

Jail Standards, and failed to meet minimum standards. Four of those failures were in the area of life safety, and have to be corrected at once or the jail would be closed. The commissioners authorized Sheriff Bob Storey to correct the areas, which means installation of an intercom and emergency light system, smoke and fume removal system and detention locks to replace the padlocks being used on four cells.

Compliance of the four areas was estimated to cost around \$1000 and funds were authorized to come from the permanent improvement fund.

The commissioners hope to obtain variances in the other eight items that the jail did not meet compliance on.



### **Cameras To Inspect Sewer Lines**

The City of Bogata is project which began in March, 1980, when the Environmental Protection Main Street and 7th Street Agency offered a grant to pay 75 percent of the Step I project, with the City furnishing the remaining 25 percent.

Hayter Engineering, Inc., Paris, Texas, is performing the Step I studies for the City. As a part of these studies, the engineers will be in Bogata between January 22 and February 2. They will have a four-man inspection crew from Dallas who will hydraulically clean and internally inspect certain portions of the City's sewer lines

The men will be working from white and blue sections of pipe are taken vehicles, and will strive to from the T.V. screen. The

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





#### Joy in a World of Silence

Struck deaf in her teens, 72year old Louise Hume has - in her own kinetic way - broken the sound barrier.

Her world may be silent, but her ebullient spirit is not still. And while she almost "gave in" to a retirement home for the deaf two years ago, she was mercifully persuaded that there was a compelling need for her special brand of caring.

Dorothy Jackson, Human Services Administrator for the Akron, Ohio Metropolitan Housing Authority told a writer from the National Council on the Aging,"I could not let her retire, she was too young, had too much to give.

Learning of Hume's plans, Jackson was galvanized into action. She sought and obtained funds to hire her as a part-time counselor for the housing authority's deaf clients.

Described variously by her co-workers as a "dynamo or dynamite lady", Hume is doing



what she has done best for most of her adult life - helping others. Louise and her late husband, Boyd, also deaf, had always made a habit of helping. Louise has, as a result, built a storehouse of expertise which might be the envy of any graduate social worker.

For example, Boyd and Louise counseled hundreds of hearing impaired people with problems ranging from adoption, bankruptcy, marital problems, drug abuse, even manslaughter and murder.

"Often", she says, "we did not know where to get help and we would pay for professional assistance. But, we learned a lot in each case - and in all cases we asked for divine guidance." Life was not ever thus for

Hume. Double tragedy struck in her teens. She lost her hearing due to high doses of quinine taken during the flu epidemic of 1918. Both parents died almost simultaneously. Not unnaturally, the young girl turned inward. Her aunt, uncle and cousin

with whom she lived refused to let her build a shell and sent her to the Tennessee School for the Deaf which, she says, "was the turning point of my life."

Later she spent a year at Gallaudet, the nationally-known college for the deaf in Washington, D.C. This experience was to spark what has become a life of service.

Among the many credits Hume has amassed was a pilot educational program she designed for the deaf at Ohio's Applecreek State Institution. The program is now state supported.

Even more remarkable has been her ability to teach the mentally retarded. She taught them not only life skills, basic

academics, but values and concepts as well.

Serving now as a counselor for the Housing Authority, Hume's days are filled, often overflowing, with "people activities". She has a caseload of some 20 people, deaf residents of the authority's housing sites. She visits them and reports not only on needed repairs and services, but, more importantly, on the health and well-being of her "charges".

She is ready, of course to respond to all types of needs, not the least of which is that vital human contact. Her work has been highlighted on several local television programs.

Communications with the hearing-impaired clients have been significantly augmented by a TTY, a telex-type machine donated to the housing authority recently by the Akron Javcees Foundation. It enables Hume and others on staff to "talk" electronically with the clients.

The growth of such electronic equipment, according to Hume, "makes deafness less of a hardship", but she considers the loss

of any of the senses, "a devastating experience."

