Winters ISD hires new **Athletic Director and Head Football Coach**

WINTERS- Springlake-Earth ISD Athletic Director and Head Football Coach Stan Caffey was voted Thursday, February 28, 2013 at a Winters school Board of Trustees special called meeting as the new Winters ISD Athletic Director and Head Football Coach.

Coach Caffey was hired and will officially take over the duties of the Blizzards' athletic program, starting March

"Mr. Caffey (...) has successfully manned the position for the past seven years. During his seven year stretch at Springlake-Earth, Coach Caffey has had many successful football seasons and has taken the Wolverine's to the playoffs seven consecutive years," stated the Winters ISD in a press release.

Caffey's post season football honors at Springlake-Earth include: State Semi-Finals in 2010, State Quarter Finals in 2011, and Regional Finalist in 2012.

In 2012 the Wolverines had a 9-3 season claiming the District 3-1A Division II District Championship. The Wolverines defeated 38-6 Wheeler in the Area round of the playoffs, and their season came to an end in Regionals playing Wellington, with a 38-6 defeat.

In 2009 and 2010, Coach Caffey was named South Plains Coach of the Year. Coach Caffey received his bachelor's and master's degrees at Sul Ross State University in Alpine, Texas.

Caffey was raised in Seminole, Texas, where he was named to the All-State football team as a senior. He attended Sul Ross State University and lettered four years, starting three years at left guard for the Lobos. As an assistant coach, Stan worked for Gary Gaines, Don Carthel, and Hal Mumme. He was the offensive line coach for Mumme at Copperas Cove HS when they developed the Air Raid Offense.

Stan is a program builder who has turned around football programs all over Texas.

The last four years his team at Springlake-Earth has won 40 games.

Caffey highlights two special moments of his career: Congratulating the Claude Mustangs in the locker room after they broke a 24 game losing streak, and awarding the semifinal medals to his team at Springlake-Earth.

He has been married to Becky Lynn for 38 years and they have three children. All of Stan's children have followed in his footsteps and are coaches. Jeff coaches at Alpine, John David is with him at Springlake-Earth, and Meredith coaches at Nazareth.

WINTERS- Strong winds gusting up to 60 miles per hour, caused damages in several homes and businesses in the area bringing fences, trees, signs, power lines and limbs down, and tearing shingles off the roof in several places. No injuries were reported.

A roof was blown away by the wind on a building located in the west side of North Main Street. The roof of Ortiz Burritos blocked momentarily both of the southbound lanes on Highway 83, near the intersection with Novice Road.

The winds also brought down a utility pole causing damages to phone and cable lines at the place.

The Winters Police Department cleared the road with a wheel loader with the assistance of Winters Volunteer Fire Department. The road was reopened nearly at midnight.

In Winters the winds also brought down a cable line in the 200 block of Paloma Street, and the Highway 83 sign at the intersection with West Dale Street.

The National Weather Service in San Angelo received reports of winds blowing at 55 miles per hour and expecting gusts of 60 mph or more. In Ballinger, the high winds damaged a utility pole

bringing a high voltage power line to the ground on Highway 158, near the entrance to Buddy's Plant Plus. The power failure left most of the city in the dark from about 2 to 4 a.m.

In the 400 block of Avenue B a phone line was reported down. In the 400 block of Ninth Street a trampoline was blown away and hit a pipe causing a water leak. The strong winds also triggered the alarm off at Tractor Supply several times near midnight.

Wild horse and burro adoption heading to Abilene

ABILENE- The U.S. Bureau of Land Management (BLM) will hold a wild horse and burro adoption in Abilene, Texas, March 14-16, 2013. The three-day event at the Taylor County Expo Center will feature dozens of spectacular animals.

These are adult and yearling horses and burros that once roamed free on public lands in the West. The BLM periodically removes excess animals from the range in order to maintain healthy herds and to protect other rangeland resources. The adoption program is essential for achieving these important

management goals. Adoption schedule will be as follows: Thursday, March 14 - 2-6 p.m., Friday, March 15 - 8 a.m.-6 p.m., Saturday, March 16 - 8 a.m.

