# Bobcats Defeat Knights 12-7

The Rule Bobcats remained undefeated last Saturday night before a capacity Homecoming crowd, defeating the Notre Dame Knights, 12-7.

The Bobcats received the opening kickoff and drove 57 yards in eight plays before Don Hisey scored from five yards out. PAT attempt by Jesse Macias was no good.

Macias -kicked off to the Knights and recovered the pigskin on the Knights 35 yard line. The Bobcats relinquished possession of the ball four plays later, failing to convert a fourth-and-four situation.

Four plays later the Bobcats regained possession of the ball after a partially blocked punt sailed only five yards before going out of bounds.

The Cats failed again to make yardage needed for the first down and attempted to punt. The punt was blocked and Joe Luna recovered the loose ball and carried it 27 yards for a Notre Dame touchdown, PAT was good and Notre Dame led 7-6 with 3:55 left in the first pe-

On the second play in the second period, Hisey put a strong rush on Ron Veitenheimer who threw an interception to Art Briles. The ball see-sawed back and forth through the second period with neither team scoring until just seconds before the half when Notre Dame attempted a 35-yard field goal. The kick was no good and the Bobcats managed only one play before time ran out.

The tough Bobcat defense held the Knights to a total of nine yards rushing during the third period. Larry Barbee blocked a pass and Cole Turner recovered a Notre Dame fumble to stop two drives in the scoreless period. The Bobcat offense managed only one first down and 26 yards rushing during the period.

The winning touchdown for the Bobcats came on a 12-yard scamper around right end by Art Briles with 7:48 left in the

game. PAT was not good and the Cats led 12-7.

During the final period the Knights never penetrated into Bobcat territory and managed a total offense of only three yards.

Hisey led the offense with 111 yards rushing. Briles had 51 and Barbee had 12.

Defensively for the Bobcats, Rob Kittley, Larry Barbee, Roy Don Wilson, Steve Anders, Gary Miller, Don Hisey, Lynn Dale Dudensing, Art Briles and Cole Turner played a fine game. Briles, Kittley and Barbee each intercepted passes and Turner and Andress recovered fum-

The Haskell Indians trounced the Stamford Bulldogs 46-0 last Friday night and held the Bulldogs to a total offense of 94 yards. The Tribe chalked up a total of 392 yards offensively.

The Indians took control of the game in early stages, recovering a Bulldog fumble seven plays after kicking off to Stamford. Two plays after punting to the Bulldogs, Randy Ivy intercepted a Stamford pass and returned it 25 yards to the Stamford 40 yard line. After a 15 yard penalty against the

Jackie Young, the Indians scored on a two yard run by Young. PAT was blocked.

The Bulldogs next drive lasted only three plays and after a 26 yard punt and eight plays, Young carried the ball 26 yards on a 4-and-2 situation for the 6 points. PAT by Ivy was good and the Indians led 13-0 with 8 minutes left in the half.

Not satisfied with a 13 point lead, the Indians held the Bulldogs to 3 yards on their next three plays and after a 27 yard Robin Colbert, Ivy caught a 32yard touchdown pass. PAT was good.

Three plays later Young intercepted a Bulldog pass and set up the final score of the first half. The score came on a 30 yard half-back pass from Young to Ivy. PAT failed and the Indians had a half-time lead of 25-0.

During the second period, the Bulldogs had possession of the pigskin for only seven plays on four offensive attempts and were held to a net gain of 11 yards.
