Paper To Fight "Gag Order" Attempt

A motion to impose a "Gag Order" and deny the motion to disqualify Austin Guest and Hardy Moore as attorneys in a Red River County Police Brutality Case has resulted in the filing of a plea of intervention being filed by a Tyler law firm on behalf of Robert W. Wright, publisher of the Bogata News to keep the order from going into effect.

In response to a motion filed by Attorney Jim D. Lovett for plaintiffs Gene Shaddid and Peggy Mitchell, attorneys Hardy Moore and Austin Guest, who represent the City of Clarksville and City Police Officer Donald Parks, are filing a motion in Federal District Court to impose a "gag order" and to have their disqualification denied.

The motions which should be filed on Friday, February 27, 1981, establish precedence that no conflict of interest exists between the City of Clarksville and Officer Parks, and that the motion for disqualification be denied.

Further, and perhaps even more important was a motion regarding trial publicity. This motion asks "That throughout the remaining course of the litigation, all attorneys would strictly observe the letter and spirit of

Disciplinary Rule 7-107(G) and would make no public statement relating to evidence regarding the occurrence or transaction involved, the character, credibility or criminal record of a party, witness, or prospective witness, the

performance or results of any examinations or test or the refusal or failure of a party to submit to such, or his opinion as to the merits of the claim or defenses of any party, except as required by law or administrative rule or any other matter likely to interfere with a fair trial of the action."

Lovett is expected to respond to this motion soon after it is filed.

Concerning the "gag order", Publisher Robert W. Wright, owner of the Bogata News, said, "Any action

which restricts or limits the sources available to a news media abridges the first amendment right to free speech and freedom of the press. This particular case is within the circulation scope of our paper, and we feel obligated to take this action on behalf of all newspapers."

"The only other paper considering intervening, to our knowledge," Wright stated, "is the Texarkana Gazette."

Rebels To Meet Eagles For District

The Rebels, on March 3, will play the New Diana Eagles for the right to represent District 20-AA in the state play-offs. The game will be played at Pittsburg High School at 7:30 p.m. New Diana must beat Harmony Friday night to win the second half. A loss by New Diana would put them into a tie for second half with either Maud or Ore City. There would have to be a play-off between New Diana and that team to see who plays Rivercrest. The game between New Diana and Rivercrest should be a real thriller. New Diana and Rivercrest split in regular season play. Rivercrest beat New Diana 12 points at Rivercrest and New Diana beat Rivercrest 12 points at New Diana.

The game will pit Rivercrest's pressure man to man defense against New Diana's sagging zone. New

Diana will have a definite size advantage over Rivercrest. They have one player at 6'5 1/2" and one at 6'3". David Phillips is New Diana's leading rebounder and scorer, averaging 25 points per game in district. New Diana has one of the finest ball handlers in East Texas in 5'3" Larry Ford. According to the Rebel coach, how well we handle Ford and Phillips will determine the outcome of the game. Phillips and Ford are both smart players and excellent free throw shooters. Their time at the free throw line must be limited and the Rivercrest press must work. The Rebels hope to beat New Diana to get a shot at Sabine, the defending State Champion of Class AA. Sabine is currently undefeated and rated No. 1 in Class AA polls.

The winner of the New Diana-Rivercrest game will play Sabine in Bi-District.

The arrangements for the game will probably be made Wednesday. Large crowds are expected to follow the Rebels to Pittsburg Tuesday and cheer them on to victory. Thursday night at 7:30 p.m. the Rebels will travel to

Paris Junior College to play Trenton, the winners of District 34-A. Trenton has a fine team as reported by the Rebel boy's coach. The game will serve as good practice for the Rebels.

Rebelettes To Meet Edgewood

The Rivercrest Rebelettes paved the way to a meeting with Edgewood at 8:00 p.m. Friday, February 27, 1981 at the Regional Tournament in Huntsville when they defeated Spring Hill 58-43 Monday, February 23 in the Bi-District tilt. It was the third consecutive year that the Rebelettes have barreled over Spring Hill on their way to the region and state tournaments, and the size of the crowd on each side of the court illustrated the expectations of the fans. The Rivercrest bleachers were packed, and the Spring Hill bleachers were sparsely dotted with fans.

Rivercrest Coach Frank Stubblefield said Tuesday morning that the girls were "tight to begin with and made mistakes, like fumbling the ball, then began to get it going in the second quarter. We play an open running game better," Stubblefield continued, "and broke it open by running in the second and the first part of the third quarters. By the middle of the third quarter, we felt we had the game cinched, and slowed the pace by walking the ball down to run the clock and to keep out of foul trouble."

Rebelette Sarah Scales was the first on the boards for the Rebelettes with two points in the first minute. Traveling was called three times in the first quarter on the Rebelettes, and once on Spring Hill in the same period.

