# Special Notice to All COTTON FARMERS

We the undersigned, Cotton Ginners of Rotan and Hobbs take this means of calling your attention to the USDA-AMS regulations governing the handling of so-called "Remnants" of cotton brought to the gins for ginning and loan processing and or buying.

In as much as the regulations are very clear governing the packaging of remnants and since it is clear that such cotton will not be eligible for the CCC loan, we would like to urge you to refrain from bringing remnant cotton to be ginned. We suggest that if you have a remnant, you hold same until such time as you can gather sufficient cotton to make an eligible bale for processing. The minimum bale weight acceptable for the CCC Loan is 350 Pounds and the maximum bale weight is 625 Pounds. If you bring a remnant it will have to be sold in the open market and you will stand to lose on same since it will not produce an eligible bale to clear for the loan. So called "Combined", "Married", "Repacked" or "Reginned" bales must be so marked. On cotton being intentionally or unintentionally placed in the loan which is not eligible for said loan, the producer, ginner and warehouseman will be subject to the penalties of the law.

We quote for you the provisions governing "Repacked" bales which come under the ineligible classification for loan approval:

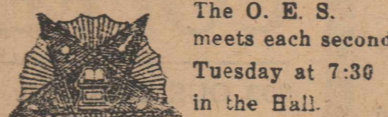

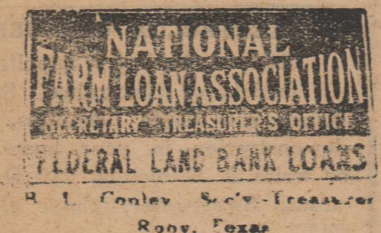

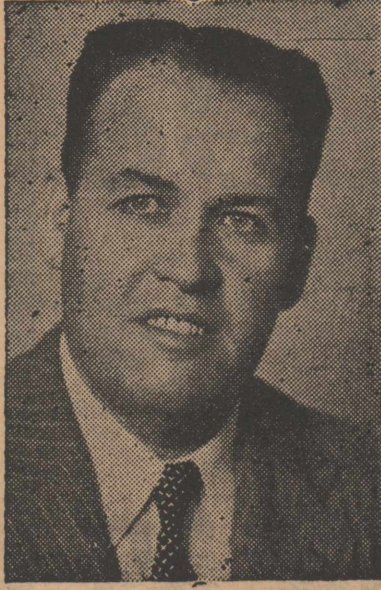

  4. Fourth, he CONFESSED his faith in Christ. He said, "I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God." (Acts 8:37). Notice he did not confess his sins, nor did he say that "I believe that God for Christ's sake has pardoned my sins," as many people do today.
  5. Fifth, he was BAPTIZED. And the Bible says that "and he (Phillip) baptized him." (Acts 8:38). Please note what did not happen:
    1. He was not voted on.
    2. He did not tell an experience.
    3. There was no sprinkling for baptism.

Leptospirosis, commonly referred to as "Lepto" has been reported to be in an epidemic stage throughout the state by the Texas Animal Mortality report. Lepto can cut your profit by causing abortion as high as 58% in infected cattle. The symptoms of Lepto are: abortions, premature birth, decreased or abnormal milk, poor weight gain, stunting or death. Swine symptoms are: abortions, poor weight gain and stunting. Lepto is caused in cattle and swine by a small threadlike bacterium transmitted in infected urine. The disease is spread through direct contact through infected urine, urine contaminated material such as bedding, poorly drained pastures, ponds or slowly moving streams. The bacteria can also enter the body through slight abrasions of the skin. Once in the blood stream, they multiply rapidly. Infected cattle, swine, horses, sheep and field rodents are the principal sources of infection to other animals. Symptoms are loss of appetite, fever, weight loss, yellowish color of the eyes, development of membranes in the mouth, lactating cattle, drop in milk production, yellowish or red tinged milk; young calves may die within twelve hours after first symptoms occur. Sows usually abort usually two to four weeks before farrowing time; cows at any stage. A blood serum test run in a laboratory by a Veterinarian can positively identify the disease. The following are preventive measures:

