## Safety Urged In Plans For Halloween

Roasting marshmallows over a bonfire, bobbing for apples in a tub of water, 'trick-or-treatin' at the neighbor's house and hoping you won't be asked for the 'pay'—a dance, song or poem—for the treat.

All this is Halloween, a once-a-year occasion when Johnny and Mary can fill their paper sacks with a collection of goodies even the heartiest of appetites can barely dent.

Halloween . . . a night when bedtime is moved back an hour (or two if you protest enough), a night when small spooks slither through the streets of Pumpkin Center, Cal., Skull Creek, Colo., and Treat, Ark—and most places between.

The originators of the observance of All Saints Day probably never realized how the eve would be marked in the 20th century.

And for sure, they never realized the dangers of Halloween hijinks.

The holiday, the National Safety Council points out, can be full of fun for youngsters if a few simple precautions are followed.

No one wants a repetition of the tragedy in Seattle, Wash., when a youngster's Halloween mask slipped, blinding his view of an onrushing auto.

How can we parents make this Oct. 31 safe from Halloween hazards?

By buying their children light-colored costumes, for one, the Council says. They're easier to see at night.

For another, by making sure the children aren't tripping hazards and that they are flameproof.

Other tips:

1. Masks are dangerous because they restrict vision. They're also hot and scratchy, so kids will welcome a painted false face. A little rouge, eyebrow pencil and moustache stick can make children miniature ghosts, goblins, pirates or clowns—but with the added safety factor of allowing them to see danger in time to avoid it.

2. Use a flashlight instead of a candle in jack-o'-lanterns.
3. Remind children that on Halloween, as during the rest of the year, safety precautions should be

## Amendment Election Set For November 5

The special election on three constitutional amendments will be held Nov. 5.

Voting in box No. 10 in Rotan will be done at City Hall, with W. B. McKimney, election judge. No. 12 will be held at VFW Hall with Aud Gerrald, election judge. Voting hours will be 8:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

The proposed amendments read for or against:

1. The Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62 Article XVII of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State.

2. The Constitutional Amendment increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-One Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-Two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-Seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.

3. The Amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State.

**Delta Kappa Gamma Explains Much On Teaching Profession**

In order that persons interested in the education of boys and girls in the public schools might better understand the teachers of those boys and girls, Gamma Tau Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma, International Honor Society for women teachers, wishes to give to the public a summary of what "Professional Growth—Living a Productive Life" means to the classroom teacher.

The teachers (all members of Delta Kappa Gamma) who prepared this summary from a program given at a recent meeting of Gamma Tau Chapter in Roby, are Mrs. E. J. Woodward, Miss Earline Bennett, Mrs. R. N. Taton, and Mrs. Joe Benson. Each of these teachers has to her credit more than five years of college and university preparation for the teaching profession. Yet each feels that good teachers are growing teachers.

The full area of teaching cannot be learned in college nor in the first few years of teaching. But as long as a teacher is alert to the problems of broadening the vision, deepening the understanding, and enlarging the interests of growig boys and girls, he need ever lack for challenges to his knowledge, skill and intellect.

The great need is for growth of teachers as alert, vital human beings, trained to gain increasingly higher levels of performance.

The practice of school-wide in-service programs is meeting the need of these teachers.

It is impossible to conceive of an in-service program existing without curriculum study as its common theme, as the in-service idea secures its quality in the organization of teacher effort toward a common goal. By taking advantage of carefully planned in-service programs, the teacher will not only grow professionally, but will reap a profit just as any business firm does.

This profit represents returns in satisfaction of a job well done. The 300-year story of American Public Education has always had a definite drive—the persistent search for the perfect instructional program. And so it will be in the years to come.

Teachers should have an important part in developing an effective long range program for education. To do this they must have membership and engage in active participation in local, district, state and national organizations. They must raise their sights to new levels by expanding educational opportunities for an expanding population.

This is a time of greatness. Local, state and national associations provide all teachers with a golden opportunity to strengthen their profession and to improve the quality of education.

