Whitaker Goes To State

Eric Whitaker, fleet-footed 880 runner on the Haskell High track team, earned the right to compete in State competition May 5-6 at Austin by winning his event with a time of 2:00.1. Coach Bobby Dodd was high in his praise of Whitaker's extension beyond any effort he has made thus far. "I think every boy that participated in the Regional Track Meet for Haskell did a good job," he said. "They just ran against people that could run faster, in the events

we didn't win. We set a new school record Friday; broke another school record Saturday; and every boy gave it everything they had. I am proud of them! The boys who represented Haskell at the Regional meet represented them well."

Eric is one of only 8 young men in the entire State of Texas in AA who will compete at state. His school record this year shows up as the very best in UIL track. He has run the 880 in six meets and won all six of them—Rotan with 2:09.3; Brady with 2:04.5; Ballinger with 2:01.2 to set a new meet record; Brownwood with 2:02.2; Albany with 2:04.1, and a new meet record; and then Regional at Odessa with a better time of 2:00.1.

Finalists were selected in the 880 by the top four of each heat; in the 120 hi hurdles on the first 2 finishes; and the best third time for the finals; the 330 intermediates were selected the same way. In the 880

the first night, Whitaker had the best time of 2:02.4, and Jackie Young and Randy Ivy did

not qualify in the heats they were in. They ran against the boy that won, and the boy placed second, in their heat. Martin Randal in the mile was the best four on Friday and he qualified. The mile relay was best 4 also.

Saturday, Whitaker took the 880 with 2:00.1; Martin Randle was 5th in the mile with 4:04.4 in the finals; the mile relay team ran 3:27.9 on Thursday night and Friday afternoon came back to run 3:27 flat. The best any mile relay team has run, this was a new school record for Haskell. It also was the best our team has run this year, obviously, and a great team effort.

In the shot put Bob Shea placed 5th with 50.2; the best he has ever done in this event. Danny Smith threw 128' in discus, but that distance didn't make the finals. Joe Kretschmer placed 5th in the high jump, on misses. Three boys tied with a height of 5' 10", but Joe was placed 5th because of misses.

"Every boy who ran for Haskell gave it the very best he had; it was a great team effort," said Coach Dodd. "I just can't tell everyone how much the paper, the advertisers, and the people's backing have helped these boys, and I can't say Thanks enough."

All of Haskell is proud of Eric Whitaker, and wish him the very best of luck at State May 5 and 6th!

Two-Day Shoot Here Sat., Sun.

Haskell Gun Club will sponsor its regular monthly shoot at the traps Saturday afternoon beginning at 1:30 p. m. and again Sunday, beginning at 11:00 a. m.

Parks & Wildlife Careers To Young Men to Apply

AUSTIN—Young men who are interested in careers as Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game management officers have until May 26 to submit application forms.

The GMO's are the department's law enforcement officers. Formerly called game wardens, they enforce game and fish regulations and engage in a number of conservation activities.

Application forms are available from any Parks and Wildlife Department district or regional office, or from Austin headquarters. All applications must be submitted to the department's headquarters in the John H. Reagan Building, Austin, Tex. 78701.

Applicants will be given written examinations at nine locations across the state June 1. The sites are Corpus Christi, La Porte, San Angelo, Tyler, Edinburg, Lubbock, Waco, and two locations in Dallas.

After subsequent interviews and investigations, the successful applicants will form the department's 28th Game Management Officer Class. The cadets will receive intensive training at the department's academy at Texas A&M University before being commissioned in ceremonies at Austin.

Applicants must be in the age group of 21 to 40, inclusive, on the date of appointment. At least a high school education and good physical condition are requirements.

Applicants must be at least 5 feet, 8 inches tall and must weigh at least two pounds for each inch of height but not more than three pounds per inch of height.

 4 to 5 lbs. Turkey (save stock)
 1/2 c. chopped pimiento
 1/2 c. nutmeats and pickle
 2 cups turkey stock
 10 to 12 eggs
 3/4 c. diced celery
 1/2 c. chopped green pepper
 2 pkgs. gelatin
 Cook turkey until meat will fall off bones, salt, separate the light and dark meat. Grind each and keep separate. Hard boil eggs and separate, mash and keep separated, salt. To dark meat add celery, to white meat add nuts and pickles, to egg yolows add green peppers, to egg whites add pimiento. Dissolve gelatin in stock. Put

dark meat in an oblong casserole. Pat down evenly and pour 1/2 cup gelatin over it. Next put egg yolows, pat down and pour 1/2 cup gelatin mixture over it. Then put light meat, pat down and pour 1/2 cup gelatin mixture over it. Refrigerate and when ready to serve invert into platter and garnish.