The Rebelettes scored 16 points in the second and third quarters, while holding Spring Hill to six and nine points.

With the ball game slowed down in the fourth quarter, the Rebelettes scored 13 points.

Leading the scoring for the Rebelettes was Scotti Wood, who had 18 points, and Veronica Howerton with 16 points. Sarah Scales made 10 points and Judy Via made nine points.

"Via did a tremendous job on rebounds," Stubblefield said. She had a total of 14. Howerton made 11 rebounds, and an undetermined number of blocked shots. "We never kept records on how many shots she (Howerton) blocks," Stubblefield said, "but the number would be impressive."

Stubblefield termed the number of fouls against the Rebelettes "average," with four called on Judy Via, three against Howerton and three against Wood. The Rebelettes had four fouls called against them in the first half and 10 in the second half, with only four called in each half against Spring Hill. As a result, Rivercrest made only four free throws, compared to 17 for Spring Hill.

Morgan. The girls have played well for the season, and have the makings of yet another championship team as varsity players.

They functioned well as a team, and their defensive play has been as outstanding as their scoring abilities.

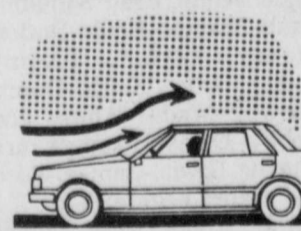

Dating Has Changed Since Horseback Days

I was at the store today and saw some young fellows starting out on their Sunday night dates. I got to recalling my old courting days.

I used to get all cleaned up, polished my saddle, get the horse all curried and the cockleburrs out of his tail, and set out. I always wanted to make a good impression on the young lady that had agreed to let me call on her.

Most of the time we would sit in the front parlor and talk, unless we had a country party to go to. I tied my horse to the fence, and we walked to the party. We played games, and square danced some, but the best

part of the party was when the girls all went into a room, and then us boys would go to the door and knock. The girl that answered the door went for a walk with you.

The part of the whole deal that I disliked was when I got on my horse and started home. I was only about 15 or 16, and those dark country roads always seemed to be out to get me. The world seemed to be just waiting to pounce on me. I always thought someone would jump out and rob or kill me. I never stopped to think that I didn't have a single thing anyone would want, and my horse was no great shaker either.

When I got home, the scary part was trying to put my horse up in the dark old barn. All the "boogers" in the world were in it as far as I was concerned. I would have to get my mother to come to the barn with me and put up the horse.

You have all heard that things are not built as good now as back in the old days, and I guess this reminded

me of that when I was in Paris the other day.

I came upon an old fire plug. It's on Bonham Street, and was built in 1909. The old fire plugs don't look the same as they did back then, as you can see from the picture here, but city boys used to tie their horses up to them when they went courting, which they weren't supposed to do.

Anyway, I think the old plug is still in use. Now that is a lasting piece of equipment.

The members also completed two quilts during the meeting and a covered dish luncheon was served.

