

Highways To Be Closely Patrolled Labor Day Holiday

"The prediction of 29 motorcides for the forthcoming three-day Labor Day period in Texas will bring an extensive traffic law enforcement program for the holiday weekend," said Major Wilson E. Speir, regional commander of Region 4, Texas Department of Public Safety.

Operation Motorcade will be in effect from 12:01 A. M. August 30 through 11:59 p. m. Sept. 1. During this period Patrolmen of the Motor Vehicle Inspection and License and Weight Services will bolster the force of the Texas Highway Patrol in enforcing our traffic laws.

"We realize," Speir said, "that this is the last holiday weekend during our vacation season and before school starts, therefore traffic will be heavy on most of our highways. Our patrolmen are scheduled to work all hours of the day and night during the Labor Day weekend and to cover as many miles of our highways with the most efficient enforcement program possible."

The prime objective of our Patrolmen during Operation Motorcade are of two purposes, protection of the motoring public from accident prone drivers, and service to the public. Each of our Patrolmen recognizes his responsibility to the motorist and he will do his utmost to make driving in this area a pleasant experience.

Excessive speed and driving while intoxicated are the leading causative factors in fatal accidents during holiday periods, therefore Patrolmen will concentrate on these violations.

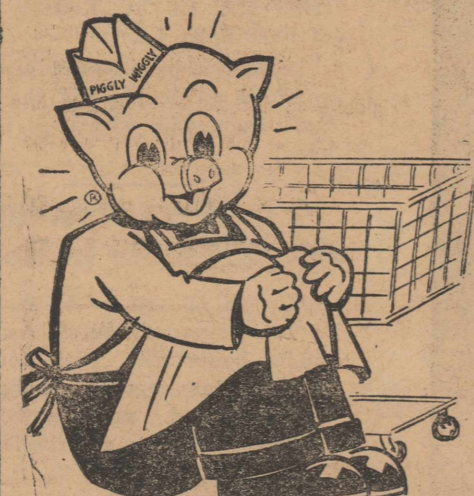

DPS Urges Caution On Holiday Driving

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr. director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, made a personal appeal to Texas motorists today urging to join an all-out attempt to make Labor Day a historical event free of traffic deaths.

In his statement, Garrison said that he was talking personally to each driver when he ask them to join the DPS, Gov. Price Daniel, and business and civic organizations throughout the state in a drive to make Labor Day yet un-obtained deathless holiday. He said such traffic record for a holiday in Texas would be recorded in the history books.

"I would like for every driver to realize that his chance of becoming a motorcide this holiday is greater than he would imagine. On an average throughout the 72-hour Labor Day period, we estimate that one fatality will occur in Texas every two-and-a-half minutes. This will be the rate of our accidents and fatalities if records of past holidays hold true."

Earlier the Texas Department of Public Safety had predicted that 29 persons would become motorcides during the three-day Labor Day holiday extending from 12:01 a. m. August 30 through 11:59 p. m. Sept. 1. The state police organization has planned an extensive traffic law enforcement program for the holiday week-end, alerting all available patrolmen for an around-the-clock vigil.

The Texas DPS has labeled its program "Operation Motorcide" and will run its usual count of traffic fatalities.

Operation Motorcide will be bolstered by a "Deathless Days" campaign conducted of the Texas Association of Broadcasters, "Crusade Child Safety" during September conducted by the Dairy Institute of Texas and special safety programs conducted by Kiwanis clubs throughout the state.

Garrison said that safe driving is a primary responsibility of every driver. In emphasizing the point, he said that if you are a driver, he is talking to you.

"Traffic accidents are generally regarded as happening to the other motorist; a person never considers that he may become the victim. But that time does come the instant before impact of the tragedy."

His advice was to drive at speeds which you know are safe and to avoid situations that place you in conflict with pedestrians and other vehicles.

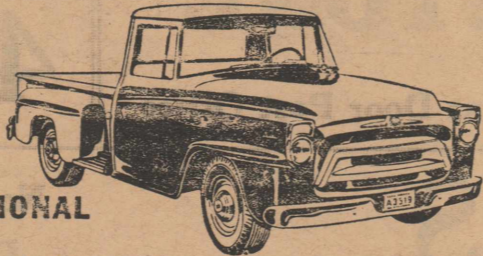

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by Charter Provision and a general law city operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby; providing for an election, a form of ballot and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 11 of Article XI and to read as follows:

"Section 11. A Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

Sec. 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

by majority vote of the qualified voters in such municipality, and any vacancy or vacancies occurring on such governing body shall not be filled by appointment but must be filled by majority vote of the qualified voters at a special election called for such purpose within one hundred and twenty (120) days after such vacancy or vacancies occur."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby. And providing for automatic resignation when such officers become a candidate for election to another office and providing for election of members of the governing body of such municipalities and the filling of vacancies occurring on such governing body by special election."

