In an interview with the Free Press, Postmaster Rosser commented, "We are striving to get out of 'miracle service' and into dependable service—that's our goal."

Firemen Hear Ray Overton

Some 86 firemen, their wives and special guests of the Haskell Fire Department enjoyed a Christmas Banquet Monday night at Felker's Restaurant, with Chief Tom Watson serving as emcee. Special guests included Mrs. George Neeley, Mrs. Volly Ivy, and Mr. and Mrs. Ray Overton of Abilene, speaker for the evening.

Entertainment was provided during the evening by Mrs. Leon Jones and Mrs. Buck Everett, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Ken Lane. Chaplain J. Belton Duncan gave the invocation.

After a steak dinner, the yearly report of the department was given by Sach Lusk. He reported a total of 118 calls, with 80% of them being turned

in prior to August 1, during all the dry weather. Eleven general calls were answered, six calls for car and truck fires.

Firemen recognized for near perfect attendance at both meetings and fire calls included Desmond Dulaney, Kenneth Marr, Skip Lane and Bill Comedy.

Firemen receiving their 5 year pins were Billy Jack Ray and Jackie Daniels.

Speaker Ray Overton, a former Haskell coach, now on the coaching staff at Cooper High School in Abilene, inspired his audience with solid-thinking ideas on how to challenge their children, and the youth of a community, into having the ambition to make a

contribution to society.

He expressed two personal concerns for the youth of today: that of their attitude toward our country, and that of parental indulgence to the point of taking away their desire to make a meaningful contribution to their society.

"If today's protests are a part of self expression, then why isn't a bank robbery a 'financial transaction'?" asked Overton of his audience. Young people whose parents do not give them a big portion of time, love, and discipline and training, but try to 'make-up' by indulging them with monetary gifts, he felt, were the young people with the 'hippy attitude' of giving up and protesting

every facet of discipline and law and order, just for the sake of protest.

His thinking left the audience with the thought that young people, by their very rebellion, are silently pleading for guidance and discipline from their parents, teachers, and leaders.

"The American system of free enterprise is the greatest on earth. Teaching people of any age the willingness of taking something for nothing is destroying our pride of self-achievement," he summed up. "A true belief in God, a respect for law and order; and 'true value goals' are ingredients to help our youth make a meaningful contribution to our society."