Now, however, she says, reflecting on the rewards which have come her way, "I look at my deafness as a blessing, I feel that any degree of success that I have attained is not in spite of my deafness, but because of it."










#### **BUDDY'S WORKSHOP** Mildew Returns in Spring

Warm weather brings back mildew problems. Mildew is a fungus that often appears in basements, closets and other poorly ventilated areas.

Mild cases can be removed from painted areas

with a stiff brush, according to specialists with the North Carolina Agricultural Extension Service.

If the mildew leaves a stain, repaint the area with a mildew resistant paint.

For severe stains on cement, wall tiles or floor tiles, scrub the area with a solution of chlorine bleach. Rinse with clear water and wipe as dry as possible

This will kill the fungus and remove the dead particles. When the fungus is on plastic and asphalt tile, work quickly to avoid spotting the surface.

Bleach may fade some materials, so check a small area for colorfastness before applying bleach to the entire surface.

How can hairline cracks in plaster ceilings be filled? They are too fine to fill with plaster or spackle.

Very fine hairline cracks can be filled in by using regular sticks of white chalk. Rub the chalk back and forth over the crack until it is filled in.

GARDEN **Pamper Gloxinia For Best Plant Results** 

The showy gloxinia usu-ally catches the eye of most plant fanciers. If you're trying to grow it for the first time, you will probably find that it takes a little more pampering than some other house plants. Selection of soil is impor-

tant. Plants do best in a soil mixture that contains at least 50 percent organic matter. One successful potting medium includes by volume, one part soil, two parts peat moss and one part perlite.

Newly potted plants may require watering every three to four days. More mature plants may require watering more frequently. Never allow the soil to become dry and hard.

After the plants start leaf growth, fertilization should begin. Use a high analysis liquid fertilizer such as 20-20-20. Follow manufacturer's recommendations. Fer-

tilize established plants every five to six weeks when actively growing. Overfertilization results in stunted plants, burned or dried leaf margins and wilted or even dead plants.

Gloxinias should be grown in a temperature range of 65 to 70 degrees.

Place gloxinias near a south or west window during the winter. Too little light causes "leggy" plants. Plants should be protected from direct sunlight after May 1.

Gloxinia plants should be given a short rest in the fall. As soon as the leaves die. repot tubers for the rest period. Potted tubers can be kept in a dark place until the new growth appears. Water the soil enough to prevent the plant from wilting. The rest period varies from several weeks to two months. When regrowth begins, the entire cycle is repeated.

**BAD NEWS FOR CAR BUYERS!** The double whammy of inflation-recession is pricing many Americans out of the new car market. Average price of a new American car is \$8,200, up 100 percent in the last decade. The prime lending rate has reached the stratospheric height of 19 percent, and car loans typically run two to four percent higher than the prime. Result? The monthly payment on a 48 month \$6,000 car loan is nearly \$170.

SMALL CAR HAZARDS: "In a collision between a subcompact and a full-sized car, occupants in the smaller car are eight times more likely to be killed," says the U.S. Dept. of Transportation. Safety experts contend this fact is a strong warning to small car drivers to stay within the 55 MPH speed limit, since lower speeds clearly reduce the risk and severity of injuries.

DRINKING DRIVERS GO TO POT. Nationwide surveys show that 60 percent of America's high school seniors have tried marijuana. Like alcohol during Prohibition, marijuana is illegal, but that doesn't prevent it from being a popular and widely used social drug. One effect of this trend is that many young people now routinely drive while under the influence of marijuana. The problem is that marijuana, like alcohol, is a central nervous system depressant. It slows a driver's reaction time, distorts perception, and reduces the capacity to make decisions. Numerous research studies have demonstrated that marijuana definitely decreases driving ability. Even worse, many people routinely combine booze and pot before they head out on the highway. Researchers have found that the combined damage of alcohol and marijuana to driving skill is more harmful than the effect of either drug used by itself.
