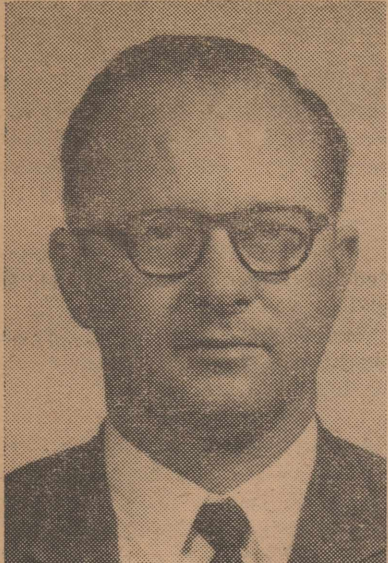
Also killed in the crash was a Levelland dentist, Dr. Malcolm Kennedy.

### Farmers Urged To Plan For Insect Control

The following information is given by the State-Wide Cotton Committee of Texas:

Now is the time to get ready to control cotton insects:

1. Get a copy of the "Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects" from your County Agent, if you do not already have a copy.
2. After studying the guide on what poisons you will use and how much you will need to fully protect your crop this year. Either have the insecticides on hand or assure yourself that they are available on short notice.
3. Check over your sprayer or duster and be sure that it is in first class operating condition and mounted, ready to use when needed.
4. If you plan to use the services of an aerial applicator make prior arrangements so that there will be no slip-ups as to the availability of the plane when needed.
5. Decide on who is to make field checks, and determine when, what and how insecticides will be applied.

The main objective is to see that all cotton insect damage and build up is prevented. When this is done, there will be no loss in production or grade, your insect control program will be highly profitable.

### City Health Officer Advises On Garbage Disposal Problem

In regard to the garbage disposal problem in Rotan, Dr. C. U. Callan, City Health Officer is publishing three articles pertaining to the problem. These are in regard to requirements of the State Health Department. The articles will be published each week:

#### REFUSE STORAGE

The proper storage of garbage and rubbish is the responsibility of the premise occupant. Improperly stored refuse can become a miniature open garbage and rubbish dump. If such storage is repeated over and over again in the community, it is unsightly and not only results in bad public health problem but also contributes to poor civic morale.

#### Containers

Sanitary standard garbage containers are a "must" for proper storage. The cans should be constructed of twenty-four gauge galvanized metal, or heavier. The top and bottom rims of the can should be reinforced as well as the entire bottom which should be concaved in such a way that it does not rest directly on the ground.

#### Storage

The practice of thoroughly draining and wrapping garbage to be placed in a storage container greatly reduces unnecessary accumulations of organic materials within the containers. These accumulations of waste liquids and solids on the inside of the container not only tend to corrode the metal and reduce the period of useability of the can but provide excellent sources of breeding material for flies as well as causing unpleasant odors.

When citizens are made aware of the hazards of insanitary practices, most citizens are not only willing but eager to cooperate in making their community a safer and more healthful place in which to live.

### Soil Conservation Sup. To Be Elected March 18

Tuesday night, March 18, is the date set for the Supervisor Election in Zone 1 of the Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District.

The election will be held at 7:00 p. m. at Clark Implement Co., in Rotan, announces Glen Webb, chairman of the board of supervisors.

The election is called to fill the unexpired term of J. C. Simpson, who recently resigned from the board of supervisors. Simpson's term would have expired in October 1959.

Zone 1 of the Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District encompasses the area north of the Roby-Snyder and Roby Anson highway to the north Fisher County line. The general area from Royston to Hamlin, and Royston to McCaulley is not included in the Upper Clear Fork District.

Landowners only may vote. Also, only landowners may qualify as a supervisor. On election night candidates will be nominated and votes will be cast.

Glen Webb, chairman of the Board of Supervisors, urged all landowners in Zone 1 to come and help elect a new supervisor to succeed Mr. Simpson.

