Primary Election Saturday

4,633 Haskell County voters will have their chance to stand back of their opinions on Texas politics Saturday, May 6, in the Primary election. And if the precedent established in past primaries holds true to form, voters will turn out strong. Not only do citizens have a chance to have their say on who takes offices in Austin, but they will vote on one contested race in the County — that of sheriff. Incumbent G. T. (Garth) Garrett seeks re-election, while J. R. (Skeeter) Miller and Tom P. (Bull) Barnett both seek their first election to the post. Precinct 6 has one contested race—that of constable, with both L. V. (Sonny) Pitcock and Raymond Denson seeking the office. A Precinct Convention will be held at 2 p. m. election day, May 6, in each election precinct.

Frontier Days 'Ready To Roll'

With only eleven days left on the calendar until the opening kickoff of Haskell's Frontier Day Celebration and Jaycee Rodeo, things are shaping up nicely and all details are expected to be worked out by May 15. Present indications are that the street parade scheduled for 5 p. m., Thursday, May 18, will exceed all others ever presented in Haskell. Ten area riding clubs and sheriff's posses have already notified Frontier Day officials that they will be here for the big day of the annual celebration. They are: Seymour Riding Club, Vernon Riding Club, Winters Riding Club, Quanah Riding Club, Nolan Co. Sheriff's Posse, Stonewall Co. Riding Club, Scurry County Sheriff's Posse, Fisher County Sheriff's Posse, and Junior Posse, and Haskell's own Sheriff's Posse. It is expected that at least five more will advise that they will be here before parade time rolls around. Several outstanding high school bands will add lively music to set the tempo of the western parade which is expected to draw hundreds of local people and visitors to line the streets of Haskell for the colorful event. Immediately following the parade the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department will serve the delicious meal of barbecued ham with all the trimmings to an expected crowd of 600 persons. Tickets for local people are now on sale at the Chamber of Commerce and from directors of the chamber. Also, tickets for the big cavalcade show to be presented in the barnyard theatre at the rodeo grounds are available at the Chamber of Commerce. Everyone is urged to purchase tickets for both the barbecue and the cavalcade in advance. Frontier Days officials need an idea of how many to prepare for and how much seating capacity to have available for the Cavalcade show and the queen's pageant Tuesday night, May 16. Several business firms have already turned in their entry for the Queen's Pageant which will again be a very spectacular and interesting part of the overall Frontier Days Celebration. This particular phase of the week's program is under the direction of Mrs. R. A. (Frances) Lane who is expecting from 30 to 40 entries for the pageant presentation. The last three nights of the week will be devoted to the ever popular Jaycee Rodeo which will involve hundreds of cowboys and cowgirls from three or four states of the Southwest. The outstanding string of rodeo stock of the Campbell and Cordell Rodeo Company of Childress will again be here to provide western competition for the contestants in the various events. All local men and women are urged to dress western or "old timey" for the week's celebration as well as to participate in the different phases of the Frontier Days Celebration. All of the week's entire Western program will take place at the Fair and Rodeo grounds with the exception of the colorful street parade on Thursday. Charles Thornhill, president of the Haskell Jaycees; Frank Jenkins, chairman of the rodeo; and all members are working around the clock to have the grounds ship-shape for the big show which gets underway on Monday, May 15th. The Chamber of Commerce, the Jaycees, the Fire Boys, the American Legion and others will all be working together to make this year's Frontier Days Celebration a memorable one. All citizens are urged and invited to "Get into the Game" and play their part in making Haskell a byword for the little town that gets things done in a big way.

This is the initial step in organizing one of the most beautiful events of Haskell's annual Frontier Days celebration. Mrs. A. C. Richardson reigns as 1971 Frontier Day Queen. An entry fee of only \$5.00 will give a merchant the right to sponsor a woman—entrants only requirement is that they must be 20 years old or older—in the beautiful show that has become one of the highlights of the Frontier Week in Haskell. All entrants model Frontier Day costumes to compete in the contest. Merchants are urged to call their entry choice, the day they get the entry form, and confirm their participation. Then, fill out the entry form and get it to Haskell Chamber of Commerce. That's all that is required of the merchants. The rest of the work and planning will be in the hands of the efficient and conscientious workers of the Queen Pageant committee. Get the entry forms in, and more details on the show will be published next week.

