Gen. Claus plans visit

Lubbock, Texas — An official visit by Gen. Santa Claus is expected Dec. 25, 1988. The following procedures will govern activities during General Claus' stay.

1. Not a creature will stir without official permission. This will include indigenous mice. Special stirring waivers will be issued to staff agencies through normal command channels. Services Division will be in charge of granting mice-stirring permits.

2. Key personnel will deploy their brains for a long winter nap on or about 2000 hours, Dec. 24, 1988. Uniform for nap will be: pajamas, cotton, lightweight, drowsing style with kerchief, general purpose. Cap, fatigue, olive green with ear flaps is optional. Sleeping caps may be drawn from supply prior to 1900 hours.

3. Personnel will use standard ration sugar plums to enable required visions to dance through their heads. The Caprock Cafe will distribute sugar plums.

4. Stockings, wool type, cushion sole, white

athletic style with AF Shade 1550 blue trim, shall be hung by chimney with care. Necessary safety precautions should be exercised to avoid stocking fires. Unit safety officers will submit stocking hanging plans NLT 0800 hours, Dec. 22, 1988.

5. At the first sign of clatter from lawn landing area, all personnel will spring from their beds to investigate cause. Immediate action will be taken to throw open window sashes and tear open shutters. (Reference OPLAN "St. Nick" No. 8, para 2A, Sec. (2), Nov. 14, 1988) All sash throwing and shutter tearing should be in accordance with this directive to facilitate synchronized performance. All commanders are responsible for seeing that no sash-throwing or shutter-tearing occurs prior to the official Claus alert.

6. Prior to midnight, date of visit, all personnel will be assigned "Wondering Eye" positions. After sash-throwing and shutter-tearing, these positions will be filled.

7. Transportation Squadron will assign one sleigh, miniature, two passenger; and eight deer, rein, tiny, for use by General Claus. One motor pool driver with rooftop license will also be provided. Driver should be fully qualified and have 5-level OJT in Dasher, Dancer, Prancer, Vixen, Comet, Cupid, Donner and Blitzen operations. Rudolph qualification is not necessary but helpful.

8. General Claus will inspect quarters using chimney entrance. All base housing occupants without chimneys should draw chimney simulator M-4 from base supply on AF Form 2775 (in triplicate) prior to Dec. 23, 1988.

9. Personnel should be aware that General Claus sometimes travels with his staff. All subordinate Clauses should be treated with respect concurrent with their positions. The Protocol Section will make sure extra milk and cookies are left near all fireplaces in the event the visiting party is larger than expected.

10. All key personnel will attend shouting rehearsal at 0830 hours, Dec. 24, 1988. Shout will consist of "Merry Christmas to all and to all a good night." Squadron commanders are responsible for uniformity in shouting. (HQ, North Pole News Service)

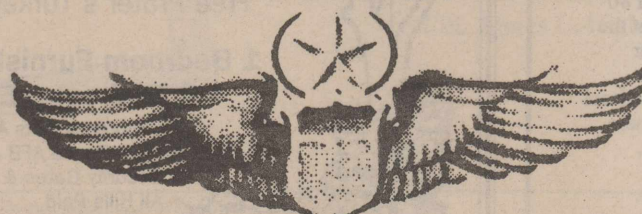

Why take drinking and driving seriously?

As the holidays begin, more and more non-drinkers tend to have a few drinks to celebrate their Christmas cheer. We at the Social Actions office are not trying to keep people from drinking, but to be more responsible about their drinking. Aside from the risk of killing or permanently disabling yourself or someone else, consider the following sobering facts about drinking and driving:

- According to the National Safety Council, drunk drivers are 25 times more likely than sober drivers to have accidents. More than 50 percent of all fatal accidents involve alcohol.

- Risk of arrest. Arrests for

driving under the influence have doubled during the past five years.

- Risk of conviction. Once convicted of driving under the influence, you face a fine, a possible jail term and attorney fees. And you will probably have to take and pay for a court assigned course on drinking and driving.