Mr. Simpson, the retiring supervisor, is the last charter member of the board to retire. He was appointed election chairman to elect the first board of supervisors in 1944. Mr. Simpson served as the first vice-chairman and later held the position of chairman for several years. He was secretary of the board until he retired.

Mr. Simpson has spent many active years in an untiring effort to promote better soil and moisture conservation in the Upper Clear Fork District. He will be greatly missed by the board on which he has served since its origin.

## Citizen Group Study Of Schools Is Started

### School Children Eye Tests Are Important

During this school year, the eyes of several hundreds of students have been and are being checked with the Massachusetts Vision Test machine by the county school superintendent and several trained, efficient, careful students. Those who do the checking do not pretend to know anything about eye defects, but the machines are so designed that trained people can operate it accurately. It has been approved by eye specialists over the country and is used by many school systems.

The machine readily detects five different kinds of eye defects, any one of which may give serious trouble. Two or three weeks after the first test, eyes are checked again of those who showed any trouble the first time, as illness or other disturbances can affect the eyes. Eight different tests are made of each person's eyes in the first test.

If the defect found in the first check shows up in the second, parents are sent a note explaining the nature of the trouble in terms a doctor understands, with the suggestion that if the child is taken to a doctor the note of explanation be given to him. This is important as the child may see perfectly and yet have a defect that may cause trouble later.

County Superintendent C. J. Dalton has been advised by eye specialists that the great majority of these defects other than vision may be fairly easily overcome if proper attention is given now but that a few cases can become very serious.

If you receive a note indicating that your child's eyes have one or more of these defects, you should, if you see a doctor, give him the note of explanation.

About 15% of the total eyes checked have shown one or more defects. Just a few moments are needed for checking each person, and our eyesight is so important that we should have our eyes examined now and then even though we feel they do not need it. Neglect may bring trouble later; attention now may save that trouble.

Fisher County citizens are pointing in the most widespread citizen study ever made of Texas Public Schools, with a view to recommending improvements to the 1959 State Legislature.

The study, which has to be both thorough and speedy because county reports are needed by May 1, is an outgrowth of the Legislature's move to examine operations of the Gilmer-Aiken Law since its adoption in 1949.

Each of the State's 254 counties has a special committee which will report by May to the Hale-Aiken Committee of 24, a state-wide group which will consolidate the county reports and draft recommendations to the 1959 Legislature. Deadline on this is October 1. The Texas Education Agency is lending manpower and material assistance in order to get the job done on time.

Along with the other counties, the Fisher County Committee under the chairmanship of Nelson Smith, president of the Rotan School Board, is concentrating its efforts in the areas under consideration—curriculum, teacher supply, school building construction, and finance. Out of these studies improvements in the Gilmer-Aiken Law will be sought, and a better citizen knowledge of schools problems should come out.

Senator Aiken, a sponsor of the school legislative and study movements, has called for the widest possible citizen participation in this study.

The Fisher County Hale-Aiken Committee, originally organized some weeks ago with 28 members, is composed of groups from each of the four schools. Each of these four groups may add others to its committee, and it will welcome suggestions from any others not on the committee.

