Church of the Nazarene

The Church of the Nazarene, an international Protestant denomination, recorded substantial gains in every area of its work during 1956, it was reported here this week.

The annual statistical report by Dr. S. T. Ludwig, Kansas City, Mo., general church secretary, showed that new churches and Sunday Schools were established at the rate of two a week in 1956. The denomination had a net gain of 109 churches for a year-end total of 4,435.

A net gain of 8,031 members, or a 2.8% increase, brought the denomination total to 287,866. The vast majority joined on profession of faith.

Perhaps most notable was the record of \$129.94 in per capita giving in 1956. This was an increase of \$4.35 over the previous high of \$125.59 in 1955.

Denominational giving for all purposes also increased by \$2,260,063 in 1956 or a denominational total of \$37,404,741.

Sunday school enrollment reached an all-time high of 611,319.

All three principal societies, missionary, junior and young people—recorded gains in members and income.

The denomination stands for the spread and conservation of the Wesleyan doctrine of entire sanctification. It marks its start at Pilot Point, Texas in 1908, and plans are being completed for its golden anniversary observance in 1958.

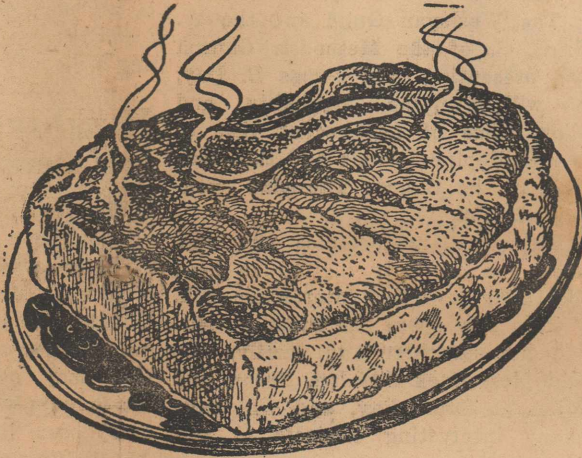

Many local farmers and ranchmen can save tax dollars this year by taking advantage of all allowable deductions and other credits.

A new law is of particular importance this year concerning the sale of breeding, dairy or draft animals because of drought. Under certain conditions, the profit from such sales will not be taxed.

New fast depreciation methods can reduce current taxes. And, when you fail to take depreciation, that deduction is gone forever; it can not be made up in future years. Reporting the sale of all qualifying livestock as the sale of capital assets, instead of reporting the sale as ordinary income, will sharply lower tax liability.

These subjects and many others are treated in the new "1956 Farmer's Tax Guide," now available at the county agent's office. Arranged for easy finding, it explains how to handle most tax problems that farmers and ranchmen face.

Some farmers have lost money this year and will not owe any taxes. When there is no tax liability some farmers in the past have tended to neglect taking all allowable deductions. This is usually a mistake, but losses can now be carried backward for two years and carried forward for as many as 5 years. Sooner or later, these current losses should permit the taxpayer to either get a refund or give him a deduction on future tax bills.

Seven grain sorghum hybrids developed cooperatively by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the U. S. Department of Agriculture, will be available to farmers for planting in 1957. These hybrids are the result of research work which began in 1921 and are the first practical hybrids to be released from these studies.

The seven hybrids, RS 590, Texas 601, RS 610, Texas 611, Texas 620, RS 650 and Texas 660, are the best of several hundred produced and tested during the past 20 years at the Lubbock and Chillicothe stations. Tests were conducted last year throughout Texas and all have thus been grown under limited field demonstrations. The plant breeders for the Texas Station say still better hybrids with improved adaption to various growing conditions can be expected in the near future.

Farmers are advised to plant one or more of the hybrids adapted to their areas and to make comparisons with standard varieties. Further, it is suggested, that only certified hybrid seed be planted as insurance that seed planted are correctly labeled.

