Ditzler is a native of Dumas and says he intends to serve residents of Stratford, Cactus and Sunray with Plains products.


No stranger to this area, Ditzler has served the area for Meads Fine Bread for the past 12 years and is a member of the Stratford Country Club.

# **Annual Consumers Event Breaks Record**

Over 250 attended the 1974 Ledbetter was instructing a at 2 p.m. Wednesday in the Annual meeting of the Stratford Consumers Company's held Saturday night in the high school cafeteria.

> Five members of the board of directors were reelected to office and the company's annual report was given by Leon Guthrie, manager.

> The board elected for this president; A.E. Pronger Jr., vice-president; Joe Flores, secretary: with other members H.L. Haile and S.J. Lavake.

> Guthrie's report on company business was highlighted by the fact the gross business of the cooperative topped \$500,000 for the first time since its beginning back in 1930.

The Consumers Company's total gross sale for 1973 were \$550,694.27 an increase over last year's record setting total sales by some \$150,356.69.

Guthrie said the big increase was the largest increase in one year the company had ever experienced.

The net margin of the company jumped to a whopping \$43,340.95 for 1973 as compared to \$11,767.31 a year previous. Guthrie reported that with the

fuel situation as it is today, he did not know what the new year would hold for the cooperative.

"We used to try to figure a year ahead," Guthrie told those present," "Now all we can do is try to keep the doors open from day to day!" he added.

Consumers used to be a 24-hour operation seven days per week. Since the changes brought on by the fuel crisis, the cooperative is open six days per week and closed from 10 p.m. until 7 a.m.



# **Applications** Being Taken For Patrolmen

Major C.W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today the DPS is accepting applications for the post of State Trooper.

Applicants selected as cadets will enter 18 weeks of training at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin in a class tentatively scheduled to begin June 11, 1974.

Bell said general qualifications for DPS Troopers are: Applicants must be 20 through 35 years of age (inclusive), good moral character; excellent physical condition; height not less than 68 inches nor more than 76 inches; weight not less than two pounds nor more than three and one; half pounds per inch of height; visual acuity no worse than 20/40 correctable to 20/20; and a citizen of the United States. Educational qualifications, which are now a minimum of 45 semester hours of college, will increase to 60 semester hours on September 1,

He pointed out that qualified female applicants are now being accepted for the uniformed services of the DPS, and that the Department has been increasingly successful in recruiting

persons from minority groups. During the training period, cadets participate in some 850 hours of law enforcement classes on a wide variety of subjects such as criminal and traffic law, human and community relations, and investigative techniques. The schooling includes rigorous physical training, marksmanship, and skills related to pursuit driving.

Some of the classes are taught under an agreement between DOS and St. Edward's University, and Academy graduates receive credit for six semester hours of college work.

After graduation, cadets will be commissioned as Probationary Trooper I at a salary of \$743 monthly and assigned to the Highway Patrol, License & Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service or Driver License Service according to the needs of DPS and consideration of personal preference.

The salary automatically increases to \$768 per month after six months. Upon completion of 12 months comissioned service, Probationary Troopers are promoted to Trooper I at a salary of \$820 monthly. Officers electing to remain in a non-supervisory uniformed position are eligible to complete for promotion to Trooper II after 60 months commissioned service.

All DPS officers receive fringe benefits including hospitalization and life insurance, paid vacations and sick leave, and holidays as for all State employees. Uniforms, vehicles and equipment are furnished and Troopers receive a uniform cleaning allowance. Expenses are paid when away from home

In addition, personnel are members of both the State Employees Retirement System and social security.

Bell said prospective applicants should contact any DPS office of Trooper for application forms. The completed material should then be taken to the nearest Regional, District of Sub-District Department of Public Safety office where the competitive examination is given each Tuesday and Wednesday of the week.

Arrangements will be made for a physical examination. A character investigation will also be conducted and applicants who are selected for the Academy will be notified prior to the start of the recruit school.

President Price Daniel Jr.'s 90-day timetable for the historic task went out the window when debate on the education article dragged over 11 half-day sessions

Even Daniel conceded as the education article debate droned toward a close that the convention is off schedule. He said he still feels, however, that there is a chance to make up for lost time by speedy action on relatively non-concroversial (if any) sections.

More pessimistic delegates are stating now that the whole convention assignment is in jeopardy due to strong feeling additional supplies through on many issues.

At root of the problem, many now acknowledge, is the basic difficulty of getting elected officials to agree on monumental decisions during an election year.

Pressure is mounting for recess until after the May now comes to about 925,000 and June primary elections. Daniel hopes to keep the delegates plugging away at decision making until early April. If it is then obvious that the job is a long way from complete, he probably will go along with motions to take off until after the elections, although he isn't ready to commit himself to all fuel marketable in Texas