### Approaching Marriage Is Announced

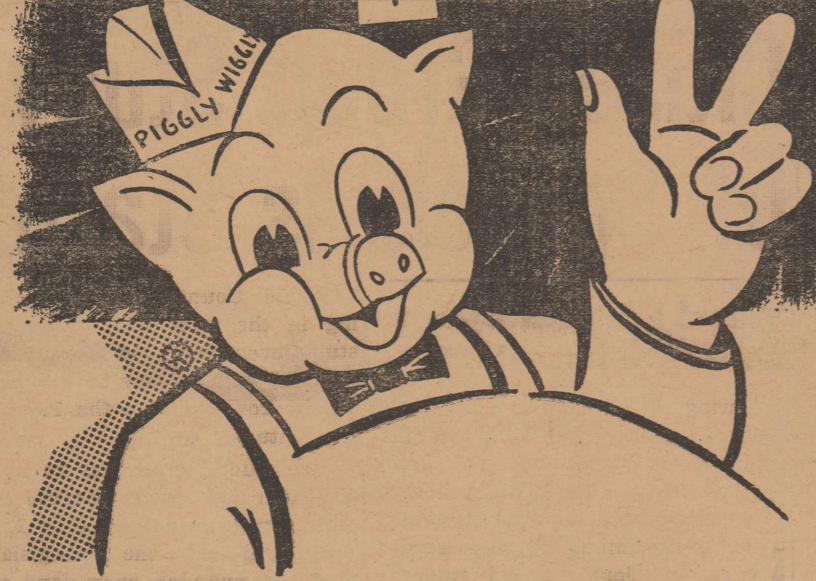

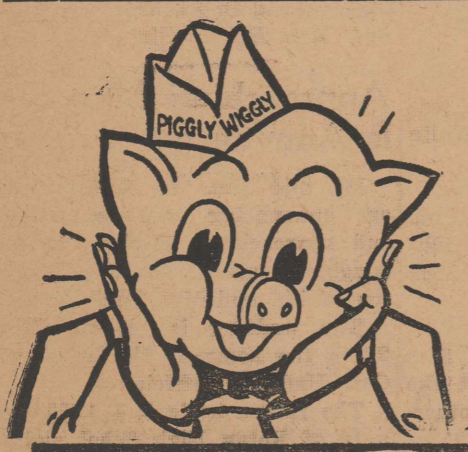

### Livestock Producers Alerted for Leptospirosis

A livestock loss of 100 million dollars a year is now caused by leptospirosis . . . a disease which causes cattle and swine to lose their unborn calves or pigs.

With the early baby pig season in full swing, farmers should be especially cautious with regard to this disease, warns C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian. In swine, when the infection strikes during mid-pregnancy, it usually causes loss of pigs, or the birth of weak ones, he adds.

Hogs can also become hidden carriers of the disease, says the veterinarian. This poses a continuing threat, especially where hogs and cattle come in contact. Swine can be carriers of the disease for as long as a year, but a veterinarian can vaccinate against this condition. This method is widely used in many areas, he says.

Leptospirosis may also be spread through drinking water that is contaminated by waste material from infected animals, cautions Patterson.

A good safety measure against the disease is to quarantine all newly-purchased hogs and have them blood-tested before allowing them to run with the herd, he advises. If the tests show that leptospirosis is present, the proper treatment and precautions can be used to prevent its spread to the original of the herd.

Remember, an ounce of prevention is often worth a pound of cure, concludes Patterson.

A majority of our peach trees require around 850 hours below 45 degrees F. During the dormant season, in order to bloom, set a fruit crop, and grow in a normal fashion. In general, plum and pear trees require a little less chilling as far as cold hours are concerned. Apple trees require more chilling. A large number of cold hours have been accumulated this winter and no difficulty with prolonged dormancy is expected on Texas fruit trees this spring. Tom Denman at the West Cross Timbers Experiment Station at Stephenville, Texas reports 985 hours below 45° up to February 1.

Playing catch up may lead to a disaster. Farmers over Texas will take to the fields with a rush once conditions become favorable. The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council passes on this word of warning: "Don't try to cram more hours into a day by over-taxing your physical capacity. Many fatal farm accidents are caused by fatigue which dulls the reflexes and leads to the taking of chances that could mean serious trouble. Don't throw safety aside for haste. The life you save may be your own."

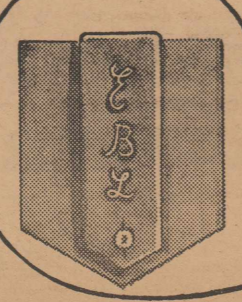

## About Your HEALTH

A weekly public service feature from HENRY A. HOLLE, M. D., Commissioner of Health



Well over half of Texas' paralytic polio victims last year were less than five years of age, a final tabulation of the 1957 polio incidence shows.

The record discloses that of the 365 paralytic cases reported last year, 218 were pre-schoolers under five. That figures out to be 59.7% for Texas, compared to 45% for the nation as a whole.

