

Agricultural Agent Texas A. e. M. College Extension Service

One of the most comprehensive cow-calf research projects in the southwest is being started in the Rolling Plains by interested ranchmen and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station seeking answers to pressing problems in cow-

calf type ranching operations. Some of the biggest problems are in nutrition, grazing management and range improvement. The project may require approximately 10 years to produce the desired infor-

An 11-section area of the SMS Ranch in Throckmorton County will serve as the experimental area. William J. Waldrip, formerly with the Department of Range and Forestry at Texaxs A&M College, will head the project as a part of the research conducted through the Ex-

periment Station at Spur. A group of ranchmen and businessmen formed the Texas Experimental Ranch Committee as advisors to the work and to raise funds for necessary construction in the experimental area including numerous fences, water tanks and other

Headed by John Matthews of the Dodge Jones Foundation, Abilene, as chairman of the committee also includes O. J. Barron of Spur headquarters ranch, Spur; R. A. Brown of Brown and Davis ranch, Throckmorton; D. Burns of Pitfork Ranch, Guthrie; B. A. Elliott of Elliott Hereford Farms, Moran; George Humphries of 6666 Ranch, Guthrie; Hobert Lewis of Spur Security Bank Spur; W. J. Lewis of Flying U Bar Ranch, Clarendon; John Lott of Lazy S. The Soil Bank Farm Program was set up by an Act of Congress in 1956 with the objective of reducing production of allotment crops and converting cropland to permanent cover (or trees) as a soil conservation measure. The program is divided into two parts, acreage reserve and conservation reserve.

To accomplish the objectives of the program, the government compensates the producers who participate in the Soil Bank. But it seems that the division of the payment between landlords and tenants may be a barrier in getting full participation of rented farms.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has just released a pub-Lication, "Dividing Soil Payments Between Landlord and Tenant" that offers suggestions on the division of payments.

This publication gives examples for dividing soil bank payments for cotton put in acreage reserve; dividing soil bank payment for wheat put in acreage reserve; and dividing soil bank payment on acres put in conservation reserve, 5-year

Also included in the publication is an example of the form for divid\_ ing the soil bank payment.

This helpful publication may be obtained from the county agent's office or from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas. Ask for MP-238.

In buying fertilizer for next spring's crops, let soil testing take the guess work out of deciding the best rate of fertilizer use. Soils vary greatly in their supply nutrients essential to top yields. This is seen by the fact that one part of the field yields fairly good where another part might yield less. This variation means that fertilizer needs will vary from field to field and from farm to farm.

Fertilizer which is applied that isn't needed is money wasted, or if the wrong ration of plant nutrients are used, profits will be less. But the right ratio and right amount of plant nutrient results in maximum profit from the use of fertilizer. Soil tests can give this information and would be a good investment before buying fertilizer next

If soil samples are taken, be sure they are representative of the field to be fertilized. We will be glad to assist with taking a sample or explaining how to take one, and also furnish the necessary information sheets that need to be submitted with the samples.

# Have That Prescription Filled at Ragsdale's

### The Duty of The Church Toward Disorderly Members

Regardless as to how unpleasent the task may be, discipline must be maintained even in the church of our Lord. There are people who have no respect for authority. One would think that every person, especially those who claim to be spiritually-minded, would take extreme care of their conduct, and attempt to properly mold for themselves a Christian character, and in so doing influence those who come in contact with them into lives of unselfishness. The New Testament is very plain regarding the duty of the church toward members who walk disorderly. The Apostle Paul having addressed his second letter to the church of the Thesalonians, among other things said, "Now we COMMAND you brethren, in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, that ye WITHDRAW YOURSELVES FROM EVERY BROTHER THAT WALKETH DIS-ORDERLY, and not after the traditions which they received of us." (2 Thess. 3:6.)

God has not left us in doubt as to what constitutes disorderly walking. In 1 Cor. 5:9-13 we have the following. "I wrote unto you in my epistle to HAVE NO COMPANY WITH FORNI-CATORS, not at all meaning with the fornicators of this world, or with the coveteous, and extortioners, or with idolaters; for then must ye needs go out of this world: but as it is, I wrote unto you NOT TO KEEP COMPANY, if any man that is named a brother be a fornicator, or coveteous, or an idolater, or a reviler, or a drunkard, or an extortioner; with such a one no, NOT TO EAT. For what have I do with judging them that are without? Do not ye judge them that are without God judge. PUT AWAY THE WICKED MAN FROM AMONG YOU.

Thus it can be plainly seen what is meant by withdrawing yourselves from every brother that walketh disorderly. And it can be seen that the purpose must not be to get revenge, but in order that he may be ashamed (repent of his sin and ask forgiveness) so he will be in a condition of heart so he can be saved. This being the purpose it is very clear that fellowship is not to be withdrawn without an effort is first made to induce the party to repent. Any person who is guilty of disorderly conduct, who denies his guilt, spurns a first and second admonition, and begins to falsely accuse his brethern who are trying to save him, or who refuses to face his accusers is perverted and self-condemned. As long as the church is in existence this rule must be adhered to, regardless as to what the world thinks about it.


