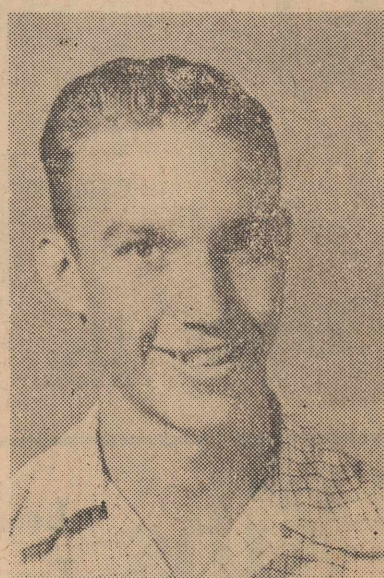

### Lions Club Sees Good Film On Petroleum

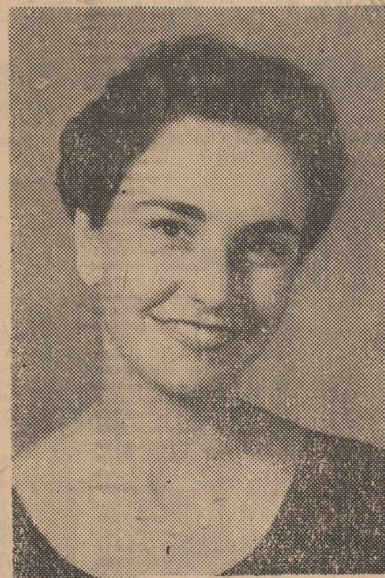
Lions Club had good attendance at Tuesday's meeting. A film on petroleum and products was enjoyed by members and guests.

The Club heard a report that steps were being taken to get weeds cut over town and the entire town sprayed with DDT to combat the mosquito infestation which always follows heavy rainfall.

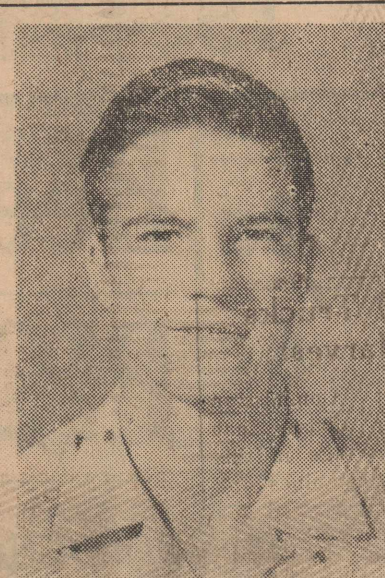
A good program is planned for next week and any member failing to attend misses a fine hour of fellowship and a good meal.

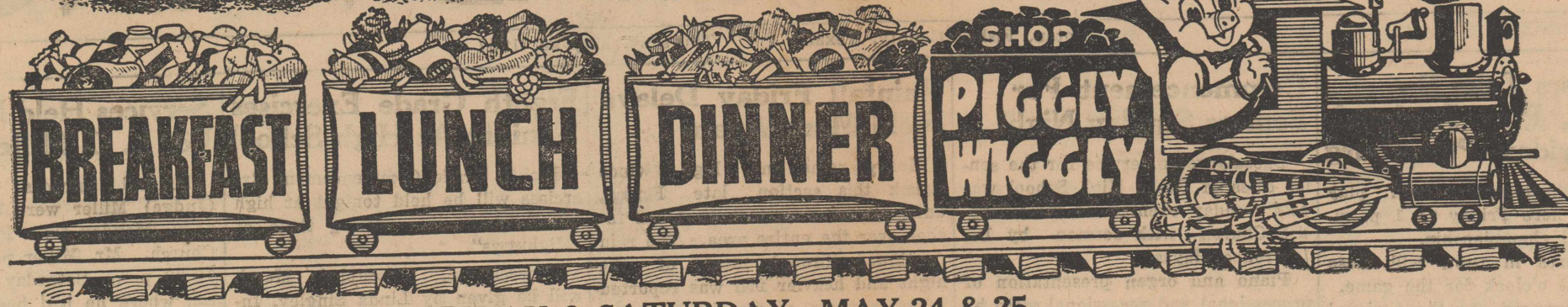

## County Agent Column

Hog producers in Texas and the nation are worried about the prospects for continued good prices. They are wondering, says John G. McHaney, extension economist, whether production increases are going to be overdone with resulting lower prices to follow in the months ahead.

McHaney says the total spring pig crop for 1957 will probably be a little larger than the one in 1956 but that slaughter will continue below last year until the end of 1957. The difference though will narrow in the months ahead and prices will probably stay above last year until November or December.

On March 1, 1957, farmers in the nine principal hog producing states held two percent more pigs three months of age and younger than a year ago. They also reported that one percent more litters would be farrowed in March, April and May and three percent more during June, July and August. At the present, says the economist, it appears that four to five percent more hogs could be available for marketing by late fall and early winter. Prices will react to the increased production with the greatest price difference coming in December 1957 and January 1958.

McHaney says no change in the demand for farm products including pork and lard is expected during the next 12 months and that changes in hog prices will result primarily from changes in supply. Hog profits will be determined in the months ahead by how well producers keep supplies and demands in balance.