If the teaching profession is to make its proper contribution toward the building of a world of freedom, teachers must join in a banded effort of local, state, national and international work to make others see that education is the foundation upon which the nation is built.

United membership is the door through which teachers must pass if they are to be worthy of the men and women who laid the foundation for our great profession and if they are to measure up to greatness to those who follow them in this great profession.

May it be said of this American generation that a foundation in education was laid for the building of a world far superior to any yet known.

The teaching profession is a way of life that assumes an obligation of public service.

The teaching profession is not for the person who is interested primarily in what he can get out of life. A dedicated teacher is rather interested in learning through professional growth more interest in life of others.

The child in the classroom is the clay with which the teacher works and out of which international goodwill and understanding and world peace will be fashioned.

Whatever is right or wrong on earth is exactly what is wrong in the human heart.

Fortunate indeed is the child whose teacher's life is love in action—whose teacher is sincere when she says, "Now I know the real fun of teaching comes in seeing how much I can put into life for my pupils."

### ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

Severe infections of the ear are not as common as they were before the appearance of sulfa drugs and antibiotics. But while the severity and frequency of these infections have been reduced, ear-

aches still occur.

Most ear pain comes during childhood, the reason being that small children have shorter passages for infections to reach the ear. When they get colds they do not blow

the nose or clear the throat as adults do. This results in an accumulation of mucous which may congest narrow passages and start an ear infection.

Infections of this type begin when bacteria reach the middle ear. The pain intermittent at first, then constant—is a sign that this has happened. In this condition, pain may be followed by drainage. The start of drainage may mean the end of pain because the pressure has been relieved. Pain subsides only when pressure and infection have been brought under control.

As bacteria multiply and produce their poison, the body's natural defenses rise to fight the infection. Blood vessels expand to carry more blood to the ear. Serum passes from blood vessels into the middle ear to try to neutralize the invading bacteria. White blood cells, normally present in the body, increase in numbers to destroy bacteria.

In mild infections the bacteria may be overcome before reaching the middle ear and there will be no middle ear involvement. In situations like this, the condition very often subsides within 24 hours.

Children with acute running ears should be taken to a physician for examination and treatment. While infection of the mastoid part of the ear bone is not as common as it once was, due to newer drug therapy, it still occurs. The mastoid part of the ear bone is connected to the middle ear. Its cellular composition resembles a honeycomb. The cells contain air and each has a thin lining membrane. An infection in the middle ear may spread to the mastoid air cells and cause them to become infected. This infection may destroy bone tissue and form an abscess in the mastoid which can be relieved only through surgery.

Earache in children may stem from causes other than infection. Nasal blocking due to the congestion of a cold, or large adenoids may be responsible. Blocking of the eustachian tube prevents air from approaching the middle ear during swallowing or yawning.

Don't neglect an earache and don't probe into the ear to relieve distress or the sense of pressure. Let your physician decide the cause and the method of correcting it.

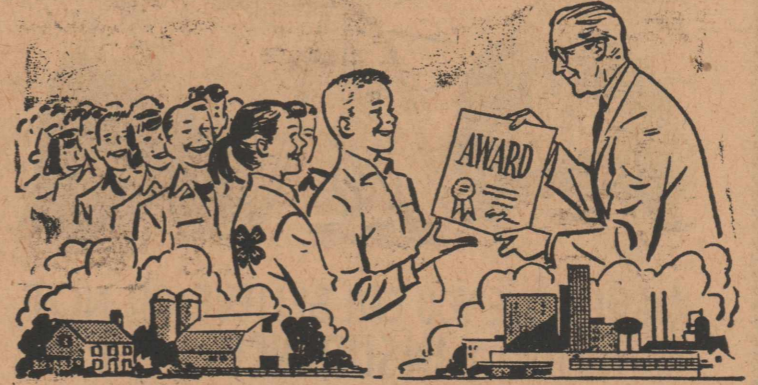
An innovation in the 1958 line is the assigning of names to each of the three weight classifications. They are:

sign. The completely machined combustion chamber is located wholly within the cylinder bore. The top face of the block is machined at a 74° angle to the centerline of the bore instead of the conventional 90° inclining the head more toward the horizontal. The top of the cylinder thus is elliptical rather than round, making more space for larger valves, central location of the spark plug and staggered valve arrangement.

