## General Election Set For Tuesday

Ballots have been delivered to election judges of the 23 boxes of Fisher County for General Election, Tuesday, November 4th.

Chief interest locally is the Tax Assessor - Collector race, in which seven people are running. Four names appear in the independent column, Robert Buck, Bill W. Ashley, Clifton Thomas and C. D. (Monk) Herron. Three candidates are asking to have names written in the Democratic column, which is blank on the ballot, but has place for write-in; these three candidates are Horace Carter, Bob Baugh and Glenda Field.

Voters may mark out all names but the one they desire to vote for in the Independent column or may mark out all and write in any name they desire in the Democratic column. Election officials advise that voters may vote the Democratic column down to the Tax Assessor race and then write in or move over to Independent column and vote their choice.

This race is for the unexpired term of Howard House, who recently died. Bill Ashley was appointed by the Commissioners Court to serve until January 1st.

Voting in precinct 12, south-side will be done at City Hall, with W. B. McKimsey as election judge. The north box, 9 & 10 will be at NWFW Hall with Ivy Jones as election judge. Voting hours are 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Considerable interest is being shown in the 9 proposed Constitutional Amendments. Here is our interpretation of the main provisions of the amendments:

Here are the main provisions of the proposed amendments to the state constitution.

Amendment No. 1 — put legislative sessions on annual basis and up salaries to \$7,500.

2 — Allow each county, after voter approval, to set up a retirement system for its elective county officers.

3 — Permit the county commissioners courts to fill county-judge and peace - justice vacancies only until the next general election (in other words, for a maximum two years instead of the present four years).

4 — Any district, county, or precinct official with more than a year of a four-year term left must resign before announcing for a different office.

5 — Permit home-rule cities, after majority vote, elect their city officials for four-years terms, instead of two.

6 — Pensions of maximum \$80-month for retired Texas Rangers and widows who weren't included in the retirement act of 1947.

7 — Allow the legislature to appropriate money to advertise such Texas resources as history, minerals, agriculture, industry etc.

8 — Medical care payments to recipients of old-age assistance, aid to blind and dependent children, and aid to permanently and totally disabled, on 50-50 basis with federal funds.

9 — Create four hospital districts, one in the city limits of Amarillo, one in Wichita County and two in Jefferson County.

## Atty. Gen. Rules On Balloting

County Attorney Grindstaff recently asked the Attorney General of Texas for a ruling as to voters marking out all names appearing in the Independent column of General Election ballot and writing in one of the four names appearing in this column in the Democratic column. In other words any name appearing in the Independent column can be marked out and written in the Democratic column.