- Family problems. The expense and social stigma of an arrest and conviction for driving under the influence can create a terrible burden for the offender's spouse and family.

- Job loss and career problems. Losing a driver's license, in addition to other punishments for drunk driving, can lead to job loss. Even if you are not discharged or fired, a conviction for driving under the

influence can ruin your career. And if you've lost a job for alcohol related reasons, finding a new one can be difficult.

- Insurance rate increases. Insurance rates may increase three-fold or more following a conviction. Your insurance may even be cancelled.

In the military, you could face consequences in addition to fines and punishments from civilian authorities. You'll be referred to the installation's substance abuse program for evaluation, education, and if needed, treatment. Your right to drive on base may be suspended. You may also face other discipline, including a letter of reprimand, reduction in pay, bar to reenlistment and discharge.

Surveys to measure sexual harassment impact on military

About 8,900 Air Force active duty men and women are being surveyed this month to determine viewpoints and experiences with sexual harassment in the military.

The Defense Department is conducting the survey as part of the January 1989 recommendations from the task force on women in the military. A total of 38,000 people from all the services will receive questionnaires.

Air Force spokesman, Maj. Lou Figueroa, said the survey is entirely voluntary.

Results are to be compiled by early summer and forwarded to the Secretary of Defense and the Service Secretaries. The final report will also be made available to the public.

Major Figueroa said the task force on women in the military reported that sexual harassment continues to be a problem among the services.

"The survey will measure the impact of this issue and will be helpful in conducting on-going and new programs that address incidents of sexual harassment," he said.

The services use the Uniform Code of Military Justice to resolve incidents of sexual harassment. In addition, training on the subject is provided to recruits when they enter the military and then on an annual basis.

The survey, the first of its kind in the Department of Defense, was

prepared by the Defense Manpower Data Center under the direction of project officer, Dr. Melanie Martindale. It is sponsored by the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Force Management and Personnel.

Completed surveys are being tabulated by a civilian contractor.

Approximately 21,000 men and 17,000 women will receive surveys. Major Figueroa said active duty women are being oversampled to ensure adequate representation among survey respondents. Women make up to 10.4 percent of the active duty force.

The surveys and pre-addressed return envelopes are being sent to targeted respondents at their unit mailing addresses. (AFNS)

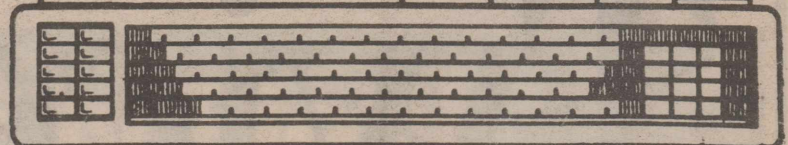

Tips to increase on the road safety

No one drives during bad winter weather unless they must. However, business or holiday plans often make winter traveling necessary. The following tips on traveling in winter weather may make your trip safer:

- Plan your trip carefully, listening to weather reports and travelers' advisories and keeping an alternate route in mind. Let someone know where you are going and what time you plan to arrive. Travel by daylight and use major highways if possible. Try not to travel alone.

- Be sure your car is in good running order and properly serviced. Make certain your tires are in good condition. Snow tires or chains are best for winter driving, but all-season radials are adequate if you live in an area with light to moderate snowfall. Before you start out, clean snow and ice off all parts of your car — windows, hood, roof, trunk and lights. Snow left on the car could affect visibility once you start driving.

- Keep your gas tank as full as possible, especially if you are unfamiliar with the route you are traveling or are entering open country and also to prevent gas line freeze-up.

- Even if you restrict your

winter driving to short, local trips, certain supplies can help in an emergency. You should always keep basic items such as a windshield scraper, battery booster cables, a tow chain or rope, a bag of sand or gravel, and a flashlight in your car. For longer trips, you may want to add a transistor radio (with extra batteries); a first aid kit; road maps; some non-perishable foods such as nuts, dried fruit, or candy; matches and candles; blankets; and two or more large coffee cans (for sanitary purposes and to burn candles for heat).

