American Beef Packers Grand Opening On Saturday

A free western barbecue that is expected to draw 15,000 to 20,000 persons Saturday will introduce what is the largest beef processing complex today--six acres of beef kill and fabricating plant under one roof and scheduled to process 2,500 choice beef

The giant beef complex is being completed by American Beef Packers, Inc., of Omaha, Neb., on a 130-acre site 20 miles south of Stratford, on the Sherman-Moore County line.

Saturday's whingding, which ABP is hosting, will have all-day tours of the giant facility, an automated production line tooled with the latest equipment in the meat packing industry. It will include a special ribbon cutting, some formal talks and a special hostess, the cirrent "Miss Texas," Judy Mallett of Beaumont.

Tours of the plant, which will be on stream late in June, will be conducted by Moore county 4-H club girls. County extension agents from a 200-mile radius will be specual guests.

Sherman County 4-H'ers will be among the many guides to be on hand for the big opening Saturday. They will include County Agent Jim Allison with 4-H members Colette Schwertner, Sherri Waters, Pam McReynolds and Honey Hart. This group had a special

preview of the opening this past weekend when they were all guests of ABP officials.

But possibly the biggest single feature of the festive weekend, which starts Friday, will be the giant barbecue, for which APB has delivered 12,000 pounds of choice brisket beef from its Fort Morgin, Colo. plant. Barbecue chief is Don Morton, Dumas industry executive, veteran of a dozen large barbecue-and-beans feeds, but none of nearly this size.

The barbecue will run from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. and will be served in a series of lines by Dumas Lions Club volunteers.

A shuttle of buses will carry visitors to the plant site from the courthouse square in Dumas, an operation necessary "to avoid as much as possible parking congestion at the plant site," explains Herb Reavis, Dumas, chamber of commerce chairman for the

The packing plant, however, has some nine acres in concrete parking area and holding pens for cattle. The company will employ 800 workers when in full operation late in the summer, and has more than 200 already at work, including some 40 supervisory personnel at different levels.

The ABP plant is what the meat packing industry calls its "new

generation" operation, as American Beef Packers is a "new generation" company, and a ranking one in the industry.

Briefly, the "new generation" plants are single story, sprawling layouts but with highly automated production lines that convert a choice 1,000 pound beef animal to marketable parts with maximum

efficiency, in time and in utilization of product. The new generation company plants also are located in the center of cattle feeding regions, an arrangement that minimizes loss through cattle hauling and in holding time in pens.

NORTH PLAINS The North Plains facility is the sixth, and largest, in the American Beef Packers system, built at a cost of more than

An Omaha-based company, only seven years old, ABP had \$729,066,000 in sales in its last fiscal year, ending June 1, 1973, and expects this figure to reach \$1-billion in fiscal 1974. Its system includes five beef slaughtering and processing plants,

one hog operation and a \$40-million-volume dairy products and distributing firm in the midwest. The company, third largest in sales in the meat packing industry,

expects to move into the number two place with the new operation.

The new industry, which has boomed home and business building in the north Panhandle area for 18 months, is the first in Schroeter Industrial Park, a 706-acre site that was developed in close cooperation with the federal Environmental Protection Agency, and with substantial EDA funds and participation by the federal Economic Development Administration.

The ABP plant site is 130 acres. Its building proper, one story but with some walls running 75 feet high, is of pre-stressed concrete and has some 255,000 feet under roof.

A trucking division that will serve the giant packing plant-that is larger and will handle more beef animals than any other in the world--will employ another 100 persons.

"Conservatively, we anticipate more than 1,000 added workers in the ABP operation and in support firms," declares Jerry Van Zanten, executive vice president of the Dumas chamber of

The industrial park, 20 miles south of Stratford, has electric and natural gas service, rail spurs from the Santa Fe Railway that flanks the park, water and sewer service adequate to serve a city of some 40,000 paved roads through it and US Highway 287 along one side.



A runoff will be held Saturday, June 1, to decide the Democratic nominee for the office of Sherman County Commissioner for Precinct 4 with Tommy Wakefield and Roscoe Dyess making the runoff.

Both Wakefield and Dyess are former commissioners and will be seeking a return to that office in the June runoffs. Wakefield led the ticket in

Saturday's Primary with a total of 123 votes with Dyess hot on his heels with 118 votes to qualify for the runoff. The other candidates, and their votes received included E.A. Hamilton with 104; H.M. White with 70; Charles T. Watson with 60;

AUSTIN, Tex. - New federal revenue sharing funds totalling \$294,045,044 will be distributed to state, county and city governments in Texas during the next fiscal year.

This is \$9 million more than allocations for the current year which amount to \$285,228,345 for all units of government in

Gov. Dolph Briscoe reported state government will get nearly 3 million more for the 1974-75 fiscal period beginning July 1 than the 1973-74 allotment. State government's cut is

\$98,081,488 compared with 895,283,690 for this year. An overpayment of \$108,711, due to an Office of Revenue Sharing mistake in Washington, will be deducted from next

ear's funds sent to Texas. The allocation is based on a formula including consideration of population, per capita income and tax effort.

Under next year's formula,

Six Texas counties will get larger revenue sharing allotments while some cities within the counties will get smaller

The Dallas County total will increase from \$3.58 million to \$5.2 million. The city of Dallas will get slightly less - \$13.1 million, as compared with \$13.6 million. Corpus. Christi's total will decline from \$3.66 million to \$3.4 million, San Antonio's from \$9.6 million to \$9.3 million, El Paso's from \$6.1 million to \$6 million and Fort Worth's from \$5.26 million to \$5 million.





It also has a high moisture content and a woody texture which does not oulverize well. But it is CHEAP. For instance, one-million BTU of lignite energy costs 14c at the

mine, one-million BTU of bituminous coal energy costs 40c, and natural gas sold interestate costs 30c while natural gas sold intrastate (no government price controls) sells for over \$1.00. So you can see the price advantage of lignite. It is also very low in sulpher content. Two power plants are now

burning lignite to generate electricity and four more power plants are being constructed. The area is being considered for a plant to enrich uranium, a process which has a huge appetite for electricty. The next step is gasification of lignite through a simple process which will produce an even greater demand for the ore. The state of North Dakota has approved the construction of four gasification plants by Michigan-Wisconsin Pipeline Co., which will produce 250 million cubic feet of gas daily for the gas-hungry Milwaukee and Chicago metroplexes.

A major objection to the gasification plants is the large amounts of water which they consume. Average rainfall in that area is only 6 inches per year and this is needed for irrigated farming.


