## Car Damages House, Leaves Scene

During the night Sunday, July 19 an unidentified driver swerved off of North Main Street in Bogata, crossed a porch and ran into the front of Mrs. Lorena Willson's home.

The driver did not stop, but backed out into the street and left the scene of the accident.

Extensive damage to the southwest corner of the living room and carport resulted to the brick structure.

Mrs. Willson, who was asleep on the other side of the house, heard the noise, but did not get up to investigate, not realizing that something had actually hit

her home.

Bricks were scattered into the living room of the house, and outside and down the street.

Neighbors had seen a light colored early 1970 model vehicle racing up and down streets, spinning tires and backing in and out of driveways earlier on the

same evening.

W.T. Davis of the Red River County Sheriff's Department is investigating the accident, and attempts to locate the driver of the vehicle are being made at the present time.

Repairs to Mrs. Willson's home were started immediately.

## Robins, Friends, Cheerful Songsters

The robin, perhaps one of the best known birds in the United States, is abundant in the East Texas area.

The black capped head and bright red breast catches the eye, as well as the somewhat pompous strut he affects when hopping jauntily over lawns.

Robins are a member of the true Thrush family, a medium sized bird with a song that is, perhaps, somewhat overated as far as melody is concerned. They do not sing in long, melodious stretches, but rather short, but very cheery bursts.

The fact that the robin's snatches of song are often the first sounds of spring heard throughout a cold and bitter

winter's end undoubtedly has endeared both song and bird to many people.

The bird was named for the robin of England, when colonists, homesick for their native countryside, noticed the strong resemblance of the American bird to that of the English one. The English cousin has a much brighter, redder breast, and a sweeter song.

In the East Texas area the birds are often found nearly all year long. The young hatched up north replace those hatched in the local area each fall. The local birds move further south and the northern ones settle in during all but the coldest part of winter.

They are remarkably tame and friendly, often nesting on

porches, or in trees next to windows. Their fear of man seems minimal, and many nests of young robins can be found in the area right now.

The carefully tended lawns of today's homeowner are perfect for worm, beetle and insect hunting by robin redbreast.

Perhaps Mr. Robin may think the lawns provided for his benefit, thus explaining his friendliness toward mankind.

At one time, however, man was not such a friend. In the early part of the century robins were classified as game or sport birds, and hunted by the thousands.

People today consider them almost a symbol of spring, and would never consider making a robin pot pie, but

that wasn't an unusual dish at all back around 1900. Such hunting has long since been outlawed, however.

A harmless, cheerful little bird, they also do great good by destroying thousands of harmful insects. They are prized by many with their comic antics of hopping, nibbling at worms and providing a bright flash of color and a cheery song for the people of the area.

## Street Shows Brahman

Jim Bob Street, a nine year old member of the Franklin County 4-H, represented his county in the Texas Junior Brahman Show, and in the All American National Junior Brahman Show held at the Heart of Texas Fairgrounds in Waco June 23-27. During the five days 221 children from six different states showed a total of 379 head of cattle. Cattle were shown in classes according to their ages and whether bulls or heifers.

Jim showed a 14 month old registered gray Brahman named "Henry" that he has

raised himself and shown at various local shows. In the Texas Show, he placed second and won a red ribbon, feed tub and thirty dollars. In the National Show, he placed third with a white ribbon and fifty-five dollars.

Jim is the son of Artie and Sue Street of Route 1, Talco. The 1982 National Junior Brahman Show will be held in Lake Charles, Louisiana and Jim will be representing Franklin County 4-H again, and hoping for top honors.

Every hour of each day was filled with family oriented events and enter-

tainment, such as hamburger suppers, programs, dances, lectures, barbecues, watermelon eating, breakfasts, banquets, and many more, but most important, the feeding and care of their animals.

A state and national show is held each summer. It is a well supported event for any boy or girl ages 9 through 21 that might be interested in the Brahman breed. Anyone interested in the 1982 show in Lake Charles may contact the Franklin County Agent's office or Artie Street.