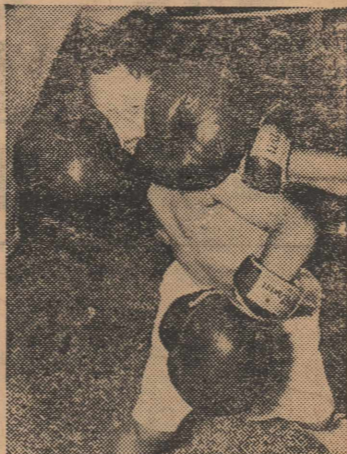
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

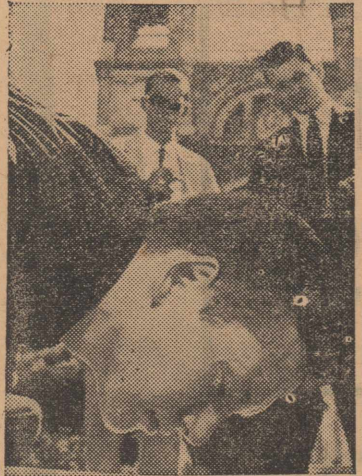

Former Resident
'Making Good' In
'Norfolk Va.

The following article in regard to a former Rotan citizen recently appeared in the Norfolk, Va. Ledger-Star:

"Norfolk—W. C. (Dub) Ashton has worked with cattle, sheep, goats and small boats and now works with rubber and camelback. A Texan from the Abilene area, Ashton did ranch work after graduation from high school in Rotan. He did everything, drove tractors, herded animals, rode in roundups and mended fences.

In the Navy for four years, he was a small boat coxswain who spent most of his years in the service in the Norfolk area. He met and married a Norfolk girl, Dorothy Steiger, and after his release from active duty in November 1954 began learning tire recapping with his father-in-law, A. D. Steiger, who has been in tire shops 40 years.

Ashton learned everything about

tires in two years of apprenticeship. He had on-the-job training with government help. For the last two years he has been shop foreman for the Atlantic Tire Co., at 25th and Monticello.

He recently bought a home in Lynnwood Shores. He and his wife have one two-year old son and are expecting a second child momentarily.

The tire recapping business fascinated Ashton from the time his prospective father-in-law first invited him to the shop to watch. Not only doesn't he mind the 100-to-105 degree heat in the shop on hot summer days, or the smell of hot rubber, he has grown rather to like both heat and odor.

He can pitch in on any phase of a recapping job, he said, and is prepared to work in any similar shop anywhere. He knows the process of recapping, from the buffing room where good casings are taken after a through inspection to the final inspection.

After the tire is "roughed up" in the buffing room it is put on a "building machine" where it is

sprayed with a rubber cement. When this is soft and sticky dry, the "camelback", or strip of rubber which will form the new tread, is put in place by hand, then evened by machine. He said that 14-gauge rubber is used for passenger car tires.

Then the tire is placed in a mold and heated to 297 degrees for 64 minutes. The new tread first softens then hardens in the heat. Air pressure is used to keep the tire inflated against the tread mold. The entire process can be completed in about two hours.

Ashton, who is teaching others the process now, earns upwards of \$5,000 in a really good year."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.
SJR #3—Number Nine on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 5, to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas; authorizing the County of Potter to render financial aid to participate in the operation of such Hospital District; authorizing the Commissioners Court of said county to assess and levy taxes on property outside the incorporated limits of such city; further authorizing a countywide Hospital District for Wichita County, Texas, and authorizing the creation of two districts in Jefferson County; and further providing that any enabling Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section to be designated as Section 5, which shall read as follows:

"Section 5 (a) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of two hospital districts, one to be coextensive with and have the same boundaries as the incorporated City of Amarillo, as such boundaries now exist or as they may hereafter be lawfully extended, and the other to be coextensive with Wichita County.

"If such district or districts are created, they may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of taxable property within the district; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property-taxpaying voters who have duly rendered their votes for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of Seventy-five Cents (75¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation, and no election shall be required by subsequent changes in the boundaries of the City of Amarillo.

"If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within or having the same boundaries as the district may levy a tax for medical or hospital care for needy individuals, nor shall they maintain or erect hospital facilities, but the district shall by reso-

lution assume all such responsibilities and shall assume all of the liabilities and obligations (including bonds and warrants) of such subdivisions or municipalities or both. The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to maintain and operate the hospital system, and to acquire, repair or renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said Seventy-five Cents (75¢) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the district.

