



My dear Nealy and Edna: I asure you that it was a surprise, but quite a pleasant one, to receive Mrs. Phillips, for a few weeks visit. your interesting letter. As the young people shared their life graciously with me through the years in the classroom I became interested in them and have them in my memory and in my affection through the years. Through half a century or more in my daily devotions I have asked the Giver of Life to bless, guide and use everyone who has ever been a student in my classes or associated with me in school life.

Certainly I remember Rotan and also the Grady community with me trying to preach, your wife at the instrument and you leading the singing. While it is not very comforting to dwell on some memories, it is one fo life's joys, at least to me, to remember experiences and associations that have been mine through the years.

USE PESTICIDES ONLY FOR THEIR INTENDED PURPOSE

Never use plant pesticides on ivestock. This rule for protecting farm animals from chemical poisoning was developed by USDA Scientists investigating occasional cases of livestock poisoning by insecticides and herbicides.

Though the same material may be used in preparations designed for use on animals as for plants, the concentration and chemical formation may be different. The refference can mean a sick animal. Pesticides are "safe" only when used as intended by the manufacturer and in accordance with his directions, points out C. F. Garner, extension entomologist.

Never over-treat plants to be used as livestock feed, advises Garner. Some highly poisonous insecticides can be used safely because directions call for quantities too small to cause animal poisoning. Less toxic compounds may be more dangerous where larger than recommended quantities are used. Always follow the manufacturer's directions and never guess at quantities, cautions Garner.

Poison symptoms appearing in animals fed pesticide-treated materials may msak een more serious disorders such as rabies, pseudorabies and encephalitis. Diagnosis is difficult, but animals suffering from pesticide poisoning alone will iusually recover completely under good care, providing the poisoning is not too severe.

and endrin act on the control nervous system. Symptoms range from severe depression to violent convulsions or respiratory paralysis.

Organic phosphorus compounds used for plant pest control are closely allied to the nerve gases developed for chemical warfare. They include parathion, methyl parathion and Guthion. They also affect Robert Browning. the nervous system, and animals poisoned breathe with difficulty, slobber and stiffen.

The housefly, perennial villain in man's fight against disease, is now being useful in this fight by helping speed up tests of anticancer compounds-drugs that may someday prove effective in controlling cancer in human beings.

3. If one can be saved without baptism, why did the Apostle Peter say, "Baptism doth also NOW SAVE US." (1 Peter 3:20-21).



They are being used in these tests because of the speed and ease with which they may be reared, according to a report from the U. S. Department of Agriculture. With comparatively little space, time, effort and expense, a supply of 1,000 to 2.000 flies can be reared daily for laboratory use.

They complete their whole life cycle in a little more than two weeks, yet they are phhysiologically similar to higher animals in many characteristics. This combination makes them useful for quick testing of growth-inhibiting, or anticancer drugs.

By contrast, mice and rats normally used for testing growth-inhibiting materials take months of effort in breeding and rearing to mature. There is also additional waiting for the slower results which follow. Flies fed milk containing a material to be tested can be dissected and results observed after only three days; rodents take much longer.

The work with flies was originated by the Department of Agriculture in finding a chemical that would cause sterility in insects. This could serve as a means of cutthem under control, thus furnishting their number and keeping ing an alternative to the use of poisonous insecticides which nearly always involves some danger to human beings, and to which inects have a tendency to build immunity.

Chemical weed killers rarely poison livestock, espite claims to the contrary. The only danger, according to the USDA scientists, lies in consumption of freshly treated plants. This can be avoided by removing livestock from treated areas for one or two weeks. Arsenical compounds are well established as poisonous, but they are less frequently used than formerly. The common weed-killers 2, 4-D and 2,45-T are much less toxic to animals. Copies of the various insect and
