

Runoff early voting is underway

BALLINGER- Early voting for the Republican Primary and Democratic Primary runoff elections is currently underway until Friday, May 23. Election day will be Tuesday, May 27, 2014. Early voting in Runnels County is being conducted at the Courthouse Annex building, located on Strong Avenue behind the Courthouse in Ballinger.

Voters who casted a ballot for the Republican Primary back in March will be now deciding between eight contenders in four contested races for Republican tickets. Looking for the Republican nomination to Lieutenant Governor are incumbent David Dewhurst and challenger State Sen. Dan Patrick. The winner of the runoff will be facing Democratic State Sen. Leticia Van De Putte in the General Election in November.

The Republican nomination for Attorney General will be for either Dan Branch or Ken Paxton, while looking for the nomination for Commissioner of Agriculture are Tommy Merritt and Sid Miller. The Railroad Commissioner nomination is being sought by Wayne Christian and Ryan Sitton.

On the Democratic runoff only two positions are up for election. Looking for the Democratic nomination for United State Senator are David M. Alameel and Kesha Rogers, while Richard "Kinky" Friedman and Jim Hogan are up for the Democratic nomination for Commissioner of Agriculture.

No local elections are being held in this runoff in Runnels County. Early voting will run through May 23.

If a voter voted in the Primary Election, the voter must vote in the same political party runoff election. If a voter did not vote in the primary election, the voter may still vote in the runoff election and for the party of his or her choice

A photo ID is required to vote in Texas. Acceptable forms of ID include: driver license issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety, Election Identification Certificate issued by DPS, personal identification card issued by DPS, concealed handgun license issued by DPS, United States military identification card containing the person's photograph, United States citizenship certificate containing the person's photo, United States

Livestock and rangeland workshop to be held June 2

SAN ANGELO- The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service in seven area counties will conduct the Livestock and Rangeland Revitalization Program from 1-5 p.m. June 2 at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center in San Angelo.

The center is north of San Angelo on U.S. Highway

"This program is designed to assist producers with objectively evaluating their current rangeland resources so they can adjust their stocking rates accordingly," said Marty Gibbs, AgriLife Extension agent in Runnels County. "All the topics will center around the premise that we are moving past our traditional 'rainy period' and therefore must make yet more livestock-related decisions and range management adjustments in order to survive another year of drought.

Cotton outlook better than last year but still a mixed bag

SPECIAL TO THE WINTERS ENTERPRISE

COLLEGE STATION- Though recent rains improved the cotton outlook for some regions, it's still a "mixed bag" for the state overall, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service expert.

The March predictions by the National Cotton Council were of a double-digit percentage increase in plantings over 2013, and those still hold water, said Dr. Gaylon Morgan, AgriLife Extension statewide cotton specialist, College Station.

However, Morgan noted that planted acres do not always equate to harvestable acres during prolonged "We still have some of the major cotton producing

areas of the state - Rolling Plains, South Plains and the

Panhandle - in either extreme or exceptional drought," he said.

There has been a number of challenges to all cotton growing areas throughout the state, Morgan noted. There was a late spring cold front in April that hurt emerged cotton and delayed planting in South and East Texas, for example. This problem, along with worsening of drought in practically all the state in the past few months, has raised the stress level for cotton

"It's been a frustrating year for many, to say the least,"

But rains have greatly improved things for the time being in South Texas, Central Texas, east of Interstate 35,

and the Blacklands, Morgan noted. Although time is limited, there's still some hope for

other parts of the state to catch up. In the Rolling Plains, those with irrigation have pre-watered and were already planting, he said. As for Rolling Plains dryland producers, they will need a rain before they can hope to establish a crop. They have until mid-June as a final planting 'And there's a good chance of rain (for the Rolling

Plains) later this week," Morgan said.

Warmth for the wounded

BALLINGER- From the sewing room to warming the hearts of veterans all over the United States. Sandra Brookshire Behne, a Ballinger resident, recently joined a Facebook group to volunteer her quilting for armed forces veterans, and what she found was a very effective way to thank them for their love and dedication to this country.

Through Quilts of Valor, a non-profit foundation started in 2003 with the goal of making quilts to comfort war-wounded veterans, Behne and other quilters in the country have been making the difference in the lives of veterans and their families.

Behne joined thinking that she could make a difference by letting them know that there is still people that care and are thankful for what they do. "Many of these veterans feel that they have been forgotten, and I wanted to make them feel that we care, that we appreciate what they've done for our country," she said.

Behne started receiving blocks, and before she knew it quilting them together became a fulltime job. So far she and her group have finished 15 quilts, which have been presented to veterans in Oklahoma, Georgia and West Virginia.

"They send the blocks and I put them together, so far I have received 767 blocks, each one of the quilts takes 24 blocks,' she said.

The Quilts of Valor Foundation was started by Catherine Roberts, a Blue Star mom in Seaford, Delaware. She was inspired by the deployment of her son to Iraq. The idea behind the foundation is to link quilt-toppers with machine quilters in a national effort to cover all returning service men and women touched by war. Quilts of Valor Foundation has become a national grassroots community effort connecting the home front with combat-wounded warriors.

The quilts are made by a quilt-topper, of fabrics quilted by dozens of longarmers. After the quilts have been washed, labeled and wrapped in a presentation case, they are shipped and presented to the recipient.

"It's amazing to see the videos of these veterans, how they break down in tears when they receive the quilts because they know that there is somebody that cares," Behne said.

These unique quilts have touched the hearts of thousands of troops in all 50 states, and overseas in Germany, the UK, Australia and Canada.

