Truck Demolished In Bridge Accident

James Reynolds of Cokan, Kansas escaped with his life after the tractor-trailer cattle truck he was driving was demolished in a one vehicle accident at 4:50 a.m. Monday, July 13, on a Sulphur River bridge in Franklin County north of Talco.

Reynolds was south bound when he apparently fell asleep hitting the north guard rail careening from one side of the bridge to the other knocking out some of

the concrete abutment on both sides. The empty truck and trailer came to a blazing halt on the south end of the bridge with parts of the truck scattered over the pavement.

Reynolds who was thrown clear of the wreckage was taken by ambulance to the Titus County Memorial Hospital where he was treated for lacerations and bruises. He was reported to be in fair condition Tuesday. Highway 271 was blocked

until 9:00 a.m. when one lane was cleared. The other lane was not cleared until much later.

The Talco Volunteer Fire Department was called to put out the fire and the Highway Department was called

to sand down the spilled fuel and clear parts of the wreckage from the road.

DPS officer Ira Covington who investigated the accident said the truck was owned by Darbert Truck Co. out of Sublette, Kansas.

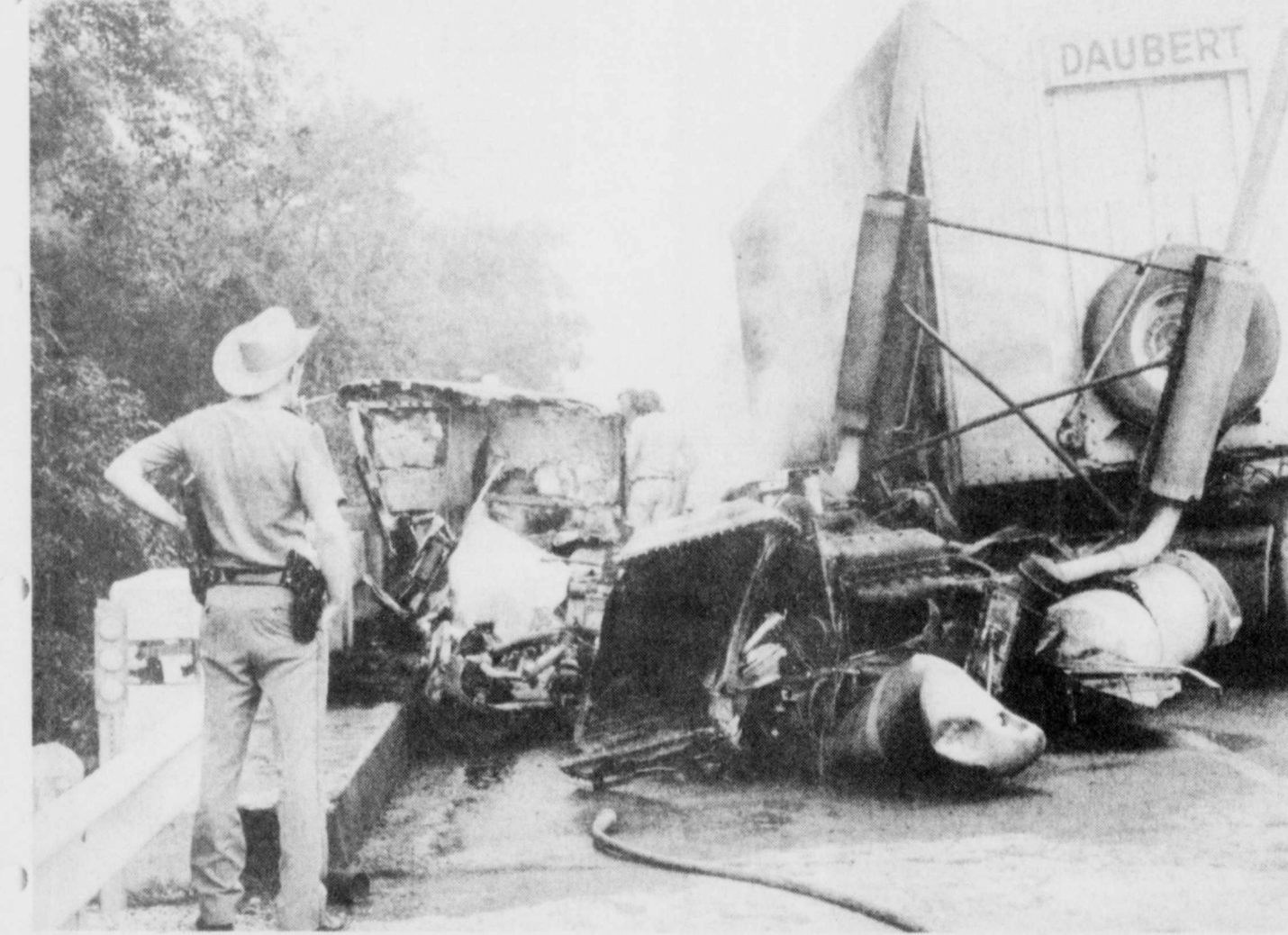
Cuthand Homecoming Scheduled

Finke To Present Grazing Program

Mr. Ralph Finke, a farmer-rancher from Pottsboro, Texas will present a program on Grazing Cattle on Wheat in the District Courtroom in Clarksville on July 16, at 8:00 p.m., reports County Extension agent Bob Moody.

Mr. Finke will discuss planting dates, fertilizing, stocking rate, and managing the wheat during extreme wet weather. By attending the meeting and listening to his techniques, this concern will be eliminated.

Mr. Finke runs several

head of cattle each year on wheat and most of it is on a black type soil and he has been very successful.

In 1981 there were over 80,000 acres of wheat planted

in the county less than one fourth of that was grazed. Farmers are losing income by not taking advantage of this cash crop, Moddy states.

The price of wheat and the

Bid Open

For FM Road

Bids are expected to be opened July 14 by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation for the construction of a new farm to market road in Red River County.

