

13th annual Junior **Livestock Show** to start this Thursday

WINTERS ENTERPRISE

BALLINGER- The 13th Annual Runnels County Junior Livestock Show will be held on January 9-11 at the Ballinger Community Center with over 130 4-H and FFA members from across the County participating. This years' show will feature approximately 400 livestock projects from youth participating in the 4-H and FFA programs in Ballinger, Miles, and Winters school districts.

All livestock will arrive at the Community Center on Thursday, January 9 and weigh in from 5 to 7 p.m. The snows will begin on Friday morning, January 10 at 9 a.m. with the swine show. After lunch, the show will resume with the rabbit show followed by the meat goat show Friday afternoon. On Saturday, January 11, the lamb show will begin at 8 a.m. followed by the cattle show at approximately 10:30 a.m.

The Runnels County Premium Sale will be held at 2 p.m. on Saturday in the show ring with every youth having the opportunity to sell a project.

The premium sale is the largest single event in Runnels County that supports youth projects and helps 4-H and FFA members gain scholarship funds and funds for future projects. A noon buyers meal will be held in the Community Center for all sponsors, contributors and buyers. Local and area businesses are invited to attend the premium sale and help support the youth of Runnels County. All funds generated in the premium sale go to the 4-H and FFA youth.

Historical venue

The Old Texas Theater closed in the late 1970s, one of the last movies shown was Star

The movie theater will be reopening on Friday night, January 17 with the live featuring of comedian and juggler Mark Angelo. The grand opening will also include a ribbon cutting and skit by local teens. The theatre will be showing movies and open for events.

After almost 40 years dormant, the Old Texas Theater will be re-opening its doors with a live show and grand opening on Friday January 17, 2014

BALLINGER- Friday, January 17, 2014 will be a historical date in Runnels County, as the Old Texas Theater in Ballinger will be coming back to life after spending the last four decades dormant. The place, originally built as the Palace Theater, has not been operational since the late 1970s, but has been completely renovated over the past 18 months.

"The theater was bought by its new owners in August of 2012, and the remodeling started right then," said General Manager Kael Denton.

Former Midland residents Paul and Katy Morrow moved to Ballinger, and decided to buy and remodel the theater.

"From the first moment they wanted to re-open the theater for business and started working in the seating, wiring, lighting, they put new tile in the lobby, they remodeled all the woodwork, it was a complete restoration," Denton

The place was also plaster-coated, and the walls were chipped off to reveal the stone underneath. The stage was extended and given a proscenium arch façade. An addition was made to the back of the building to accommodate storage, an office, dressing rooms and staff restrooms.

The "Texas" sign was also restored, and now shines announcing the re-opening of the place. According to local residents this sign originally sat across the street, in the original Texas Theater, but it was moved to the Palace when the Texas Theater burned down to the ground.

New year brings extreme cold to Runnels County

BALLINGER- Ballinger and Runnels County started the year with extremely cold weather, following a national winter storm caused by the so-called "Polar Vortex" that affected every corner of the United States territory. Monday, January 6, 2014, the mercury plummeted to 15 degrees Fahrenheit, and the highest temperature recored couldn't make it pass freezing.

According to the National Weather Service office in San Angelo, the maximum reached at 5:24 p.m.

was 32, while the lowest temperature recorded regionally was at 7:59 a.m. for a daily average of 24 degrees. No precipitation was recorded regionally along with this cold front.

Despite the extreme temperatures, they are far from the lowest on record for the day. According to the NWS archives the lowest on record for January 6 was recorded on 1947, when the mercury dropped to a chilly 5 degrees.

These cold temperatures are following a series of regional historical records, such as the

day record-setting 1-inch snowfall recorded in San Angelo on Friday, December 6, 2013. The snowfall broke the old record of trace set on December 6, 1969.

That same day, a record low maximum temperature of 31 degrees was set at Mathis Field, in San Angelo, which broke the previous record of 34 degrees set on this day in 1972.

A record low temperature of 25 degrees was also set on Saturday, December 7, 2013 at Mathis Field, breaking the 33 degree mark set







Weather Whys

Q: Can you have freezing rain, snow and sleet at the same time?

A: Yes you can, says Brent McRoberts, of Texas AS&M University. "Winter storm systems frequently contain all three," he says. "Very often, you can have more than one precipitation type at the same time. All three types of precipitation begin falling from clouds as snow. If a snowflake doesn't encounter air warmer than 32 degrees as it falls to the surface. you will have snow. If the snowflake encounters warmer air beneath the cloud, it will melt. Sleet occurs when the melted snowflake has a chance to refreeze before reaching the ground, while freezing rain occurs when it doesn't freeze until contacting the surface. Forecasting the type of precipitation is difficult because just one or two degrees in temperature difference can change whether an area receives rain, snow, freezing rain or sleet.

THE ORGANIZATION OF RUNNELS COUNTY

Railroad was what everyone hoped for

WINTERS- While it seemed the major activity was in the center of Runnels County, settlement of the area immediately surrounding what would be the city of Winters began in the 1880s. Two families, the C.N. Curry's and the C.E. Bells staked claims to parcels of land about one mile southeast of the present-day town. By 1886, other families had settled in the area.

