Emotions Running High In Civil Rights Case

Publicity resulting from a violation of civil rights suit filed in federal court in Tyler alleging that Red River County Deputy Sheriff Doug Jackson brutally beat and kicked a prisoner, Glen Shadid, "makes me feel about that high [indicating 1/2 an inch between his fingers]." Jackson said Friday afternoon in an interview with newspaper publisher Robert W. Wright.

Emotions were also high in the office of Clarksville attorney Jim D. Lovett, who filed the suit for plaintiffs Shadid and Peggy Mitchell. Lovett has suffered the loss of his law office building in a fire of unknown origin on Sept. 18 and received a letter threatening his family on Sept. 19, all since the initiation of the suit, and thinks there should be an investigation conducted which might link the fire to the civil rights case.

"The fire deal makes me damn mad," Jackson said. "I didn't have anything to do with burning his damn building."

Lovett said he was working on another major case at the time of the fire, an anti-trust suit between liquor interests at Sun Valley, on the east side of Paris, and Toco, on the west side of Paris. "We were ready to go to court the next day," Lovett said. "Now the case has had to be rescheduled."

No evidence was found at the fire which would incriminate anyone, Lovett said, but about 10 days after the fire, after the scene had been searched by three arson investigators, plus Lovett and his staff, a file on Connie Frugia was found in the middle of the ruins, scarcely singed around the edges. The note which threatened the Lovett family also eluded to the Frugia case. It was compiled with clippings from a newspaper, and read, "You saved the baby killer. Your family is next. Inferno."

Connie Frugia, who Lovett defended as a court appointed attorney in June of 1980, was accused of stomping her 19-month old step-child to death. The Frugia

trial ended in a hung jury, but is scheduled for a new trial Feb. 2. A new opinion by noted psychiatrist Dr. James Grigson holds that Frugia was temporarily insane at the time of the death, Lovett said, and that he expects that she will indeed, be "saved."

Lovett said Friday that he has maintained private body guards, armed with M-16 rifles, since the day after the fire, when the note was received, but that Texarkana FBI agent Larry Wagster indicated to Lovett that he was over-reacting, commenting that Lovett had only received one threatening letter and had only had one building burned.

Lovett filed the civil rights violation suit on Tuesday, December 23, 1980, in the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Texas, Paris Division. Defendants are Jackson, deputy Kelly Slaton, Clarksville city officer Donald Parks, the city of Clarksville and Red River County.

The violation of civil rights suit alleges that on the night of Sept. 10, 1980, Shadid and Mitchell were passengers in a pickup truck driven by Roger Learned which was involved in an accident following a chase by city officer Parks. Jackson assisted in the chase, and Learned was arrested for eluding a police officer. The suit alleges that Shadid, under the directions of Jackson, drove the pickup back to Clarksville, following the city police car, having to drive at speeds up to 80 miles an hour to keep up. Upon arrival at the county jail, Jackson arrested Shadid for speeding, which Shadid protested. It was at this point that the suit alleges that Jackson started kicking, hitting, beating and slinging Shadid around by his previously broken arm. This was done in the presence of deputy Slaton

and officer Parks, who the suit says made no effort to stop Jackson. Peggy Mitchell begged Jackson to stop and Jackson arrested her for disorderly conduct. Jackson then added disorderly conduct and resisting arrest to the charges against Shadid. According to the suit, an unknown person handed a flashlight to Jackson, who used the flashlight to beat Shadid. The suit further alleges that Jackson beat Shadid again after taking him into a cell out of the view of the other prisoners.

"I'm not going to deny it," Jackson said Friday. "I hit him, but I just can't help it. When someone hits me, I'm going to hit him back." Jackson contended that Shadid hit him in the chest with the small cast on his arm, and then he (Jackson) hit Shadid on the head with his flashlight. "And that was all there was to it," Jackson said. "He quit and I quit."

"He was told not to go to the jail," Jackson said, referring to Shadid, "and he was asked to leave after he got here, but he just kept raising sand. After he was put in the cell with the others they kept raising so much noise, I went upstairs and moved him to another cell,

and we scuffled, but nothing happened."