## To Those Who Have Not Decided

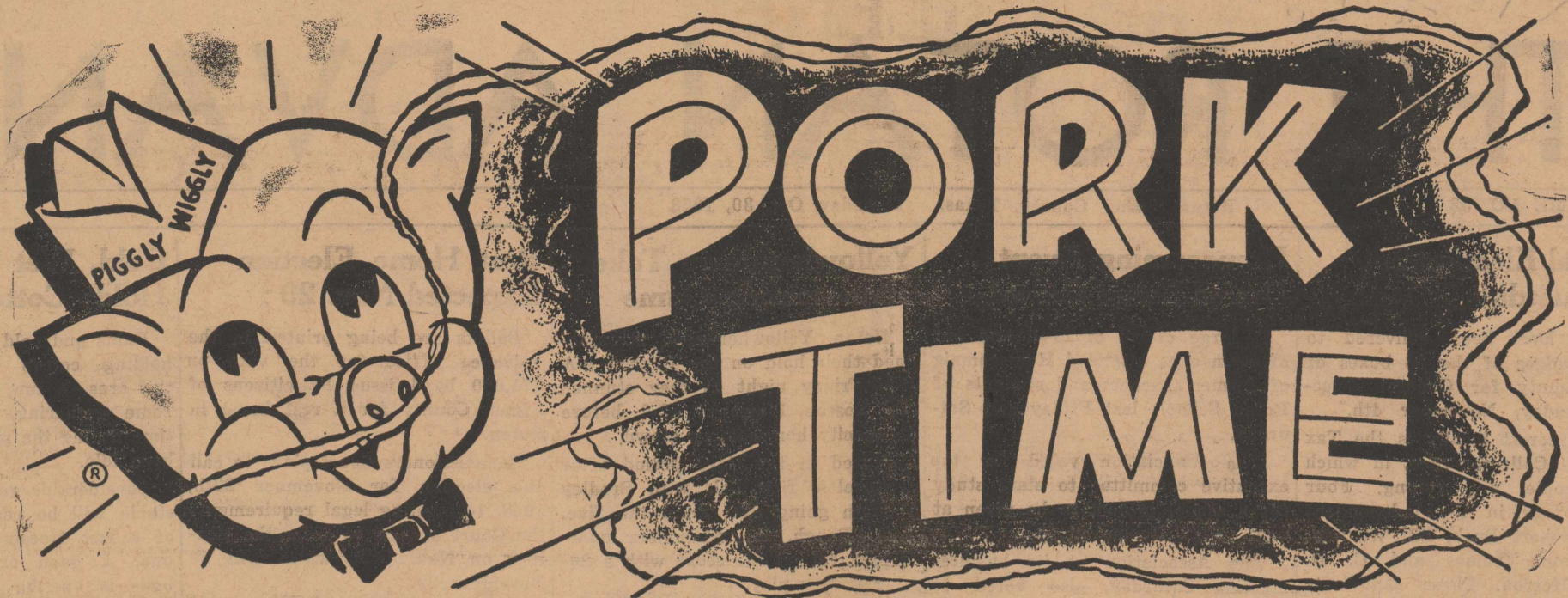

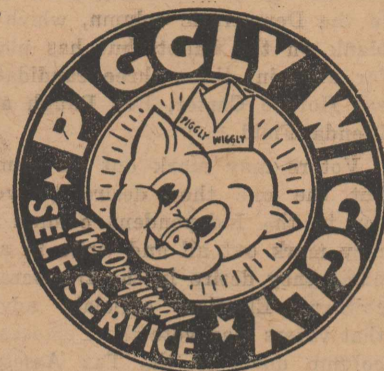

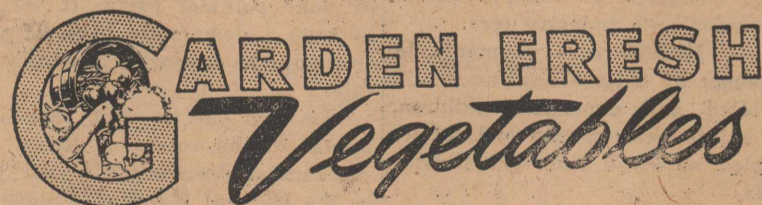

## Turnpikes Are Testing Ground For Sign Color

Driving the 143 miles from San Antonio to Corpus Christi — or over any of Texas' 2,899 miles of federal interstate highways — will be safer thanks to "turnpike laboratories."

Preparing for the completion of the 41,000-mile super-road network, officials are using turnpike roads as testing grounds for the latest and best thinking in "accident proof" highway design.

Because there are accidents on turnpikes, those that occur take on special significance for traffic experts in Texas. When a driver has an accident on a turnpike, safety authorities know they are getting at the core of the vital question: "What makes an accident?"

The answer turned up is quite likely to apply to accidents on other types of roads, and helps state and local authorities make road safety decisions on a factual basis.

For example, a recent analysis of the color and reflective qualities of directional signs on all U. S. turnpikes produced valuable information on night driving safety.

Most signs on turnpikes are either green ones whose lettering only reflects headlights or green signs whose background color and lettering both are brightly visible at night because they reflect headlights. Reflective green signs show up in full color at night just as they appear green during the day.

