# **Blood Donors Top 70 Unit Quota**

For the first time in four visits to Haskell County, the quota for the Red River Red Cross Bloodmobile was met on March 1. The bloodmobile received a total of 73 units of blood during the 41/2 hours of donation.

During the last year, the bloodmobile has visited Haskell County three times and received a total of 128 units of blood, The first visit, May 23, in Haskell, the bloodmobile received 47 units, the second, also in Haskell held on September 19, a total of 45 units were donated and December 14, when the bloodmobile visited Rule, 36 units were donated.

Blood chairman Charles Thornhill said, "I would like to thank the people of Haskell County for making this worthwhile project successful."

At least one Haskell County donor, and probably more on this Bloodmobile visit, joined the ranks of Red Cross 'gallon donor'. As the cards were being filled in, one of the registrars recognized George Fouts as donating his eighth pint. All permanent records of the visits are kept on file at Wichita Falls, and when they are returned to the newspaper, probably more gallon donors will be recognized at that time.

Reaching the goal of 70 pints insures residents of Haskell County that blood will be available to anyone when the need arises. The bloodmobile will be in Rule May 31, and again in Haskell August 9. Plan now to give blood both of these days. who knows, your blood may save a life. 
# Annual Cattle Drive March 14

While at the conference, they met with congressmen, senators, and governors from throughout the nation as well as numerous officials from various federal agencies. They also visited in the offices of Senators Tower and Bentsen and Congressman Omar Burleson. Over 1,000 state and local officials from 40 states attended the conference.

The primary purpose of the meetings was to discuss problems that face the citizens in the West Central Texas Region.

**Over 900 Snakes In First Annual Show** 

Everyone who participated in the first annual Jaycee Rattlesnake Roundup last weekend deserved an award of some sort. Handlers, hunters, and spectators made it through the weekend without any snake bites, injuries or accidents.

Spectators viewed between 800-1000 snakes and ate over 200 pounds of fried snake during the two day show.

Barney Barnett and Bob Gallaway, professional snake handlers of Wichita Falls, gave handling demonstrations and educational lectures. Both handled western coachwhips, (non-poisonous), cotton mouth water mocassins, broad banded copperheads, and western diamondback rattlers.

Approximately 20 members of the Texoma REACT Club, a citizens band radio club from Wichita Falls, accompanied hunters and guides to dens throughout the county to assist in any way needed.

In award presentations Sunday afternoon, Ralph Wall of Throckmorton received trophies for the largest, 64 inches, and the second most pounds of rattlers during the show. Tommy Matthews was awarded the trophy for the most snakes. Kenny Tanner of Rule and Albert Cunningham of Abilene received the trophy for the smallest snake a 16 inch rattler. Jim Carden and Larry Darter of

Munday won a trophy for the most rattles on a snake with 16. Jaycee project chairman, Frank Jenkins and vice-chairman Don Comedy were both very pleased with all aspects of the show and wish to express their thanks to the many landowners who allowed hunters to hunt on their property.

Ray Howell did a fine job in securing permission to hunt from landowners and organized hunts very well. Ned Phillips and his assistants were on hand both days and manned the consession stand selling sandwiches, refreshments and fried snake. Other Jaycees who helped with the show as project chairmen were Roger Sharp, Flea Market; and Charles Thornhill, killing pit.