County Sheriff Bob Storey, who was not on duty at the time of the incident, said that Shadid had no obvious bruises when he appeared before Justice of the Peace J.B. Holley the next morning, other than the stitches taken in the back of his head resulting from the flashlight blow. Lovett, however, said that it was obvious that Shadid had been severely beaten.

The suit alleges that Jackson left Shadid in the cell bleeding for about two hours, but Jackson said that Learned was arrested at 2:14 a.m., and that Shadid was treated at the hospital after 3:00 a.m. "A lot happened in that length of time for me to have left him on the floor for two hours," Jackson said.

Jackson, by his own admission, has had charges of brutality levied at him on two other occasions, both while serving as a police officer in Paris. Formal charges were levied on one occasion, Jackson said, but were later dropped. Brutality charges were also levied against Sheriff Storey following an incident in Midland approximately 15 years ago, but those charges

Six Lose Lives In Accident

Ribbons, candy canes, new boots and a child's stuffed animal were scattered at the scene of the six fatality accident which occurred at the intersection of FM 115 and FM 21 near Mount Vernon Friday afternoon, December 26.

Mrs. Jerry (Carol) Stidham Sulsar of Mount Vernon, age 22, her mother, Mrs. Leslie (Jo Ann) Cobier Stidham, Clardy, age 43, Mrs. Sulsar's aunt and a sister of Mrs. Stidham, Mrs. Robert (Ruth Ann) Walker of Bellville, Illinois, age 28, and her three children, Cheryl Ann, age 9, Robert V. Junior, age six, and James Allen, age two, were pronounced dead at the scene by Franklin County Justice of the Peace B.E. "Stacker" Cowser, shortly before 3:00 p.m.

Taken to the Franklin County Hospital via Franklin County Ambulance Service were Benjamin Franklin Snell, age 19, of Shamrock, and Robert Vernon Walker, age 30, of Bellville, Illinois. Snell, driver of a 1966 Ford pickup, was south bound on FM 115, when he apparently failed to yield right-of-way at the stop intersection and struck the 1977 Pontiac coup, driven by Jo Ann Stidham which was west bound on FM 21.

"I didn't see the actual crash," stated off duty DPS trooper Steve Blake, "but the dust was still flying when I stopped."

The first person on the scene after the accident happened, Blake alerted local officers, ambulance and rescue units.

The impact carried the vehicles across the intersection to the south. The cab of the pickup was separated from the frame and bed. Traveling an additional 100 feet, the cab came to rest upright, less than 10 feet from its engine, and 20 feet from the Stidham auto, which rolled and came

to rest on its top.

The bodies of the six killed were trapped inside and beneath the car. Rescue and law enforcement personnel could not find any signs of life within the car. First checks by rescue officials indicated five trapped in the wreckage, however still another body was found an hour later after two wrecker units were used to lift the compacted vehicle.

Onlookers at the scene made removal of the bodies difficult for officials, who had to request that "persons not involved in the operation" move back several times.

The area was littered with baggage, school books, wrappings, ribbons, children's toys, and tools. The last of the debris and vehicles were not cleared from the area until after 5:00 p.m.

Snell was admitted to Franklin County Hospital in Mount Vernon where he remained until Monday. At that time he was transferred to Presbyterian Hospital in Dallas. Local hospital spokespersons termed him in stable condition with head and chest injuries at the time of the transfer.

Walker was transferred to Saint Joseph's Hospital in Paris after receiving emergency treatment for multiple broken bones, head and internal injuries at Franklin County Hospital. At last report, Walker remained in the intensive care unit, but was termed in stable condition.

Joint funeral services were held Monday, December 29, for Mrs. Sulsar and her mother, Mrs. JoAnn Stidham at the First Baptist Church in Paris. Burial was in Evergreen Cemetery.

Mrs. Sulsar was born June 20, 1958 in Berryville, Arkansas, the daughter of Leslie and Jo Ann Stidham. See ACCIDENT, Page 3

Sales Tax Payments Total Over \$560 Million

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday that December city sales tax payments to Texas cities will bring 1980 totals to more than \$560 million.

