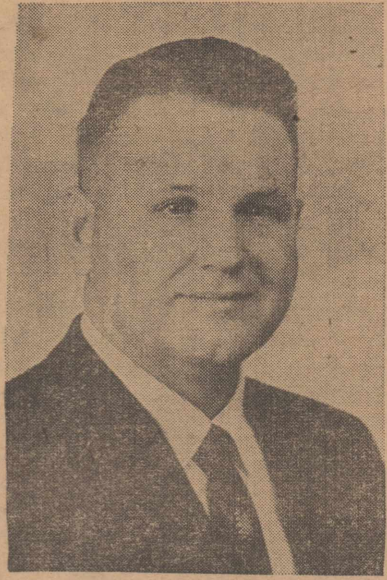

Carriker Is Candidate For Representative



MAX CARRIKER

Max Carriker, 36-year-old Roby stock-farmer and seedman, announced Wednesday his candidacy for State Representative from the 91st legislative district, composed of Nolan, Mitchell and Fisher counties.

Carriker, a native of Fisher County, is son of Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Carriker of Roby. He is associated with his father in farming and ranching, and in the seed business.

He is married and has three children. Their farm home is located along U. S. Highway 180, just a few miles east of Roby.

Carriker said Tuesday that he wanted the job because it offered wider opportunities to fight for rights of people in this area. He has been "fighting" for a lot of things to improve the economic structure of the area during the past few years. For improvement in education; more water for the county and area; various conservation programs; favorable farm legislation and a fair agricultural program; fair taxation, especially as applied to farmers and small business men. He has made several trips to Washington in the economic interest of the area.

About three years ago, at the peak of the drouth, he headed a 12-county committee, formed to ask increase in the cotton acreage allotment as an emergency program.

He is immediate past president of the Four County Agricultural Council, composed of members from Fisher, Nolan, Mitchell and Scurry counties. He is a member of the Fisher County Farm Employment Advisory Committee; and is a member of the board of directors of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Carriker's activities, both local and area, have been, and are, very diversified. He is a past president of both the school board and the PTA in Roby. He is one of the founders and served six terms as president of the Fisher County Fair and Rodeo Association.

Carriker is a graduate of Hardin Simmons University, Abilene, and, during World War II, volunteered as a private in the U. S. Air Corps. He served three and one-half years; two years in the Pacific, and was discharged with the rank of Captain.

Perhaps the most important post he holds in Fisher County is that of County Democratic Chairman.

He is a complete newcomer to politics, having never sought office before.

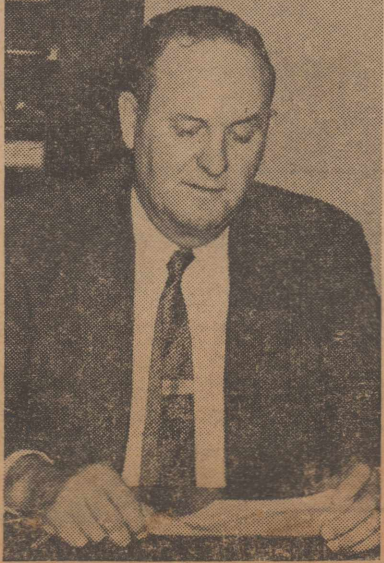
Open House At FHA Office Last Saturday

Pre-Measurement Cotton Service Offered

Fisher County farmers are reminded that requests for the service of pre-measuring 1958 cotton acreage allotments are now being taken at the ASC office. Under this program, a reporter will measure and stake out your cotton acreage. Then, if you plant within the area staked out, you will have the correct amount of cotton when your farm is checked this summer. The pre-measuring service is entirely optional, and the cost of it must be paid by the farmer obtaining the service. The rate of charge for premeasuring cotton is \$10 per farm plus \$4 for each plot over one.

April 15, 1958, is the final date to make application for cotton pre-measurement service.

