



The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has announced that planting seed for Blightmaster, a disease-tolerant, stormproof cotton and Crockett, new hightest weight, early maturing, good quality, hard red winter wheat for Texas, will be available in 1957.

Available from the County Agents' office are publications, L-292, Blightmaster and L-288, Crockett which describe these new and improved crop varities for Texas.

Tests indicate that Blightmaster will yield as much under blightfree conditions as other stormproof varities now grown in Texas, and greater yields may be expected under heavy blight conditions. Staple Worth, spent several days here re- length is 15-16 to one inch. It is adopted to stripper harvesting; is medium in maturity; semi-spreading in growth habit and is recommended for areas of the state where a stormproof variety is desired.

The new hard red winter wheat for Texas has good disease resistance, early maturity, high yields, high test weight and high milling qualities to its credit.

Crockett wheat is recommended for the Panhandle and South Plains wheat areas and also for the Rolling Plains and north-central Texas wheat areas. Individuals interestd in producing certified seed of Crockett during the 1956-57 crop year may obtain foundation seed from the Foundation Seed Section, Texas Agricultural Exepriment Station, College Station, Texas.

Here is a bit of research information which may be an important factor in the production of good quality meat. There is some evidence from research with ribbits and in studies of sheep and beef cattle that tenderness in meat is an inherited quality, according to R. W. Snyder, extension meats specialist.

To produce more lean meat of good quality and tenderness, we need a better understanding of what : makes tenderness and desirable flavor, says Snyder.

Enough research has been done to show there is no direct relation between tenderness in the meat and outside fat. But tndernss and flavor may be influenced by the paeticles of fat within the meat cells. It is also possible that there may be a relationship between tenderness and the size and elasticity of different muscle fibers.

Once the chemical nature of tenderness and good flavor are are clearly understood, it may become possible to add these qualities to any meat.

Final abolishment With a sales tax exempting food and rent the rich would pay proportionately much more than the poor. You can only spend so much on food and rent, which is not taxed, but the rich spend on many things that would be taxed. They would pay taxes according to how much they spend. It would be possible for the people earning \$4,000 or less to get off with paying almost no Federal taxes at all if they confined themselves to the necessities

Some will still say, "But the rich, who can best afford it, should pay most of the taxes." Under our present system, however, the rich do NOT pay most of the taxes. People earning \$6,000 a year or less pay \$22,000,000,000 of the \$30,000,000,000 or so collected annually in income taxes. The surtax rates above the basic rate in our progressive system bring in only \$4,70,000,000 a year. If everybody paid the same rate today as the lowest, we would lose only enough revenue to carry on the government for three or four weeks. And the chances are, as history proves, that the incentives to earn more and risk more and invest more of ending surtax rates would more than make up this difference in increased taxes on increased incomes.

The progressive income tax, as it works in this country and everywhere else, discrimates against the great middle income group of people more than anybody eles. They pay the bulk of the taxes. They get the least in return for their taxes. They are the "forgotten men" of our time.

Karl Marx knew what he was doing. He knew that an unlimited progressive income tax would gradually increase the power of government and decrease the abaility of the people to resist government confiscation of their property. He knew that it would make it easy for the government to spend more and seize more authority to regulate the lives of the people. He knew that the surest path to Communism was such a tax. It's time the American people learned that.