Farm to Market Road 3390 will extend 2.7 miles from Farm to Market Road 412, 1.3 miles southeast of U.S. Highway 82 in a new location. It will provide two 10 foot wide traffic lanes with four foot wide shoulders.

Richard L. Stauter of Paris is the department's engineer in charge of supervising the work, expected to require 150 working days.

Weather Causes Tick Problems

With the onset of warmer weather, people will be taking vacations and making excursions into the woods and parks. They will be exposed to tick infestations.

There are several species of ticks in East Texas that will transmit a disease called "Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever." This disease is fairly common in East Texas. Although it is not a serious threat at this time, vacationers or campers should be aware that the disease is present. The disease is transmitted by several species of ticks and is an infectious disease of the peripheral blood vessels.

A symptom of the disease is the appearance of a rash on the body after the second to fifth day of a tick bite. This appears first on the wrist and ankles and may be found on the back, but then it spreads to other parts of the body. The symptoms are also expressed by a

headache, fever and body aches (similar to flu symptoms).

To prevent ticks from getting on the body, campers and outdoorsmen should use insect repellants. Wearing clothes that can be layered would also be a good idea, that is trouser legs tucked into the boots or socks pulled up over the pants leg and the shirt tail should be tucked in. The disease is not transmitted unless the tick remains attached to its host for two hours or more.

Once the tick is found on the body, it should be removed, but do not pull the tick from the body as this can leave the mouth parts imbedded in the skin. To remove a tick, touch it with a hot needle, a few drops of camphor, alcohol, turpentine, kerosene or chloroform. Then slowly remove the tick and place some antiseptic over the wound.

For control of ticks within the home landscape, persistence is necessary. Several insecticides will work-they are: Sevin, Malathion, Diazinon and Dursban. One application will not control the ticks. Continue to apply these materials on about a 7-10 day interval until the infestation is brought under control.