The average accident rate per 100-million miles traveled on "reflective green" turnpikes is a significant 9 per cent less than that on "non-reflective green" turnpikes. This strongly indicates that reflectorization of color as well as lettering on road signs helps cut accidents — which probably accounts for the increasing use of this safety technique on all modern road signs.

Comparing accident rates on turnpikes that use both types of green signs with those that use blue — the only other color used on turnpikes in significant quantities — shows 30 per cent fewer accidents on "green" turnpikes. The combination of reflective background and green color for directional signs appears to yield the best safety results, probably because drivers see this combination with daytime effectiveness.

### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—I have a permanent plan World War II GI insurance policy. It has lapsed because I let my grace period for payment of the premium go by without paying. What must I do to reinstate the policy?

A—GI permanent plan insurance may be reinstated at any time by payment of all back premiums, plus interest. You must also meet VA's health requirements.

Q—I have to supply VA with a certified copy of the public or church record of my marriage, in order to be paid more money on my GI allowance while attending school. Exactly what is meant by "certified copy"?

A—"Certified copy" means a true copy of either the official public or church record of your marriage. It must bear the seal and the signature of the person keeping the records. He may be either the clerk of the court, or a church official.

Q—I am at school under the War Orphans education program. Am I allowed to change my course of study?

A—Yes. However your parent or guardian generally must agree to the change, and the VA must be satisfied that the new course will be suited to your interests and abilities, and that you have a good chance to succeed in it.

Q—If a Korea veteran uses his GI training benefit, is he still entitled to use his GI loan benefit?

A—Yes. Use of one benefit does not deny a veteran his right to use the other.

### Huge Spending Throws Federal Deficit Hugher

Budget Director Stans has explained why the Federal deficit is now expected to reach \$12.2 billion — the highest figure in peacetime history — this fiscal year, whereas, back in January, a roughly balanced budget was forecast.

Two things have happened. First, receipts are now placed at \$7.4 billion below the January estimate. And expenditures are placed at \$5.3 billion above the January estimate.

In an editorial on the depressing budget situation, the New York Times points to a "particularly shocking" fact. That fact is that "most of this unanticipated rise of \$5.3 billion in spending was totally unrelated to the only two objectives that could possibly justify it—

fighting the depression and strengthening the nation's defenses."

In other words, this incredibly large deficit, which has blown the spectre of inflation up to king-size dimensions, can't be blamed on our military needs and commitments. A very large part of it can only be honestly blamed on our continued spending for frills and non-essentials—for things we not only can but should do without, or leave to taxpaying, self-supporting private enterprise to accomplish.

The Times also points out that prospective spending for this fiscal year "comes to within \$400 million of the \$79.6 billion that we spent in 1943, the third year of this country's participation in World War II." If ever a road led to national bankruptcy, we are following

### Primary Open House Has Large Attendance

Open House for Primary School was held Friday night, with students in charge, sponsored by Primary PTA organization was attended by a large crowd estimated at more than four hundred parents and friends.

The first grades, with Mrs. D. Y. McKinney, Mrs. Billy Sumerlin, and Mrs. W. T. Edwards as teachers, featured "We Are Six," unit of study the first six weeks of school. "This is a study of things with which the first graders are already familiar, and aids them in going into study of things with which they are not familiar, Mrs. Jewel Tillotson, school principal said.

The second grades, with Mrs. Robert Witherspoon, Mrs. Tommy Watkins, and Mrs. Elmo Cummins as teachers, presented their unit of study on community life, featuring firemen, milkman, grocerymen, post office, postmen, and bakers.

The third grades, with Mrs. H. B. Robertson, and Mrs. Charles McCall as teachers, presented their study of the weather, the seasons rotation of the earth and related phenomena.

Mrs. Ray Brown's fourth graders presented their study of The Congo; Mrs. Billy Smith's students studied Holland; Mrs. Wendell Morrow's students studied Mexico. In conjunction with the study, Mrs. Morrow taught the students a bit of Spanish.