- Don't overdress when driving. Even on short trips, your clothing should be loose-fitting and comfortable. Heavy clothing should be removed after the car has warmed up. But pull over to the side of the road instead of struggling out of heavy clothing while driving.

- If you should get caught on the road during a winter storm, keep calm. Give some indication you are in trouble — turn on your flashing lights, raise the hood, or tie a cloth to an antenna or door handle.

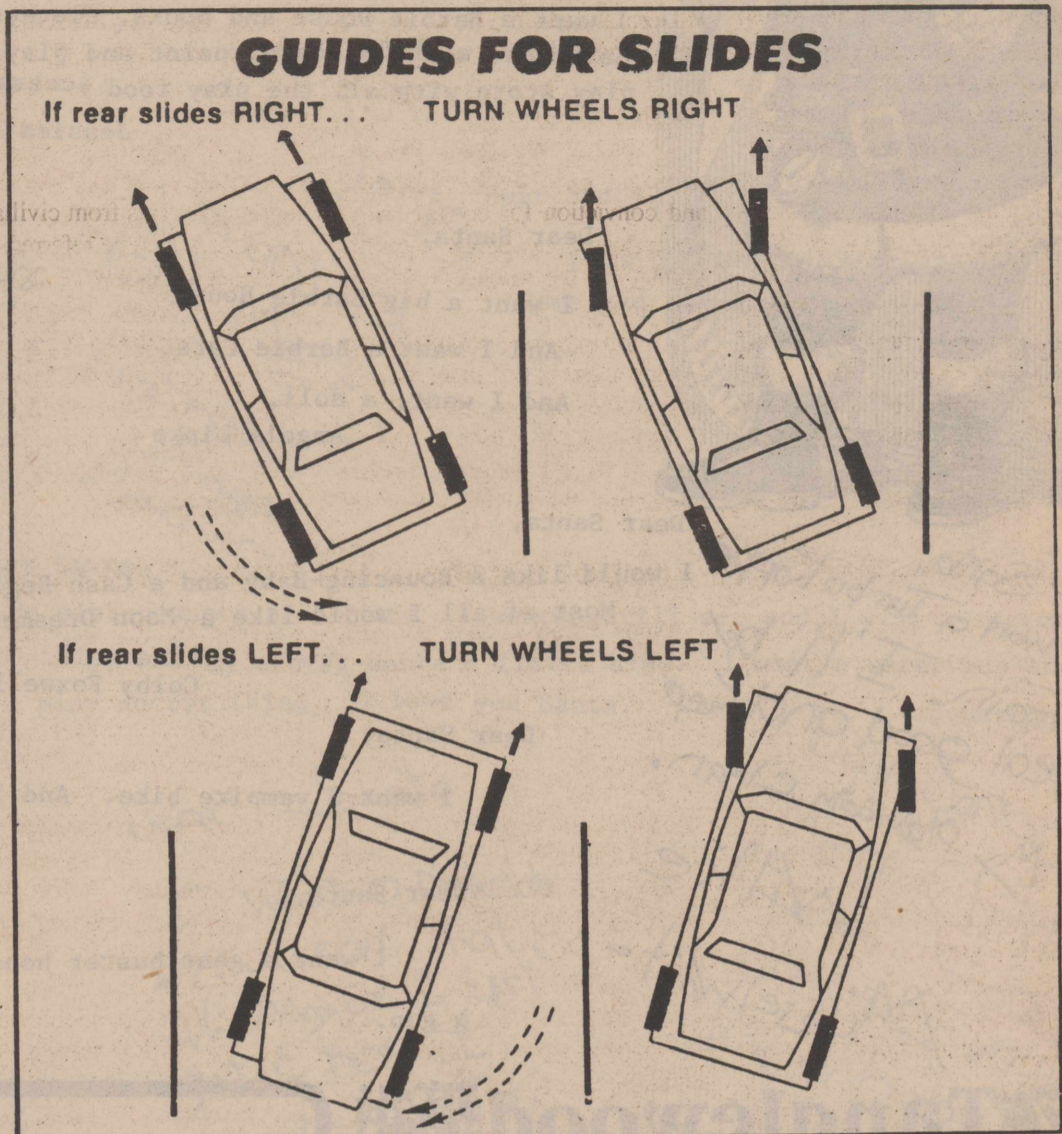
- Stay in the car. Do not try to walk from the car unless you can see a shelter within a reasonable distance; disorientation comes quickly during a blowing

