## Wheat Acreage Allotment History

The U. S. Department of Agriculture explained the effect of new legislation (Public Law 85-366, enacted April 4, 1958) on the computation of future acreage allotments for wheat. The general effect of the new law is to alter the past practice under which the farm that exceeded its wheat allotment received credit for the entire harvested wheat acreage for the year determining future allotments. Under the new legislation, one set of requirements will apply to the 1958 wheat crop and another to 1959 and subsequent crops, as follows:

**For the 1958 Crop:**

Individual Farm Allotments—A farmer who overproduces his 1958 wheat allotment will receive credit for the 1958 farm base acreage (adjusted 4-year acreage) as 1958 history, just as the farmer who complies with his allotment does. However, he cannot receive credit for more than the base acreage, regardless of acreage produced. These legal provisions deal only with wheat acreage history and have no effect on marketing quota provisions. Any farmer who produces more than 15 acres of wheat and exceeds his allotment in 1958 will be subject to marketing quotas. The producer who has overplanted his 1958 allotment has until the disposal date for his area to decide whether or not to dispose of his excess acreage. The amendment does not effect producers who have obtained such producers that none of the wheat acreage in excess of the wheat allotments will be considered in establishing future farm wheat acreage allotments will remain of effect.

State and County Allotments—In computing future State and County allotments, 1958 wheat acreage in excess of farm allotments will not be counted. Thus, excess farm wheat acreage will not produce an increase in the State or county allotments in future years. For the State and county calculations, the 1958 acreage history of a farmer who exceeds his allotment will be the allotment. In other words, a non-complying farm's wheat history will be listed at one figure for purposes of the farm allotment computation and at another for purposes of computing State and county allotments.

**For 1959 and Subsequent Years:**

Individual Farm Allotments—If the acreage allotment is exceeded, the farm's wheat history for the year will be the allotment. To receive credit for the base acreage as history a farmer who exceeds his allotment may store the excess wheat under the marketing quota regulations or deliver it to the government. Farmers who plant within their allotments will continue to get credit not only for acreage harvested but also for the acreage diverted from wheat under the allotment program. Thus over a period of years the producer who exceeds his allotment will accumulate a smaller acreage history than the farmer who complies with his allotment.

## First Contract Under Great Plains Program

James E. Harvey is the first producer in Fisher County to sign a contract under the Great Plains Conservation Program. Through this program he will be able to receive cost shares and carry out a basic conservation program over his entire ranch.

Harvey's ranch lies 5 miles southeast of Roby. He owns 1360 acres of rangeland. Under the Great Plains Conservation Program, Harvey plans to control mesquite brush on 737 acres, overseed all his range land to good high producing native grasses, construct a stock pond a diversion terrace, cross fences, and develop a 45 acres wildlife area.

In 1951, Harvey bought 1,000 acres of this place—later he bought another 360 acres. He became a district cooperator with the Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District soon afterwards. Soil Conservation Service personnel from the Rotan office assisted him to develop stock water ponds, on which he received ACP assistance. Harvey, with the assistance of Harold King of the Soil Conservation Service, developed a basic conservation plan for his entire place.

Since Harvey became a district cooperator, he has carried out a number of conservation practices

on his land—such as deferred grazing, proper use, stock ponds and diversion terraces.

Through the Great Plains Conservation Program, Harvey, now has the opportunity to receive cost shares sufficient to carry out the entire plan of operations for his ranch. He will do this over a three year period. The entire amount of the Government cost share has been set aside, and conservation practices are scheduled to be applied every year.

Harvey and his family live in Lubbock, where he is sales manager for the Kimbell-Lubbock Company. His plans are to build and make his home on the ranch later on.

This year he plans to control mesquite on one pasture by chaining and reseeding. He also plans to construct a pond and a diversion terrace, and to put up cross fences.

Harvey has developed a good sound conservation plan of operation for his ranch. Through the Great Plains Conservation Program he is able to get financial assistance to carry out needed conservation practices. Through such efforts, great improvements should be forthcoming on his native grassland.