Mrs. Tillotson explained that the school had a drill group on each grade level, second through the fourth, where emphasis was on progress charts in the three R's, and art work based on reading material.

Of special interest at the open house was the new tachistoscope machine, demonstrated by Mrs. Tillotson, with students and parents participating. Needless to say, parents came out a poor second as far as grades were concerned.

Mrs. Tillotson explained that the tachistoscope machine is a remedial technique for reading, used primarily with slow reading groups to improve eye span, develop proper seeing habits, and to cause the student to pay attention and to listen. She said the machine develops confidence in the child. Before the machine was put into use, each child was given a silent reading test. This test will be repeated each six weeks to note improvement in the individual. A special schedule is set up for its daily use. It is in use fifteen minutes for each group each day — no more and no less.

Mrs. Tillotson said she gained the idea of using the machine when she and a group of teachers attended the reading clinic at McMurry College last Summer. The clinic was conducted by Dr. Ullin W. Leavell, president of the University of Virginia, Charlottesville, West Virginia. She said Dr. Leavell used the machine all the time and stated that over a period of six months a whole grade level could be accomplished through proper usage.

Primary school students acted as host and hostesses at the open house and conducted tours of their rooms, explaining their unit of study. Many were featured in special demonstrations.

## Full Information Should Be Given In Application For Drivers License

The Texas Department of Public Safety reported today that it is returning applications and fees for renewal of Texas Driver Licenses at the rate of one-thousand per week because of information insufficient to identify the applicant.

The wholesale return of OLD applications is brought on by the omission of a number of factors that must be included for the proper identification of the person desiring to renew his driver license. The department reported that it must have the full name of the individual, the person's birth date and current address. The number of the old license is a quick means of identification.

Most of the information needed is already included on the renewal notice that is sent by the department to the motorist prior to the expiration of his license. A space is provided for the license owner to change his address.

H. C. Smith, manager of the DPS License issuance and Driver Record section reports that most of the difficulty comes when a person applies for renewal without returning a renewal notice. In this type of renewal application, the individual simply writes a letter and includes the fee.

Insufficient information in renewal applications received by the Texas DPS sets up a chain reaction of processes for identification of the individual asking for a new license. But in many instances the search is hopeless.

When a man gives the name of A. B. Smith in his renewal application, file clerks of the Driver License service of the state police organization set to work in an attempt to identify the individual by birth date, address, or other information contained in his permanent file. However, if all identifying information does not correspond, the application must be returned to the individual.

You can imagine the task that awaits a DL Clerk who must search through a file that contains more than five-million individual records, and more specifically, to look for the name of A. B. Smith in 35 trays with each containing 700 personal record files. There are 36,400 files in the department's massive record system bearing the name of Smith.

In order that it may improve its service of renewing licenses with a minimum delay to motorists, the Texas Department of Public Safety asks that you give complete information.

A woman should give her date of birth, all given names, and her surname. If she is married, she should also give her maiden surname and previous married names.

If you have changed addresses, clearly indicate the proper address. And it always helps to list the number of your old license. That number belongs to you and will be on all licenses issued to you.

Texas driver licenses are issued for a two year period and expires on the date given on the face of the license. The fee for an operators license is \$2.00, a commercial operator \$3.00 and chauffeur's \$4.00.

The Texas DPS asks that you check the expiration date of your current license and renew it in time before you discover you are driving without a valid license. And in making application for renewal, include complete information. Correct, complete information on your renewal will result in a more rapid return of your new Texas driver license.

