not ibe used for prophylaxis in family contacts of diagonosed cases, the reason for this being that the re-
maining members of the family are maining members of the family are
usually infected with the vivis by usually infected with the virus by
the time the original case developes the time the original case developes
symmoms of the disease. The vaccine should not be given to individuals during a major illness or to thost with sympoms that may represent
early polio, such as fever, sore throat or stomache upset.
Dr. Holle says that immunizations should be given before the peak of the season if possible but can be
given throughout. the given throughout the summer. Sec-
ond injections can be given even when the incidence is rising with very little risk. The risk, if any, is less than the risk of acquiring the disease in unvaccinated children.
The Commissioner of Health. ports that only about one third of those eligible to receive the vaccine have received one or more injections.