## Household Hints

### Mildew Control . . .

Recent hot, humid and rainy weather conditions in some areas of the State offer excellent growing conditions for the molds that cause mildew.

Clothes and household fabrics—especially cotton, linen, silk and wool—are favorite camping grounds for mildew. Quick treatment of the stains is important, according to extension clothing specialists.

First, brush off the surface growth of mildew. Do this outdoors, not in the house, where the spores might scatter over other materials and produce a new growth of mildew.

Soap and water will take care of fresh mildew stains on washable fabrics. If the stains are stubborn, they may be treated with a bleach. Sodium perborate is a mild bleach that is safe for washable fabrics. It's a good idea to test colored fabrics with the bleach first to be sure it's color fast.

Sponge the mildew stain with a solution of one tablespoon of sodium perborate in one pint of lukewarm water. Leave for a minute or two. Then rinse well. Dry cleaning is recommended for fabrics that cannot be washed.

### Warm Days Increase Moth Damage

Rug moths and carpet beetles hatch rapidly under those conditions and the larvae begin at once to gorge themselves. Moth larvae feast for 40 days while those of the beetle continue to eat for an entire year.

In addition to heat and humidity, larvae thrive on dirt and darkness. Too often shades and blinds are drawn and insects are left to enjoy themselves.

The best protection is a thorough cleaning in advance of hot weather according to extension home furnishing specialists. This will not only get rid of moths, larvae and eggs but will also remove the dirt and stains which encourage infestation.

Day-to-day care is very important. For best results, use the carpet sweeper daily on floor coverings and vacuum at least once a week. Give particular attention to breaks, creases, seams and baseboard areas, all of which are favorite hiding places for insects.

Termites may attack rugs or basement floors and on porches. Moth-proofing is fatal to termites.

### Control Houseflies . . .

Flies carry disease germs that endanger health . . . Don't give them a chance to live and multiply.

Sanitation is the first step in controlling this pest, according to extension entomologists . . . Make sure all window and door are tightly screened. Keep garbage and other refuse tightly covered and dispose of it frequently by burning or burying. Keep compost piles covered and clean up after dogs, cats and chickens.

Killing is the second step against this pest. Kill flies by spraying in and around the house. Use both the space and surface-type spray. The new bait preparations are good for use outside where flies gather.

For information on type of bait or spray to use, and how to apply, get a copy of the bulletin, L-311, "Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects." It's available from your County Agricultural Extension Agent.

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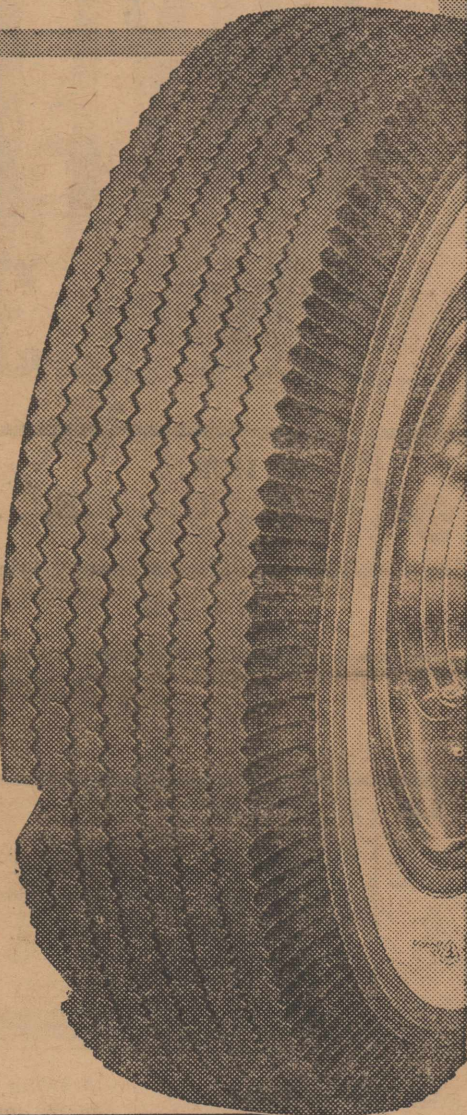