Of the remaining Texas cases, 44 were between the ages of five and nine; 23 were in the 10-14 age group; 19 were between 15 and 19; and 61 were over 20.

Clearly revealed in these "age group distribution" figures is the necessity of placing special emphasis on the immunization of pre-school children, while at the same time keeping in mind that everyone up to 40 years of age should take the series of three shots in proper sequence.

It still takes almost eight months to take the entire series. The second shot is given two weeks after the first, and the third seven months after the second.

Parents must take the initiative in seeing that their younger children are properly immunized and in getting immunized themselves.

In the four years since the advent of Salk vaccine, its efficiency in conferring immunity against the

crippling effects of polio has exceeded all expectations. This is its record of performance for the past five years.

In 1952, Texas suffered 3,984 cases of both paralytic and non-paralytic polio. That was the worst year in state history. In 1953, reported cases totalled 1,751. There were 3,037 cases in 1954; 1,931 in 1955; and 1,359 in 1956.

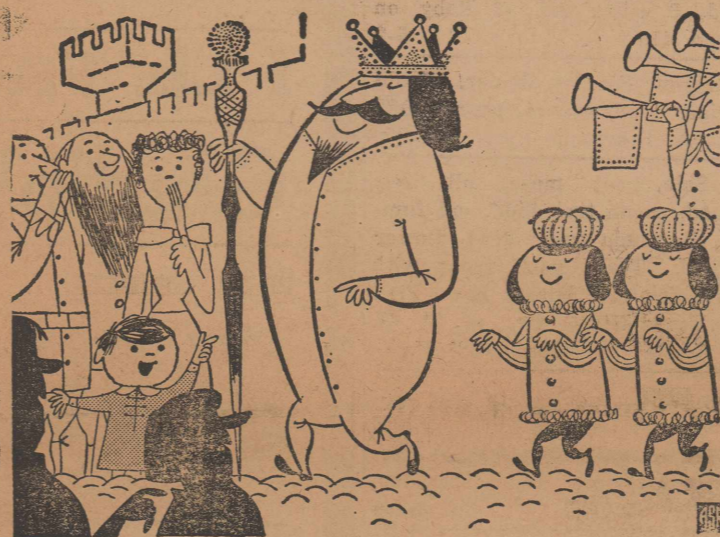
Now compare those yearly totals with the 729 cases last year—slightly over half the number experienced in the lightest year of the previous four.

The time for parents to take action toward having their youngsters—especially those of pre-school age—vaccinated is right now, before the polio season begins. And parents will be making a mistake if they neglect to get themselves immunized at the same time.

The tendency of many people is to take one or two doses of vaccine, and forget about the third. True, one shot gives some protection, and two gives even more. But only by taking that third shot can maximum protection be assured.

Getting vaccine is no problem nowadays as it was in the beginning. Latest estimates put the nation's vaccine supply at 30 million doses.

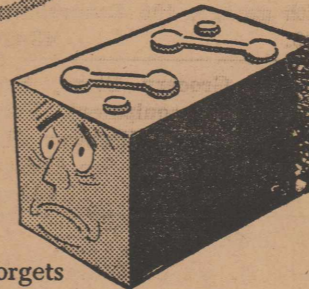
You would not dream of setting out for work or school without shoes on your feet, a dime in your pocket. Yet, many people neglect to fortify themselves with another essential... a good breakfast.

- 1 1/2 cups PET Evaporated Milk (1 tall can)
- 1 1/4 cups water
- 1 1/2 teaspoons onion salt
- 10-oz. pkg. frozen fish sticks

Cut cheese into 1/2-in. squares. In a well-greased dish holding about 6 cups, mix cheese with rice, milk, water and salt. Bake near center of 350 oven (moderate) about 20 min. Arrange fish sticks over top of rice mixture. Bake 20 min. longer, or until rice is tender and fish sticks are thoroughly hot. Serve hot with catsup or chili sauce, if desired. Makes 4 servings.