Bullock said his office is sending \$33.5 million in payments to cities who levy the one-percent optional city sales tax this month. The rebates to Texas cities is \$93.5 million more than was distributed among Texas cities during 1979, an average increase of more than 20 percent. Locally, Deport will not

receive a December check. The city received \$1,428 in December of 1979, with total payments for 1980 reaching \$6,520, a 15 percent increase over 1979.

Blossom will not receive a December check, with net payments for December 1979 being \$1,846. Total 1980 payments reached \$7,953 for

a 13 percent increase over last year.

Bogata, likewise, will receive no December check. Payment for the same period in 1979 was \$4,106. Payments to date reached \$18,717 for a three percent increase over 1979.

Talco's December check will be \$2,793, bringing the

year's total to \$30,465 for a 75 percent increase over the previous year.

City sales taxes are collected along with the state's four percent sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly by the Comptroller to the cities where the tax is levied.

Grass Fires On Upswing

Talco Fire Department Fire Chief Randy Carroll reported that grass fires were on the upswing here during the month of December and that firefighters made the following calls. Estimated Income Tax Due

Taxpayers must pay by January 16, 1981, the final installment of estimated income tax if they did not have enough 1980 Federal tax withheld or if their amended income Estimates for 1980 changed substantially during the last quarter, the Internal Revenue Service says.

The one exception to this rule is for taxpayers who file

their returns to pay all taxes due by February 2, 1981, according to the IRS.

Generally, taxpayers must file estimated tax if their tax is expected to be \$100 or more and if they have more than \$500 in income not covered by withholding.

For additional information, taxpayers may order the IRS free Publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax," using the order form in the tax package. The publication can be ordered by calling the IRS forms-tax information number listed in the local telephone directory.

were also dropped, Story said.

The suit, in which Lovett, a former president of the Texas Trial Lawyers Association, has been joined by 39 other law firms across the United States, seeks \$300,150 in damages. "We are not in this alone," Lovett commented.

Lovett said his investigators have matched the typewriter type used in addressing the envelope which contained the threatening letter with a letter which was sent to the Red River County Sheriff's office. "The connection, if any, needs to be worked out," Lovett said. "All that has been turned over to the FBI, and I had to call them and demand that they do something or give me my evidence back before they ever got moving." According to reports, the FBI has finished their investigation.

Jackson said Friday that he would not take a polygraph test. "I don't believe they work. I've seen them when they were right, and I've seen them when they were wrong," Jackson stated. All three of Lovett's major witnesses, Learned, Shadid and Mitchell, have taken the test, and according to Lovett, the results were perfect. Shadid and Mitchell took their case to Lovett shortly after the Sept. 10 arrest.

Shadid was not permanently injured in the incident, but Lovett said he agreed to take the case because he was "outraged."

Jackson said he was to meet with his attorney, Jim Hooper of Texarkana, on Monday to reply to the questions in the suit. "The county is not paying my legal bills," Jackson said. "I have to pay for my own defense."

Jackson said he appeared before the Red River Grand Jury in October, charging Shadid with assaulting a peace officer, but the jury no billed Shadid.

The Grand Jury did take some action, however, in the form of "secret" letters written to the Red River County Sheriff's office and the Clarksville Police from John Nichols, Grand Jury Foreman, almost six weeks after the Grand Jury's term expired. The letter to Clarksville criticized the procedure of driving 80 miles an hour with a prisoner in the car, and the letter to the sheriff's office criticized procedure which would allow injury to a prisoner.

A Mature Think Tank

Morton D. Weiss has an idea which he says could kill two birds with one stone. "Simple. Use retired brainpower to solve community problems and save government costs."

The 76-year-old Washington, D.C. resident and retired financial analyst believes that retired people should be used as consultants to advise government on such community concerns as transportation systems, health needs and housing.

Lamenting that the potential of older people is too often overlooked, he told a writer from the National Council on the Aging, "There is a lot of talent — solid experience and expertise — that is going to waste. It's criminal not to use this valuable human resource."

Further, he says, when older people get shunted aside by society, "they begin to wither and to withdraw from society."