The economist advises hog producers to keep a close watch on future production trends. Present hog prices and the prospect for lower feed grain prices for the fall of 1957 will aid expansion and increase the chances for lower prices in the spring of 1958. The efficient producer will probably not need to make any major adjustments but should continue to be on the alert for changes which will make his operations even more efficient.

Lower prices, on the other hand, could result in losses or no profit for the inefficient producers, concludes the economist.

Weeds and grass in cotton can be a real setback says Fred Elliott, extension cotton specialist, by the use of rotary hoes, lateral oiling with post-emergence naphtha oils and spot piling Johnson grass.

Last year farmers saved more than \$15,000,000 in their fight against weeds by using these three practices, and the savings in 1957 can be much greater because of improved moisture conditions. He says county agents reported that 43,918 rotary hoes were used in 145 counties; that post-emergence oiling with five gallons of naphtha at a cost of about one dollar an acre was carried out on small cotton on 20,285 acres in 53 counties and spot oiling was used to control Johnson grass on 89,491 acres in 133 counties. Johnson grass, he adds, can be controlled faster, easier, cheaper than by any other method and can be readicated in one season at a saving of five dollars an acre with spot oiling.

The rotary hoe, he says, is a triple purpose instrument. It control weeds and grass in small cotton; cultivates and can be used to break crusts and thus insure a stand or can be turned around and used to firm seed beds. It should be operated at high speed. A four section hoe can weed up to 100 acres a day depending on the rate of travel.

Seedling cotton is highly resistant to post-emergence oils but injury will result after the bark begins to form. Elliott says to apply the naphtha oil with tractor mounted shoes, using two fan type nozzles, one on either side of the row and staggered and kept at least five inches from the cotton. These applications made at 7 to 10 day intervals can be used provided the cotton plants have not begun to form true bark.

For best results with lateral oiling, he says the seed bed should be smooth. The first application should be made when the weeds are in the seedling stage or up to three inches high but not until grass appears. The spray shoes should be calibrated and carefully adjusted on a smooth surface and checked regularly after the operation begins. When oiling and cultivating at the same time, cultivate shallow and in wet weather lighten the tractor by removing unnecessary weight and get into the field before the weeds get too large.

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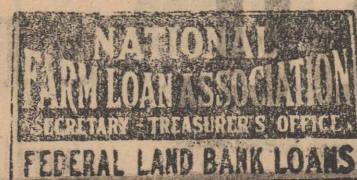
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
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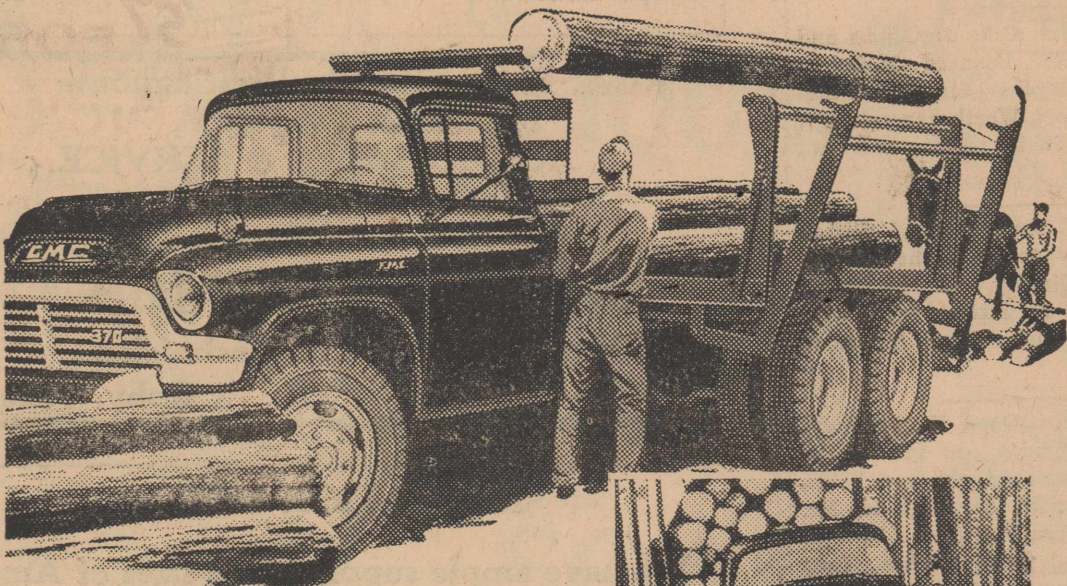


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**Mrs. Snapp To Receive Degree From McMurry**

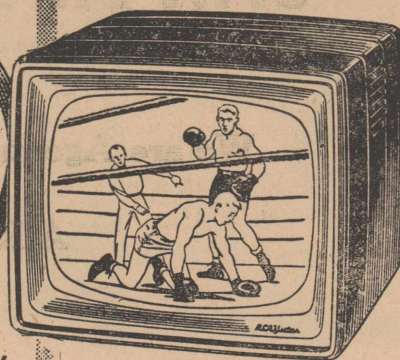
McMurry will award 93 masters and bachelors degrees in the graduation exercises, according to Jerome Wannoy, registrar.
