# Horse Vaccine Available Today

County Agent Max Stapleton was contacted Monday and asked to make a daily report on any sick horses, or horses that die in Haskell County.

This effort is going on across the state in order to stop the dread VEE in horses, that has traveled up from South America.

Stapleton is required to keep a daily record in order to keep facts up-to-date on the progress of the disease. Every horse owner is urged to contact him, if they find one of their horses dead, or if one is sick.

Stapleton was notified Tuesday morning that a supply of the VEE vaccine was made available to Haskell County, and would be here this afternoon, July 22, at 2 p. m.

Vaccine station has been set up at the Haskell County Fair Grounds and Dr. Ballard of Stamford will be here at that time to begin innoculating horses. Vaccination will be administered free of charge and it mandatory for all horses in

### Ninety-One Persons Given Chest X-rays

Chest X-rays were given to ninety-one residents of Haskell County during the visit of the Christmas Seal Mobile Unit in Haskell last Thursday.

# Biggest Generating Plant West Texas Utilities Com- bine generating unit is housed volt transmission systems.

West Texas Utilities Company's system generating capability was increased 110,000 kilowatts last week when the number four generating unit at Paint Creek Power Station at Lake Stamford was placed in commercial operation.

The announcement was made by WTU Vice President and Chief Engineer John A. Hutchison.

The increase in the capability of the Paint Creek Plant gives it a total capability of 236,000 kw, making it the largest generating station in the West Texas Utilities Company system.

According to Roff Hardy, WTU president, this increase brings total system capability to 718,500 kw., or an increase of 33 percent over the last five years. Hardy also pointed out that site preparation for the new Lake Ft. Phantom Power Station at Abilene is now underway. The first unit at the new plant is scheduled for completion in 1974.

No. 4 Construction Began 1969

The addition of the number four unit at Paint Creek began in 1969. The new General Electric conventional reheat tur-


bine generating unit is housed in a two-story, 20,000 square foot, addition to the plant. The initial boil-out of the Riley Stoker boiler was made early in March and the test runs on the new equipment were recently completed.

The construction project has been under the supervision of Walter Meller, WTU construction engineer. The general contractor for plant construction and equipment erection was Hawkins and Westbrook Construction Company of Abilene

The Company maintains and operates 8 generating plants, including Lake Pauline Power Station at Quanah, Paint Creek Power Station at Lake Stamford, Abilene Power Station in Abilene, Oak Creek Power Station at Oak Creek Lake, Concho Power Station, and San Angelo Power Station at San Angelo, Rio Pecos Power Station at McCamey and the Fort Stockton Gas Turbine Plant at Fort Stockton. 


# Cc. Health Officer Urges Precautions

"Now is the time to take proper precautions against mosquito infestations in our county," said Dr. T. W. Williams as he discussed the outbreak of Venezuelan Equine Encephomyolitis, (more easily pronounced VEE) among horses in the low er regions of Texas. "You can quarantine horses, but you can't quarantine mosquitos, and they are the carriers of the disease that is most often fatal to horses, but rarely to humans. However, humans can contract the disease, and we should get rid of all mosquito breeding spots, to lower the possible danger here."

Dr. Williams, County Health Officer for Haskell County, said, The VEE scare in South Texas has alerted us all to the danger-not just to horses, but to all human beings." He urged everyone to check

all possible breeding spots for mosquitos and eliminate them by pouring oil in the water, or by using other methods. The city is spraying to check these areas over town, but it's up to every resident to check their own property and assist in the offort. "If it rains here or south of

here, the rain will drive the mosquitos northward, and bring VEE closer to our area.



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

# Fouts Dry Goods Founded In 1918

Haskell Pioneer John Fouts, with Bob Mitchell as a silent partner, began one of the first businesses in Haskell in March of 1918 that has continued down through the years in the Fouts family to become one of the most unique businesses here.
