Youth Victim of Accidental Shooting

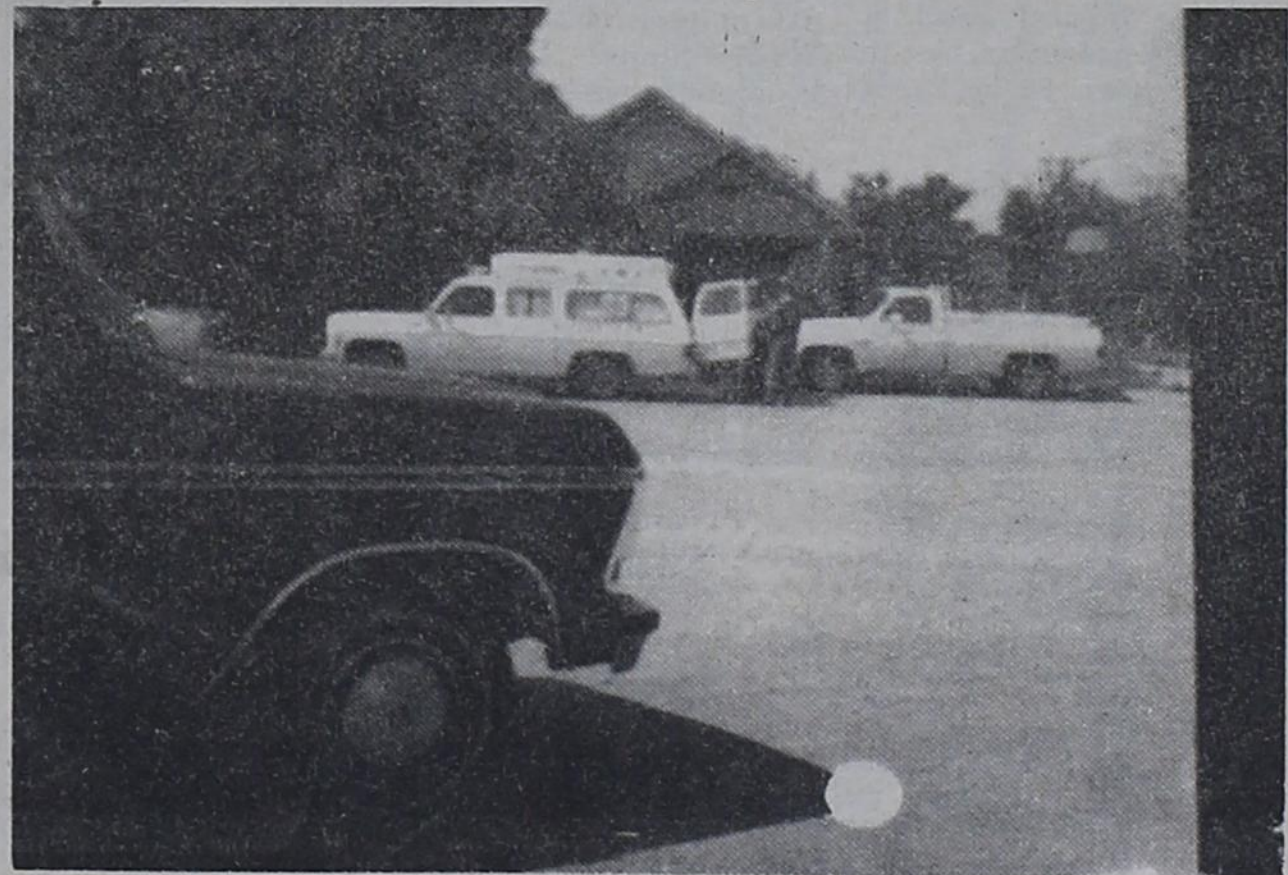
Israel Tiernia underwent four hours of surgery last Wednesday after being shot by his brother, 13 year old James.


Baird pitching has given up only four hits, striking out 36 batters with Baird scoring 60 runs in the first four games of the 1982 season.