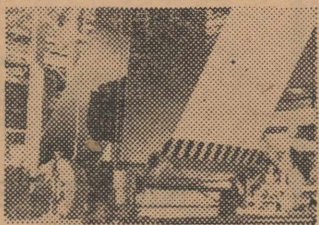

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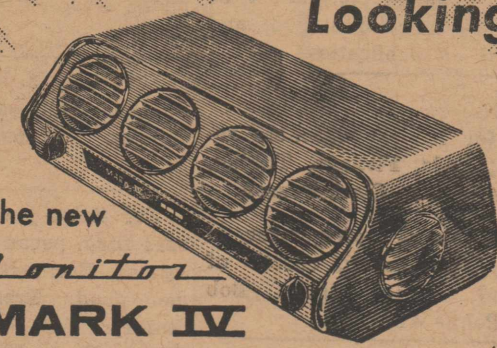

**Co. Agent Warns On Stock Disease**

Fisher County Agricultural Agent James S. Norman, today released a report from the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station on the livestock disease "leptospirosis". Once thought to be unimportant to the livestock industry, this disease is now known to be causing extensive losses.

Surveys conducted during 1956 and 1957 by the Texas Station show the disease to be widespread in cattle and swine of the state. More than half of the herds tested had animals that were positive to the leptospira test. Sheep, goats, and horses may also be affected, but the extent of the disease among these animals is unknown. Deer and several other types of wildlife suffer from the disease and may serve as a reservoir.

Leptospirosis has a wide range of symptoms that makes a diagnosis in the field difficult. It may affect most of the animals in a herd without recognizable illness. On the other hand, there may be numerous abortions and up to 5% death loss among grown animals. But usually the death losses are confined to calves and one out of three of those affected may succumb.

The first symptoms are a high temperature, coffee colored or blood tinged urine and sudden decrease milk production. The milk may be viscid and yellow as in mastitis, but the udder will be limp and cool. Abortion may occur if the animal is in late pregnancy.

## QUESTIONS and ANSWERS



**Question**—Does John 18:37, teach that since Jesus admitted being a king while on earth, that it follows that he had a kingdom? and since the word kingdom and church is used interchangeably in the scriptures, that the church was in existence while Jesus was on earth?

**Answer**—No. If that be true then Matt. 2:2, proves beyond the shadow of a doubt that the church or kingdom was in existence when Jesus was born, for Matt. 2:2, says that Jesus was "born King of the Jews". Therefore that which proves too much, proves nothing. The church of the New Testament had its beginning on the first Pentecost after the resurrection of Christ. For a full account of it read Act 2.

**Question**—In Matt. 16:18, where Jesus said, referring to the establishment of the church, "I will build" did he mean that the church was already in existence and that he meant that he was going to enlarge or make it stronger? Please comment on this.

**Answer**—First note that "will build" can only express future action. Any other theory or reply to this simple statement, is not a reply but an attempt to evade the force of truth. The word has no such meaning other than to express a future intention in this passage.

**Question**—Does it make any difference as to what name one wears religiously?

**Answer**—In Acts 11:26, we are told that "the disciples were called CHRISTIANS first in Antioch." In 1 Peter 4:16, we read that, "but if a man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed; but let him glorify God in this name". God cannot be glorified in a name given by man. In a collective sense regarding the name they wear the Bible refers to them as "The church". "The church of the first born," "The churches of Christ," "The church of God"... Wherever the term appears "The church of God," in the scriptures it has reference to the "churches of Christ." The Lord knew that there would come a falling away from the true church as set forth in (2 Thess. 2:3-12), and knowing that man-made churches would appear, so he gave it a divine designation. Yes, it makes all the difference in the world what name you wear religiously!

