speed is a must for night driving." However, lowered speed is not

order to see danger quickly and act
immediately to avoid it, the driver must step up his alertness.
Dyson pointed out that the walk-
er is similarly handicapped at night er is similarly handicapped at night.

be mixed with diesel oil or kerosene and applied with a hand or
backtype sprayer. For the hard to kill trees, Walker recommends a pound of the chemical in six gallons
of oil. For easier to kill trees a pound to 12 gallons of oil is sug-
