

## Haskell Has Six Accidents In November

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on gural highways in Haskeil County during the month of November, according to Sergeant Frank Jircik, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in no persons killed and three persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first 11 months of 1971 shows a total of 55 accidents resulting in one person killed and 30 persons injured.

This bill would enable the government to purchase surplus grains and hold them in a strategic reserve thus benefiting both farmers and consumers. The delegates also expressed support for an amendment to the Strategic Reserve Bill sponsored by Representative Melcher of Montana immediately raising price support loans by 25%. # "REMOVAL OF MILE-AGE LIMITATIONS **URGED**"

Removal of mileage limitations from federal farm truck driver regulations was urged this week by Farmers Union, NFU President Tony Dechant made the recommendations in a letter to Director Kaye of the Transportation Department's Bureau of Motor Carrier Safety. Revised regulations proposed by the Department of Transportation to become effective Jan. 1, 1972, would exempt farm drivers from certain regulations, but only for hauls within a 150mile radius of the farm. Dechant said, "Any mileage restriction must be set at an arbitrary distance, and whether a particular trip involves more or less than 150 miles (or whatever distance) has no bearing on whether the driver will operate the vehicle safely." Dechant recommended that the farm driver exemptions be applicable regardless of the distance of any particular trip.