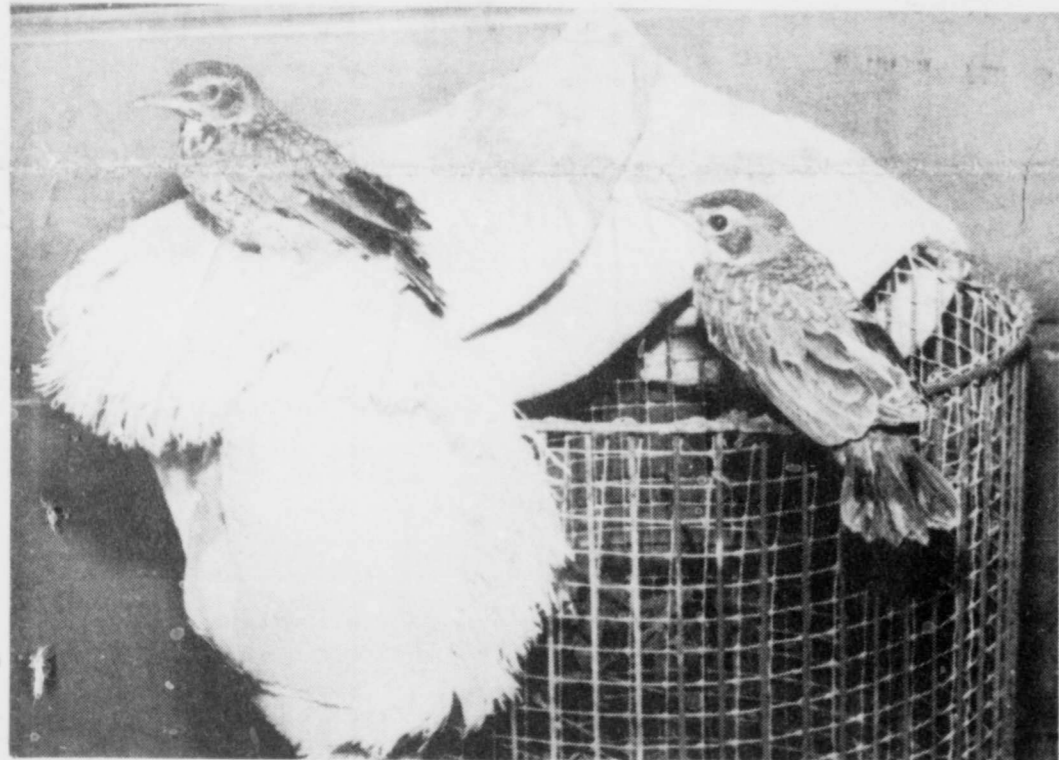
## 4-H'ers Participate In District Revue

## Tractor Pull Has New Location

Again this year local people will participate in the annual Paris Young Farmer's Tractor Pull, long a favorite event for area people.

The main change in the event this year will be the location. The new location will be on Loop 286 NW of Paris, between City Electric and Cagle's. The new site will have a three hundred foot long track, as compared to the old track at

the Rodeo Arena in Paris, which was only half as long. The Young Farmers presently have some 500 seats erected, but will put up 2000 more on Thursday before the pull. There will also be room for people to back their pickups in and sit on tailgates, or to put up lawn chairs to sit in. Parking will be more than adequate.

The first night of the pull will be on Friday, July 24 at

7:30 p.m. That night's performance will feature 5,500 pound modified tractor stock, 7,500 super stock, 9,000 pound stock, 9,200 modified and 12,000 superstock classes.

A special, and first time event will be a 5,800 four-wheel drive superstock pickup truck class.

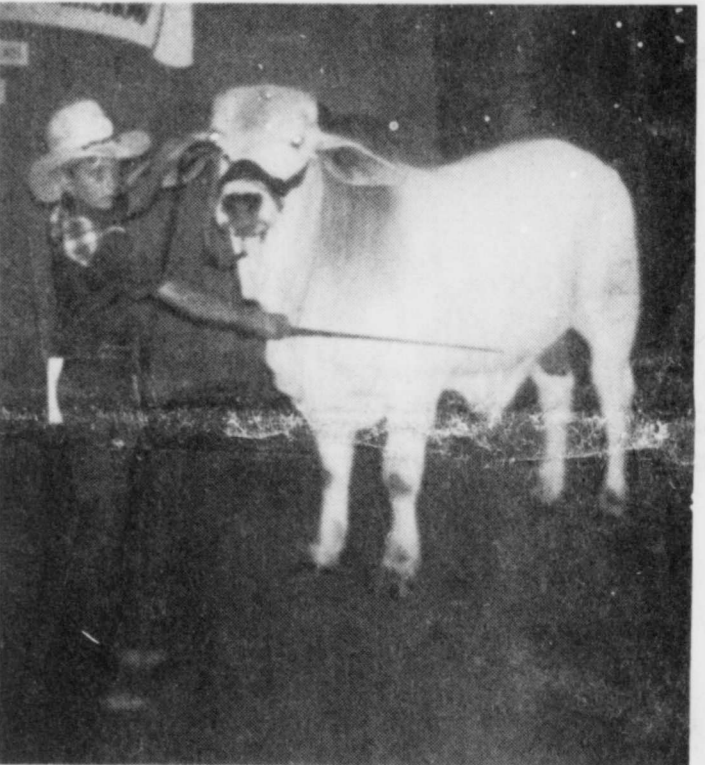
Saturday classes will include an antique class, 5,500 pound superstock, 12,000 pound stock, 7,200

modified and 9,500 pound superstock classes.