**Question**—What are the officers who have the administration of the New Testament church?

**Answer**—Elders and deacons. Their qualifications are set forth in 1 Tim. 3:1-7; Titus 1: 5-8, The qualifications of deacons are set forth in 1 Tim. 3:8-10. The elders have the spiritual oversight of only the congregation where they are members. They rule by teaching and living an exemplary life. The deacons are servants of the church. The preacher is also a servant of the church, working under the oversight of the elders. He is not a pastor, unless he meets the above qualifications, and has been so selected. Being a gospel preacher does not make him a Pastor.

## Midwest CoOp. Open House May 18th

The Midwest Electric Cooperative, Inc., will hold Open House, Sunday, May 18 from 2:00 to 5 p. m., at the new office building recently completed in Roby.

This \$95,000 building is functional in design without sacrifice of beauty and completeness. Built in "T" shape of brick and tile it contains besides the general offices, seven private offices, coffee room, mimeograph room, utility room, rest rooms, coat closets, large storage rooms, a vault, a meeting room with an adjoining kitchenette. Double accordion doors separating the two.

The entire building is heated and cooled electrically and thermostatically controlled. Each office is equipped with thermostat so that the occupants can regulate the temperature of office to suit is or her needs.

Mahogany paneling is used as wainscoting and facings throughout the building except in the manager's office. Here mahogany paneling is used over all of walls.

Walls in private offices are tinted a soft green shade, while those of the general offices are in coral.

Window walls used in much of the building give a spaciousness that pleases and attracts.

The grounds surrounding the building have been leveled, curbs built and the driveway in front of building given an all-weather surface. At opposite ends of the driveway and between it and the highway are large spotlights facing the building and arranged in groups of three.

The meeting room is a desirable place for community meetings, day or night as it can be entered without going through any other part of building. Since the Midwest moved into the new building, recently, a number of groups have used this pleasant, convenient place for gatherings.

The Midwest Electric Cooperative, Inc., which services nine West Texas counties: Borden, Fisher, Scurry, Jones, Mitchell, Stonewall, Nolan, Garza and Kent, has a membership of 3,442 and 1803 miles of lines. At the present 950 oilwells in the area are getting electricity from the Midwest.

Goat Mayo of Petrolia will fur-

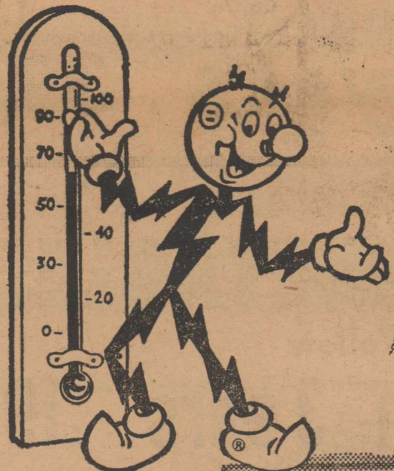

**ORDINANCE NO. 1**

Being an Ordinance adopted for the preservation of health, sanitation and safety of the public and providing for the collection, removal and disposal of garbage, trash, and rubbish within the City of Rotan, Texas; defining terms; requiring all owners, occupants, tenants, or lessees of residences, churches, schools, colleges; lodges and commercial industrial businesses or other buildings within the City to provide containers and receptacles with covers for garbage, trash and rubbish; specifying that containers and receptacles be placed at convenient locations on the premises where they may be emptied and the contents removed at regular intervals; prohibiting anyone except employees of the City of Rotan, or their duly authorized representatives from emptying containers or receptacles or transporting the contents on the streets and public thoroughfares; fixing schedules for reasonable charges to be made against owners, occupants, tenants and lessees of buildings and premises receiving the service; requiring the director of the Department of Public Health to make periodic inspections of buildings, premises and all places where garbage, trash and rubbish may accumulate and enforce and administer the provisions of the ordinance; providing a saving clause in the event any part of the ordinance should be declared unconstitutional; fixing a penalty for the violation thereof; repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith; and providing an effective date.