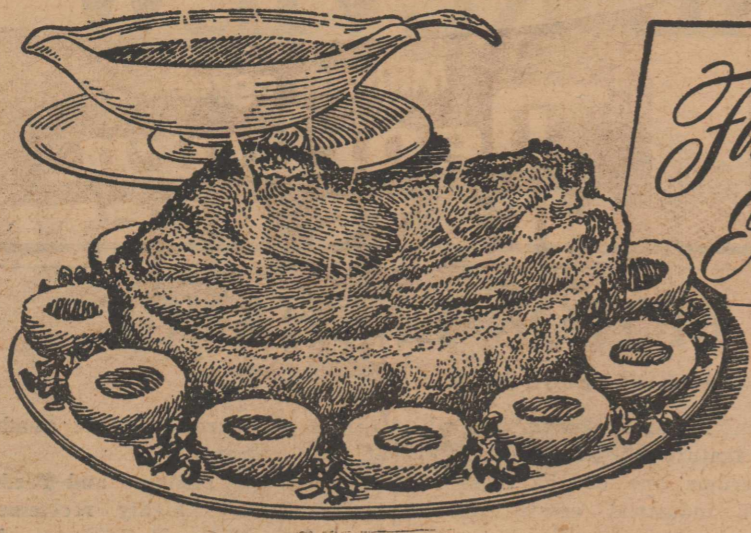

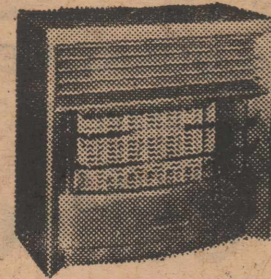

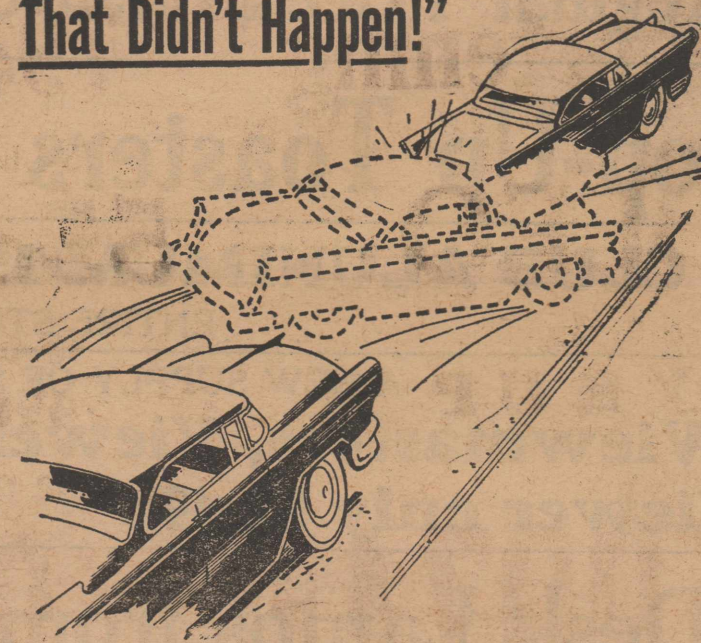

Fisher County is enjoying harvest of the best county-wide cotton crop in many years. More than four thousand bales have been ginned to date and most estimates go from twenty to twenty-five thousand bales for the year.

**Electrical Safety Around Home**

In the mood for shocking experience? Well, you can accomplish this several ways.

For Example:

Stick your fork inside the toaster next time that piece of bread won't pop up. Don't forget, of course, to leave the toaster plugged in. Oh, yes, and to make the experience more memorable, try resting your free hand against a metal sink or faucet — preferable one that's moist.

Fiddling with radios while you're taking a bath can be pretty shocking, too. And it's always darn risky.

The National Safety Council says that electricity is nothing to fool around with. You can't be too careful with it.

A Texas man learned that while watching TV in his bathtub. The antenna fell into the tub, shocking him senseless. The cause? Probably a defective set that energized the antenna.

Maybe you don't watch TV while taking baths, but it's a good bet you do take unnecessary chances with electricity. You may not even be aware of all the risks you take.

According to the Council, more than 1,000 persons a year die from electric current, many of them in the home. Undoubtedly, thousands more are painfully shocked.

The Council has received reports of people being shocked by everything from oven elements to "live" refrigerator doors.

How can you keep from being accidentally electrocuted?

You can avoid a lot of risk by observing these rules, the Council says:

1. Don't touch appliances or radios while you're in the bathtub or your hands are wet. Always stand on a dry surface when you use appliances.