Extra-strength "peaked roof" aluminum pistons are positioned with one dome surface parallel to the plane of the flat head and the other at 32 degrees to it. The result is thin squish and quench area in one half the cylinder and a wedge-shaped combustion chamber in the other. The arrangement induces extreme turbulence in the fuel-air mixture and together with the short flame travel from the centrally located sparkplug induces high efficiency of combustion.

In line with its improved engines, Chevrolet also is offering many improvements in chassis components. On all heavy-duty models, cast spoke wheels now are standard and air brakes are optional except on the school bus. The air-over-hydraulic brake system is extended to include medium-duty models for the first time.

In appearance the new trucks carry a more massive look. A varied sheet metal design gives distinction to models in each weight class, although frontal styling of all modes is substantially similar except for the Step-Van. Exterior changes have functional as well as style values. Modern dual headlamps ex-

tend on beam visibility up to 50 feet further.

Attractiveness of exteriors is matched by new smartness inside the roomy cabs. Long-wearing vinyl is featured in standard cabs with optional trim and appointments available.

Attention has been given to many other details in the 1958 truck line. The accelerator pedal has been re-hinged for driving comfort. Hood-lift effort has been reduced from 35 pounds to 10 or the larger models. Generator capacity has been stepped up 20% in most models.

He entered the Army last January and completed basic training at Fort Carson, Colo.