"(b) The Legislature may by law permit the County of Potter (in which the City of Amarillo is partially located) to render financial aid to that district by paying a part of the expenses of operating and maintaining the system and paying a part of the debts of the district (whether assumed or created by the district) and may authorize the levy of a tax not to exceed Ten Cents (10¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation (in addition to other taxes permitted by this Constitution) upon all property within the county but without the City of Amarillo at the time such levy is made for such purposes. If such tax is authorized, the district shall by resolution assume the responsibilities, obligations, and liabilities of the county in the manner and to the extent hereinabove provided for political subdivisions having boundaries coextensive with the district, and the county shall not thereafter levy taxes (other than herein provided) for hospital purposes nor for providing hospital care for needy individuals of the county.

"(c) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a hospital district within Jefferson County, the boundaries of which shall include only the area comprising the Jefferson County Drainage District No. 7 and the Fort Arthur Independent School District, as such boundaries existed on the first day of January, 1957, with the power to issue bonds for the sole purpose of purchasing a site for, and the construction and initial equipping of, a hospital system, and with the power to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of property therein for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on such bonds.

"The creation of such hospital district shall not be final until approved at an election by a majority of the resident property-taxpaying voters voting at said election who have duly rendered their property for taxation upon the tax rolls of either said Drainage or said School District, nor shall

such bonds be issued or such tax be levied until so approved by such voters. The district shall not have the power to levy any tax for maintenance or operation of the hospital or facilities, but shall contract with other political subdivisions of the state or private individuals, associations, or corporations for such purposes.

"If the district hereinabove authorized is finally created, no other hospital district may be created embracing any part of the territory within its boundaries, but the Legislature by law may authorize the creation of a hospital district incorporating therein the remainder of Jefferson County, having the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided by Article IX, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, except that such district shall be confirmed at an election wherein the resident qualified property-taxpaying voters who have duly rendered their property within such proposed district for taxation on the county rolls, shall be authorized to vote. A majority of those participating in the election voting in favor of the district shall be necessary for its confirmation and for bonds to be issued.

"(d) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character."

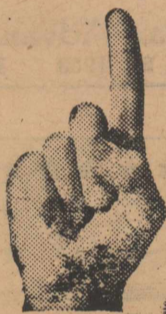
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the general election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas, and authorizing Potter County to lend financial aid to and participate in the operation of said Hospital District, and further authorizing the Legislature to create a countywide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas, and authorizing Potter County to lend financial aid to and participate in the operation of said Hospital District, and further authorizing the Legislature to create a countywide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

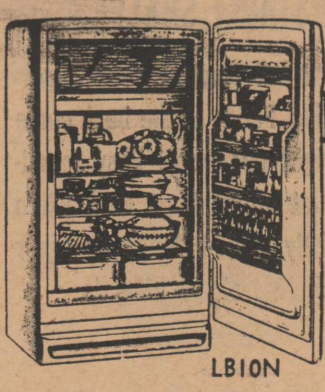

QUESTIONS and COMMENTS



Question: Does Jesus teach in John 15: 1-10, that the "Branches" are just different churches? Also can a child of God fall from grace? Give Bible references.

Comments: The answer to the first question is No. The answer to the second is Yes. Now for the proof. In John 15:1-10, Jesus says, "I am the true vine, and my Father is the husbandman. Every branch in me that beareth not fruit he taketh away; and every branch that beareth fruit, he purgeth it, that it may bring forth more fruit.

"Now ye are clean through the word which I have spoken unto you.

"Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine; no more can ye, except ye abide in me.

"I am the vine, ye are the branches: He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for without me ye can do nothing.

"If a man abide not in me, and my words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will, and it shall be done unto you.

"Herein is my Father glorified, that ye bear much fruit; so shall ye be my disciples.

"As the Father hath loved me, so have I loved you: continue ye in my love.

"If ye keep my commandments, ye shall abide in my love; even as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love." (John 15:1-10).

Every New Testament Christian is a branch of the vine. The idea that branches mean denominations is utterly foreign to what Jesus meant here or to the New Testament.

Let us examine the verses above and Jesus answers both questions which is asked above.

1. Jesus is the vine (verse 1).
2. The Father is the husbandman (Ver. 1).
3. The branches are the children of God—"Ye". (ver. 8).
4. The branches are IN CHRIST—"every branch in me." (ver. 2).
5. The branches that bear fruit God purges (Ver. 2).
6. Branches that bear fruit are clean (ver. 3).
7. Branches bearing no fruit the Father takes away (ver. 2).
8. Branches bearing no fruit are gathered and burned (ver. 6). Here Jesus is saying that a disciple, a child of God that bears no fruit are burned.