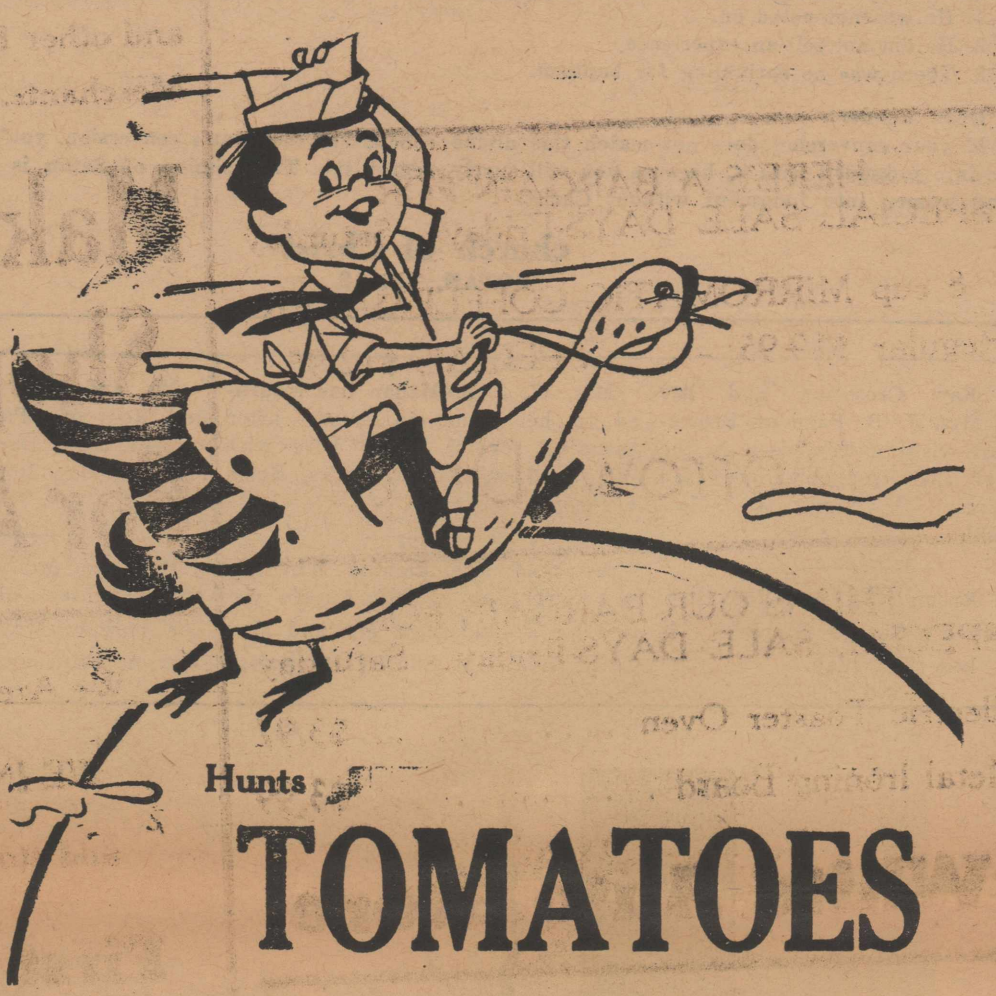

Leptospirosis, commonly referred to as "Lepto" has been reported to be in an epidemic stage throughout the state by the Texas Animal Morbidity report. Lepto can cut your profit by causing abortion as high as 58% in infected cattle.

Cattle losses due to Lepto are: abortions, premature birth, decreased or abnormal milk, poor weight gains, stunting or death. Swine losses are: abortions, poor weight gains and stunting.