Application approval is required and can be done on site. To qualify to adopt, one must be at least 18, with no record of animal abuse. Adopters must have a minimum of 400 square feet of corral space per animal, with free access to food, water and shelter. A 6-foot corral fence is required for adult horses, 5 feet for yearlings, and 4.5 feet for burros. All animals must be loaded in covered stock-type trailers with swing gates and sturdy walls and floors. BLM staff will be on hand to assist adopters through the short application process.

All animals will be offered on a first-come, first-served basis for the minimum adoption fee of \$125 (set by law).

BLM pays a one-time \$500 careand-feeding allowance to adopt-

ers of horses at least four years old. The allowance is paid in full after one year when adopters receive official ownership title for their horse(s). All standard adoption conditions and fees apply. A limited number of eligible horses will be available. Younger horses, burros and trained animals are not eligible for this incentive. This incentive is designed to find homes for older horses that might otherwise be destined for long-term pastures, where they'd live out the remainder of their natural lives at taxpayer expense.

Wild horses and burros - iconic symbols of America's western heritage — are renowned for their strength, endurance, agility and intelligence, characteristics bred into them in the wild that make them ideal for work or recreation. Since 1973, the BLM has placed more than 225,000 of these "living legends" in approved homes across the country.

Spring time sees increased alcohol-related traffic crashes in Texas roads

AUSTIN- March 1 through May 31 marks the most dangerous season on Texas roadways for alcoholrelated traffic crashes. Texas Department of Transportation is reminding motorists to line up a P.A.S.S. a Person Appointed to Stay Sober - because even "buzzed" driving is drunk driving.

In 2011, spring accounted for 26 percent of all alcohol-related traffic crashes in Texas, according to Tx-DOT, more than any other season. At the same time, weekends continue to claim too many lives - more than half (58 percent) of all alcohol-related crashes occurred on a weekend in 2011. With spring break and holiday weekends approaching, TxDOT wants motorists to know that consuming just a few drinks can still impair a person's ability to drive, and it has launched a public safety campaign.

W. F. Matthews

W. F. "Hook" Matthews was born September 27, 1919, in Ft. Worth, Texas, to Jim and Dora Matthews and died February 26, 2013, at the Tally House Care Unit at Baptist Memorials surrounded by loving family and caregivers. He was preceded in death by sisters Gracie Foster, Euta Homer, Frankie Brooks and Oma Lee Klein, and brothers Chester, Jack and W.F.'s twin brother, J.F.

Family visitation was held Friday March 1, 2013, at Johnson's Funeral Chapel, in San Angelo.

A celebration of W.F.'s life was held Saturday, March 2, 2013, at Harris Avenue Baptist Church at 1026 East Harris in San Angelo, Texas. The was officiated by Randy Bush, Travis Monday and Robert Webb. Burial followed at Lawnhaven Memo-

rial Cemetery. W.F. spent his early child-

hood in Eastland County near the Nimrod Community. The family then moved to the Best Community in Reagan County where his father was a rig builder. He attended school in Big Lake. He moved back to Shep, Texas, in southern Taylor County in 1938 where he went to work for Taylor County as a machinery operator. W.F. joined the Texas National Guard in 1940, and his guard unit was activated in September 1940 when his unit became part of the 36th Division. W.F. was a proud member of the 2nd Battalion, 131st Field Artillery, E Battery. His unit shipped out from Camp Bowie in Brownwood, Texas on November 10, 1941. They then made their way by train to Angel Island, California, and boarded the USS Republic to head west. They arrived in Pearl Harbor on Sunday, November 30, 1941 (one week before Pearl Harbor was bombed) and spent one night in port before departing for the Philippines on December 1, 1941. While at sea, they received word that Pearl Harbor had been bombed, and the United States was at war. The Republic was diverted to Brisbane, Australia, where they camped at the polo grounds and remained awaiting orders for about three weeks. The unit was ordered to Java in the Dutch East Indies in early January and arrived without much of their equipment. They fought valiantly for several weeks only to be taken prisoner on March 8, 1942, by the Japanese Army and Navy. W.F. was injured during the battle for Java. He spent the remainder of the war moving from POW camp to POW camp throughout Southeast Asia working as slave labor for the Japanese war machine. For a time, he worked on the infamous "Death Railway" in Burma and Thailand. The 131st Field Artillery was not heard from until the end of war and became famously known as "The Lost Battalion". These dark days shaped his outlook and attitude for the rest of his life. The bonds of friendship formed by the "Lost Battalion" brothers have remained strong for over 70 years.