The Lesson Jesus taught is:

1. The branches represent (not different churches) saved individuals, FOR they are IN CHRIST who is the Vine.

2. But some are to be taken away by the Father and burned. In I John 2:24: "As for you, let that abide in you, which ye heard from the beginning. IF THAT WHICH YE HEARD FROM THE BEGINNING ABIDE IN YOU, YE ALSO SHALL ABIDE IN THE SON, and in the Father."

Christ makes the ABIDING in Him dependent on HIS WORD ABIDING IN US.

In Luke 8:10, in the parable of the sower, Jesus says that some "for a while believe, and in time of temptation FALL AWAY."

The idea that Branches in John 15, have reference to churches, or that a child of God CANNOT fall from grace is utterly foreign to God's word.

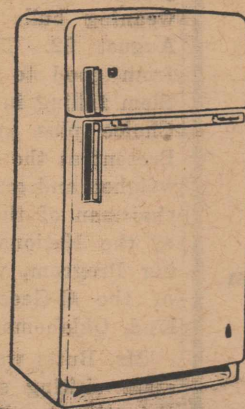

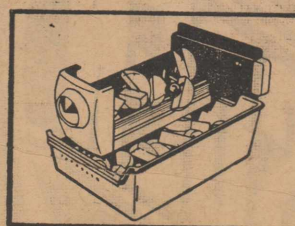

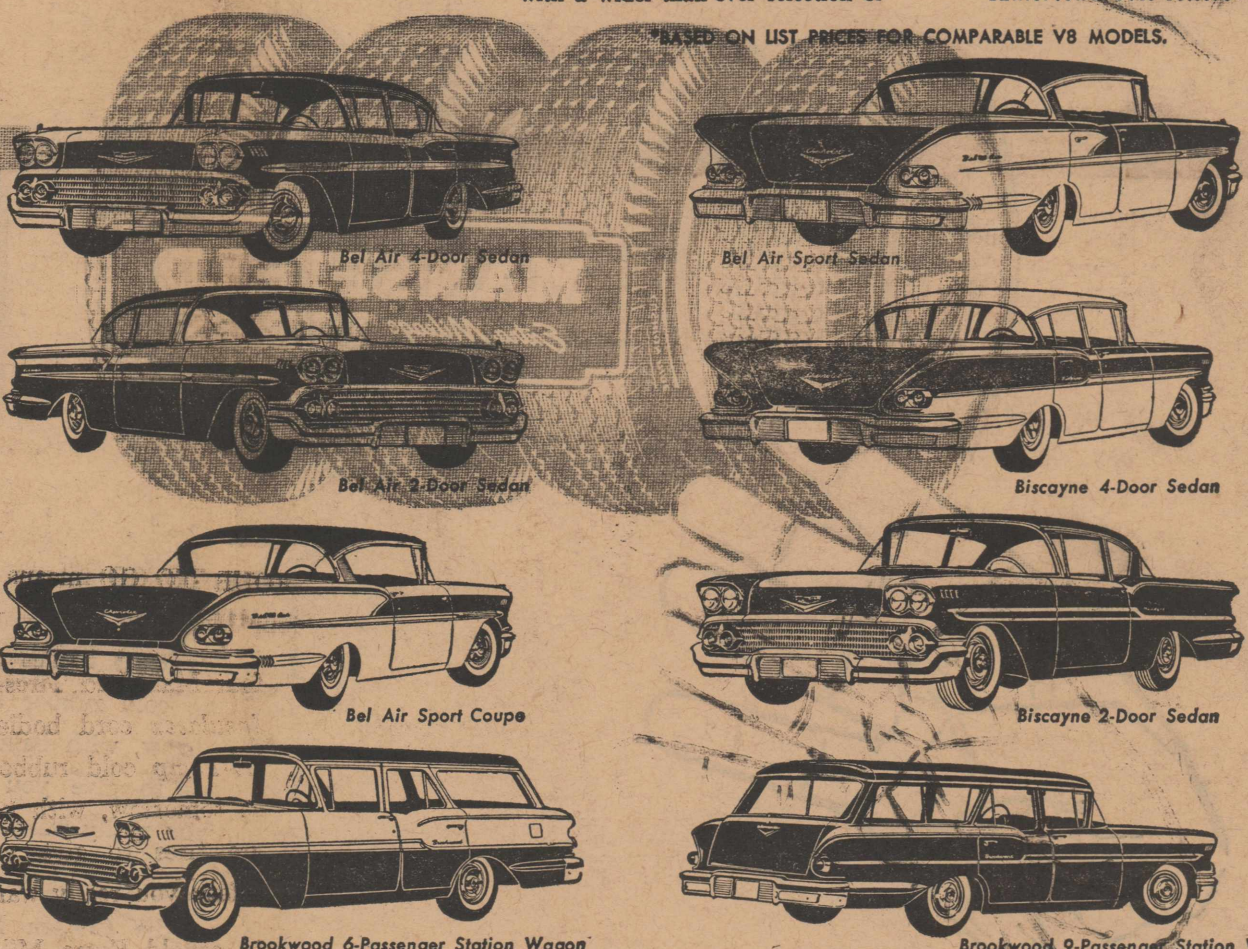

Crop prospects look considerable better due to the rainfall received over the past week, which amounted to as much as six inches in part of the county down to .5 in the Northeast part.

With the increased moisture and

cool nights, there is the possibility that we might have a buildup of bollworms. According to our extension entomologist DDT is recommended, either as a spray or a dust. If dust is used it should include at least a 10% DDT mixture, applied at the rate of 12 to 15 pounds per acre. If the Toxaphene-DDT spray mixture is used, it should be applied at the rate of 2 quarts of the actual insecticide per acre.

With adequate supply of moisture we have now, conditions are favorable for planting some winter le-

gumes and grasses to help combat winter erosion and improve our soil.

A good growth of a legume crop will add nitrogen and organic matter which a lot of our soil is short of. Will also give protection against erosion. The physical condition of the soil is also improved and in some instances loss from root rot is lowered.

One of the main legumes recommended for this area is winter peas, either the Australian or the Romack varieties. Hairy Vetch is also recommended. When planting legume seed inoculate the seed to insure against failure.

Where wind erosion is a serious problem legumes should be interplanted with rye or some other winter-hardy small grain to give protection to the young legume seedlings. The recommended planting date for legumes in this area is from September 15 to November 15.

Sam Swann, a Cooperator in the Beef Cattle Performance Program, who ranches in the Southeastern part of the County, weighed 26 weaning bulls and heifers Friday, August 22. The yearlings graded from good to fancy with most of them falling in the Choice plus and Choice plus and Choice groups. Present at the time the calves were weighed and graded was Glen Butts, chairman of the Board of Directors of the National Performance Testing Program, who is also manager of the O-Geechee Farms of Fairland, Oklahoma.