1958 Cotton Acreage Reserve Program

Fisher County allocation of funds for 1958 Cotton Soil Bank is \$570,000.00, which is only enough for 375 agreements. The office has taken requests for agreements from 127 producers amounting to \$138,000.00. These requests will be approved only if additional funds are made available. The final sign-up date to make requests for agreements has been changed from March 7 to February 20, 1958. Anyone desiring to make application must do so by February 20.

Producers are reminded that all livestock must be removed from the designated acreage when the agreement is signed by the producer.

Information Given On Refuse Sanitation

The following information in regard to refuse sanitation was recently received by Dr. C. U. Callan, City Health Officer of Rotan, from the State Department of Health.

City officials have instigated a cleanup program which is planned to cover the entire town in the next few weeks. As garbage disposal is a major health problem to any town or city, Dr. Callan requested the opinion of the State Department on a basis practical for Rotan.

Dear Doctor Callan:

This will acknowledge your letter of January 23 requesting information concerning a sanitary garbage collection and disposal program.

This Department should like to take this opportunity to congratulate you for your interest in this very important phase of municipal sanitation.

The complete refuse sanitation program necessitates the proper handling of refuse in its three phases: storage, collection and disposal. Each phase must be considered since the neglect of one point will cause failure of the program and its desired objectives. A sound ordinance which outlines and controls each phase of the program is the foundation of a successful operation.

Refuse storage is the responsibility of the individual premise occupant and should be accomplished through the use of galvanized metal containers, 30 gallon maximum, with tight-fitting lids. The use of these containers not only facilitates easier handling by collection personnel but also discourages burning and prevents the escape of refuse to domestic flies and rodents at individual premises. In effect, it prevents backyard "miniature dump grounds." Many elements of the community agree on the importance of promoting and maintaining a community-wide storage policy. Public health authorities acknowledge good refuse storage practices from the public health standpoint; public works authorities are interested in having refuse confined in proper containers and located at the proper places for collection; the fire department is interested in the safe storage and collection of combustible materials; and the home owner is interested in the sanitation and safety aspects of proper refuse storage. A good education program through local newspapers, radio, personal contact, clubs and other available media is usually the best approach in improving storage conditions.

The sanitary collection of refuse is the responsibility of the municipal government. Collection service provided twice weekly to residential areas and daily to business areas materially reduces storage problems; however, a more important reason for frequent collection is the fact that fly breeding often occurs in putrescible material that is allowed to accumulate for longer than three or four days. In most instances the enclosed packer-type collection vehicle is more practical and sanitary than the open-type vehicle. Due to greater capacities, fewer trips to the disposal site are necessary. This type equipment also protects refuse from flies, eliminates spillage and blowing papers and reduces injuries to collection personnel due to easy loading features.

The sanitary landfill is one of methods of refuse disposal. In the most economical and sanitary sanitary conditions, resulting from scattered refuse and putrescible materials, commonly found at open dumps, create an ideal environment for flies, mosquitoes and rodents, which in turn present serious potential health hazards to nearby residents and to the entire community. These conditions can be eliminated through a sanitary landfill operation in which all refuse is compacted and covered daily with an earth cover. Small tractor equipment for this operation is now available which is in the price range of small communi-