snowstorm.

- For heat, turn on the car engine for brief periods. To avoid

deadly carbon monoxide poisoning, always leave a downwind window open slightly.

Also, make sure the exhaust pipe is clear of snow when the engine is running.

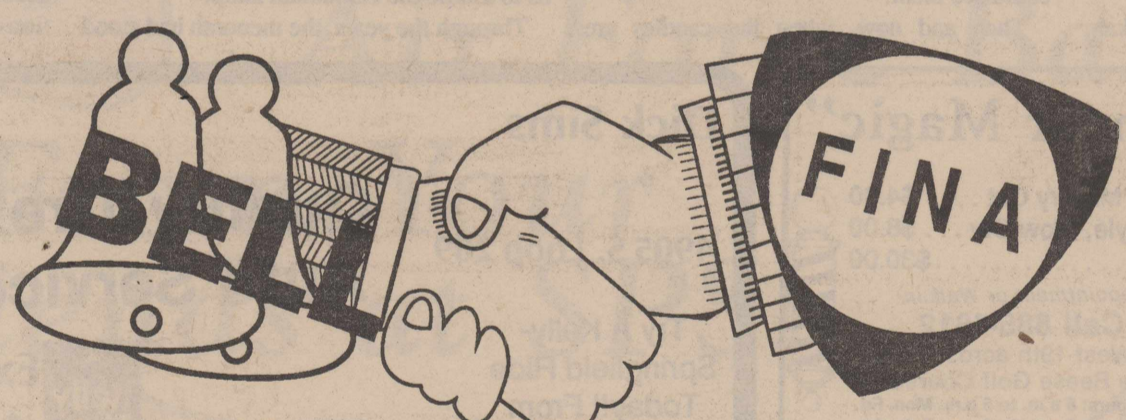

Improper use of Christmas toys may lead to tragedy

Children and toys go together. Dolls and toy animals have been found in the pyramids of Egypt, the burial mounds of Persia and the ruins of ancient Crete.

Now it's customary to give toys during the Christmas season to share the joy of the holiday with children. But that joy can turn to sorrow if the toy is inappropriate or unsafe. The first step in buying safe toys is to check the recommended age levels on the packaging.

A statement like "recommended for children aged six and over" is a safety tip, as well as a reference to the intelligence it takes to play with the toy.

Age levels are set by the consumer product safety commission using information gained through experience and research. They've

learned that very intelligent two-year-olds may still be tempted to pull small parts off a toy and put them in their mouths. Don't try to challenge a child by purchasing toys that are meant for older children. Take the age levels as the safety guides they are meant to be and try to keep an older child's toy away from younger brothers, sisters and friends.

It helps if the older child is taught to put toys away. Toys for children aged four and under should be too large to swallow and have no small, easily removable parts.

When buying for this age group, avoid toys with long strings or cords that can cause tripping accidents or strangulation. A basic rule for all age groups is to avoid toys that shoot objects, especially arrows or darts without secure, blunt rubber tips. Electric

toys with heating elements should only be used by children over eight years old and they are best used under adult supervision.

After the child starts playing with the gift, it's wise to check the toy's condition every once in a while. If a child pulls a toy apart, he or she can be hurt by the edges or points inside a toy.