Mr. Butts was in this area of the state visiting several ranchers participating in the Performance Testing Program and was going on to Canyon, Texas, to attend a meeting

of his Directors of the program the first of this week.

Now is a good time for control of mesquite with individual tree treatment methods. The principal chemical still recommended for the control is 2-4-5-T. Mixed at the rate of 1 pound of 2-4-5-T ester in 10 gallons of diesel oil or kerosene, to 3 to 5 gallon knapsack sprayer can be used for individual tree treatment.

Trunk base treatment gives satisfactory control by spraying thoroughly all the way around the mesquite trunks from ground level up to 12 inches high. Let the solution soak down around the crown. If one side of the trunk is missed, it will probably sprout on that side. A gallon of the mixture should treat 20 to 30 average size mesquite trees at a cost of 1 1-2 cents each for material alone.

On trees over six inches thick, frilling (overlapping axe cuts all the way around the trees) and treating in the frill gives quicker, cheaper and more effective results. Leaflet 127, Chemical control of Mesquite, give more information on the use of 2-4-5-T, and is available at the County Agent's office.

New Laws Apply In Dove Hunting

Austin, Aug. 26—Don't be confused, it may cost you a fine for killing too many doves, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game & Fish Commission. The North Zone season opens Sept. 1.

This year's hunting regulations, approved by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, permits a possession limit of 20 birds after the first day. This does not mean, the director warns, that a hunter can go out and kill 20 birds in one day and get by with it.

The daily limit is still 10 birds. However, after the first day a hunter may have two days' possession, provided he doesn't have them on his person or in a manner to indicate they were all killed on the same day.

"The dove is a migratory bird and as such comes under final federal control," the chief says. "This year the possession limit has been modified, as well as the season lengthened. A good dove crop indicated early this year is responsible."

The chief also warned that new licenses must be obtained before hunting Sept. 1. These licenses are required for all hunters between the ages of 17 and 65 who hunt out of their own county. The new licenses are available with game wardens, stores handling sporting goods and county clerks. New fishing licenses also will be required at the same time.