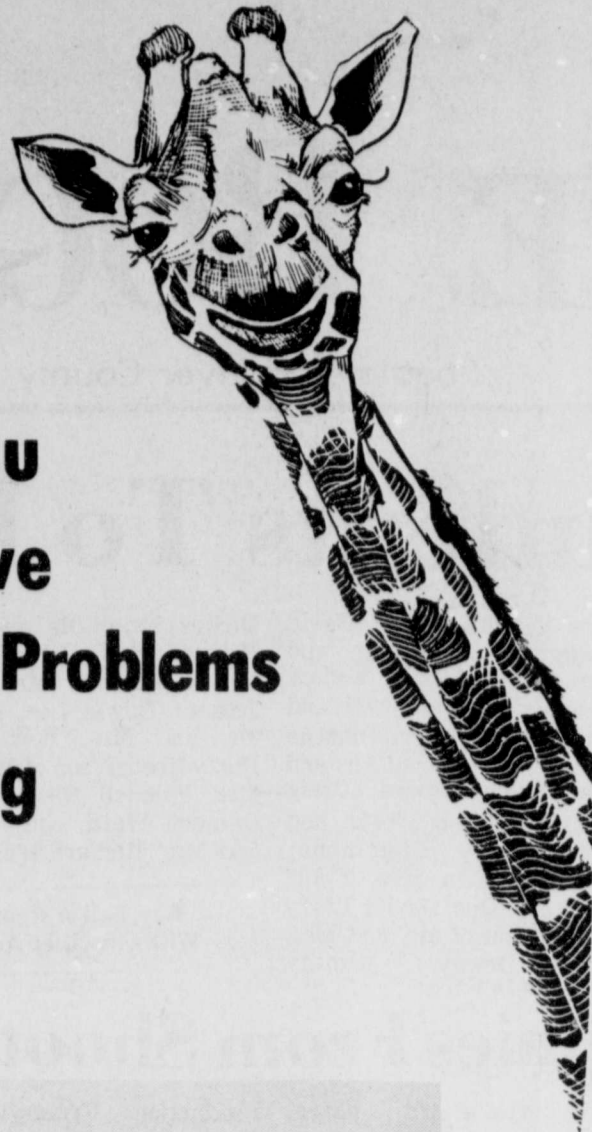

Melvin Webb Farm Has Milo Demonstration

By Paul D. Payne The prospects for a high yield from area milo looks really promising. The summer rain has enabled the crop to set a full head of grain and midge activity was less than expected, which should help grain prospects.

Now is a good time for farmers to drive out to Melvin Webb's place for an inspection of the twelve-variety milo demonstration. All of the varieties have set grain and one can determine plant characteristics. Each of the varieties are identified with a stake located in the middle row of each variety. There are 16 rows of each variety.

The spring hail storm that went through the county destroyed four varieties and these were replanted to another variety.

The Webb Farm is located in the Byrdtown Community which is between Pattonville and Blossom. To reach the demonstration site, take FM 196 north of Pattonville for a distance of two miles, take the oil top road to the east and travel about one mile and the site will be on your right.

Varieties included in the demonstration are Harpool 6203 GR, Oro GXTRA, Ring Around 807, Pioneer 8680, Golden Acres TE 66B, Conlee Top Hand TA, Pioneer 8311, Ring Around 7336 B, DeKalb 42, Paymaster DR1125, TE Bird-A-Boo II and Paymaster GR1089.

Melvin and his son, Mark have the demonstration in good shape. They will be pleased for farmers to inspect the crop and keep up with the progress. For a personal guide of the demonstration stop by Mr. Less' house (Melvin's dad). But be prepared to stay for a while.

SOYBEAN WEED CONTROL

Weeds and grass are presenting a real problem in soybean field. It seems as though every weed and grass seed has come up and this condition is presenting a real challenge to the producer.

George O'Connor, Direct, has some of the cleanest soybean fields that I have seen. George was running the middles for the last time using a rope wick applicator with Round-Up on sporadic Johnson Grass and Pigweed plants last week when I stopped for a visit.

George showed me a soybean field in the bottom that he was particularly proud of. It had a severe