District 18 PTA Holds Conference

A huge crowd attended the 17th annual conference of Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers, Dist. 18, at the First Presbyterian Church, Haskell, April 25-26 to hear views on the new four-quarter school system and discuss other business pertinent to the organization. The conference decorations were themed "Western" and done by Haskell Young Homemakers, both at the conference meeting rooms, and at City Cafe where the pre-conference board meeting was held. Entertainment was provided by a western band composed of Clarence Meier, Ken Wolch, Perry Force and Jesse Sanchez. Haskell Mayor J. Belton Duncan welcomed visitors and keynote speaker for the first session was Mrs. Fred Parker who spoke on "The Power of PTA." A panel on "The Three 'I's' of Schools" was moderated by A. E. Wells and panelists included Loyd R. Bell, C. G. Whitten, Aleise Cline and Haskell Superintendent H. T. Wilkinson. The four-quarter system, mandatory after next year, was explained and discussed by the panel. Students will attend three 60-day quarters instead of the previous two 90-day semesters. In 80-minute class periods instead of 55-minute ones, they will cover the same amount of material in each course, taking four instead of six courses. This system, however, may promise to create many financial problems for the smaller schools. Operating costs, more teachers and running school buses over longer periods were just a few of the problems that schools may have to face. PTA Life Memberships were awarded. D. E. Fitzgerald, and Kenneth C. Short already had received these. Others honored were Mrs. Joe Thigpen of Haskell and Mrs. Robert Erwin of Ira. Chairmen of the District Conference were Mrs. Loraine Johnson and Mrs. J. W. Wallace of Haskell.

A Wichita Falls team of Carl Hall and Mike Zinni took a one-stroke victory here Sunday in the championship flight of the Haskell Country Club partnership golf tournament, when some 70 teams were entered in play. The Cocktail Soup



Cold soups are a wonderful basis for hot weather meals. Usually a cold soup is served in a glass bowl or cup placed on a bed of chopped ice. The appearance of this appetizer is appealing to almost all and when it's teamed with a fruit salad and hot french bread, it becomes an exquisite lunch.

An unusual variation of this theme is *Chilled Sardine Soup* served from an ice-bucket into well chilled old fashioned glasses containing colorful swizzle sticks.

Chilled Sardine Soup

- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 2 medium potatoes, peeled
- 1 can (10 1/2 oz.) bouillon
- Chopped scallions or green peppers
- 1/2 soup can of water
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 cans (3 1/2 oz. each) Maine Sardines
- 1 1/2 cups rich milk or half and half

Saute onion in butter in saucepan until soft. Add potatoes, bouillon, water and salt. Cover and cook 30 minutes or until potatoes are tender.

Blend potatoes, broth and sardines, about half a blender full at a time until smooth. Stir in milk and chill. Serve topped with chopped scallions or green pepper. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Borscht With Maine Sardines

- 1 jar (32-ounces) prepared borscht
- 1 can (3 1/2 ounces) Maine sardines in oil, drained
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon prepared horseradish
- 1/2 cup sour cream

Strain vegetables from borscht and put into a blender container. Add sardines and a little liquid from borscht and blend until smooth. Add to remaining borscht liquid with lemon juice and horseradish and stir until blended and smooth. Chill. Serve well chilled in an ice-bucket. Top with a spoon of sour cream on each serving. Makes 4 to 6 servings.



\$113,342 Estimate County's Share Revenue-Sharing

Governor Preston Smith released the following statement today concerning the Revenue-Sharing Bill which was approved by the House Ways and Means Committee:

will be retroactive to January 1, 1972. "We have worked closely with the Committee and Chairman Wilbur Mills to provide all assistance which would be helpful to the Committee in their deliberations. As a result of this close communication, we are now receiving detailed information as to specific allocations to the various counties of the State. Initial estimates indicate that a total of \$113,342 will be allocated to all governmental units in Haskell County. Of that amount, the county government

will receive \$63,905, the city of Haskell will receive \$30,942, the city of Stamford (part) will receive \$1,039.