Even the harmless baby doll may have wires or sharp sticks holding it together. And after "accident proofing" a child's toy, take a look at the toy box. It should have a lift-off or spring-loaded lid that allows it to stay open, and some form of ventilation incase a child ends up inside. The spring-loading device also prevents injuries from lids falling on children.

Using common sense when purchasing

toys and teaching children the right way to play with them are the best ways to prevent a Christmas present from becoming a safety risk.

Before buying a gift, think of all the ways you played with toys as a child, then buy accordingly.

These are only a few of the safety factors involved in child's play, but parents do have help in protecting their children. Besides the standards set by the CPSC, the toy manufacturers of America have developed voluntary product safety standards accepted by most American toy makers. Exchange customers have an added advantage—AAFES Quality Assurance Division puts special emphasis on safety testing of toys AAFES considers for sale. (AAFES)

Hanukkah celebrates religious triumph

Editor's note: Many readers have heard of Hanukkah during this time of year but were not certain of its historical significance. Although this celebration was observed earlier in the month of December, the following provides an interesting insight regarding the Feast of Lights.

Many centuries ago, a small band of Jewish soldiers fought and won the first recorded battle for religious freedom. They resisted and overcame the Syrian King Antiochus who had attempted to suppress the Jews and their religion.

This war was called the Maccabean War since the Jews were led by a priest named Mattathias and his five sons who became known as the Maccabees—the Hebrew word for hammer—because in battle after battle they dealt hammer blows to the enemy.

Feast of Lights

It is to celebrate this significant victory that the Jews observe Hanukkah, or the Feast of Lights, each year.

For eight days beginning on the twenty-fifth day of the Hebrew month of Kislev, they give thanks for the great event that insured the survival of Judaism.

On each of the eight days of Hanukkah,

Jews light candles; one the first day, two the second, and so on. A special nine-branch candelabrum (menorah) is used. The ninth candle is not allowed to burn until the last day of Hanukkah to celebrate the miracle that occurred in the Temple when the holy place was rededicated after it was recaptured by the Maccabean warriors.

When the lights in the temple were rekindled, the oil that was supposed to last for only one day, lasted for the entire week. Thus, candles are lit for eight days and one candle is made to last through the week.

Hanukkah celebration

The Hanukkah celebration includes many festive customs. Among the traditional decorations is the six-point Star of David. Gifts exchanged by the family are wrapped in blue and white paper.

Special symbols of the festival include the elephant, because of the war elephants used by the opposing armies, and the hammer, in commemoration of the Maccabees.

The first Hanukkah lamps or menorahs were not intended for reading but were placed near windows so that passers-by in the streets could see them.

Then and now, when the candles are



lighted, the person lighting them and those who look on recite: "Blessed be the Lord our God, King of the Universe, who has sanctioned us by Thy commandments and enjoins us to kindle the Hanukkah lamp."

Through the years, the menorah had stood

for light and truth. The Hanukkah menorah also stands for people's love for liberty. It glows in the synagogue and in the home; it guides the Jew through his life, and often accompanies him when he dies as an inscription on his tombstone. (AFNS).

ATC begins review of flying training

Headquarters Air Training Command is initiating a broad area review of all undergraduate and graduate flying training in an effort to improve the quality of training through the next decade, with special emphasis on those items required to support the specialized undergraduate pilot training program.

"This review will take a strong, candid look at all facets of flying training," said Lt. Gen. Robert C. Oaks, ATC commander.

Undergraduate pilot training, Euro-NATO Joint Jet Pilot Training, pilot instructor training, the flight screening program and specialized undergraduate navigator training will all be reviewed.

"We'll take a look at the philosophy of flying training instruction, syllabus requirements, instructor manning, the quality of the student entry and assignment process, deputy commander for operations organization, training facilities and quality of life," explained Col. Danny Parnell, BAR (broad area

review) project officer and director of programs and resources, deputy chief of staff for operations and readiness.