That night will be the evening for the 6,200 modified four-wheel drive trucks.

Competitors from Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana and Mississippi will vie for \$9,300 in prize money.

Proceeds from the tractor pull will help sponsor Young Farmer and community activities.

## New Rig Put In Service

CRC Circle M, Inc., an operation of Crutcher Resources Corporation, Houston, recently took delivery of a new rig at its Kilgore yard and put it into service for Dallas-based Texas Oil & Gas Corp. Rig supervisor is Jackie Woods and crew chief is Paul Snelling.

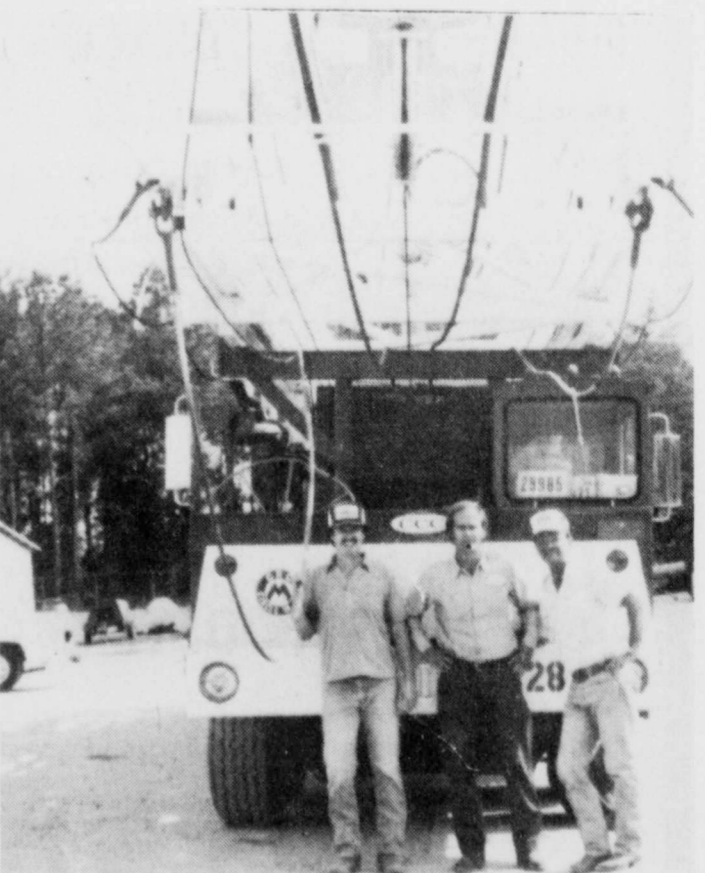
Fred T. Maxwell, president, says Rig 28 brings the CRC Circle M fleet to 26 workover units, one drilling rig and 12 vacuum tank trucks at yards in Giddings and Talco, Texas, as well as Kilgore, company headquarters.

Rig 28 is a new Crane Carrier Model 400 workover

unit with a 96-foot mast. Hookload is 215,000-pounds with drawworks powered by an 8V92 GM diesel engine. A JWS 300 National triplex pump is driven by a GM 6V92 diesel engine. The unit has a 220-barrel mud tank.

For safer, faster work, other power equipment includes a Cooper model 60 power sub and King 75-WP swivel. The rig is capable of workovers to 16,000 feet.

CRC Circle M performs oil and gas well completion, workover and servicing in East Texas, Central and South Texas and North Louisiana. Rig yards are located in Kilgore, Carthage, Talco and Giddings, Texas.

