fully monitored by the Food and Drug Administration to assure their safe use in food. Many additives increase the nutrient value of foods. Vitamins and minerals are added to salt, milk, margarine, breakfast cereals and enriched grain products. Natural colors such as carotenes (yellow), beet powder (red), and caramel (brown) are often used in cheese, bread and soft drink mixes. Only a few natural colors can be used easily in food manufacturing, so most of the colors added to foods are synthetic. These can be used only so long as there are no questions about their safety. Additives are also used for their an: caking, antifoaming and bleaching properties. One example is sodium silicoaluminate which is used in dessert and soft drink mixes.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said the Legislative Redistricting Board should proceed with caution in redrawing rew state senate districts.

"Our work shouldn't be rushed or we're likely to become as entangled as the Legislature when it tried to reappoartion the Senate," Bullock said.

The constitutional provision that hands the authority to the five-member board to redistrict when the Legislature fails to do so allows the board to wait up to 90 days before meeting to decide on reapportionment.

Bullock said waiting until the clock runs nearly out will lessen the prospects that the final maps will be unconstituctional.

Bullock said a fair redistricting plan won't be produced overnight although he noted that months of groundwork by this office will not make the task impossible.





had its beginning in a major industry, that of the cattle raising. Rodeo is a Spanish word meaning roundup. In the Southwestern part of the United States it is pronounced "ro-day-o," but in the West, North and Central part it is pronounced "ro-de-o," and that is the way the cowboys say it.

No matter how the word is pronounced the sport remains the same, and it is typical of the west. It is indeed a sport, with the cowboys paying for the privilege of contesting for the prize money. This payment is in the form of entry fees, and it really means that a cowboy bets the amount of the entry fee that he can win against the other contestants in the same event. Such a spirit is true sportsmanship.







Some reports of wheat sprouting are coming in and growers with this condition can expect a lower grade and a severe price cut. According to local elevator operators, wheat that has over 15 percent germ sprouted is classed as Sample Grade and will only be suitable as feed grade wheat. It is not exportable and will certainly be docked in price.

Harvesting grain too wet provides an environment for insects and causes an added cost because the grain should be dried to 12 percent moisture or less. Grain containing more moisture attracts insects, promottes mold, and may induce

heating. Cracked grain attracts insects and aids in their development. Wheat should be harvested as dry as adjusted properly to eliminate weed seeds and keep cracking of kernels at a

Brucellosis Vaccination. Cattle producers are encouraged to continue having their replacement heifers vaccinated from Brucellosis. Beef heifers must be vaccinated between 3 and 12 months of age and dairy heifers prior to 6 months. However, vaccination between four and six months is recommended.