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROTAN, TEXAS:**

**SECTION 1.** The accumulation of waste, refuse, trash, rubbish and other deleterious substances on the premises of private residences, commercial institutions, vacant lots and in streets and alleys constitutes a public menace and nuisance and greatly increases the danger of the spread of infections, contagious and epidemic diseases, and it is imperative and urgent for the preservation of health, safety, sanitation, peace and public welfare that proper and adequate regulations be adopted to require property owners, tenants, occupants or lessees to secure containers and receptacles of sufficient size and material in which to deposit garbage, trash and rubbish for collections and removal at regular intervals.

**SECTION 2.** Garbage, trash, rubbish, refuse defined. The term "garbage" as used in the ordinance shall be held to mean all animal and vegetable matter, such as waste material and refuse from kitchens, residences, grocery stores, drug stores, butcher shops, restaurants, cafe, hotels, rooming houses and boarding houses and other deleterious substances.

The term "trash" as used in this ordinance shall mean waste and refuse materials such as feathers, coffee grounds, paper of all kinds, boxes, barrels, crates, grass, weeds, shrubs, yard cleanings, grass clippings, leaves, tree trimmings and sweeping from sidewalks.

The term "rubbish" as used in this ordinance shall mean waste and refuse material such as tin cans, bottles, glass, rags, rubber, pieces of wood, scraps of iron, tin, wire and other metals.

The term "refuse" as used in this ordinance shall be held to mean all substances included in the terms "garbage", "trash" and "rubbish."

**SECTION 3. Garbage Cans and Trash Receptacles Required.**

That every owner, occupant, tenant or lessee using or occupying any building, house or structure within the Corporate limits of the City of Rotan, Texas, for residences, churches, schools, colleges, commercial business or other purposes shall provide and maintain garbage can or receptacles of sufficient number and size, as herein after specified, to hold the garbage, trash and rubbish that will normally accumulate on the premises.

**SECTION 4. Garbage, Trash, and Rubbish Can Size and Construction.**

Every owner, occupant, tenant or lessee shall provide a container or containers for garbage and rubbish and rubbish of not less than five (5) nor more than thirty-two (32) gallon capacity, constructed of metal with a tight-fitting metal lid.

**SECTION 5. Construction.**

Garbage containers that have deteriorated to the extent of having jagged or sharp edges capable of causing injury to the garbage collectors or others whose duty it is to handle the container, or to such extent that the lids will not fit tightly or securely, will be condemned by the City of Rotan, acting through the Superintendent of

garbage Department or by the Health Department.

**SECTION 6. Those Allowed to Empty Contents of Cans or Receptacles.**

It shall be unlawful for anyone except the employees of the City of Rotan or their duly authorized contractors to empty garbage cans or trash and rubbish receptacles or convey or transport garbage or trash and rubbish on the streets, alleys and public thoroughfares of the City of Rotan.

**SECTION 7. Lids or Covers to be Kept on Cans or Containers.**

The lids or covers of all containers shall at all times be kept secure and fastened so that cats, dogs, rodents, flies and other insects may not have access to the contents thereof and said lids and covers shall only be removed while the containers and receptacles are being filled or emptied as the case may be.

**SECTION 8. Location of Containers.**

In residential areas, receptacles as required shall be placed inside of the property line at the edge of the alley where there is no alley fence, and where there is an alley fence the receptacle or receptacles must be placed against the outside of the fence. Where there is no alley, the receptacle or receptacles must be placed in front of said property between the sidewalk and curb at a place most accessible to the collectors. Under no conditions will City vehicles or Employees be allowed to enter private property for the purpose of picking up garbage.

**SECTION 8-A Business Establishments** which have wet garbage are required to use the same type of container as for residences and such containers shall be placed in the alleys where there is an alley and where there is no alley, containers must be placed on or near the curb line of such place of business. Business establishments having such quantities of waste paper to make use of barrels impracticable are required to prepare waste paper in containers easily accessible to the garbage collector.