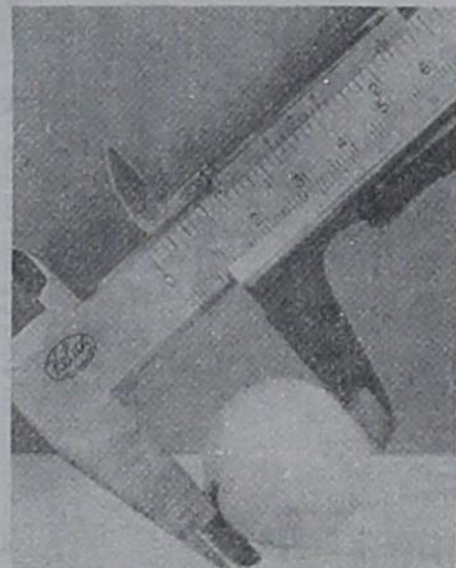
Church Members Work for Worthy Mission

Gross Sales Up 18 Billion Dollars In Last Quarter 1981

State Comptroller Bob Bullock reported Tuesday that gross sales in Texas for the fourth quarter of 1981—October, November and December—totaled almost \$109 billion.

Gross sales for Callahan County for this period was \$18,190,285.

Fourth quarter sales in 1981 passed 1980 fourth quarter sales by \$18 billion, Bullock said, a 19.9 percent increase.

The report details gross sales of all sales made by Texas Businesses— as well as those subject to sales and use tax.

The Comptroller said the sales tax analysis for October, November and December of 1981 shows 375,699 outlets reporting compared with 341,539 reporting in 1980. Out-of-state taxpayer numbered 6,815 billion compared with 6,096 a year earlier.

Total gross sales for 1981 came to \$337 billion in the state.

The fourth quarter 1981 total reflected

sales of \$86.3 billion in gross sales in the state's 26 Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas (SMSAs), \$10.7 billion in non-metropolitan areas and \$11.8 billion in sales by out-of-state taxpayers.

Sales in the state's 10 leading urban areas were 1. Houston \$33.6 billion, up 19.7%; 2 Dallas-Ft. Worth \$21.7 billion, up 12.9%; 3 San Antonio \$4.7 billion, up 13.8%; 4 Corpus Christi \$4.4 billion, up 20.6%; 5. Beaumont-Port Arthur-Orange \$2.4 billion, down 4.8%; 6. El Paso \$2 billion, up 15.1%; 7. Austin \$1.9 billion, up 19%; 8. Odessa \$1.5 billion, up 22.6%; 9. Victoria \$1.3 billion, up 42% and 10. Longview \$1.2 billion, up 19.7%.

The Comptroller's Office also released a computer analysis showing reported sales in each of the SMSAs and the state's 254 counties.

Albany Fandangle Sets Dates, June 17-19 - 24-26

For more than forty years the people of Albany, Texas have been entertaining West Texans with song and dance, depicting the lives of early settlers through the production of the Fort Griffin Fandangle.

The two hour musical is scheduled to run for six performances June 17-19 and June 24-26 at the prairie theatre just outside Albany city limits.

A cast of over two hundred local citizens begin rehearsing as early as February each year to make the historical narrative possible. With the exception of the directors and technicians, the cast and crew of the show volunteer their many hours of rehearsal and performance.

The Fandangle was created 44 years ago by Albany playwright and author Robert Nail as a sen-

ior play. The production was such a success that local citizens encouraged Nail to expand the endeavor to include the townspeople.

Over the years scripts for the show were carefully constructed to tell the story of the old west and how it was settled. Following Nail's death in 1968, the town drew from within itself for continued leadership and guidance.

For two generations the Fandangle has pulled from Albany talents that otherwise would have gone undeveloped. All music and lyrics for the production are the products of Albany citizens as are the props and scenery.

The large outdoor stage is the setting for scenes that include a herd of long-horns, buffalo, a stage coach, countless cowboys and a replica of the Texas

Central locomotive. Also used is a large street set that transforms the two acre stage in to the wild and reckless Main Street of Fort Griffin, a cattle trail town and home of a military fort by the same name.

Albany celebrates the annual production with a parade scheduled this year to begin at 6 p.m. on Thursday, June 25. The sixty or more entries in the parade represent local organizations as well as several of the moving props from the show such as the steam powered calliope.

Fandangle visitors are encouraged to come early enough to view Albany's many historical buildings, including the courthouse which was constructed in 1883. Organ concerts are held each evening of performances on the hand-crafted pipe organ in the Matthews Memorial Presbyterian Church located one block off the square.

Calliope concerts are held before each show at the theatre.

Albany's latest achievement is the founding of the Old Jail Foundation Art Museum which was a recipient of one of four cultural achievement awards given by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce this year. The prestigious award has been bestowed on Albany twice in the past, once to Robert Nail and then again to the people of Albany for the production of the Fandangle.

The art museum will be featuring an exhibit entitled "Taos Today" during the Fandangle
