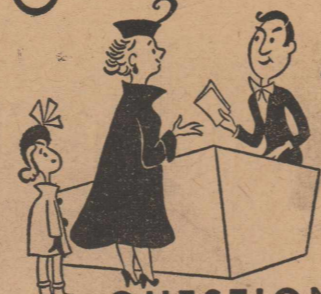

Social Security



QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

The information in this article is compiled by H. C. Haney, Field Representative of the Abilene Social Security office. It is designed to answer any questions you might have concerning social security.

Question: Can a husband receive social security benefits based on his wife's work?

Answer: Yes. The law provides for paying monthly benefits at age 65 to a husband who was receiving one-half support from his wife at the time she became entitled to her own social security payment. In addition to being fully insured, the wife must also have been "currently insured," that is, have worked under social security for at least six of the thirteen quarters before she became entitled to social security.

Question: What is the amount of a wife's social security benefit?

Answer: A wife at 65 will receive an amount equal to one-half of her husband's benefit. If she elects to receive her benefits at age 62, the amount will be less than one-half.

Question: How many people can receive social security benefits on one wage earners account?

Answer: There is no limit to the

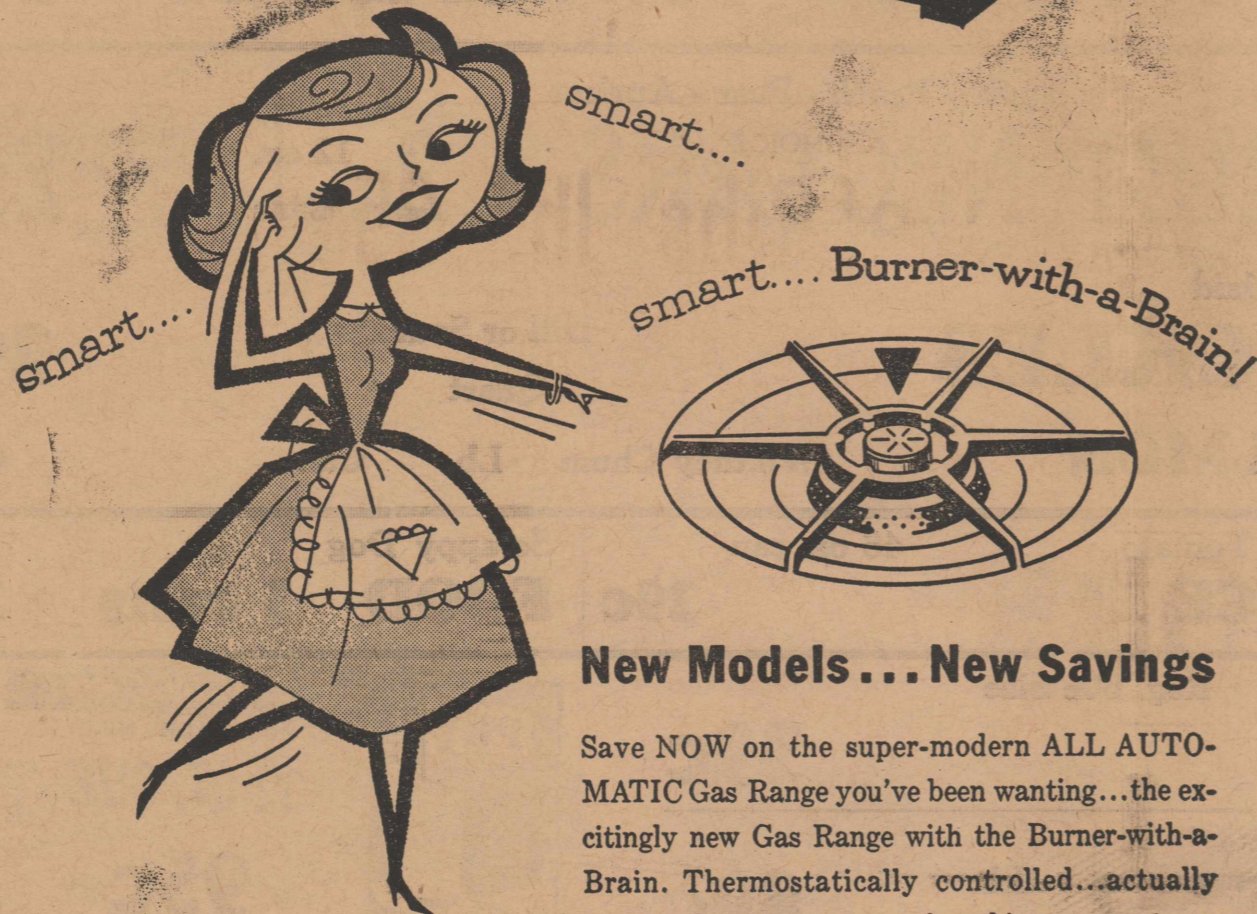

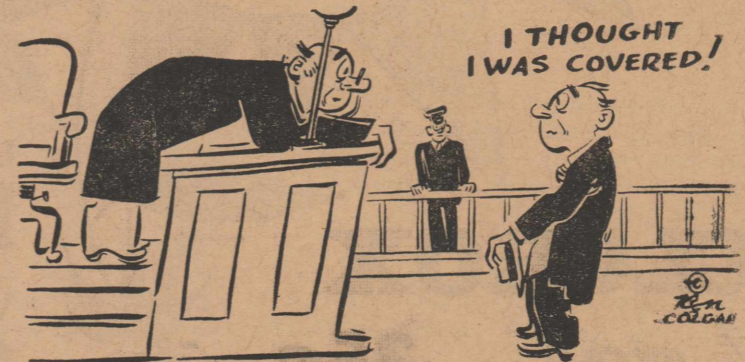