ATC flying units and headquarters staff agencies and accession sources will be active participants in the BAR. In addition, various air staff organizations, major commands and other agencies with a direct interest in flying training have been invited and encouraged to provide input.

The BAR process will officially kick off with a conference at Randolph AFB, San Antonio, Texas, Jan. 18 - 19. The BAR process will continue with periodic conferences until all issues are identified and resolved and resolutions are implemented or programmed.

"A Broad Area Review of our flying training programs will give us an opportunity to identify areas that warrant improvement, make the appropriate revisions to improve them and, consequently, help improve the quality of flying training through the 1990s," said General Oaks. (ATCNS)

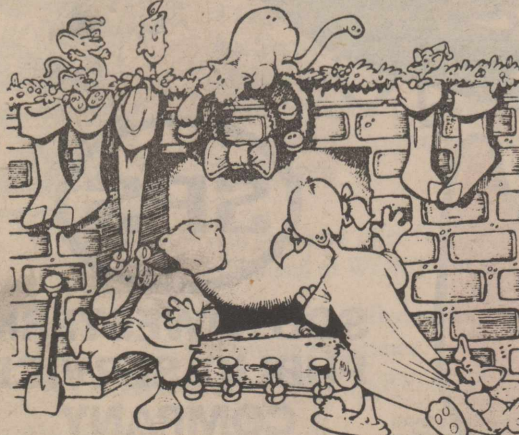

Housing rates increase for some, decrease for others

The Department of Defense has approved new variable housing allowance (VHA) rates effective Jan. 1. Set by grade and location, at with and without dependents levels, the rates are based on a 1988 DOD wide housing costs survey. The previous housing survey was conducted in 1986.

Two out of three Air Force members drawing VHA will see their monthly VHA rates drop next year because housing costs in their areas declined or grew less than housing costs nationwide. Housing costs include rent, utilities and maintenance expenses reported on the VHA survey. By law, mortgage principal and interest costs are not included in the data used to set VHA rates. Most people, however, will still receive more money overall for housing because of a average seven percent increase in quarters allowances.

About 44 percent of the VHA reductions are \$20 or less; 16 percent are greater than \$50 per month. For those with VHA increases, nearly 53 percent of the increases are less than \$20 and about 10 percent are \$50 or greater per month. For a few, VHA reductions will be greater than both the BAQ increase and the 4.1 percent basic pay and subsistence allowance raise. About

2.7 percent of VHA recipients will take home less pay next year because of VHA reductions.

The 1988 survey showed housing costs in costal areas, such as Los Angeles, Washington, San Diego and Boston, continued to escalate. At the same time, costs in Hawaii, Alaska and many inland locations have declined or grown at a slower pace than the national median. Median is the midpoint between the highest and lowest housing costs.

The new VHA rates reflect those survey trends. The VHA formula is designed to equalize median out-of-pocket housing expenses by grade. Effective Jan. 1, median out-of-pocket expenses will drop to 21.5 percent of the national median cost for each grade, down from 1988's high of 22.5 percent. BAQ plus VHA will equal 78.5 percent of the median housing costs in each grade. (AFNS)

