

The bridegroom was attended by Donnie Kimbell of Odessa.


Wedding music was by Mrs. Henry Withers. Becky Strickland, soloist, sang "Whither Thou Goest."

Mrs. Byrd gave a report on the County Fair and asked that anyone who had suggestions for next year's Fair turn those suggestions in at the October Council meeting.