**SECTION 9. Requirements on Weight and Length of Units.**

The total weight of each garbage can and contents of each trash and rubbish receptacle and contents shall not exceed seventy-five (75) pounds so that each can or receptacle may be removed conveniently; in the event trash and rubbish is of such nature that it cannot be put in the receptacle, it shall be carefully prepared in units or pieces under seventy-five (75) pounds in weight and placed at such point as the representative of the City shall find and designate to be the most accessible for collecting and removing. Tree limbs, shrubs and hedge cuttings shall not exceed five (5) feet in length and shall be prepared in pieces or units under seventy-five (75) pounds in weight and placed in an orderly manner at such point as the representative of the City shall find and designate to be the most accessible for collecting and removing.

**SECTION 10. Burning of Trash or Garbage.**

It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to burn trash or garbage within the City Limits of Rotan, Texas, or Garbage.

**SECTION 11. Charges of Trash**

The collections and removal of garbage, trash and rubbish from houses, buildings and premises used for residential purposes shall be once each week. Fair and reasonable charges for this residential service shall be and are shown in terms of dollars and cents in a column for a calendar month as follows:

- Single Family Residence \$1.00.
- 2 Family Dwelling (2 accounts) Each \$2.00.
- 3 Family Dwelling (3 accounts) Each \$3.00.
- 4 Family Dwelling (4 accounts) Each \$4.00.

The basis of the above service charge is the collection and removal of the normal accumulation of all garbage of each family unit each week, and the collection and removal of the maximum of eight (8) cubic feet or the volume of two (2) thirty-two (32) gallon cans or receptacles or trash and rubbish once each week.

**SECTION 12. Charges for Commercial and Business Service.**

The collections and removal of garbage, trash and rubbish from houses, buildings and premises used for commercial and business purposes shall be daily, six days each week. Charges for this commercial and business service, which are fair and reasonable shall be a minimum of \$2.00 per month.

The basis of the service charge will be on the number of collections each week and the cubic yard-

age of such garbage, trash and rubbish.

The representative of the City shall determine the cubic yardage of garbage, trash and rubbish and the service charge which shall be approved by the City Manager.

**SECTION 13. City Garbage Superintendent's Office to be Notified of "No Service."**

Every owner, occupant, tenant or lessee of a house or building used for residential, business, or commercial purposes is required to maintain constant supervision and surveillance over the garbage can and trash and rubbish receptacle on his premises and if either the garbage can or trash and rubbish receptacle should not be emptied and the contents removed by a representative of the City of Rotan, or by other duly authorized person, for a period of seven (7) days, he must notify the City Garbage Superintendent by telephone or in writing, of this fact within seven (7) days.

**SECTION 14. Wet Garbage.**

All garbage or trash and rubbish that is mixed with water or liquids shall be drained before being put in the can or receptacle. All garbage, which has been drained, shall be well wrapped in paper or other combustible material before being deposited in can.

**SECTION 15. Heavy Accumulation of Packing Houses, etc.**

The places of wholesale accumulations such as packing houses, killing and dressing plants for fowls, wholesale fruit and vegetable houses and storage, business houses and other places where the daily accumulation of garbage, trash and rubbish is more than the ordinary quantities, are not included in the service service furnished by the City Garbage Department, are required to notify the Garbage Superintendent of the City of Rotan, who shall direct the disposal of such accumulation in a satisfactory

manner.

**SECTION 16. Heavy Accumulation** such as brick, broken concrete, rock, stones, ashes, lumber, clinkers, cinders, dirt and plaster, sand or gravel, automobile frames, dead trees, and other bulky, heavy material shall be disposed of at the expense of owner or person controlling same under the direction of the City Garbage Superintendent.

**SECTION 17. Heavy Accumulation of Manure, Etc.**

Manure from cow lots, horse stables, poultry yards, pidgeon lofts, and waste and oils from garages and filling stations, shall be disposed of at the expense of the party responsible for the same under the direction of the City Garbage Superintendent.

**SECTION 18. An Offense to Vioate Ordinance.**

The Health Ordinance requires that all premises, both vacant and occupied be kept in a clean and a sanitary condition at all times.