"The balance will be distributed to other cities and towns within the county.

"It would appear from these early estimates that the bill, if finally enacted, will provide substantial fiscal relief to the hard-pressed cities and counties of Texas. At the same time it will afford a real opportunity to improve and expand on those services which the people feel are most critically needed.

"I have strongly advocated approval of these funds to our cities and counties and I will continue to support these provisions until final Congressional approval is received."

JANUARY, 1970
criticized the 1970 Feed Grain Program announcement because of its failure to cope with rising production costs by maintaining the same support and payments to the program. FU also criticized the abandonment of the advance payment program because of financing requirements of small farmers.

TFU—succeeded in speeding up final payments for the 1970 wheat, feed grain programs by two months.

TFU—sponsored senate legislation for advance feed grain payments.

continued to build the Farm Organization Coalition to 27 general farm and commodity groups.

sponsored a "fly-in" of farmers from states across the nation in support of the National Farm Bill.

protested the reduction in projected yields of cotton in Texas.

1/2 c. margarine

In hot margarine brown meat quickly on all sides, a few pieces at a time. Over low heat, cook meat slowly, until tender, remove meat to platter. In releasing Treasury figures, County Bond Chairman R. W. Herren announced that sales of U. S. Savings Bonds in Haskell County during March totaled \$14,233. During the first quarter of 1972, sales were \$44,290 for 18 percent of goal achieved.

Texas purchased \$18,288,542 in Savings Bonds during the month compared to March 1971 sales of \$17,180,080—an increase of 6 percent. Quarterly sales totaled \$56,927,138 for 28 percent of the state's goal of \$202.3 million.

National sales of E and H Bonds amounting to \$582 million were reported for March, 13.3 percent above 1971 sales of \$513 million. Sales for the three-month period totaled \$1,640 million—31 percent of the National goal of \$5.3 billion.

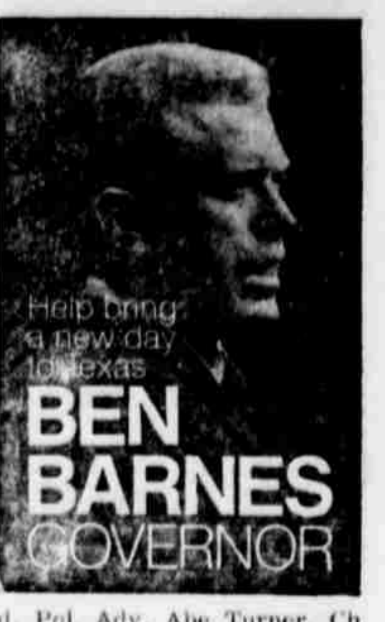

Farmers Union Works Toward Better Agricultural Legislation For State

At a meeting in Waco April 24 the state Farmers Union Board commended members of Congress for efforts to shed light on the "ever widening spread in food costs between the farm gate and the super market." The resolution supported congressional efforts to limit further entry of food processors into farming and ranching and called on President Nixon to instruct the Price Commission to continue the ex-

emption of raw agricultural products from price controls. The statewide general farm organization Board of Directors urged Gov. Preston Smith to include changes in the trailer safety legislation in the call for the next special legislative session. The resolution pointed out that the present rules of the road being administered by the Department of Public Safety are costly and difficult to administer.

Turning its attention to farm taxes, the farm organization leaders called on candidates for Governor and Lt. Governor to direct their campaigning to specific solutions for the state's tax problems. It called on all candidates that are concerned about the welfare of the rural

areas of the state to support state tax reform and advocate a corporate profits tax.

The farm leaders took a position on the Administration's proposal to transfer certain programs and agencies out of the United States Department of Agriculture into a proposed Department of Community Development, and asked modification of a bill that has been proposed to establish a Wheat and Wheat Foods Research, Education and Promotion Program.

Texas Farmers Union president Jay Naman of Waco expressed the organization's approval of recently announced regulations exempting farm and ranch-used spare parts from sales tax. He said, "We are pleased that we have finally won a long-time fight for this important tax break. This has been a Farmers Union objective for many years."