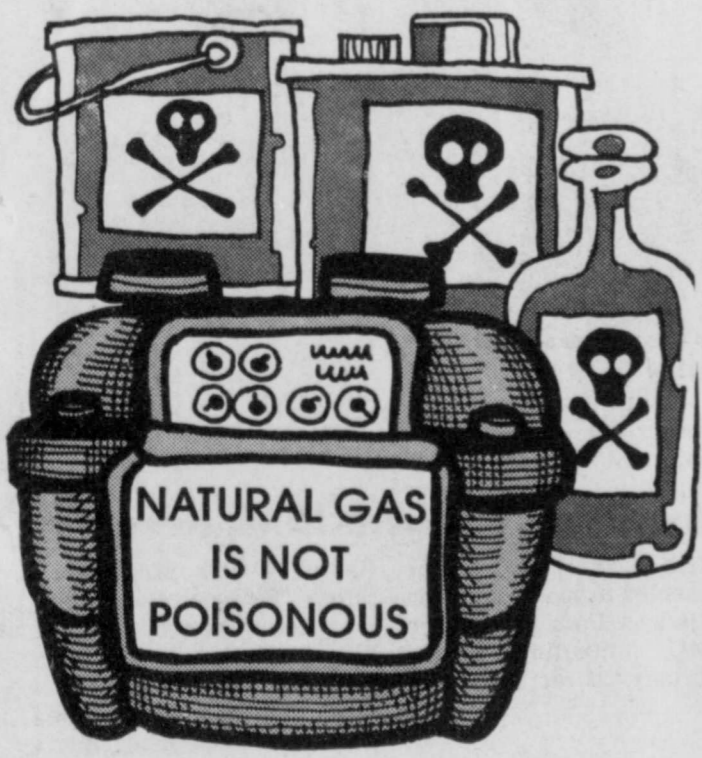

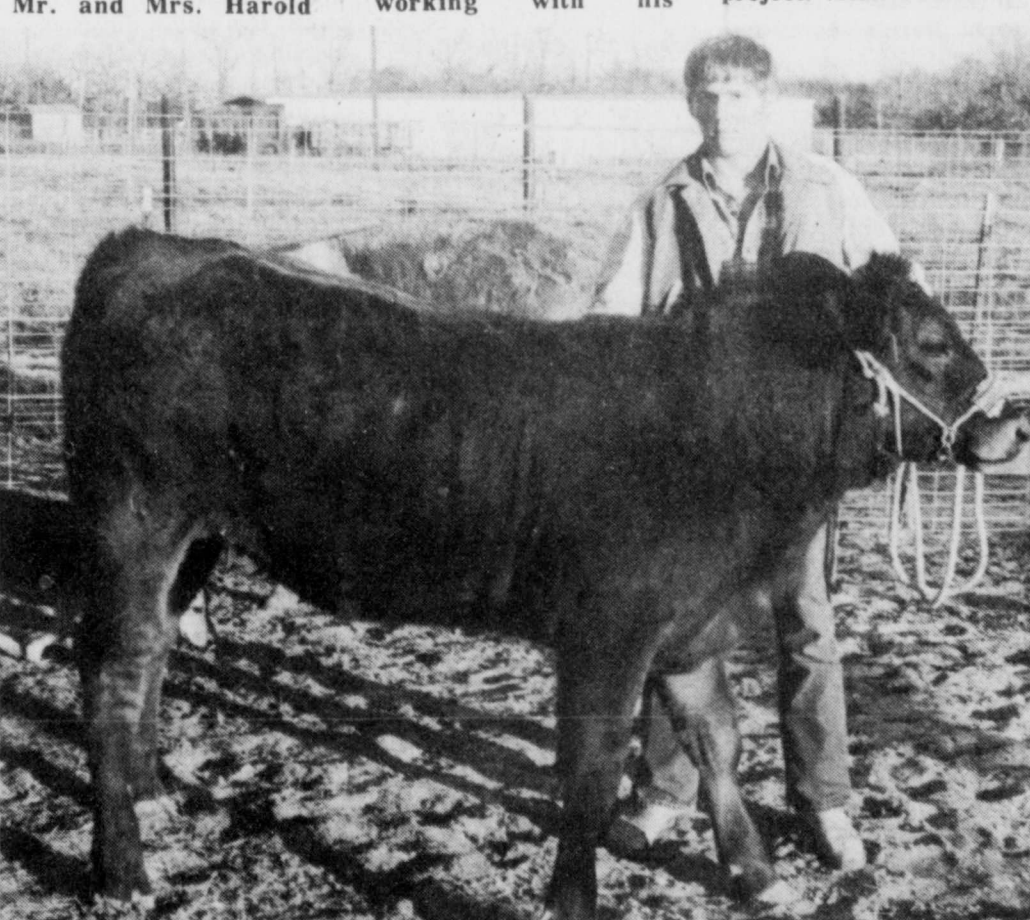

Sen. Aikin Contacts Students

After 46 years of legislative leadership, former Senator A.M. Aikin now spends a great deal of time sharing his knowledge and experience in Texas government with local high school civics students. Area schools within the First Senatorial District, which Senator Aikin served, are invited each year to select students to visit the Senator in an informal discussion on Texas Government and

politics. The meetings are conducted in the A.M. and Welma Aikin Regional Archives at Paris Junior College. The 65th Legislature authorized PJC to construct an exact replica of the State Capitol office occupied by Sen. Aikin for over 30 years, and authorized the Texas Senate to transfer office furniture, equipment, and official papers from the Capitol office to the college.

In his interviews with local students, Sen. Aikin is quick to point out his strong belief in and continued support of our public schools in Texas. He is quick to condemn those who are unjustly critical of school systems, stating that in his opinion "the schools and teachers are doing a better job now than ever before." The two most important things in our communities says Aikin "are our churches and schools. The church comes first, followed closely by the schools. Both deserve our complete support."

Sen. Aikin is best remembered across Texas for his support of public education. While leading the Texas Senate, Aikin introduced and supported major legislation which helped establish Texas in a position of eminence in many areas, especially in education at all levels and in state fiscal responsibility.

Two members of the Band Boosters met with the Board to request that consideration be given to permitting the band to make an overnight concert tour in the future. The Board will take this matter under advisement and study. The request for the tour mentioned the 1981-82 school year as probably the logical time for the first tour provided approval is given.

The Board, as is its normal procedure, discussed a number of matters of concern for the overall improvement of the school district and the welfare of students. In final action, the various financial reports were approved as presented. The next regular meeting of the Board will be on Tuesday, March 10 at 7:00 p.m. at Rivercrest with the public cordially invited to attend.
