# **DPS** Urges Caution On Holiday Driving

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr. directtor of the Texas Department of Public Safety, made a personal appeal to Texas motorists today urging to join an all-out attempt to make Labor Day a historical event free of traffic deaths.

In his statement, Garrison said that he was talking personally to each driver when he ask them to join the DPS, Gov. Price Daniel, and business and civic organizations throughout the state in a drive to make Labor Daya yet unobtained deathless holiday. He said such traffic record for a holiday in Texas would be recorded in the history books.

"I would like for every driver to realize that his chance of becoming a motorcide this holiday is greater than he would imagine. On an average throughout the 72-hour Labor Day period, we estimate that one fatality will occur in Texas every two-and- a half minutes. This will be the rate of our accidents and fatalities if records of past holidays hold true."

Earlier the Texas Department of Public Safety had predicted that 29 persons would become motorcides during the three-day Labor Day holiday extending from 12:01 a. m. August 30 through 11:59 p. m. Sept. 1. The state police organization has planned an extensive traffic law enforcement program for the holiday week-ed, alerting all available patrolmen for an around-the-clock vigil.

The Texas DPS has labeled its program "Operation Motorcide" and will run its usual count of traffic fatalities.

Operation Motorcide will be bolstered by a "Deathless Days" campaign conducted of the Texas Association of Broadcasters, "Crusade Child Safety" during September conducted by the Dairy Institute of Texas and special safety programs conducted by Kiwanis clubs throughout the state.

Garrison said that safe driving is a primary responsibility of every driver. In emphasizing the point, he said that if you are a driver, he is talking to you.

"Traffic accidents are generally regarded as happening to the other motorist; a person never considers that he may become the victim. But that time does come the instant before impact of thetragedy." His advice was to drive at speeds which you know are safe and to avoid situations that place you in conflict with pedestrians and other vehicles.

"Provided, however, if any of such officers, elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected here by.

"Provided, however, if any of such officers, elective or appointive, shall announce their candidacy, or shall in fact become a candidate, in any general, special or primary election, for any office of profit or trust under the laws of this State or the United States other than the office then held, at any time when the unexpired term of the office then held shall exceed one (1) year, such announcement or such candidacy shall constitute an automatic resignation of the office then held, and the vacancy thereby created shall be filled pursuant to law in the same manner as other vacancies for such office are filled.

"A municipality so providing a term exceeding two (2) years but not exceeding four (4) years for any of its non-civil service officers must elect all of the members of its governing body by special election."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation and laws of this State.

Producers of 95% of all milk producers of 95% of all milk prothe new brucellosis control regulations which become effective September 1.

By that date, dairymen operating under Grade A permits must have adopted one of two carefully described plans of herd management, each aimed at eradicating brucellosis from dairy cattle.

Under both plans all breeder cattle over six months of age must be blood tested. Plan A requires the slaughter of reactor animals within 15 days, but does not insist on calfhood vaccination as a protection against infection. Plan B permits retention of branded reactors for three years, and makes calfhood

vaccination mandatory.

Both plans are recommended in the milk code published by the U. S. Public Health Service, and have been approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Responsibility for enforcement of the new anti-brucellosis regulations falls to the State Health Department's division of food and drugs. Division officials say the decission of most dairymen as to which plan they will follow will be duced in Texas will be affected by based on herd size and the extent of infection in individual herds.

> Brucellosis, otherwise known as Bang's disease, and as undulant fever in its human form, is a contagious disease of animals and men. In addition to cattle, brucellosis is a common affliction of goats, pigs, and hrses.

> When the disease attacks humans it causes lingering fever, weakness and loss of resistance, and is occasionally fatal.

> Usually it is passed to humans through unpasteurized milk from infected animals, or by handling infected animals without first taking proper sanitary precautions.

> The extent of brucellosis infection in Texas is apparent in a May, 1958, report of the Animal Disease Eradicatioo Division of the USDA. The report said that of 1,252 Texas herds (62,457 cattle) tested, 60.3% were found infected or suspect.