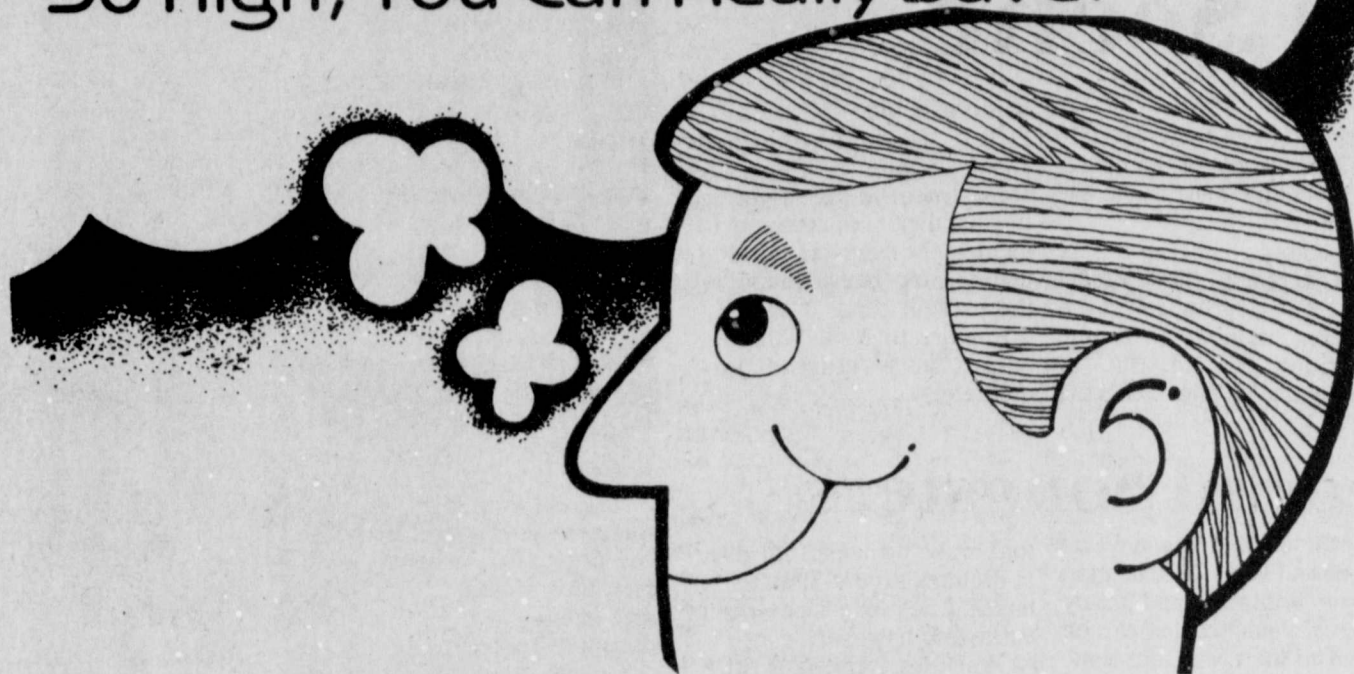

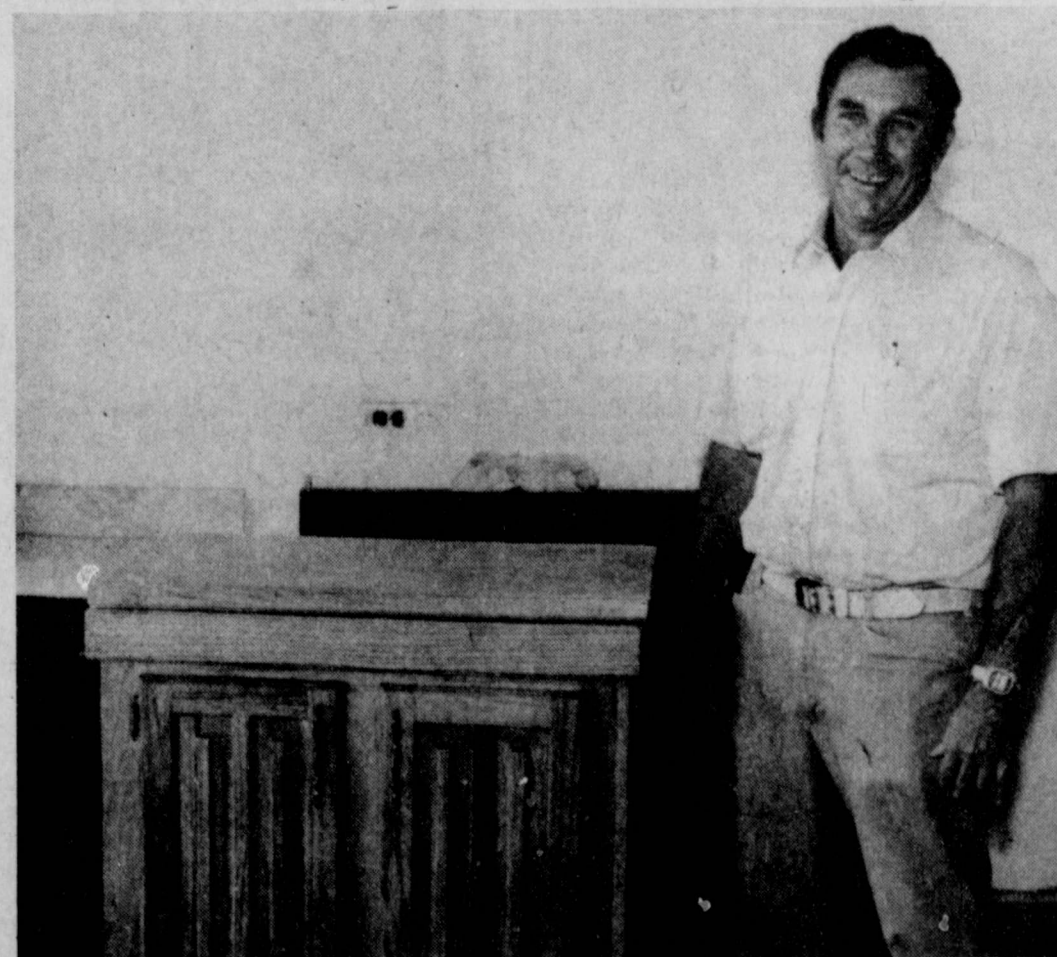

## City Sales Tax Payments Are Higher

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday said payments of the optional one-percent city sales tax for 1981 to Texas cities are 17 percent higher on a statewide average compared to last year.

Bullock's office Tuesday paid 713 Texas cities \$32,698,770 in sales tax rebates for July.