After liberation, W.F. returned to Shep where he met, courted and married Gladys Faye Wheat of Wingate, Texas, on December 12, 1946. They farmed in Runnels County for several years until W.F. and Gladys moved to Midland, Texas. He went to work for the Texas Highway Department, and they were blessed with the birth of Randy in 1955. W.F. then moved his family to San Angelo in 1956 where son, Tommy, was born in 1957. W.F. continued to work for the Texas Highway Department for over 30 years, retiring in 1980. He was very proud of the hand he played in building roads and bridges throughout West Texas and could tell countless stories about all the road jobs he worked on. After retirement, W.F. remained active spending many hours volunteering at Harris Avenue Baptist Church and Kindergarten, building and repairing furniture and toys. He enjoyed drinking coffee in the mornings with his buddies at the Dun-Bar Restaurant

W.F. was an active member of Harris Avenue Baptist Church for over 56 years, serving as a Deacon and Sunday School Superintendent as well as many other leadership positions. He was a Master Mason for over 60 years and was a member of the York Rite Bodies. He served as President and was a member of both the Concho Valley Ex-POW Association and the American Ex-POW Association. W.F. was proudest about being a member of the "Lost Battalion Association" which was made up of the survivors of the 36th Division, 131st Field Artillery and the U.S.S. Houston.

W.F. is survived by his wife of 66 years, Gladys, sons and daughters-in-law Randy and Kathy, and Tommy and Christi of San Angelo; grandsons Justin of Kansas City, Missourri, Mason and fiance Brenna Sayles, Brian and wife Tara, Mickey and wife Kayla, Bradley and girlfriend Stephanie Carter, and Dillon all of San Angelo; great-grandsons, Rian and Oakley of San Angelo. Brothers-in-law and wives, Arley and Joy Wheat of San Angelo, and Gene and Jeanie Wheat of Winters, Texas as well as many nephews and nieces and cousins.

Grandsons served as pallbearers. Honorary pallbearers were the surviving members of the "Lost Battalion" and the members of the "Lost Battalion Next Generation".

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Mediterranean diet, an alternative for the American taste

COLLEGE STATION- While a Mediterranean-type diet has long been touted as heart-healthy, it was only recently that substantial research has been done to validate this claim, said experts with the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service.

'The research recently completed in Spain was not based on anecdotal evidence or observa-

tion," said Dr. Sharon Robinson, AgriLife Extension nutrition specialist, College Station. "For this study, a significant number of people were given different diets to follow for a substantial length of time and were carefully monitored. It also involved extensive collaboration among academic, medical and health-care entities."

Results of this 5-year study involved almost 7,500 people and were published by the New

England Journal of Medicine. Participants were ages 55 to 80, just over half of whom were women. Almost all participants were overweight or obese, and while heart-disease-free at the beginning of the study, all were at high risk for heart disease. In addition to their weight, participants' health-related problems included type 2 diabetes, smoking, high cholesterol and hypertension.

"Participants were divided into three groups," Robinson said. "One followed a Mediterranean Mediterranean diet supplemented with nuts. A third control group followed a standard lowfat diet. Groups were provided dietary sessions and detailed with menus and recipes.'

showed participants following the two Mediterranean-type diets had a 30 percent lower combined rate of heart attack, stroke and deaths from related causes than those on a low-fat diet.

However, Robinson said, a notable difference between a Mediterranean and low-fat diet coming from the study was that participants could derive a greater percentage — up to 40 percent — of daily calories from fat.

WPD, school officials investigating alleged bullying at Winters Elem

WINTERS- The Winters Elementary School, Winters ISD and Winters Police Department are investigating a parent's complain about an alleged case of bullying at Winters Elementary School.

Last week a parent complained about three kids grabbing her son while they were in the restroom and punching him in the stomach. The incident occurred on Monday, one day after the kid had been released from

"I just want to bring awareness to parents, for they to know what could happen to their kids when they are at school," said the mother of the alleged victim. "I want

The woman complained to school officials and filed charges at the Police Department.