Planting seed of these seven hybrid are white, but the grain produced will be red. In general, the higher the hybrid number, the later is its maturity, but none is as late as Plainsman. Yields 20 to 40 per cent greater than varieties of the same maturity under most conditions can be expected. The plants show superior seeding vigor, rapid growth and uniform height and maturity. Since the hybrids have larger heads and are often slightly taller than the varieties, occasionally more lodging may occur in hybrids. Cultural practices for the sorghum hybrids are the same as recommended for sorghum varieties.

Detailed information on each of the seven hybrids is given in L-310 Grain Sorghum Hybrids. It is available from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

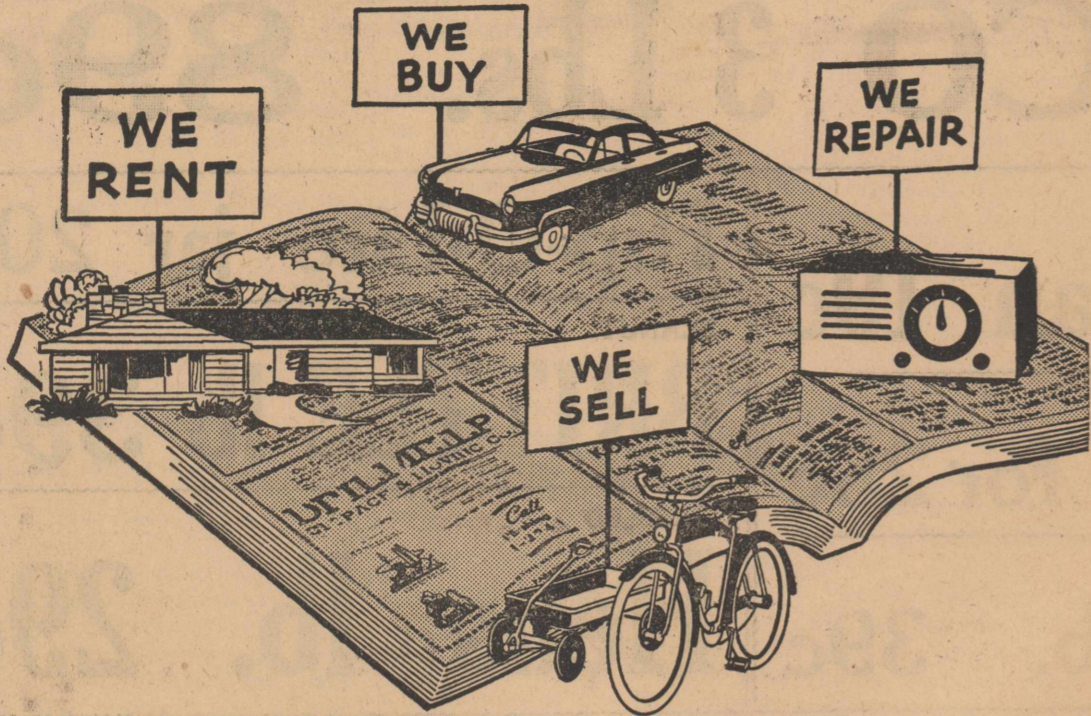
Another Jr. Livestock show season has rolled around. The first one for the season will be the Fisher County FFA and 4-H show, Saturday, January 12.

Care Of Eyes Stressed
As Very Important

There's at least one vital key to riding the tide of a hectic gift-buying and holiday rush and still being able to smile.

The key: Don't abuse two of your greatest gifts, your eyes.

For the eyes, which control some 80% of your actions and use up to 25% of your body's energy, the "holidays" may be anything but that.

In a whirl of crowd-bucking, tree-trimming, traveling, television-viewing and other activities of the season, don't let tired eyes spoil holiday fun.

A few basic rules will help make your holidays—and the days following it—happy ones.

The rules include:

When traveling on buses or trains, don't spend every minute reading—and certainly not fine print. Reading while vehicles are in motion adds another burden of fatigue to the eyes.