For Behne the quilts have a special meaning "because a blanket warms the body, but a quilt warms the soul," she said.





Q: How much advance warning time is there before a tornado hits?

A: New technology has improved advance warning times dramatically, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. "The National Weather Service says that in recent years, the amount of pre-warning time before a tornado hits has almost doubled," McRoberts explains. "It is now as high as 11 to 15 minutes before it strikes. That's up from only 5-6 minutes in the 1980s. Also, there s now something called the Emergency Alert System used by many radio and TV stations. This system automatically takes control of a broadcast and advises listeners and viewers of an approaching tornado. When an alert is sent, a warning is automatically scrawled across your TV screen with a break in programming."

THE ORGANIZATION OF RUNNELS COUNTY

The brass band in Ballinger, a symbol of status

WINTERS- It had been about four years since the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railroad came to Ballinger, and the only thing lacking was a brass band. This was a serious matter in the minds of many local people. In a time when a brass band not only was an aesthetic asset but Valso a status symbol of the first magnitude, the Runnels County Ledger felt that Ballinger needed a band "worse than any-thing." As well as being good for the town at that time, its presence would insure that "we could have whatever we want ≈in the future." Mr. J.Y. Pearce came to the rescue and met with "flattering encouragement," from everyone he approached about the formation of the band. Local musicians quickly rallied and with the band an accomplished fact, Ballinger felt com-

plete in all respects. In the decade from about 1890 to 1900, newspapers and local organizations began their promotion of Runnels County on a scale that dwarfed all previous efforts along this line. Ballinger assumed the lead in the formation of the Pecan, Colorado, Concho Immigration Association. The association circulated pamphlets and special editions of the county newspapers by thousands. They sent agents to prominent points on incoming railroad lines to entice new citizens. This intense activity probably was hundred feet of rope, and the Hillcrest Addition. The

had some effect in bringing new settlers, although they might have come to Runnels County anyway. After all of this effort, the population did not increase any more rapidly during that decade than prior to 1890. At the organization in 1880, the county population was 1,000 and by 1890, it was 3,193, then in 1900, records showed the in-

crease was up to 5,379. Saloons still flourished and so did other businesses although somewhat more subdued. Two moves to outlaw the sale of liquor met defeat. The newspaper's reports of the sociable evenings spent in eating barbecue and "tripping the light toe" at the Wylie Ranch, fish fries and religious revivals were replacing reports of shootings, fights and generally rambunctious conduct. In the early 1890s it was an offense to ride a horse more than 6 miles per hour through the streets of Ballinger. Fines could reach up to

The spirit of the open range was almost entirely gone, but Fogg Coffey, the youngest son of Richard and Sarah Coffey of the Walthall area, maintained at least a symbolic protest against the changing times. When Ballinger passed the ordinance forbidding the cowboys to wear their guns to town, Fogg complied with the letter of the law and showed his contempt for the spirit of it by leading his shooter into town on a

The county's social standards were changing and religious activities became more important. A group of Bohemians began to arrive into the county where the majority was considered Protestant. Most had been associated with some kind of frontier religion, camp meetings under a brush arbor, week(s) long revivals and various fundamentalist doctrines. Most of the time, amicable relations usually prevailed. There developed within the Christian Church of Ballinger, a faction opposed to some parts of the doctrine, individuals and or both. Finally, the dispute became so serious that the dissenters, under a Minister known as "Weeping Joe" Hardin, withdrew from the church and went to South Ballinger where they erected their own church. This failed to satisfy some and difficulties quickly arose within the new group. The melee resulted in shootings and beatings with clubs. Within a few months, the church building burned.

after that. The Ballinger Cemetery Company was formed when ten acres were sold to the city by the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railroad July 11, 1888. According to testimony, the Cemetery was used only two or three years and included approximately a dozen graves at the most. The cemetery was located in what is now

character of the ground caused it to be abandoned by the community and bodies were removed by relatives to the area now known as the Evergreen Cemetery, located south of the Colorado River. A few transients and those whose relatives could not be located, maybe three or

four were left behind. August 12, 1890, H.D. Pearce sold 15 acres of land to the City of Ballinger. The purpose of this purchase was for a new cemetery. It would be called Evergreen. Later, about 1903, the City of Ballinger conveyed four lots to Commander J.H. Routh and H.D. Pearce, Adjutant of The Henry E. McCulloch Camp Confederate Veterans for "love and respect of our people to the indigent Confederate Veterans of Runnels County. These lots are located in Section 1 and they are numbers 19, 20, 59 and 60.

The earliest marked grave in Evergreen Cemetery is that of Rosannah Tudor Wylie, wife of William Hawthorne Wylie, who died January, 1884. There were others that died before the establishment of Evergreen in 1890, they were possibly reinterred in Evergreen.



More than 170,000 TRICARE Prime beneficiaries were dropped from Prime coverage and automatically enrolled onto TRICARE Standard on October 1, 2013 as required by TRICARE regional service contracts. The contracts condensed Prime Service Areas (PSA) to within 40 miles of a military hospital, clinic, or BRAC base closure site. The FY 2014 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) allows many beneficiaries dropped by the reduced PSA to get their Prime coverage back again. Beneficiaries that reside within 100 miles of a military medical treatment facility or live in a ZIP code that was a Prime Service Area as of Sept. 30, 2013 will have the option to re-enroll in Prime. On April 28, 2014, the Defense Health Agency (DHA) will mail re-enrollment forms to these impacted TRICARE beneficiaries. They have until June 30, 2014 to re-enroll in TRICARE Prime. 