Lepto is caused in cattle and swine by a small threadlike bacterium transmitted in infected urine. The disease is spread through direct contact through infected urine or urine contaminated material such as bedding, poorly drained pastures, ponds or slowly moving streams. The bacteria can also enter the body through slight abrasions of the skin. Once in the blood stream, they multiply rapidly.

Infected cattle, swine, horses, sheep and field rodents are the principal sources of infection to healthy animals.

Symptoms are loss of appetite, fever, weight loss, yellowish color may develop on membranes of eyes and mouth, lactating cattle, drop in milk production, yellowish or blood tinged milk; young calves may die within twelve hours after first symptoms occur. Sows usually abort usually two to four weeks before farrowing time; cows at any stage.

A blood serum test run in a laboratory by a Veterinarian can positively identify the disease. The safest method of preventing or

eradicating Lepto is to vaccinate. Lepto vaccination differs to Bangs in that the animals can be vaccinated at any age. However, very young calves should be vaccinated within six months, gilts should be vaccinated when selected for breeding or at breeding time.

Research studies continue to indicate that selective breeding can be quite effective in developing more muscular meat-type hogs, says T. D. Tankersley, extension animal husbandman.

Researchers at the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Beltsville, Md., research center found that in three generations, Duroc hogs selected for breeding, because of their low fat, decreased the backfat thickness of their offspring by 11%. Hogs of the same breed selected for high fat produced animals with a backfat increase of 14% in the third generation.

Animals chosen with significantly less backfat than the herd average transmitted about 41% of that advantage to their offspring. On the other hand, animals chosen with more backfat than average transmitted about 57% of this characteristic to their progeny. The apparent higher heritability of fatness compared to leanness, emphasizes the importance of careful selection in developing meat-type hogs.

At slaughter, the third-generation Duroc hogs bred for leanness yielded three percent more trimmed hams, loins and shoulder butts than third generation hogs bred for fatness. For every 200-pound Duroc marketed, third-generation lean line pigs averaged 6.2 pounds more lean cuts and 10 pounds less fat cuts than fat-line animals, although the fat line yielded 1.2 pounds more bacon per pig.

However, the researchers warn, progress in developing a greater lean-to-fat ratio may not be so rap-

