Haskell recorded 1.16 inches of rain on March 23, according to Sam Herren, official weather observer, but that's not all the weather news recorded here. About dusk that evening, a small twister' was reported in the north part of town that, although covering a small area, did a bit of damage.

A 17-foot trailer house, completely furnished, owned by Wayne Phemister at 706 N. 19th street, was completely demolished and pieces of it andits contents were strewn across a wide area of that part of town. A picture window and two other windows in the R. W. Turnbow residence at North Avenue F were caved in, and more damages were reported at Wooten's North sale Station

at 1304 N. Ave. E. No one was injured at any of these locations in the winds that only lasted for a few minutes,

and some hail was reported. The rainfall, too, was spotted with parts of the south part of the county not receiving any precipitation, and heavier rains reported in the Mattson area. Sagerton received less than 1/2

This brings Haskell County total rainfall to date to 1.62.

They were eloquent in their praise of hosting Farmers Union members, Haskell Coun-

ty citizens as a whole, and especially of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Perry and Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Sonnamaker who hosted them in their homes during their stay in this part of Texas.

"Never have we witnessed or received such hospitality as we have in Texas!" was the opinion of all four of the personable farmers, voiced by Clifford Gascorgne of Hit-heock, S. D.

"It's a great state famous for its hospitality," added Gerrit Boltges of Platte, S. D. "To prove it, some 40 farmers from over our two states signed up for the southern tour, and they all wanted to go to Texas, so we had to draw colored tickets, each ticket representing a different state. We four were really the lucky ones," he laughed "and a lot of the losers didn't make the tour simply because they couldn't come to Texas, which does speak well of your reputation for great hospitality."

We were impressed with the great job Texas farmers are doing in conservation practices for holding the soil, and terrific water conservation practices utilized in everyday farming," emphasized Sheril Doll of New Salem, N. D. (He's really from Hanover, this interviewer found out, but he says

nobody ever has heard of it down here in Texas, so he lists nearby New Salem as his home).

"Terraces in our states are only used in soil conservation practices, and we never use them to collect and hold water. which is such an obviously practical use " observed James Curran. "We are concerned, though," he continued, "every bit as much as Texans are, about the possibility of future water needs of our states, though not as much so as Texas." He informed us that citizens of South Dakota were for the most part opposed to channelization of their waters to the south. Living in the heart of the Big Sioux Basin, he expressed interest in flood damming practices on the Big Sioux river, and using the flood control lakes to store water for future needs in South Dakota.

"We've learned a lot of Texas farming practices that can be put to good use at home,' they told us as they left with hosts Willard Mullins and Bud Lane.

And as they walked out our doors, on their way to the airport for the return flight north they once again assured us. "Texas hospitality is the great-

Tax Questions ... And Answers

(This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.)

Q) What transportation expenses are deductible that are not business related?

A) You may deduct as a charitable contribution unreimbursed out-of-pocket transportation expenses directly attributable to services you render to a charitable organization. If you use your own car, instead of actual expenses you may use the rate of six cents per mile to determine your deductions.

Transportation expenses necessary to get medical care are Central Texas Municipal Water at the Community Center in also deductible in the same way. However, these expenses are subject to the 3% rule for medical expenses.

Transportation expenses in connection with education and moving may also be deductible. Details can be found in Information on Educational Exfree by dropping a postcard to

Q) Have there been any changes in the Social Security Tax rate for 1972?

In Texas, the changeover will approved be gradual, with new signs goin traf- ing up on a replacement basis initially. The manual will be-

come effective June 1, 1972. Although there will be new symbols, shapes and colors, the majority of the existing signs will remain unchanged.

The new yield right-of-way sign will have a wide red border and white jinterfor and will retain the word "YIELD" in red inside the border.

The new prohibitive signs will all have a red circle with a slash cutting diagonally through the center which will mean "NO NOT" or "NO". The symbol inside the circle will show what is prohibited. For greater example, a sign showing a left turn arrow which is surrounded by a red circle and a slash means "NO LEFT TURN."

The yellow diamond-shaped signs will still stand for a warning, but some of the symboys showing hazards ahead will be new. For example, the message, "MERGING TRAF-FIC", on a yellow diamondshaped sign will be replaced by a black arrow being joined by a smaller black line. It is hoped this will minimize confusion as to which stream carries the merging traffic.

There is a major change in the school advance sign and the school crossing sign. These signs will now be pentagon in shape, with the figures of two school children being shown in black on a yellow background. Color will become more im-

portant in the new system. Red will indicate stop or a prohibition, green will show movement permitted or give directional guidance, blue will signify motorist services, yellow will indicate a general warning, and black on white will be used for regulatory signs such as those for speed limits and for most guide and destination signs.

In addition, orange (a new color in the manual) will convey construction and maintenance warnings.

The new traffic control devices manual also includes major adjustments in the use of color lines for pavement mark-

White broken lane lines will remain on divided, multiplelane highways such as Interstate Highways. The white broken line will denote that there s more than one lane, but that traffic in all lanes travels in the same direction. Solid white lines will be used for edge lining on two way roadways,

crosswalks and road markings. Yellow striping will be used a great deal more than in the past and will denote two-way traffic. The combination of broken and solid yellow stripes will indicate to the motorist what is permitted.

A yellow broken centerline will mark the division of the road where passing is permitted. A solid yellow line to the right of a broken yellow centerline will mean no passing is allowed for traffic in that lane. Double solid yellow lines will denote the center line of an undivided multi-lane highway where no passing is allowed by vehicles in either direction.

The Postal Service may get into enough side lines to make it profitable in a few years. From plans they have, it looks NEW TYPECLEANER as if the Service may become sort of a variety store. Patrons retary. No finger smudges, in Alaska can buy automobile tags at the post office window and Europe-bound travelers can

get passports at the same place. For a special price the Postal Service promises that in the Books In Print near future they can deliver a letter about 300 miles away in two minutes.

The service, in addition to selling stamps, is now designing more exotic issues to keep collectors busy and money coming in. The bigger offices also carry stamp albums. Even the rogues' gallery will be blown up and likely the pictures will be in color.

Post offices may soon be selling hunting stamps, stock job applications for Federal positions and information on the Federal budget.

Some old-time postal managers deplore the new operations, saying they are gimmickry designed to take the public's mind off the fact that the mail service is not getting any better. The complaints may get louder as more and more over-thecounter transactions are put into effect.

There is still the problem of the delivery of the individual letter across town in a reasonable time. Postal officials have said that "in instances we can get a letter across the country faster by jet plane than a letter can be delivered on the other side of the city by truck." This seems to be one of the hang-

Some officials have plans whereby post offices will become sort of like shopping centers, dispensing goods and services for those who want to pay for it. There are even guarantees of delivering packages within so many hours.

One must wonder if marirage and divorce may eventually be offered over the postal counter.