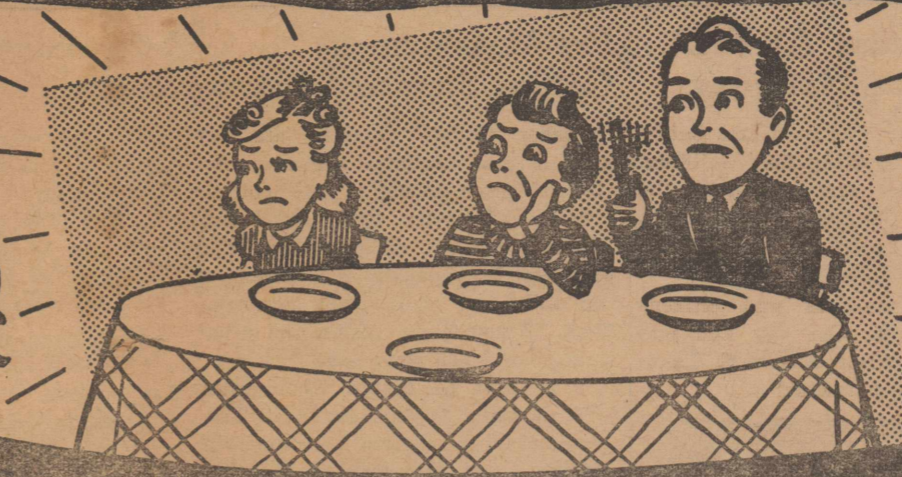
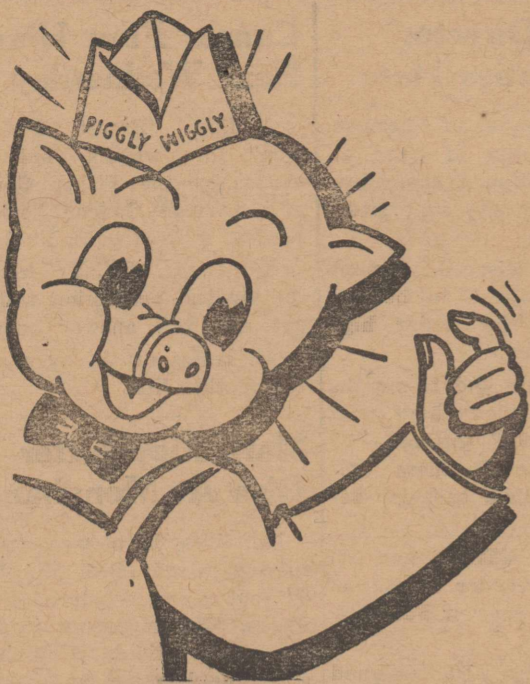
Article 2745c. Election of School Trustees.

Sec. 1. In all elections for the office of county school trustee or trustee of any school district, however created or designated, the applications of candidates for a place on the ballot shall be filed not less than thirty (30) days prior to the day of the election and the ballots shall be printed not less than twenty (20) days prior to the day of the election. In each election it shall be the duty of the officer or board charged with the preparation of the ballots to deliver to the county clerk, on or before the twentieth day preceding the day of the election, a sufficient number of ballots to accommodate applications for absentee ballots in such election; and it shall be the duty of the county clerk to conduct the absentee voting in the election in accordance with the general election laws relating to absentee voting. Paper ballots shall be used for absentee voting in all such elections, including elections in districts where voting machines are used at regular polling places.

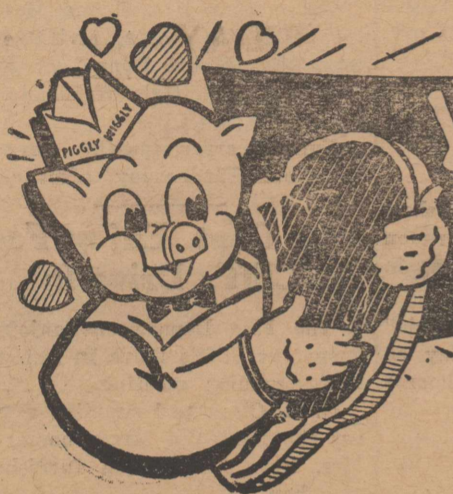
This means:

- (1) For the year 1958 a candidate must file on or before March 5.
- (2) Ballots printed on or before March 15, and delivered to county clerk for absentee voting.

