Cotton harvest was resumed Tuesday and after another few frosts farmers plan to begin operating strippers. This will greatly speed up gathering.

Mrs. James B. Day, program chairman, introduced the program: "Teacher Welfare and Morale" and "Conservation of Members" the program was discussed at length from many angles.

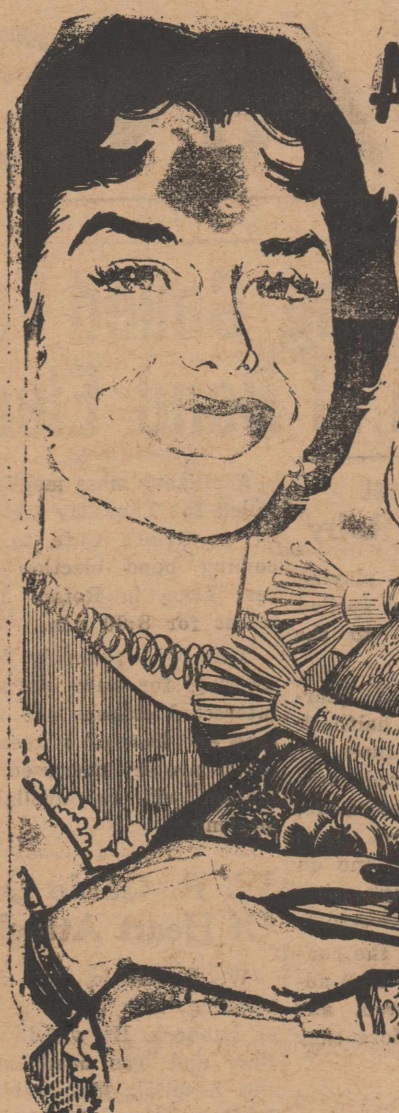

Cotton harvesting has speeded up now that we have had several days of open weather. However, there is still a shortage of labor. At the time this article was written, there had been approximately 12,000 bales of cotton ginned in the county.

The production for Fisher County has been estimated at 27,000 bales.

According to the wage finding released by the Texas Employment Commission, effective Nov. 13th, Fisher County cotton first pulling dryland is \$1.75 per hundred-weight.

The following are some suggestions made by Fred Elliott, extension cotton specialist: In some sections, cotton harvesting conditions are even worse than those of a year ago. Excessive moisture, cotton root rot and angular leaf spot diseases are contributing to lower quality seed from some areas.

Check seed closely by cutting a sample with a knife before storing; store only seed with high germination (80 per cent is very good) and low free fatty acid content; save seed for bulk storage containing less than 12 per cent moisture unless good facilities for drying and cooling are available; small quantities for bulk storage should be turned and sacked and large quantities for bulk storage should be cured by pulling air through them with a fan and duct system.

USDA research shows that a moisture content of 13.6 per cent is the critical point beyond which storage may quickly become disastrous. The moisture content in all stored seed, if possible, should be brought down to 10 or 11 per cent.

Production and price outlook for 1958 and discussions of recent development in agriculture affecting the credit situation for farmers and ranchers will be some of the features at the eight annual farm and ranch credit school for bankers to be held at Texas A&M College, November 30 through December 2.

B. C. Drinkard, President, Citizens State Bank, Roby, Texas is a member of the Bankers Advisory Committee for the school this year, and will be attending the annual school.

Bebout suggests that farm and ranch folks discuss this school with their bankers. He promises something worthwhile for the bankers and of course, the up-to-date information they get will help you when you discuss your credit problems with them. Your County Agent can furnish details and information about the school. Those dates again for the Farm and Ranch Credit School for Commercial Bankers November 30 to December 2. The place, Texas A. & M. College.

A common problem of dairymen—disease control—will be thoroughly discussed at the 24th annual Dairymen's Short Course, Dec. 4-5, at Texas A&M College.

The short course program will place special emphasis on programs of mastitis, leptospirosis and brucellosis, but it is by no means limited to this phase of dairying. It is designed to serve the needs of all dairymen, milk plant fieldmen, commercial feed company fieldmen and others directly or indirectly interested in the future of the dairy industry in Texas.

Speakers include outstanding men in their field. Some of the topics to be discussed are what's ahead for dairymen in 1959, making dairying pay, how the Texas Brucellosis Program is progressing and what the dairy farmer can do to control mastitis.

Additional information concerning the short course may be obtained by writing R. E. Leighton, Department of Dairy Science, Texas A&M College, College Station, Texas.

## Now's A Good Time To Check Social Security

Workers and self-employed people are encouraged to check their social security accounts at least once every three years according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager at Abilene.