Weiss, who cut his financial teeth working on emergency public service jobs under Interior Secretary Harold Ickes during the Depression, also thinks that "both federal and local governments spend unnecessary monies on high powered consultants."

The solution to the twin problems of underutilized retired expertise and the government's need for talented people, lies, according to Weiss in "Mobilizing Mature Manpower", his name for the mature think tank he has founded.

Noting that governors, mayors and other leaders are "missing a good bet", by not making use of older people, Weiss believes that low rental offices should be made available so that people of various disciplines could come together for a group think.

He says such offices would provide "catalytic environments" in which specialists such as community planners, attorneys and accountants could apply their collective wisdom and design cost-effective solutions to community problems.

Weiss is careful to point out, however, that he is not seeking a federal subsidy or a handout. In fact, he says, "I believe that people are willing to pay their own way and split the tab for office space and clerical help — just in order to continue to contribute to the society which they have traditionally served."

Recent stories appearing in

the press (and re-printed in the *Congressional Record*) about Weiss' concept and organization have sparked some interest and he is receiving a lot of mail. However, without clerical help, he is slow to respond.

Weiss is more than a little disappointed that he has not so far been able to garner much support from some of the senior organizations which he says, "really have a stake in some of the problems I am talking about."

For example, he continues, many older people have difficulty getting around. They may not have access to mass transportation and taxis are costly.

A solution would be to form a transportation cooperative in which a group of older people might invest modest amounts. A van could be bought or leased and pooled trips — such as visits to the doctor and shopping, as well as pleasure trips, could be

scheduled.

And, on he goes, exploring one idea after another, all of which he feels would go a long way towards solving problems, while saving money.

Weiss says, with grit born of determination, "my idea is workable, would have a cohesive effect on the community and could be replicated in any community."

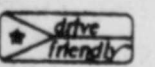

GARDEN

Nasturtium Established As An Old-Time Favorite

Nasturtium, *Tropaeolum majus*, originated in the foothills of the Andes and was introduced into Europe approximately three hundred years ago. It has long been established in this country as a favorite outdoor garden plant. Trailing varieties are ideal for use in hanging baskets and in window boxes.

The rounded leaves contain a single stem and the orange, red, yellow and white flowers with either single or double blossoms, bloom in summer or late autumn. Dwarfed varieties are preferred for indoor use. If seeds are planted in late summer, they will bloom indoors throughout most of the winter months.

Germination can be speeded up by soaking the seed in water for a day before planting in a six or eight inch pot containing garden soil with a little sand added for good drainage. Nasturtiums will fail to bloom if the soil is too rich in nitrogen. Place in a sunny location, preferably in a



southern exposure and water when the soil feels dry. Pinching back the tips during the growing period will result in bushier plants and picking the faded flowers will encourage new buds to form. After blooming has ceased, reserve the seed pods and leaves and start all over again with fresh plants.

Nasturtium leaves have a peppery taste that enhances the flavor when used in soups, salads or on sandwiches. Unripe seedpods can be pickled in vinegar and served in the same manner as pickled capers.

CORN AND BEEF CASSEROLE

- 1 pound ground beef
- 2 eggs
- ¼ cup milk
- 1 cup soft bread crumbs
- 1½ teaspoons salt
- 1 #2 can cream-styled corn
- 2 teaspoons prepared mustard
- ¼ cup finely chopped onion

Beat the eggs. Stir in the milk and crumbs. Add the remaining ingredients and mix thoroughly. Turn into a well greased casserole and bake at 300° F. for 1 hour. Serves 4 to 6.

Prepare a cake as for a jelly roll and cover with softened ice cream instead of jelly. Next roll and sprinkle with confectioner's sugar or frost with whipped cream. Freeze until firm and serve.

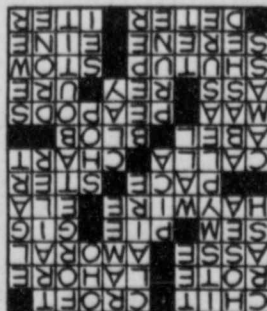

Extra weight in the trunk may give you a bit more traction driving in the snow but it increases the risk of a spin-out! It cuts your gas mileage too. If you do add weight drive with caution.