Before starting on a long auto trip for Christmas, be sure you're well rested. Stop occasionally to refresh yourself and rest your eyes, especially if you're the driver. If it should be snowy or rainy, remember that sun glasses help cut daytime glare—but don't use them for after-dark driving.

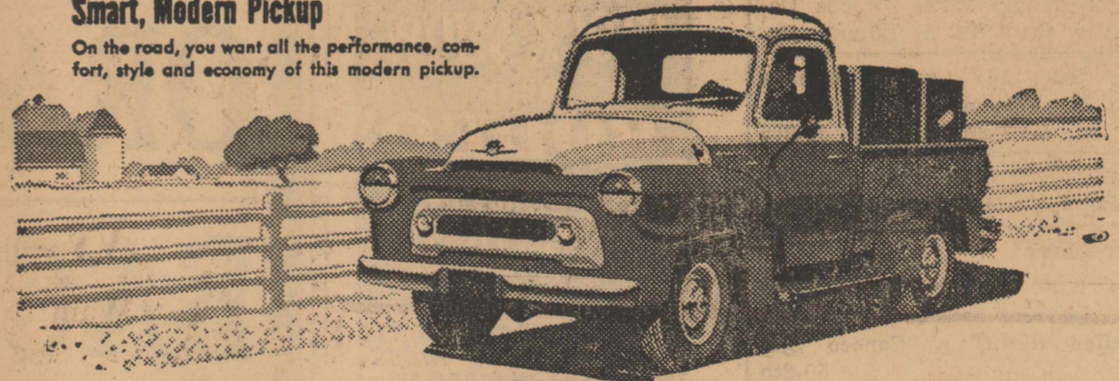

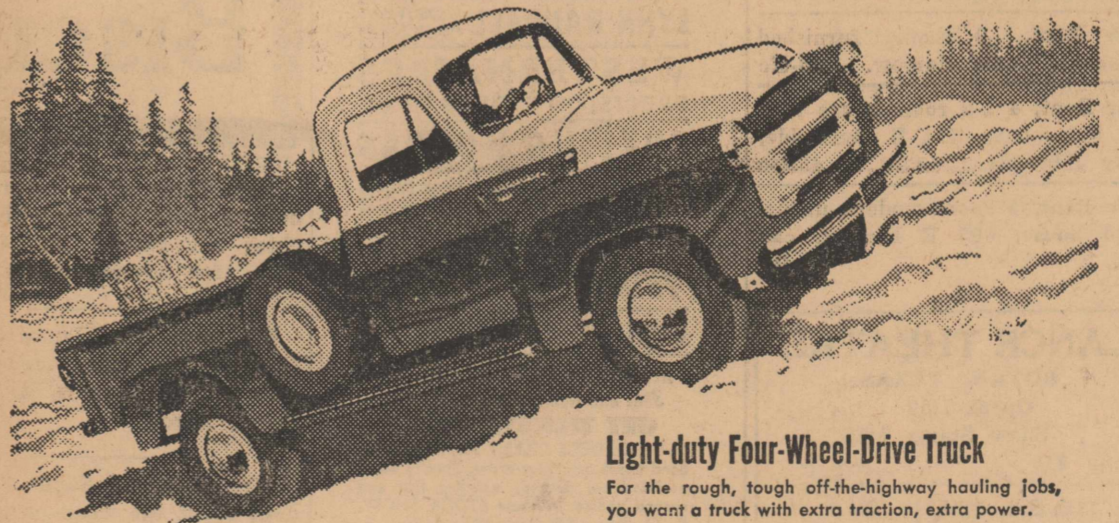

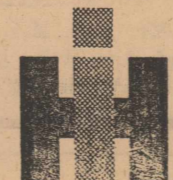

Mix and cool. Roll into balls and roll into remaining 1 1-2 cups of cereal (crushed into fine crumbs.)