Railroad was what every settlement hoped for but only if it came through their community. The Runnels County Record, January, 2, 1886 reported: "since there was no reason why the line should not come through Runnels City, let the company be assured that Runnels City would exhaust every legal remedy that could be devised to keep the county seat. Some people began looking after Runnels City's interests within a few days by circulating a petition praying the court to order an election for county seat. If Runnels City were legally chosen, and it was a foregone conclusion that it would be since its opposition was an unknown desert spot near Valley Creek (Maverick), then the railroad would be more likely to come there. All of the speculating gave the Runnels City's leaders a job to make sure of their city's permanent position.

Early January, 1886, citizens of Runnels City, unable to stand the strain any longer, met at the Courthouse to devise ways and means of inducing if possible the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railroad to come to Runnels City.

Colonel McCord made an encouraging and pertinent talk in which he pointed out that Runnels City had a better chance of getting the railroad than Coleman City had had when they first commenced real, earnest action. The Runnels City's citizens appointed Judge C.H. Willingham, T.A. Thompson, Herber Stone and George D. Nichols to go to Galveston to confer with the railroad authorities on behalf of Runnels City.

The meeting established a standing committee of solicitation to obtain donations and those present donated some part of their property that they could spare and obtain the much desired result. The meeting then adjourned.

The next morning, the Judge and his associates on the committee started to Galveston. The Runnels Record, January 16, 1886 stated they had every confidence they would return with the intelligence as to the future interest and prosperity of the Town of Runnels.

As was reported in the Fort Worth Gazette a few days later, the article' headlines: "THE RUNNELS DELEGATION MAKES A TEN STRIKE FOR THAT ENTERPRISING CITY." By January 23, 1886, one of the directors of the company estimated the value of the Runnels City's offering at \$50,000, and spoke favorably of accepting the proposition. All seemed certain but there was hint of a conspiracy involving one member of the committee. The Fort Worth Gazette mentioned only three present. It could have been that George Nichols did not go. Of the three mentioned, only one lived

in Runnels City – Judge C. H. Willingham. Stone and Thompson lived outside the county but were on the committee because of their landholdings and possibly their contributions used to entice the railroad officials to Runnels City.

Some residents questioned the intensions of the County Judge, but the Runnels County Record came to his defense. "Although we know that he has interests down on the river, still we know of his sense of honor and sympathy with the people who were his neighbors and friends. He paid his own expenses for the trip." They did question — did he pay his own way so he could advance his interests down on the river while in Galveston?

The year of 1886 was starting out to be a very stressful and a very dry year. The drought had set in and was very devastating in all areas of the residents of the town and the surrounding areas.

rounding areas. The regular term of the New Year began with the Honorable Runnels **County Commissioners** Court meeting February 8, A.D. 1886 with Judge C.H. Willingham presiding. All four commissioners were present. They were Job Davies, H.H. Luckett, F.M. Bright and Henry Wylie. The Sheriff, John McEwen Formwalt and W.L. Towner, County Clerk were also present. The court among items addressed were the taxes for the year of 1886. State Ad Valorem Tax = 25 cents, School Tax = 12.5cents, County Ad Valorem Tax = 25 cents, Road and Bridge = 7.5 cents, Occupation Tax= one half of the State Tax. In School District No. 1, Runnels Tax was 20 cents per \$100 value of

property. In Content, it was the same.

The court adjourned to meet the next day, February 9. They examined reports for all roads. The report of taxes collected for the Runnels School was \$74.03 and for Content, it was \$50.59.

The court examined a petition signed by residents and qualified voters asking that the court order an election for the purpose of deciding if hogs or swine should be permitted to run at large in the following territory. Beginning at the north corner of Runnels County; then south with the west boundary line to the Colorado River; then down the River to Valley Creek; then up Valley Creek to the north boundary of Runnels County; then west with the boundary to line of beginning. The court continued

with examining the road reports, appointing overseers and also road hands. They appointed the following presiding officers as managers of Elections for the Precincts of Runnels County for the year 1886. Precint No. 1 – H.D. Pearce, Precint No. 2 – Alfred A. Hanscomb, Precint No. 3 – C.M. Teel, Precint No. 4 – W. E. Allen, Precint No. 5 – D.H. Cameron. The clerk recorded the meeting and decisions in the minutes, then the court adjourned

Five Texas Department of Agriculture credits will be available: one in the integrated pest management category, two general, one laws and regulations, and one drift minimization.

The course will include presentations on integrated pest management control of fire ants and forage pests, brush control strategies, pesticide laws and regulations, fruit and pecan tree management, and drift minimization and equipment calibration.

"The training is called the last chance course because it's the last time our office will offer Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units before the February 28 deadline," said Josh Blanek, AgriLife Extension agent in Tom Green County. Older licenses renew on February 28, though more recently issued licenses renew on the anniversary of the date they were originally issued."
