

In other business the Court appointed Commissioner Joe Everett to serve as the local representative on the PRPC District Mental Health & Retardation board. he replaces Commissioner Dale Hamilton in

The court adjusted pay for election judges and clerks due to the changes in wages and hour laws. In the future election judges will be paid at a rate of \$2.50 per hour with clerks receiving \$2 per hour.

The Court okayed half the purchase price of 1,000 feet of new fire hose to be used by the Stratford Fire Department. The other half of the cost will be borne by the city.

Members of the Court voted to recess until 2 p.m. Tuesday when they will open bids for the remodeling of the Court House and to also make some decision as to whether or not to participate in the Federal Manpower Training Program being offered for this area.

The Court took the oath of a board of equalization and will meet as a board of equalization to meet in regular session on June 4. Industrial taxpayers will meet with the board at 10 a.m. and local taxpayers may meet with the board beginning at 2 p.m. on that date.





Springtime is kite time The Texas Safety Association urges parents to help children learn to fly kites skillfully and safely.

The safety group especially stresses the warning not to use metal or tinsel cord in the construction of a kite or a kite string. In addition to the clutter of high wires, aerials, electric signs etc. that abound almost everywhere, the atmospheric electricity that may accumulate in an exposed wire at a high altitude creates an extremely dangerous electric force.

In choosing a safe area to fly a kite look for a level. open space where the wind has a chance to level off and blow steadily. Stay clear of electric wires and poles. buildings, traffic. ditches. railroad tracks, construction sites, reservoirs and radio

The project is part of a continuing crime prevention program in Abilene, Amarillo, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Odessa and Waco.

Goal of the pilot program is to reduce incidence of burglary by 18 per cent in each of six participating cities.

Publicity used in the campaign suggests that police crime-prevention specialists be invited into citizen's homes to demonstrate crime-prevention techniques and teach them to recognize potential criminal activities and report them to police. Texas ranks

second in the nation in the number of trained crime prevention officers, with 57 graduates of the National Crime Prevention Institute.