2. Unplug appliances if you must poke into them. Even then be careful of heavy condensers, such as in a TV set.

3. Ground appliances in damp locations, such as washers or dryers. Always ground portable electric tools, especially when used outside.

4. Replace worn appliance cords.

"Confine your shocking experiences to the things you see on TV horror movies and the like," the Council suggests. "Don't get electrocuted by a home appliance."

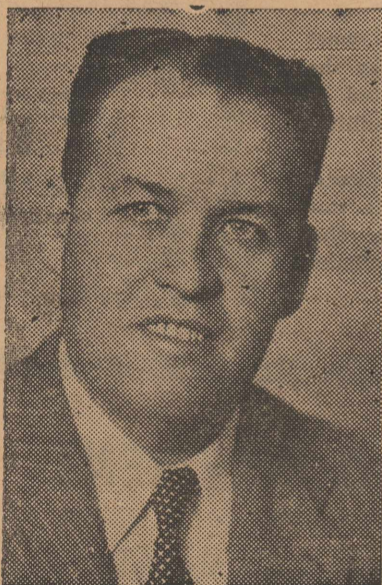
There were 193 roll calls during the First and Second Sessions of the Congress, and Burleson was present in every instance, and is on the record with a "yea" or "nay" vote.

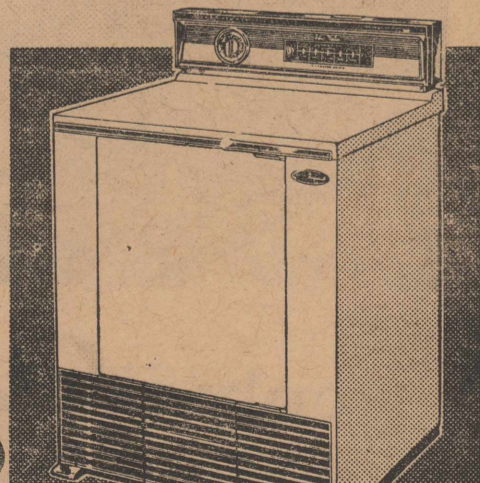

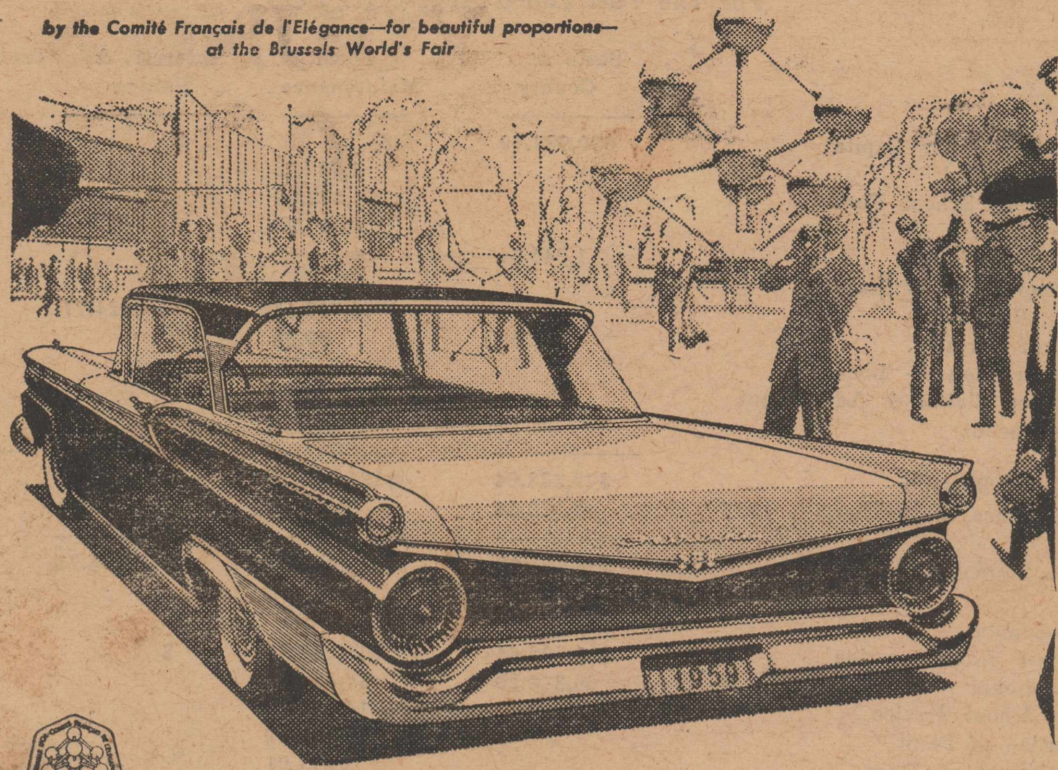

## FU Names Officers In Regular Meeting

Named to head Fisher County Farmers Union for 1959 was F. L. Mitchell of McCauley as president; H. T. Neves, Jr. of Roby, vice-president; and Mrs. Coy Carriker of Royston, secretary-treasurer. Mitchell served as executive vice-president the past year and Mrs. Carriker as secretary. Retiring president is Max Carriker of Roby who has headed the organization for the past three years.

The meeting was held Tuesday night, October 21 in the Fisher County Agriculture building. Speaking to the large gathering of members was Frank Mitchell, County ASC office manager. Mitchell gave a run-down on the details of the cotton plans under which farmers will operate in 1959. "Farmers have a choice in 1959 of what is known as "Plan A", or "Plan B".

Plan A would allow farmers to plant an amount somewhat less than this year's allotments and receive a support rate of not less than 80% of parity. Farmers choosing Plan B would be allowed to plant their Plan A allotment plus an additional 40% and be supported at 15% below Plan A producers. The support rate for 1959 cotton has not yet been announced by the Secretary of Agriculture, but under the formula by which he is bound, informed sources estimate that Plan A cotton will be supported at about 31 cents per pound for middling 7-8 inch, and Plan B cotton at about 25 cents.