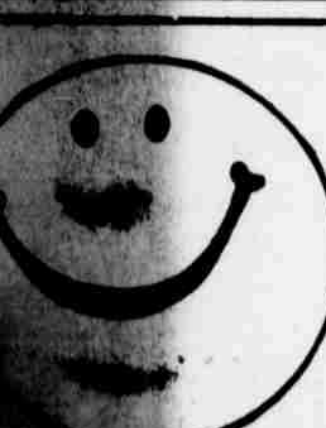

item in a garage sale when it might of interest to someone else. This includes toys, books, records, knickknacks, household and sports equipment, furniture and clothes. Use a garage sale to raise money for the family or a favorite charity.

"If your friends and neighbors are in the midst of spring cleaning, join forces to offer a variety of merchandise," Mrs. Fowler suggested.

Keep in mind that low prices attract bargain hunters. However, extremely low prices often fail to make the venture financially worthwhile. Check the cost of items at local thrift and second-hand shops for a pricing guide.

Mend and clean clothing before putting it up for sale. Pin the correct size on garments. Tie or pin pairs of shoes together. Clean and repair toys, records, kitchen equipment and books. Steer clear of selling un-repaired or damaged goods.

Remember a trick of the trade, and set up a few tables where everything sells for the same price. Otherwise, group similar items together. Hang all garments on a rack.

"Don't forget advertising for the sale," the specialist reminded. "Neighborhood signs can help. You can also consider placing a small ad in the newspaper."

Remember to check legal aspects that relate to selling goods. Call the Comptroller of Public Accounts for information on collecting sales tax. He's listed in the phone book under Texas State Agencies.

Check with the Internal Revenue Service for information on reporting income from a garage sale. Is the money collected to be donated to a recognized charity? Ask about giving tax deduction receipts to donors of merchandise. The Internal Revenue Service is listed in the phone book under United States Government Offices.

Small Business Employers Taxed Under Texas Employment Comm.

A tax deadline that is new to thousands of Texas employers arrives April 30, 1972.

For an estimated 72,000 employers who became "covered" by act of the last legislature, April 30 is the deadline for filing wage reports with the Texas Employment Commission and paying unemployment taxes for the first quarter of this year.

"Those who have not yet filed this quarterly report should do so at the earliest opportunity," W. S. Birdwell Jr., commissioner representing employers, urges.

Employers who are new to coverage have been notified by mail, and have been sent the forms and instructions for making the employers' quarterly report. Some of the quarterly reports received have omitted the wages list containing employees' names and wages. These must be included, along with the taxes due.

Employers brought for the first time under coverage of the Texas Unemployment Com-

mission Act by the legislature are mostly those who have one to four employees.

The "new" employers this year receive a tax rate of 1 per cent. The law requires employers who have one or more workers in 20 weeks of a calendar year on the payroll, and employers who pay \$1,500 or more in wages in a calendar quarter, to pay the unemployment insurance tax. Certain nonprofit, charitable and educational organizations are subject only if they have four or more workers.

Wages up to \$9,000 must be reported to the Commission in order to calculate unemployment benefits. The tax, however, is based on wages paid each employee in a calendar year. The tax is due on the first \$4,200 paid to each employee.

Those employers who became liable for the tax for the first time in 1972—with the exception of the successor in a change of ownership—are assigned an entrance tax rate of 1.0 per cent.

Within two years employers become eligible for an experience rate which is based on charge backs to an individual employer's account.

NOVEMBER, 1969
FU and NFU—Were responsible for securing passage in the Senate of a vastly extended Veterans Training Bill which provides many on-the-farm training program benefits for veterans.
FU testified in support of retaining control of the nation's water resources in the hands of family farmers and opposed increasing the 160 acre limitation which should apply to large corporations in California engaged in cotton production.
FU testified before the Livestock and Grains Sub-committee for the Coalition wheat and feed grains portions of the Coalition Farm Bill.
FU urged the Senate to provide additional sources of financing for rural telephones.
FU and TFU successfully opposed the cancellation of resale loans on grain sorghum under USDA.
FU continued building the coalition of farm organizations to 25 in support of a workable farm bill for farmers.

DECEMBER, 1969
FU testified for an improved wheat program with export marketing certificates, a price of \$1.25 per bu., projected yields with adequate adjustments for natural disasters, and advance payments at program sign-up time.
FU—Joe Benkin, vice-president, testified for an improved cotton program, a permanent extension of the 1965 Act, cotton program tied firmly to the parity concept.
FU gained a victory with Senate passage of a 7% investment tax credit with a \$20,000 limit. At the same time, the Senate increased the personal income tax exemptions from \$200 to \$500 by 1971. Both actions will benefit small farmers.
FU expressed strong support for an effective bargaining bill and opposition to the bill introduced into the Senate.
FU Board of Directors voted to withdraw from the National Cotton Council until the time the cotton and cotton processing dominated Council discontinues influencing cotton program policies.