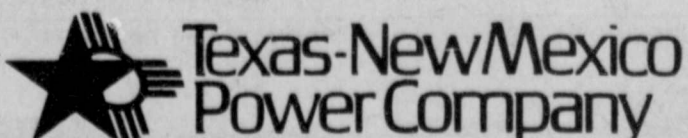

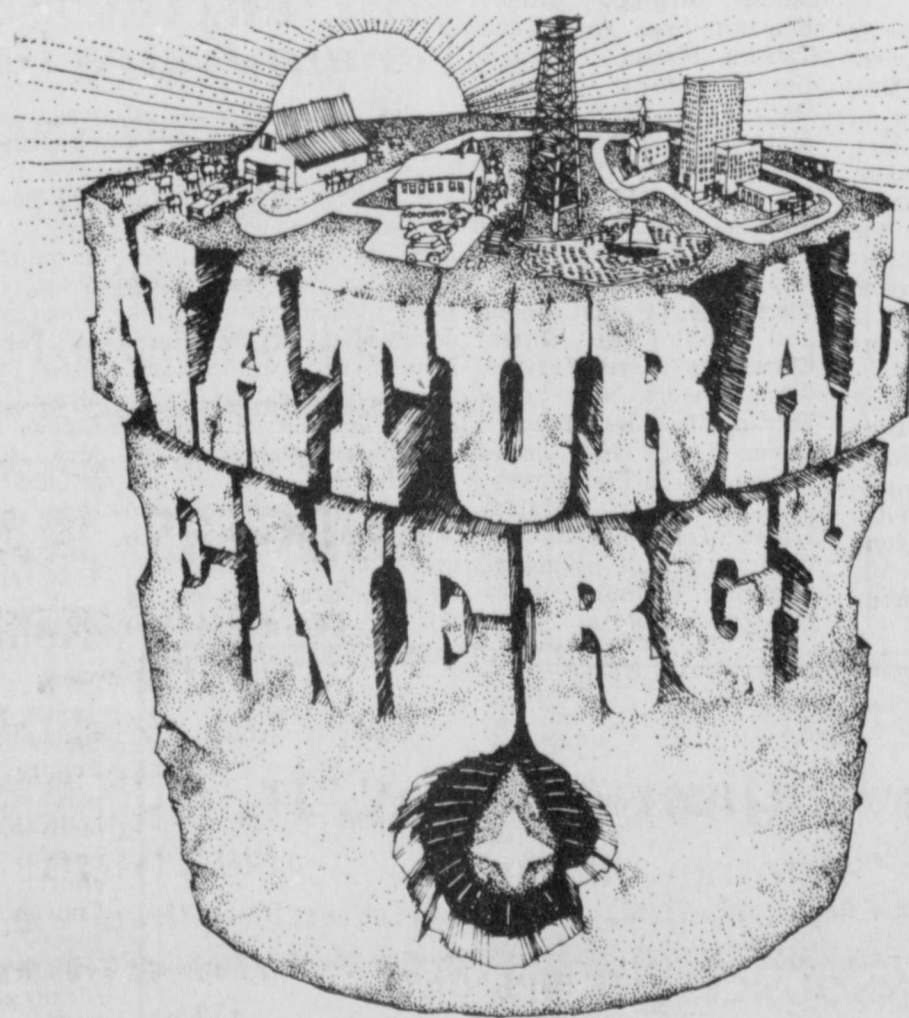

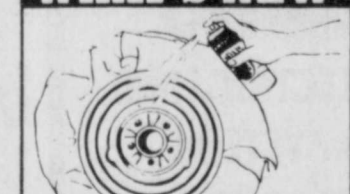

The Home Garden: Status Symbol?

This is the year of the home garden. From Maine to California, Ely to Biloxi, thousands of homeowners are trying for the first time to raise beans, carrots, tomatoes and potatoes.

In some areas, seed and plant vendors say sales indicate that the home garden may well be on the way to achieving recognition as a status symbol in much the same fashion as that achieved by the two-car garage, the power cruiser and the bass boat. In shops, stores and corporate dining rooms, conversations are no longer limited to golf scores and fishing tales. Today's conversation-opener is, "How does your garden grow?"

Four tomato plants qualifies one as a home gardener. The small plot man can talk for hours about the growth and progress of a dozen bean plants and six broccoli plants. If you hear someone talking about a Chinese garden, it doesn't mean that he is growing a crop of rice.



His garden may be half as high as it is long, with soil or organic matter piled upward, then terraced so that rows are one above the other rather than side-by-side. This is space utilization, an often important consideration where city dwellers are concerned. Apartment dwellers are planting cucumber plants in large, suspended pots, and cherry tomatoes. They're fashionable, make interesting conversation pieces, and, sometimes, produce tasty additions to a relish plate of salad arrangement.

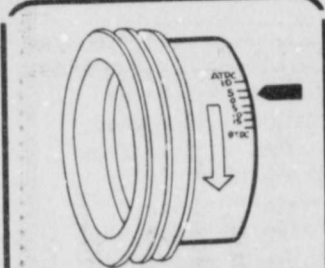