Winters Chief of Police Nathan Johnson said the case is under investigation, no significant damage was done to the child, and the case will be sent to review by the Juvenile Probation Officer once the investigation is completed.

"Because of student confidentiality and privacy laws, the district may not legally disclose any specifics in regards to the identity of the students or disciplinary measures. According to Mrs. Edwards, 'at WES it is our priority to provide a safe and orderly environment for all our students. Communication between parents and school is essential in reducing inappropriate conduct on our campus. We welcome your input," he added.

Weather Whys

Q: Why is the sky blue and not some other color?

A: From space, the Earth is seen totally surrounded by blackness, says Texas A&M University's Brent McRoberts. "But the blue sky and white clouds we see are the result of light being scattered in all directions, he explains. "We know that light is coming from the sun, and this light contains all of the colors within the spectrum. The colors of light travel in waves of different lengths, and about 18 miles up, light encounters air molecules. These air molecules allow most of the light to pass through. But blue and violet travel at small wavelengths which get scattered by these very small air molecules across the sky. This is also known as Rayleigh scattering, which makes the sky look blue. During a sunrise or sunset, the sunshine has to pass through more atmosphere, so the shorter wavelengths are almost completely scattered away, allowing a red-

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

THE ORGANIZATION OF RUNNELS COUNTY

Election of County Judge, commissioners and sheriff

WINTERS- In order to slow the Indian threat in the area, the United States Government established Army posts during the period of time about 1894. This was the line of defense east and south of the area that had become Runnels County by an Act of the Texas Legislature in 1858. The one with major significance in Runnels County History was Fort Chadbourne, located about 2 miles west of the existing county line at the northeastern corner of Coke County.

The Army had occupied the Fort on October 2, 1852 after abandoning Camp Joseph E. Johnston, located on the South side of the North Concho River in northwestern Tom Green County. The government leased land for the new site from Samuel A. Maverick for 20 years at 25 dollars per month. The fort was referred to as the Camp on Oak Creek before it was finally known as Fort Chadbourne.

The policy toward the Indians was not so aggressive during these years and confrontations were few. In the period from 1857 until the beginning of the Civil War, Fort Chadbourne was a stage line. The soldiers on guard encountered more weather extremes than Indian confronta-

Just 3 years after the Texas Legislature created Runnels County, the troops at Fort Chadbourne surrendered and the county was under the Comanche's con-

It had been abandoned by 1867 for Fort Concho in Tom Green County.

The first settlers, the Guest brothers and the Coffey family came in 1862. They built what was known as Picketville. It was a picket fenced in area to hold off Indian attacks. It was the place for the families and their livestock to have refuge.

By 1876, with the Indian threat almost eliminated, a town sprang up known as Walthall. It was located a few miles down the Colorado River. About the same time, in the northwestern part of Runnels County, so many people had moved to the area, it was given the name of Maverick after Samuel A. Maverick from whom the settlers were buying land. The closest organized county, was

Coleman, so by law they carried out the official business to organize Runnels County in a called meeting in Coleman County Commissioners Court, January 12, 1880. Under the directives of that meeting, they ordered an election be held February 16, 1880. The exact location for this meeting is not known. The first Runnels County Commissioners were elected. Precinct 1 - William Guest, Precinct 2 - W.G. Preston, Precinct 3 - P.M. Pemberton and Precinct 4 - P.S. first County Judge, W.N. Copeland was elected the first County Clerk and John W. Formwalt was elected the county's

Turner. Sylvester Adams was elected the first Sheriff.

John W. Formwalt, the newly elected sheriff, was popular in the county history. He was about 6-foot-6 inches tall. He was called the ugliest man in the country. His popularity grew when he was known to have made his friends deputies and shot out the lights in order to close the saloons at night. It was noted that he always paid for any damages. The local newspaper, the Runnels County Record noted he was known for "always fetching em". He was known to have been a tough cowboy before he

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

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
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Blizzards drop lead to tie with **Ballinger**

Ben Holden for the Bearcats worked 5 innings allowing 7 hits, 6 runs, only 1 of them earned, walked 2 and struck out 3.

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




