Dr. Curry Holden Sells Film Rights On Novel

Dr. William Curry Holden of Texas Tech has received contracts for sale of film rights to his novel, "The Hill of the Rooster."

Dr. Holden a native of Rotan has published several successful novels dealing with the Southwest, but "The Hill of the Rooster" seems to be his most popular.

Film rights to his novel, published in 1956 and based on expeditions to the Yaqui country, Sonora, Mexico, will be released by Champion and Bartlett, producers for Paramount Studios. The picture will be financed, released and distributed by Paramount. Dr. Holden will receive \$10,000 bonus, plus 10% of the net profit.

Dr. Holden has been a member of the Texas Tech faculty since 1929. He was head of the History Department from 1936 to the middle of the 1940's, then served as dean of the Graduate School from 1945 to 1950. He is director of West Texas Museum on the campus and has served in that capacity since the museum was established. He still holds a professorship in the Department of History and Anthropology.

Holden's interest in the Yaqui Indians started in the fall of 1933, when a border patrolman, Ivan Williams came through Lubbock. Williams previously had lived in Arizona and has been acquainted with Yaquis. His experiences incited Holden to lead an expedition from Lubbock to the Yaqui country in 1934 and has returned there about 25 times since.

Holden will be remembered here by many friends. He attended Rotan schools and was reared in the Pleasant Valley community.



Gambling is wrong because it grows like a disease on the gambler. Men have gambled away fortunes. Anything that holds an individual in such captivity is opposed to the superiority of Christ Jesus in our lives. As Christians we are taught in the Scriptures that we are to labor honestly for our daily needs (Eph. 4:28). Gambling is not honest labor; it is STEALING! Gambling contributes nothing to the community, rather it lives like a parasite from the earnings of constructive labor. It was born out of idleness and will become worse as men become more idle.

How many millions of people have been allured by the pretended rewards of gambling. Gambling is a big business in which the leaders find the easiest money to be made anywhere. It is generally known that the gambling games are so fixed that one cannot win.

Why do people want to gamble? It makes no difference whether one is matching pennies or nickles, placing small bets, buying chances, punching boards or entering the office football pot it is gambling nonetheless. Many reasons can be given why people want to gamble. Perhaps one reason is some use it as an escape from the complex world in which we live. But like all escapes, it is really no escape at all. Christians cannot gamble "For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's" (1 Cor. 6:20). Gambling is not only against the law of the land but is contrary to the will of Christ. "Abhor that which is evil; cleave to that which is evil." (Rom. 12:9; "Set your mind on the things that are above, not the things that are on the earth. For ye died" (Col. 3:2, 3).

Social Security



QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Question: I am 68 and plan to sell my business and retire next month. I have netted over \$4200 the last three years. How much social security will my 65 year old wife and I receive.

Answer: Based on your earnings of \$4200 or more since 1954, you and your wife will be eligible for \$162.80 per month.

Question: I am drawing social security as a widow, age 62. If I earn \$1226.00 this year, how many social security checks must I forfeit?

Answer: If your earnings are between \$1200 and 1280 in 1958, you will lose one social security check for the year.

Question: Is employment as a maid in a hotel or tourist court the same as household employment?

Answer: Definitely not. Such employment is for a business enterprise, and the social security tax must be paid on all earnings, regardless of the amount per quarter, and on total wages—not just cash wages. Household employment is work performed in a private home.