This may be done easily with a preprinted and addressed postal card furnished free of charge by all social security officers. Just insert your own name, social security number, date of birth and mailing address before signing, stamping, and mailing the card to the central accounting office in Baltimore, Maryland.

Tuley pointed out that each person should make sure his account is correct because the amount of future benefits to him or his survivors is based on wages or self-employment income posted to his social security account. If an error or an

employer's failure to report wages is discovered within three years, quick corrective action can be taken. After three years, it is more difficult and sometimes impossible to correct an account because of the statute of limitations and other factors.

The Social Security Administration maintains approximately 125 million separate individual accounts and has an index of nearly 5 million employers. Most of the huge job of posting all the accounts is done by advanced automation techniques. The postings of these accounts are almost fool-proof, Tuley stated, but sometimes an employer fails to report some wages or reports them under an incorrect social security number. Also, self-employed people occasionally report their income under an incorrect number or even without a number. Any of these might cause an error in an account.

Since so much depends on your

account being correct, you should keep a record of your income each year and check your account regularly to make sure it is correct. The handy card for doing this may be secured by writing the Social Security office, Abilene, Texas.

### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

#### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—I'm a Korean veteran, holding GI term insurance. I understand, by a new law, I now can convert it to a permanent plan. Is this so?

A—You will be able to convert it after January 1, 1959. The new law permits Korea veterans holding term insurance policies with the letters "RS" before their numbers to convert to one of six permanent plans.

Q—On my discharge from the Armed Forces recently I received a lump sum disability severance payment. Will I have to pay this back to the Government if I am awarded VA compensation for the same disability?

A—Yes. The law requires that VA monthly compensation payments revert to the Government until the amount recovered is equal to the amount of disability severance pay the veteran received.

Q—I am planning to sell my GI home but cannot pay off the loan with what cash I will receive from the new purchaser. Do I have to have VA's consent to make the sale?

A—No, you do not need VA's consent to sell your property. However, if you wish to be released from possible liability to the Government, you must apply to VA.

Q—It is possible for a disabled "Peacetime" veteran to draw VA compensation at wartime rates?

A—Yes—if the disability resulted from extra-hazardous service, as, for example, participation in simulated warfare, the veteran may be eligible for compensation at wartime rates.

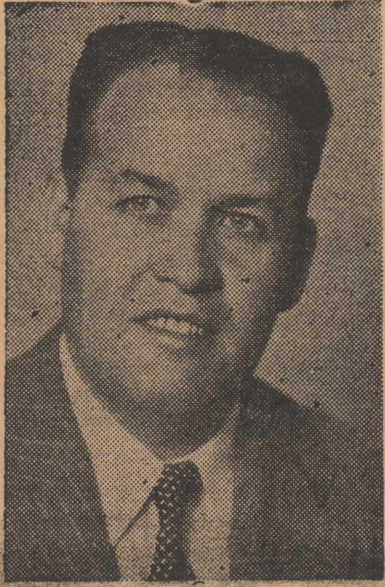

**TRUTH vs ERROR**



We are convinced that many people who are members of denominational Churches are not fully aware of the doctrines that they are supposed to believe. For example, are you aware of the fact that you are supposed to believe, even though it is nowhere mentioned in all the Bible, that, sinners are saved at the point of faith BEFORE water baptism. No man can prove that doctrine by the Bible. Jesus says: "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." (Mark 16:16.) Now as one reads this he is forced to the conclusion that some kind of salvation is involved in this passage. This verse forces one to one of two positions. If he believes that a child of God cannot fall from grace, and says this passage refers to salvation in heaven, then away goes his theory on the impossibility of falling from grace. If he believes it refers to salvation from past sins, away goes his belief that one is saved at the point of faith BEFORE water baptism, see that?

Let us now analyze our text.

1. First, "He" is under consideration.
2. The text says this "He" "shall be saved."
3. We ask is it just ANY "he"? If the word is UNMODIFIED then universal salvation is the results.
4. We ask again is it "He that believeth shall be saved"? NO! This is false doctrine.
5. Again is it "He that is baptized shall be saved"? NO! This also is false doctrine.
6. What is the correct rendering then? It is "He that believeth AND is baptized shall be saved. This is Bible doctrine. The word "AND" in the text is a copulative conjunction — it tells the difference between false doctrine and the Bible — which is divine truth.

Now let us compare false doctrine with Bible doctrine:

1. False doctrine. "He that believeth and is NOT baptized shall be saved."
2. It is reduced to Belief minus baptism equals salvation.
3. Bible doctrine. "He that believeth AND is baptized shall be saved."
4. Or, Belief plus baptism equals salvation. Such is the striking contrast between truth

and error. Friends, study your Bible and listen to men only in so far as they stay with God's word. Simply because a preacher claims to be ordained that does not make him infallible, or immune to error. Study! Truth will make you free. (John 8:32). To hold error is to be in the "snare of the devil" and held "captive by him". (2 Tim. 2:26).

