and bids for the building were opened by the Foundation board on June 26. Attending the bid opening were representatives of many of the bidding companies, as well as three of the subcontract bidders on the heating and air conditioning for the plant. A. O. Fancher, owner of West Texas Sheet Metal Company of Haskell, was one of

HIF president Royce Adkins conducted the Friday meeting,

and brought those attending up to date on negotiations that had been made since the bid opening.

The original plant contract called for 12,000 square feet of floor space, but with the present changes, the 11,000 square foot building was agreed to be adequate to house the plant.

Board member Bob Philpot made the motion to go into contract with Camp Construction Company of Graham to construct the building, according to plans as prepared by Riherd & Huckabee Architects, with modifications as agreed upon by Herman Marcus, for a construction price of \$124,000.00. The motion was seconded by Belton Duncan.

Officials of Herman Marcus have projected that the plant will employ about 75 persons by the end of the first year of operation, with an estimate of be tween 150 and 200 employees by the end of the second year.

The building will be constructed on a five-acre tract west of Haskell owned by the Industrial Foundation.

Ground-breaking ceremonies are set for 2 p. m. Monday, July 23, at the site and officials of both organizations will be on hand