City sales taxes are collected by merchants and businesses along with the

state's four percent sales tax and are rebated monthly by the Comptroller's office.

Statewide, Texas cities have received \$343.4 million during 1981 compared to 1980 payments through July of \$291.9 million.

Rebates for our area were: Blossom-\$4,139; Bogata-\$9,428; Deport-\$3,060; and Talco-\$15,408.

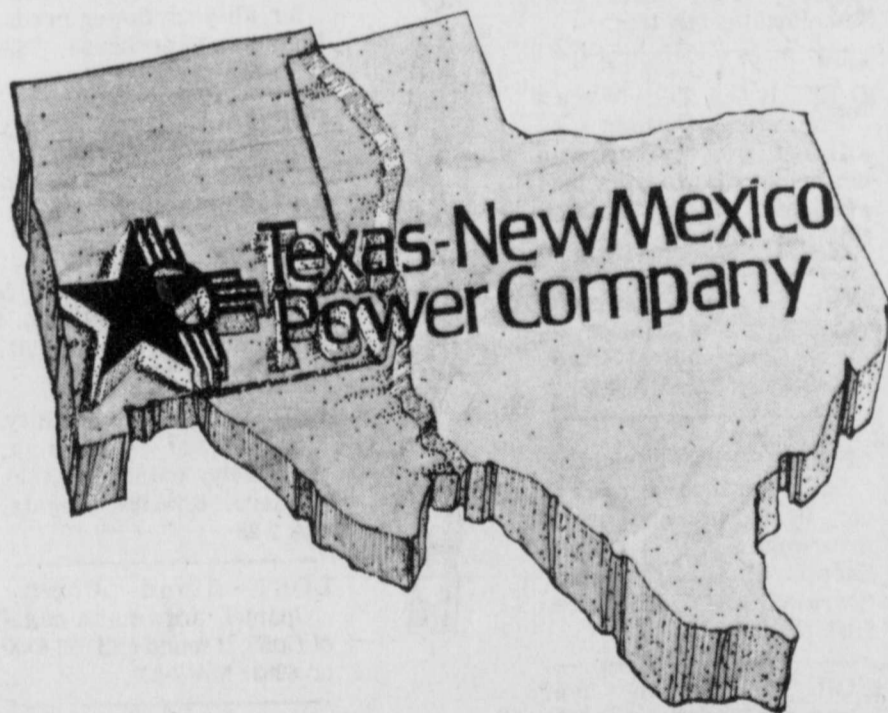

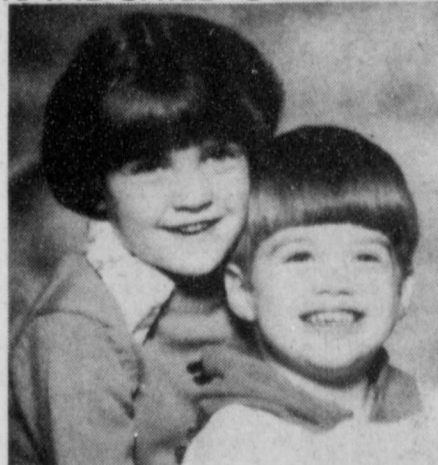