Fisher County cotton producers are generally undecided as to whether Plan A or Plan B is the least attractive. After six straight years of planting restrictions and increasing costs, farmers are eager to plant more cotton, but many point out that if the major portion of the 1959 crop must go into CCC stocks as is the case in 1958, the prospect of receiving the same gross return per farm for 40% additional production is cause for careful con-

sideration.

The following resolutions were adopted at the Tuesday night meeting for presentation to the state resolutions committee for inclusion in the Texas Farmers union program which will be presented to delegates at the State Convention in Mineral Wells, December 5 and 6.

Under the section on Cotton we urge the inclusion of the following paragraph: "We recognize the recent legislation dealing with cotton as favorable to processors of the commodity and unfavorable to family farm producers. We urge immediate repeal of the legislation creating "Plan A" and "Plan B" cotton quotas, the avoidance of any other schemes to promote greater production for less return, and the early establishment of a comprehensive cotton program, designed to keep supply in line with effective demand and price at a parity of income level."

Under grain sorghum, other feed grain and forage crops we urge the inclusion of the following paragraph: "We are opposed to the dumping of stored CCC wheat on the feed grain market by the Secretary of Agriculture."

Under Beef Cattle we urge inclusion of the following paragraph: "We are alarmed at the accelerated rate of foreign livestock and beef imports, and urge that such imports be restricted to the extent that they do not adversely affect domestic producers of beef cattle."

Under the section on livestock we urge incorporation of the following paragraph: "We ask that establishments engaged in the business of conducting public livestock auctions or sales which animals are bought, and sold by live weight be required by law to exhibit in a conspicuous and understandable manner, the weight of each animal."

Under the section on Water: "We urge that the U. S. Government continue to restrict, without exception, the use of irrigation water stored in Federally constructed reservoirs to none but family-sized farm units."