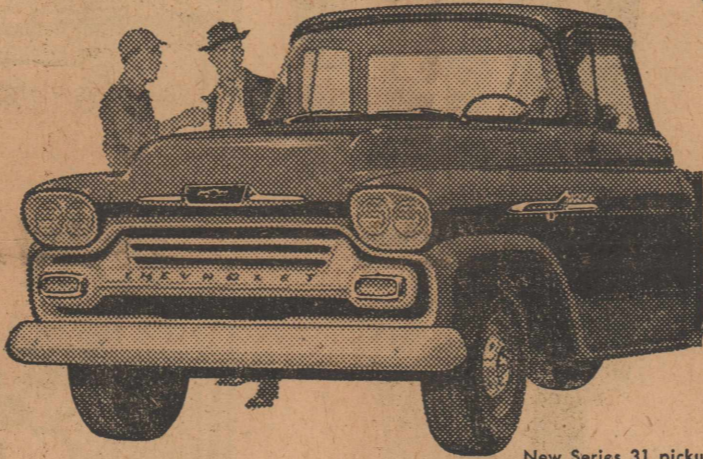

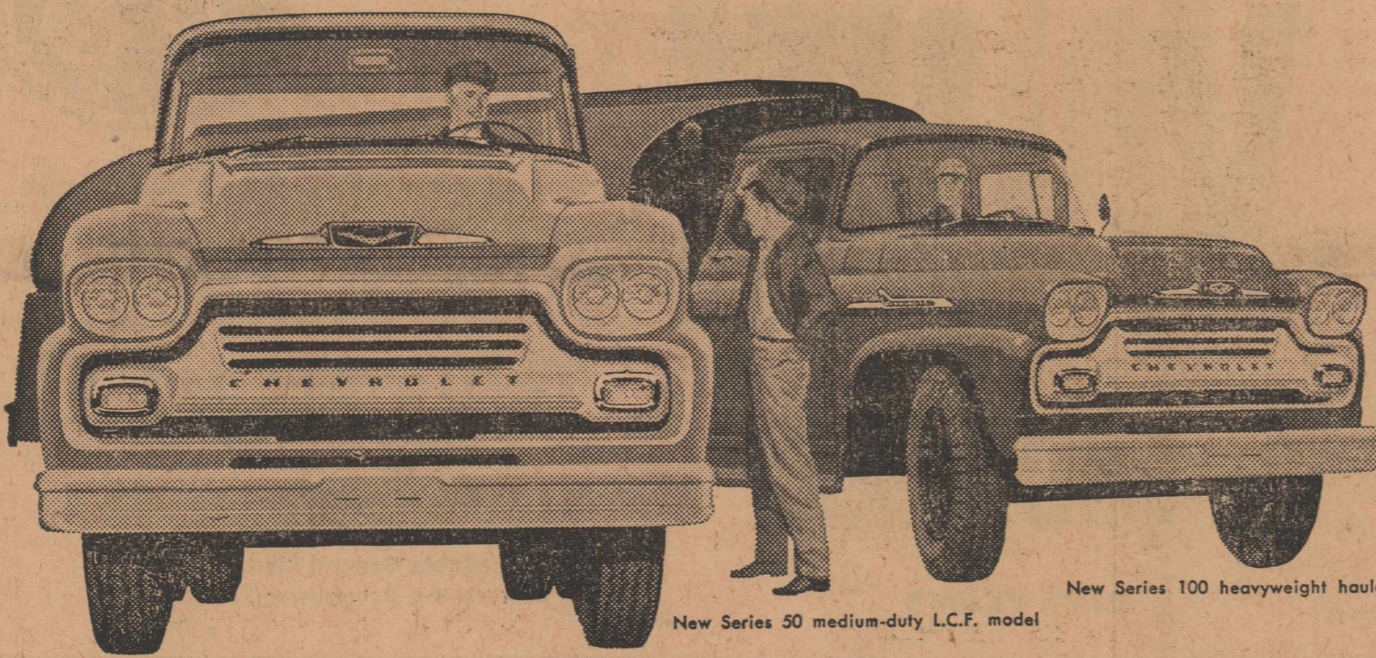

### AN ORDINANCE

Regulating Solicitors, peddlers or vendors of goods, wares, merchandise or service calling in or about private residences in the City of Rotan, Texas, requiring permits from the City; excepting the sale of certain products from the provisions hereof; providing penalties, repealing conflicting ordinances, and declaring an emergency.

Be It ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF ROTAN, TEXAS, THAT:

Section 1. No person or persons shall after the adoption of this ordinance go in, upon or about any private residence in the City of Rotan, Texas, while acting in the capacity of a solicitor, peddler, itinerant merchant, or vendor of merchandise, unless such person or persons have been requested or invited to do so by the owner or occupant of such private residence, or unless such person has received from the City of Rotan a permit to engage in such activity by the City of Rotan.

Section 2. Permits to solicit business or to peddle or sell goods, wares, services or merchandise shall

be issued by the City Secretary upon compliance by the applicant with the following requirements:

a. Applicant shall receive the written approval of the Board of City Internal Affairs, which written approval shall state that an investigation has been made of the goods or services offered for sale by the applicant and that such goods or services have been found to be of a reliable nature and the reputation of the manufacturer or originator of such goods or services meets with the approval of such Board of City Internal Affairs.

b. The applicant shall present a written approval issued by the Chief of Police certifying that the applicant has registered with the Police Department of the City of Rotan, Texas. Further, that the Police Department has no reasonable objection to the issuance of a permit to the applicant.

c. Applicant shall pay to the City of Rotan the sum of \$1.00 to \$100.00 for the issuance of such permit. The permit shall be operative for a period of one (1) month from the date of issuance.

Section 3. Permit provided for in Section 2 above may be revoked

without notice by the City of Rotan upon receipt of reliable information that the holder of such permit has violated any of the laws of the State of Texas, or the Ordinances of the City of Rotan; has furnished a purchaser with cheap, shoddy or useless merchandise; or has conducted himself in such a discourteous or persistent manner as to become a nuisance to the persons upon whom he calls.

Section 4. The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to the sale or soliciting of orders for the sale of milk, dairy products, vegetables, poultry, eggs and other farm and garden products so far as the sale of these commodities is now specifically authorized by law.

Section 5. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined an amount not to exceed \$200.00.

Section 6. All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, which are in conflict herewith are repealed.

Section 7. It being deemed by the City Commission that an emergency exists, this ordinance shall go into effect immediately upon its