Recent interviews with Central Texas dairymen reveal that most milk producers agree that compliance with the regulations will make possible the ultimate eradication milk-transmitted brucellosis.

Producers are also aware that brucellosis-free herds will mean greater profits for them. Cattle free of the disease produce up to 20% more milk, and produce healthier calves more frequently.

In order for producers to maintain their Grade A permits, they must be operating under either plan by Spetember 1, and be able to prove it. No extension of time is being contemplated by the department.

lution assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the liabilities and soligations (including bonds and warrants) of such subdivisions or municipalities or both. The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the district to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said Seventy-five Cents (75¢) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the district.


"(b) The Legislature may by law permit the County of Potter (in which the City of Amarillo is partially located) to render financial aid to that district by paying a part of the expenses of operating and maintaining the system and paying a part of the debts of the district (whether assumed or created by the district) and may authorize the levy of a tax not to exceed Ten Cents (10¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation (in addition to other taxes permitted by this Constitution) upon all property within the county but without the City of Amarillo at the time such levy is made for such purposes. If such tax is authorized, the district shall by resolution assume the responsibilities, obligations, and liabilities of the county in the manner and to the extent hereinabove provided for political subdivisions having boundaries coextensive with the district, and the county, the boundaries of which shall include only the area comprising the Jefferson County, the boundaries of providing hospital care for needy individuals of the county, the boundaries of providing hospital required for political subdivisions having boundaries existed on the first day of January, 1957, with the power to issue bonds for the sole purpose of purchasing a site for, and the construction and initial equipping of, a hospital aystem, and with the power to issue

# QUESTIONS and COMMENTS

Question. Does Jesus teach in John 15: 1-10, that the "Branches" are just different churches? Also can a child of God fall from grace? Give Bible references.

Comments. The answer to the first question is No. The answer to the second is Yes. Now for the proof. In John 15:1-10, Jesus says, "I am the true vine, and my Father is the husbandman. "Every branch in me that beareth not fruit he taketh away; and every branch that beareth fruit, he purgeth it, that it may bring forth more fruit.

"Now ye are clean through the word which I have spoken unto

"Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine; no more can ye, except ye

"I am the vine, ye are the branches: He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for without me ve can do nothing.

"If a man abide not in me, and my words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will, and it shall be done unto you. "Herein is my Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit; so shall

ye be my disciples. "As the Father hath loved me, so have I loved you: continue ye in my love.

If ye keep my commandments, ye shall abide in my love; even as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love." (John 15:1-10). Every New Testament Christian is a branch of the vine. The idea that branches mean denom-

inations is utterly foreign to what Jesus meant here or to the New Testament. Let us examine the verses above and Jesus answers both questions which is asked aove.

1. Jesus is the vine (verse 1).

2. The Father is the husbandman (Ver. 1). 3: The branches are the children of God- "Ye". (ver. 8).

4. The branches are IN CHRIST-"every branch in me." (ver. 2).

5. The branches that bear fruit God purges (Ver. 2).

6. Branches that bear fruit are clean (ver. 3). 7. Branches bearing no fruit the Fathers takes away (ver. 2).

8. Branches bearing no fruit are gathered and burned (ver. 6). Here Jesus is saying that a disciple, a child of God that bears no fruit are burned.

The Lesson Jesus taught is: I. The branches represent (not different churches) saved individuals, FOR they are IN CHRIST who is the Vine.

2. But some are to be taken away by the Father and burned. In I John 2:24: "As for you, let that abide in you, which ye heard from the beginning. IF THAT WHICH YE HEARD from the beginning ABIDE IN YOU, YE ALSO SHALL ABIDE IN THE SON, and in the Father." Christ makes the ABIDING in Him dependent on HIS WORD ABIDING IN US.

In Tuke 8:18, in the parable of the sewer, Jesus says that some "for a while believe, and in time of temptation FALL AWAY."

The idea that Branches in John 15, have reference to churches, or that a child of God CANNOT fall from grace is utterly foreign to God's word.