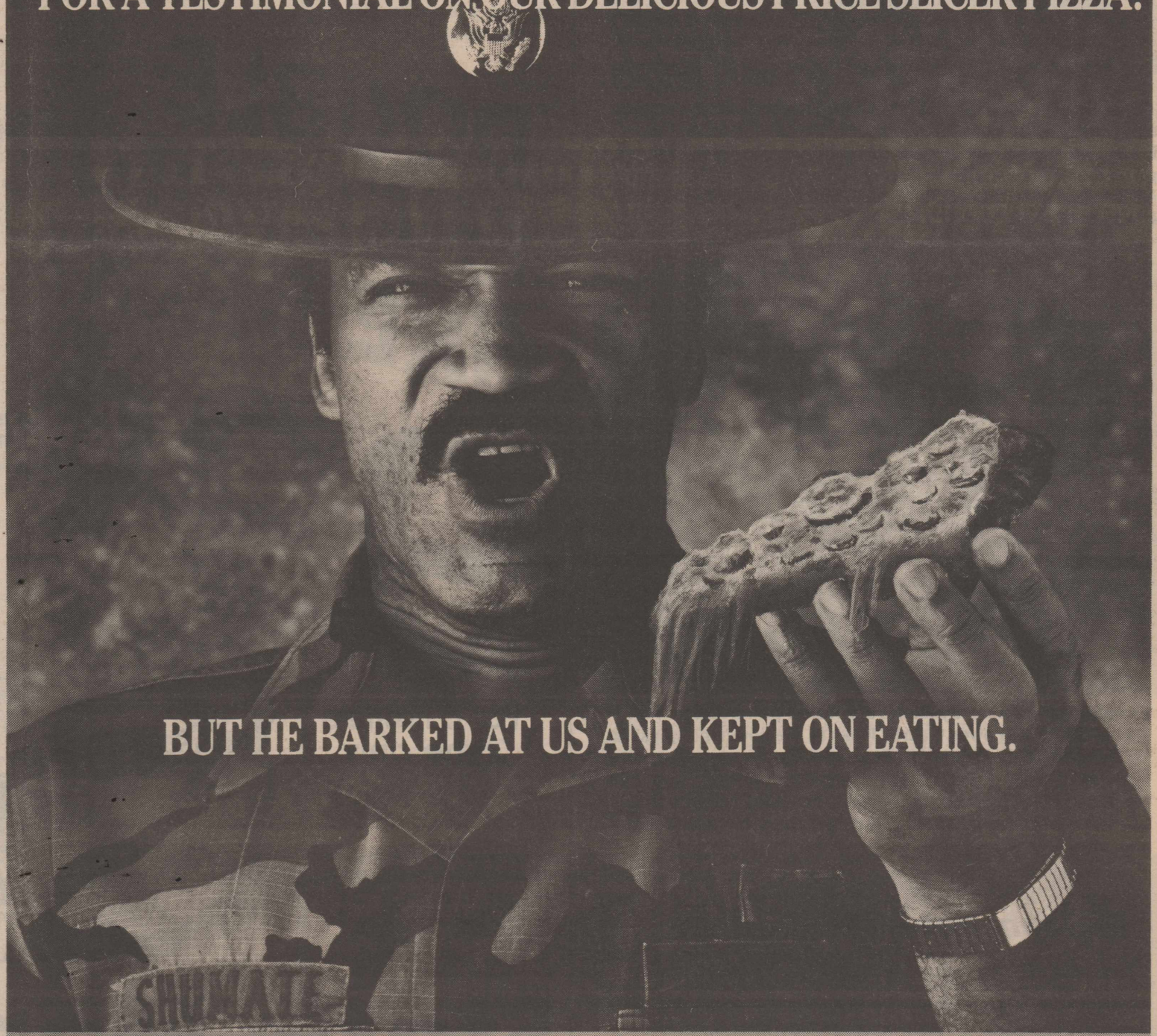
Suggestion program

Museum Notes from Texas Tech University

The Peter Rogers mural at the Museum at Texas Tech University is one of a relatively few major murals done in black and white. The artist favors that medium because, he says, it allows him to express mood by utilizing the forms of nature "without the distraction of color."

The Moody Foundation gave funds for the construction of the Moody Planetarium at the Texas Tech Museum. The current planetarium has been in operation for 18 years. Before that, the original Texas Tech planetarium operated for 17 years.

The Museum of Texas Tech University houses more than 800,000 artifacts in its permanent collections. Only a small portion of the collection is on display at one time. Fitness and health

Do you have any tips on how to properly stretch before exercise?

A rule of thumb for many stretches is: The simpler they are to execute and the more familiar they are, the greater the benefit to you. It's not good to overstretch, but it is important to effectively stretch key areas of muscle to achieve flexibility. Specifically, the targets of flexibility stretching are the muscles and the tendons that attach the main muscles to bones.

