### **Gross Sales** Are High

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday reported that gross sales in Texas Paymaster Gr 1089. during the final quarter of last year surged to \$89.8 billion.

Sales in the final three months of 1980, as reported by 341,539 outlets, outstripped third quarter sales by \$24.1 billion, Bullock said.

Total gross sales figures for 1980 in Texas reached \$281.1 billion, according to Bullock, compared to gross sales for 1979 of \$213.8 billion.

"The numbers speak for themselves," Bullock said, 'showing most Texas companies closed out the year on an economic high note.

Bullock said the expanding Texas business picture was also partly responsible for the rapid increase in reporting outlets--up by nearly 100,000 from the third quarter to 341,539 at year's end

Bullock also released a computer analysis showing reported sales for each of the state's 254 counties and a sales tax analysis broken down by the state's Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas.

Fourth Quarter gross sales in Lamar County were 121,157,603 and for Red River county were 35,930,145.

The water consumption per month to be billed for Class A users shall be to amaximum of 10,000 gallons in order not to account any water used during months for purposes such as lawn and garden watering from which water is not returned into the wastewater treatment services. Costs shall be broken down to show the operation and maintenance costs at the actual water consumption per month to be billed for Class B users shall be the actual water consumption recorded each month for the purpose of water bill. In case of users purpose of water bill. In case of wers not on a metered basis, the City shall not on a metered basis, the City shall establish an estimated water consumption based on a comparison of the non-metered user with a metered user of similar class.