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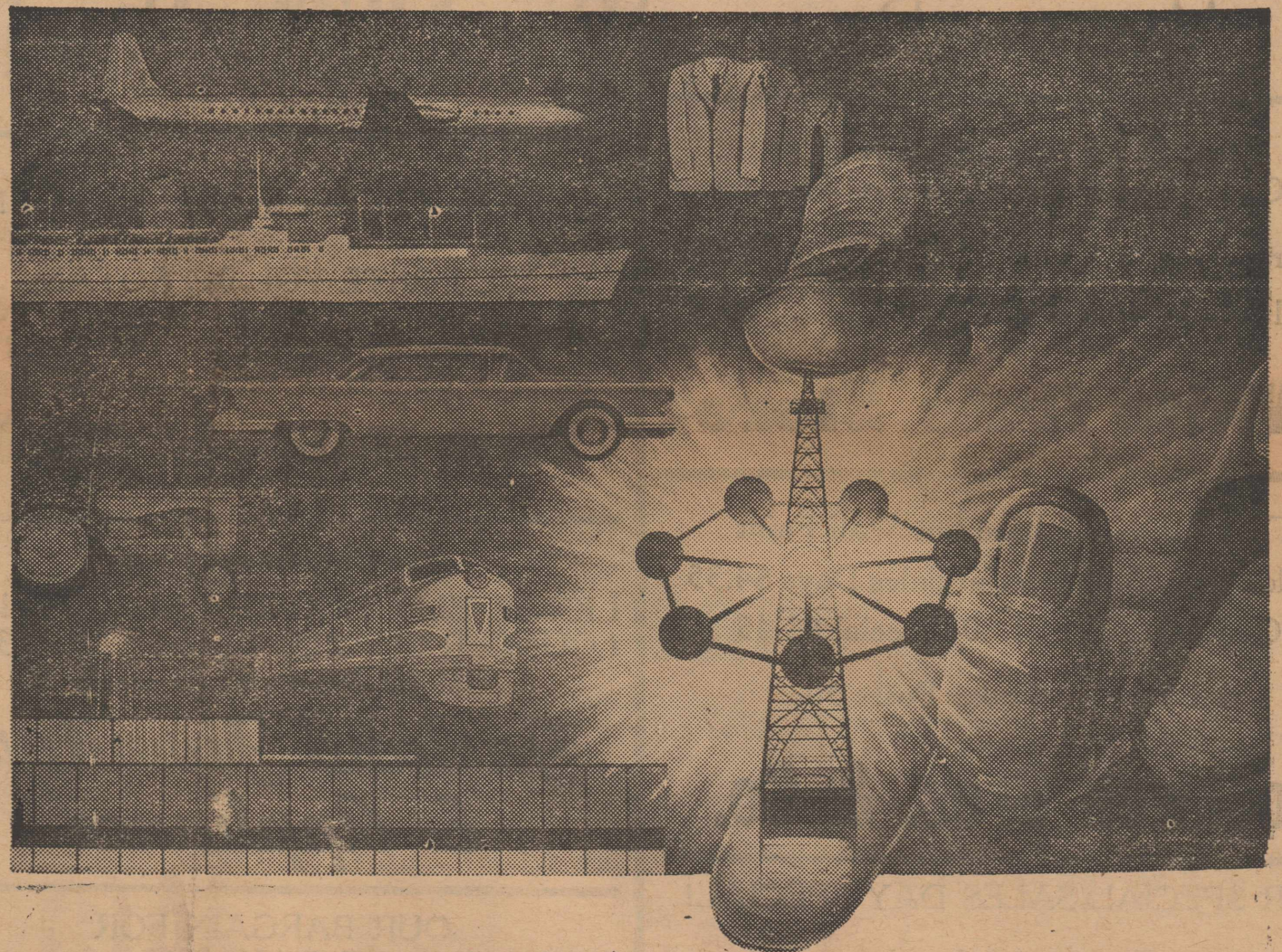

Texas' senior citizens stand to get a better shake in nursing homes as far as care, safety and comfort are concerned, with the latest action from the State Board of Health.

Revisions in existing "standards for nursing and care homes" were adopted by board members at their recent quarterly meeting in Austin. More than 9,000 elderly persons residing in 560 licensed nursing homes in Texas stand to benefit from improved nursing care.

The board's action will prevent future applicants for state licenses from using existing buildings as nursing homes unless electrical wiring conforms to national electrical codes and unless all walls and

materials are capable of resisting fire for at least one hour. Too, roofs must be constructed of non-combustible material and the building's heating system must be vented.

The new standards also discourage occupancy of upper floors of multi-storied homes unless they are equipped with automatic sprinkling systems.

New nursing home construction or remodeling plans must be submitted to the State Department of Health for review and approval, according to the Board of Health's new rulings. In new construction, private rooms must contain at least 100 square feet of floor space, and at least 72 feet must be devoted to each bed in wards or multi-bed

rooms. The revised standards require that nursing home laundry rooms be separate and screened, with washing machines connected to sewer systems. Invoices must be kept on foods purchased for patients. The new code asks that daily meals include the basic foods contained in "Texas Food Standards", prepared by the Texas Nutrition Council.

Other provisions set up in the new standards are aimed at keeping the State Department of Health informed as to the policies concerning the operation of the homes. This will include information on types of patients, restrictive rules and charges or refunds.

The upgrading of nursing home standards is the aim of the new standards. All future applicants for state licenses to operate nursing or care homes are required to be graduates of an accredited high school or show proof of attaining the equivalent. Licensed physicians registered nurses or licensed vocational nurses are exempt from this