Planting time is upon us. In the next few weeks our farmers will be busy planting cotton, maize and guar.

As conservation crops, maize, when properly managed following harvest, can return 3000 to 4000 pounds of residues to the soil. Many of our soils need this residue returned, to prevent erosion from wind and water, and to prevent the soil from structure deterioration. Guar, a legume crop, has proven most beneficial to our soils in that it returns large amounts of nitrogen to the soil. Guar can be planted on "set aside" acres, as can red-top cane, sudan, and other forage sorghums.

Plan now to use some guar in your cropping system this year.

As of this writing, May 15th has been tentatively set as the starting date for aerial spraying of mesquite. The County Development Group set this date to correspond with that of surrounding counties. If you are planning to do mesquite control this spring, now is the time to make your plans and get your application in.

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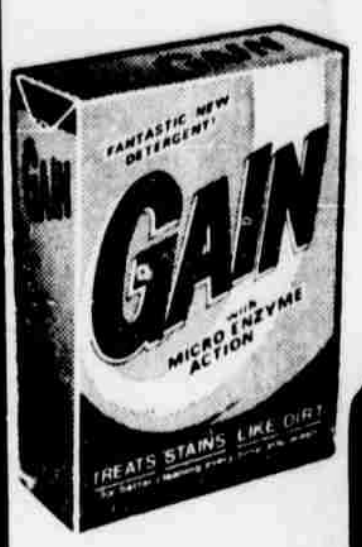

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Spring comes a bit later in this area than it does there at home. During the past week the whole place has put on new clothes. The leaves are not all out but they show up almost overnight. Flowers and blooming trees are everywhere.

It suggests that our generation has inherited a very beautiful world. We have also inherited oceans and streams filled with fish and tidal waters have teemed with lobsters, oysters, crabs and clams. Unfortunately, some of these things are greatly diminished simply because we have not taken care of them.

From near Washington on a clear day the Blue Ridge Moun-

tains loom in the background and the hills seem to command man's tenderest care. But the uglifiers have their way—there in a mountain run a rump-sprung easy chair, its rusty coils appearing almost obscene, and spring asters and jonquils grow up amid a bed of beer cans.

Not long ago a visitor to Athens stood on a street corner easily contemplating what to do with his after-breakfast cigarette, which had now burned down to the filter.

The busy sidewalk was immaculate. According to his description, the gutters looked as if they had just been combed and brushed. He said that every place he traveled in Greece he had seen the same tidiness. Finally the tourist pinched out the cigarette on his shoe, dropped the butt in his camera bag and soon returned to America remembering with admiration the cleanliness of Greece.

The Greeks are not alone in keeping things orderly. It appears in Finland, Sweden and

Denmark. The small towns of Switzerland and Holland make us ashamed of our own outdoor clutter.

This same American told the story of Vice Premier Pattakos who once had his limousine pause in traffic behind a taxi occupied by a British lady. She tossed an empty cigarette package out the window. The Vice Premier asked the taxi to stop and personally escorted the lady back to the cigarette package lying in the street. Picking it up he handed it to her. "But I don't want it," she protested. "Neither do we," said Pattakos.

Everyone has seen our highway employees trying to keep the rights-of-way free of rubbish of one sort or another. They do the best they can but have a hard time keeping up. Our affluent society, like some beast, slouches across the land and leaves its ugly spore behind: beer cans, milk cartons, paper cups, brown bags, paper—plain junk.

Some have speculated on the melancholy tale that one day

in some ultimate madness, man will blow this earth to smithereens and leave a dead planet hurtling through space. Thousands of years will pass before new archeologists will appear on the scene from a different galaxy to shift the ashes of the world that was. In it they will find the ruins of great highways, tall buildings and evidence of all the things which now and in the future have existed.

They will be able to determine the cycle of the seasons and to know that a short time before this season of the year a lot of ugliness was buried be-

neath the snows. They will also determine the beauties of springtime and the abuses that man has heaped on it.

In their searches and analysis they will read a meaning into the legend embossed upon these objects—a statement of man's fleeting impact on the ages: "no deposit, no return."

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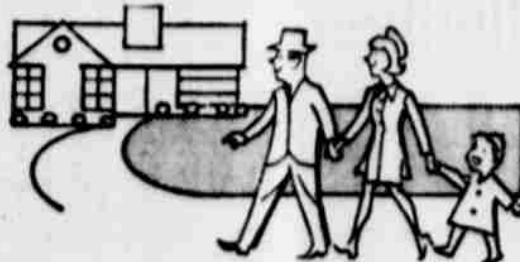