The City Garbage Department will not make collections of garbage, trash or rubbish or tree limbs and shrubbery cuttings, where same is not prepared for collection and placed as designated by the terms of this Ordinance and failure to comply with this provision will be an offense and each day's failure to comply will constitute a separate offense.

**SECTION 19. Disposal Places.**

The disposal of garbage, trash and rubbish and that designated under Sections 14, 15, 16 and 17, of this ordinance or any kind of rubbish in any place within the City Limits of Rotan Texas, except as authorized by the City Garbage Superintendent, is prohibited.

**SECTION 20.**

The meddling with garbage cans, trash or rubbish receptacles in any way, pilfering, scattering contents and junking in any alley or street within the City Limits of the City

of Rotan is prohibited.

**SECTION 21. Protection of Cans or Receptacles.**

The contents of all cans and receptacles shall be protected so that the wind cannot blow out and scatter same over the streets, alleys and premises of City.

**SECTION 22. Service Charge Place on Water Bill.**

To avoid duplication in billing and as a convenience to the public, fees for the service herein provided for shall be billed on the monthly water bills, and shall be promptly remitted to the City of Rotan monthly as the same accrues. Failure to pay such fees when due shall be considered as if the water bill is delinquent and the City may, at its option, discontinue water service until the delinquent fees are paid.

**SECTION 23.**

It is hereby made the duty of the Superintendent of Garbage and the Director of the Department of Public Health of the City of Rotan or his representative, to make regular inspection trips at regular intervals to determine whether or not the garbage, trash and rubbish is being properly collected, removed and disposed of as required by the provisions of this or any other applicable health ordinance, and in the event it is found that the Ordinance is being violated appropriate and timely action shall be taken to insure a full compliance with its said provisions.

**SECTION 24. Complaints.**

Do not enter into controversy with workmen concerning garbage collection. To make a complaint, call the City Office-Phone 222. In making a complaint, be sure to give name and correct address.

**SECTION 25. Saving Clause.**

Should any part, section, sentence, paragraph, clause or phrase contained in this Ordinance be held to be unconstitutional or invalid, such holding shall not affect the

validity of the remaining portion of the Ordinance, but in all respects shall remain in full force and effect; and the City Council hereby declares that it would not have passed the unconstitutional or invalid part had it known it was invalid and that it would have passed the remaining part that it not invalid.

**SECTION 26. Repealing All Ordinances or Parts of Ordinances in Conflict Herewith.**

This Ordinance shall be held and construed to be cumulative of all other Ordinances affecting the health, safety, peace and sanitation of the public in the City of Rotan, except in the instances where the provisions of this ordinance are in conflict with the provisions or Ordinances heretofore passed and all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are expressly repealed.

**SECTION 27. Penalty for Violation of Ordinance.**

Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), and each offense and each day's continuance of failure to comply with the Ordinance shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

**SECTION 28. Effective Date of Ordinance.**

That this Ordinance become effective and in full force and effect three (3) full days after publication of same.

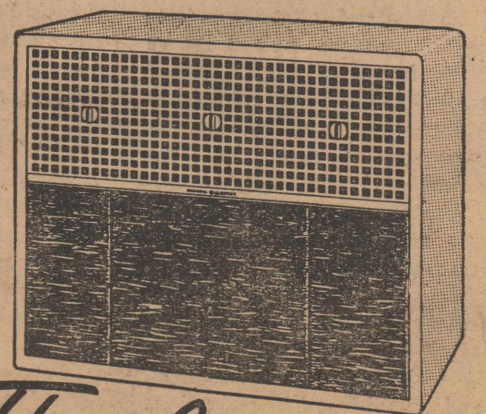

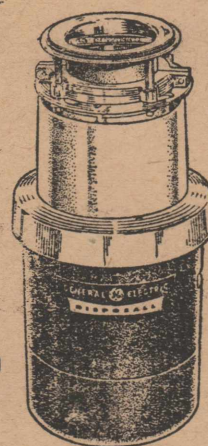
