Jerry Williams

Jerry Lee Williams, 24, brother of Marvin L. Williams of Stratford, died when he jumped from his truck as it crossed in front of an oncoming train in Borger last Friday morning.

Mr. Williams was dead on arrival at the Borger hospital having been struck by the truck after he jumped from his cab. Officers said Williams was hit by the rear wheels of his truck just before it was struck by the oncoming Santa Fe train.

The truck was carrying 246 head of hogs and traveling about 15 mph when it crossed into the path of the train about 1:15 a.m. Friday.

Mr. Williams was born at Bynum and came to Plainview about a year ago from Edmonson. He was a Vietnam veteran and a member of the First Baptist Church of Edmonson.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Williams of Plainview; seven brothers, James of Abilene, M.L. of Stratford, H.L. of Sunray, David, who is with the U.S. Army in Germany, and Randy, Alvin and Teddy, all of Plainview; four sisters, Mrs. Eldon Benton of Abernathy, Mrs. Morris Benton of Ralls, Mrs. Mickey McCurty of Chula Vista, Calif., and Mrs. Benny Evans of Olton.

A member of the First United Methodist Church of Stratford, Miss Harris taught in Stratford before moving to Wichita Falls.

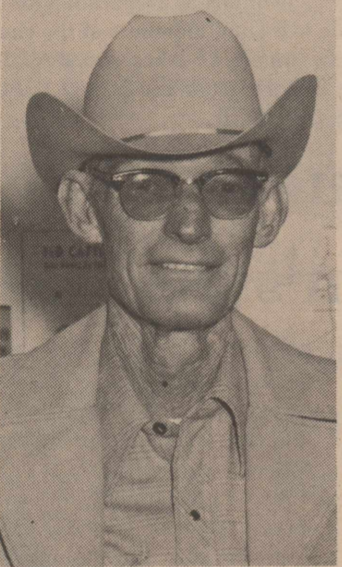
Survivors include two sisters, Miss Hazel Harris of Stratford

H.M. (Howard) White has announced his candidacy for the office of Commissioner, Precinct 4, subject to action of the

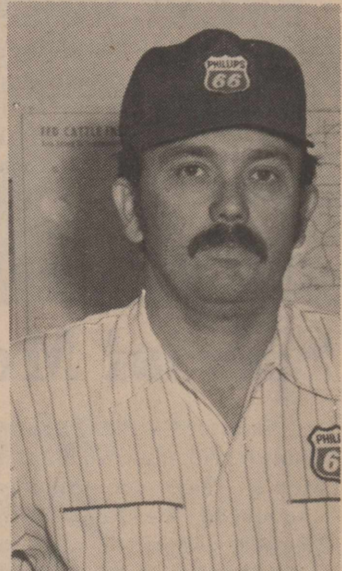

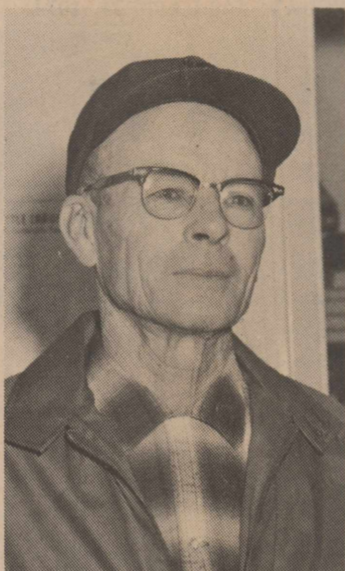

Tom Wakefield has announced his candidacy for the office of Sherman County Commissioner, Precinct 4, subject to the action of the Democratic Primary set for May 4.

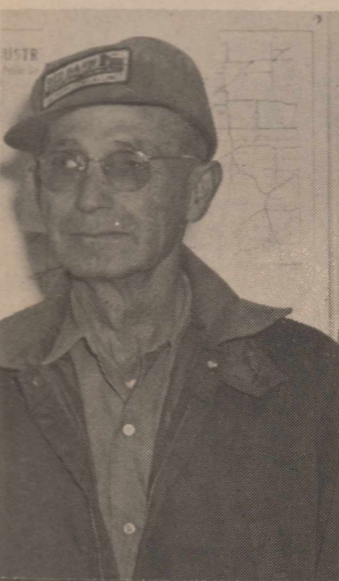
Wakefield has previously served as commissioner, holding the office for two terms during the mid-1960's.

again, under present law.

If a person has moved to Sherman County since last year's elections, they should come to the Court House and request a transfer in order to become a Registered Voter in this county.

A person can register within 30 days prior to an election and become eligible to cast a ballot in that election. This refers to a person who is a Texas resident. A person who moves here from out of state must reside in the state for six months before being eligible to vote in Texas.

Simply explained, if you have been a regular voter in Sherman County for the past three years, chances are you are already on the Registered Voter's list. However, if you are a new resident, and haven't taken time to transfer, you should go by the Tax Assessor-Collector's office as quickly as possible.