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 29th day of November, 1958, within Fisher County, Texas, to determine if said County shall issue Bonds and if a tax shall be levied on all taxable property within said County sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity, in pursuance to an ELECTION ORDER made and entered by the Commissioners' Court of Fisher County, Texas, on the 10th day of November, 1958, and which order is in words and figures as follows:

ON THIS the 10th day of November, 1958, the Commissioners' Court of Fisher County, Texas, convened in regular session at the regular meeting place thereof in the Courthouse at Roby, Texas, there being present and in attendance the following members, to-wit:

BRUCE McCAIN, COUNTY JUDGE, Presiding; and W. B. OWENS, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 1;

JERRY CROWLEY, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 2;

T. R. UNDERHILL, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 3;

THURMAN TERRY, COMMISSIONER, Precinct No. 4; and among other proceedings had were the following:

Commissioner T. R. Underhill introduced the following election order:

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court of Fisher County, Texas, deems it advisable to submit to the resident qualified taxing voters of said County, who own taxable property in said County, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, a proposition for the issuance of bonds of said County for the purpose hereinafter stated; therefore

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF FISHER

**COUNTY, TEXAS:**

That an election be held in said County on the 29th day of November, 1958, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified taxing electors who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation for their action thereupon:

"SHALL the Commissioners' Court of Fisher County, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said County in the principal sum of SEVENTY FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$75,000) to mature serially within any given number of years not to exceed TWENTY (20) years from the date thereof, to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FIVE PER CENTUM (5%) per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity, for permanent public improvements, to-wit: to establish a county poorhouse in and for Fisher County, Texas, pursuant to authority conferred by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, including Chapters 1 and 2, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, and particularly Article 718, R. C. S. of Texas, as amended?"

If the proposed bonds are authorized at the election called herein the proceeds of said bond issue will be used to establish a county poorhouse to care for a minimum of thirty-five (35) paupers and to be located in the City of Rotan, Texas.

ALL VOTERS who are legally qualified voters of said Fisher County, Texas, and who are resident property taxpayers of said County, and who have duly rendered their property for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election; and said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapters 1 and 2, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. S. Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THERE-

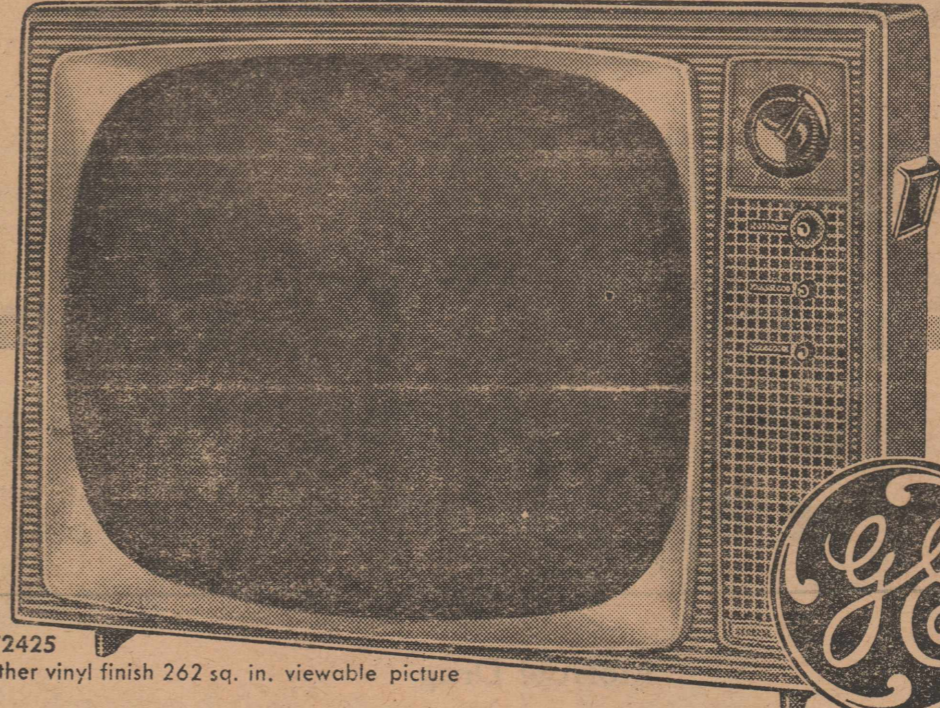
For other telephone people, football is work, because broadcasts and telecasts, as well as news account of the games, are flashed from city over telephone company lines.
