County Committee elections start Nov. 4

WASHINGTON- USDA Farm Service Agency Administrator Juan M. Garcia announced that the 2013 FSA County **Committee Elections** began November 4, with the mailing of ballots to eligible voters. The deadline to return the ballots to local FSA offices is December 2, 2013.

"The role and input of our county committee members is more vital than ever at a time when our country faces important choices regarding the funding and operation of our government," said Garcia. "New county committee members provide input and make important decisions on the local administration of disaster and conservation programs. With better participation in recent years, we have also seen promising increases in the number of women and minority candidates, helping to better represent the richness of American agriculture."

County committee members are an important component of the operations of FSA and provide a link between the agricultural community and USDA. Farmers and ranchers elected to county committees help deliver FSA programs at the local level, applying their knowledge and judgment to make decisions on commodity price support programs; conservation programs; incentive indemnity and disaster programs for some commodities; emergency programs and eligibility. FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out federal laws. To be an eligible voter, farmers and ranchers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program. A person who is not of legal voting age, but supervises and conducts the farming operations of an entire farm may also be eligible to vote. Agricultural producers in each county submitted candidate nominations during the nomination period, which ended on August 1 Eligible voters who do not receive ballots in the coming week can obtain ballots from their local USDA Service Center. December 2, 2013, is the last day for voters to submit ballots in person to local USDA Service Centers. Ballots returned by mail must also be postmarked no later than December 2. Newly elected committee members and their alternates will take office January 1, 2014. Close to 7,700 FSA coun-ty committee members serve in the 2,124 FSA offices nationwide. Each committee consists of three to 11 members who serve three-year terms. Approximately one-third of county committee seats are up for election each year. More information on county committees, such as the new 2013 fact sheet and brochures, can be found on the FSA website at www.fsa.usda.gov/elec-tions or at a local USDA Service Center.



The young county holds elections on early stock laws

WINTERS- The end of the year of 1884 was approaching fast. A special term of the Runnels County Commissioners Court was called on the first Monday, December 1, A. D. 1884 at the Courthouse in the Town of Runnels.

Officers present were Runnels County Judge C.H. Willingham presiding, and commissioners M.F. Bright*, T.L. Odom, Henry C. Wylie, Sheriff John McEwen Formwalt, and W.L. Towner, County Clerk. The court spent the entire day approving bonds, checking into rooms rented for county business and paying salaries and rent. They adjourned until December 22, 1884 for the purpose of receiving the election returns from Precincts 1 and 2.

December 22, 1884, a called term of Commissioners Court was held at the Courthouse in the Town of Runnels. The County Judge, Charles H. Willingham presided. Commissioners Job Davis and F.M. Bright* were present.

The court proceeded to examine the returns of the election held at content to determine if hogs should run at large in Precinct 2. The Stock Law for was 22 votes and against was 7 votes with a total of 15 votes for the law.

The next results were examined- that being to assess a tax of 20 cents per annum per \$100 worth of property in the Content School District. The monies would be for canceling debt, finishing school house and other school purposes. The final results were: for school tax, 21 votes; against school tax, 4 votes, leaving a majority of 17 votes for tax.

The returns of an election held in Runnels on December 11, A. D. 1884 to "determine whether or not hogs, sheep and goats shall run at large within an area of 1 mile from the public square" in Runnels, the results for the Stock Law were 37 votes for and no votes against the Stock Law.

The court then allowed credits on the 1883 tax rolls for a total of \$146.72, County delinquent were \$42.88 and State delinquent a total of \$69.72. Sheriff John M. Formwalt was the County Tax Collector as well as the Sheriff. The court adjourned until the next morning.

December 23, with the same officers present, the commissioners ordered the clerk to make out an account against the State of Texas for taxes due on lands bought by the State.

The court adjourned until the next regular term, thus closing out the year of 1884.

Runnels County's first Judge, Sylvester Adams, was born March 9, 1834 in Humphreys County, Tennessee. He came to Texas with his father while quiet young. When he was older, he enlisted in the Confederate Service from Bosque County March 8, 1862, He was a recruit in Speight's Battalion Texas Infantry.

Sylvester Adams was at the re-organization meeting under the conscript law, later transferring to Co. A., First Texas Heavy Artillery and was stationed in Galveston, Texas, Virginia Point and served there for the duration of the war.

November 1879, he took an active part in the organization of Runnels County, after his move from Bosque County.

At the organization meeting of Runnels County held in Walthall, Sylvester Adams was elected the county's first County Judge. The date was March 10, 1880. He was re-elected twice in succession, serving until November of 1884. Runnels County would be seeing more of Sylvester Adams in the years ahead.

Judge Adams was known to his friends as a true friend. He was a Democrat from the old school believing in a government by the people and for the people, believing implicitly in the justice of the Confederate cause, and in religion he was a Baptist.