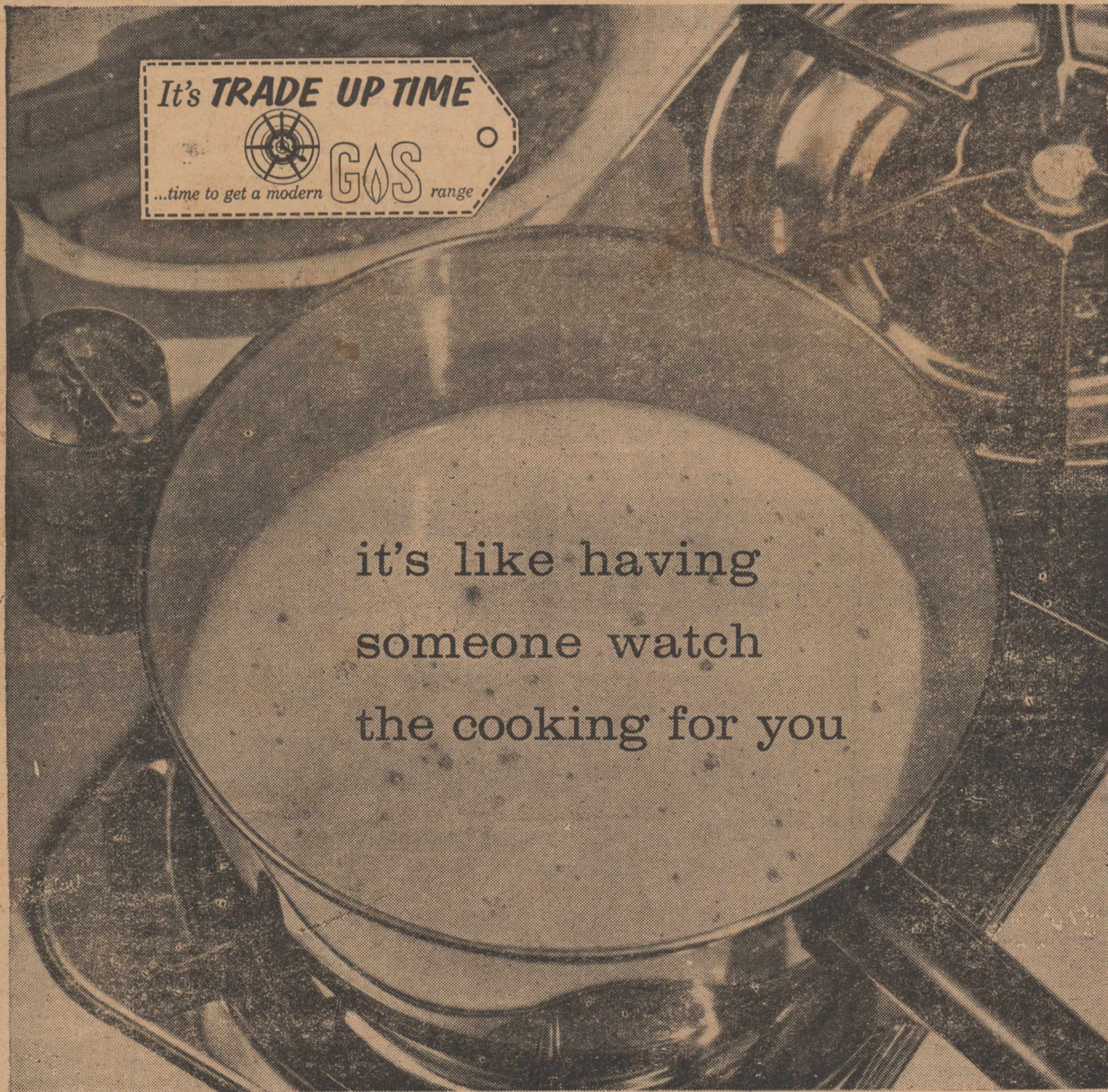
### Don't Miss Out On SS At Retirement Age
