



QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS



Question:-Are Christians today under the old law, covenant and testament, as a law, and rule of faith and practice?

Answer:-No. In Romans 6:14, Paul says, "ye are not under the law" Then to the Galatians 5:4, Paul says that if anyone "would be justified by the law; ye are fallen away from grace."

Question:-Does the Bible mention several baptism or ways or modes of baptism? Answer:-No. The Holy Spirit says there is, "ONE baptism." (Eph. 4:5).

Question: Should infants be baptized?

Answer:-No. Only the taught are to be baptized. Only the learners, the believers, the men and women who repent are to be immersed. In Acts 8:12 we read, "But when they believed Philip preaching good tidings concerning the kingdom of God and the name of Jesus Christ, they were baptized BOTH MEN AND WOMEN." To attempt to baptize a baby is mockery!

Question:-Are there many churches recognized in the Bible so that one may join the one of his choice with the consent of the Lord?

Answer:-No. You cannot join the church of the New Testament. When one has "obeyed the gospel" (Rom. 10:16), he is then "added . . . to the church" by the Lord. (Acts 2:47). Jesus said, "I will build my church," not churches! Then in Acts 2, we read where it came into being on the first Pentecost after the resurrection of Christ. Then about 25 years later Paul said, "There is ONE body", (church), not 200. (Eph. 4:5).