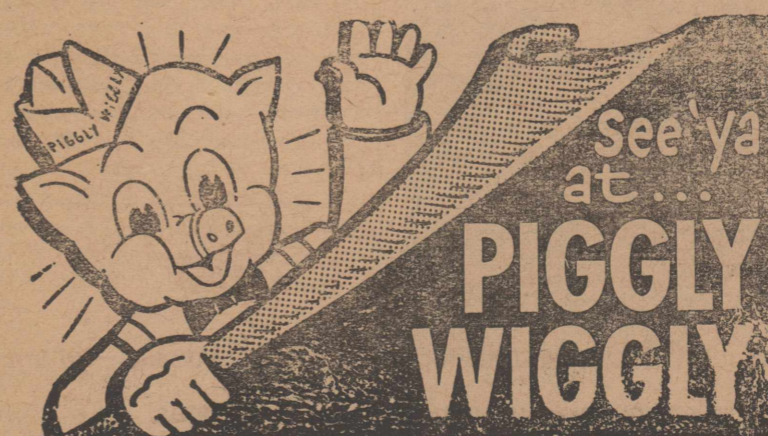

Local Winners Of 'Betty Crocker' Contest Named This Week

Two girls have been named Betty Crocker Homemakers of Tomorrow in Rotan.

They received the highest scores in their schools on a written examination of homemaking knowledge and attitudes taken by graduating high school girls.

The local winners are Barbara Kay Hodges of Hobbs High School and Peggy June Hammit of Rotan High School.

Their examination papers now will be entered in competition with those of 627 other school winners to name this state's candidate for the title of All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow and will also be considered for the runnerup award in the state. For their achievement they will each receive an award pin designed by Trifari of New York.

Each State Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and an educational trip with her school adviser to Washington, D. C., Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and New York City. A \$500 scholarship will be awarded the second ranking girl in each state. The school of the state winner receives a set of Encyclopedia Britannica.

A record 327,000 young women in 11,800 of the nation's public, private and parochial high schools participated in the fourth annual Betty Crocker Search sponsored by General Mills. This year's huge entry brings the four-year participation over the million mark. A total of 1,071,000 girls have enrolled in this national homemaking project since it was launched in 1955 to assist schools in education for home and family living. A total of \$106,000 in scholarships will be awarded this year.

ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health,

There is a definite Jeykell-Hyde element in Wilhoml Konrad Roentgen's discovery of the x-ray phenomenon in 1885. Used by trained technicians, x-rays become peerless tool for diagnosing and treating human ills and injuries. But used by untrained hands, they become errant destroyers of living tissue. Even Roentgen didn't realize the danger of his discovery. He apparently did not receive any significant injuries, but his good fortune stemmed from the fact that he constructed shields not for his own protection, but to keep his highly prized photographic plates from being fogged by scattered radiations. Today there is agreement among many medical authorities that x-ray exposures cause tissue damage. Generally speaking, however, as used by competent physicians the value of diagnosis and treatment far exceeds the controlled damage which must inevitably result. Recent stringent regulation by the State Board of Health against exposures of humans to x-rays prohibits indiscriminate fluoroscopy. Fluoroscopy is authorized when supervised by persons licensed to "engage in the healing arts." A case in point is the relatively common practice in recent years of using x-ray machines to visualize feet of normal people, including children, in retail shoe stores. That they are dangerous has been shown by the State Health Department's Division of Occupational Health as long as five years ago. Engineers extensively examined machines in various parts of the state and found the vast majority of them to be distinct hazards to customers and to store employees stationed nearby. The new Board of Health regulations say "shoefitting fluoroscopes are hereby declared to be neither diagnostic nor therapeutic." But that does not preclude their use as a means of checking a corrective shoe fit as prescribed by a physician. For persons with normal feet, most shoe stores fit shoes by the time proved methods of pressure, feel and comfort. But there are persons who require special built in corrections in their shoes. In many of these instances fluoroscopic devices are valuable in checking the accuracy of the correction. Parents should never submit themselves or their children to flu-

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rosopic shoe fittings unless their physicians recommend the procedure. Public Health and medical authorities have a responsibility for seeing that the best possible use is made of x-ray devices in detecting and treating human ills. The public has a responsibility too, in not demanding x-ray from their physician when he does not find one necessary.