Six caveats for all stretches:

- Don't bounce into the stretch; gradually push into the stretch.
- Don't forget to breathe while stretching, inhaling during the resting phase and exhaling during the work phase of the stretch/exercise.
- Don't do exercises that require bending at the waist with your legs straight.


- Don't do deep knee bends or full squats.
- Don't use weights while stretching without proper instruction.
- Forcing body parts beyond their normal range of motion can result in injury.

Stretch after your heart rate has slowed. This is an ideal time to stretch, because muscles and joints are nice and warm after exercise. Slow, static stretches will help increase flexibility, and may help prevent tight muscles.

Pay special attention to those muscles most used during your activity. A runner, for example, needs to do extra stretches for the muscles in the lower back and the back of legs. Use your stretching time wisely.

The secretary of the Air Force approved a proposal to mandate Direct Deposit participation for all Air Force people. In general, all new military accessions will be required to have their military pay deposited with the financial organization of their choice effective 60 days after reaching their first per-

manent duty station. Student trainees will be exempt from mandatory participation until arriving at their first permanent duty station.

Participation in the Direct Deposit program will also be a condition of employment for new civilian employees effective 60 days after reporting for work.

Implementing procedures, participation guidelines, and other information will be disseminated

when received.

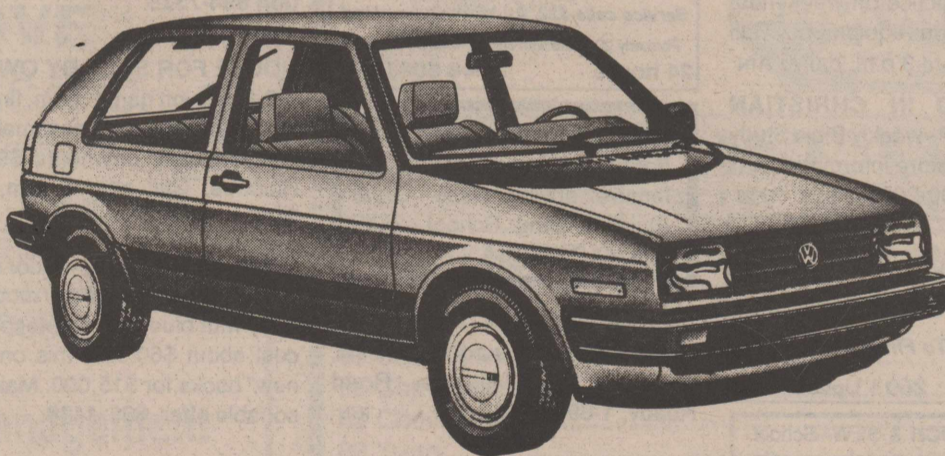

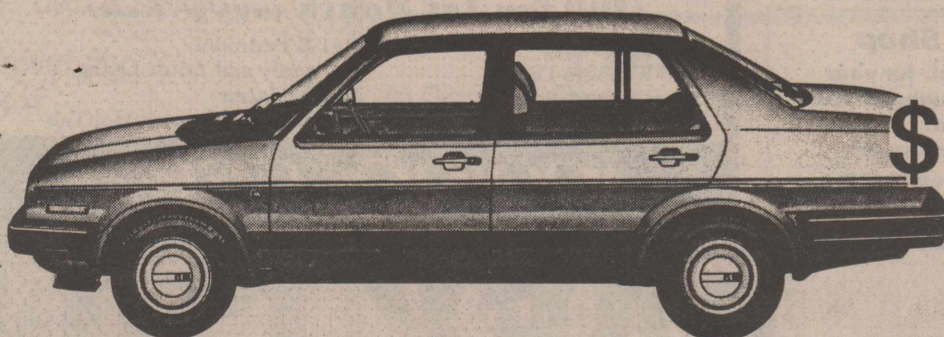
