DRUNK DRIVER CONTROL BILL COULD SAVE \$340 MILLION

AUSTIN—Texans may save \$340 million in the next two years because of one new law passed by the legislature and signed by the Governor, according to the president of the Texas Safety Association.

J. U. Parker, a Houston safety consultant, who heads the statewide safety group, made the comment today in a release from TSA's Austin office.

He explained that Governor Preston Smith had signed into law a measure aimed at controlling the problem of the drunken driver-driver. Rec-

ommended as a part of the Governor's traffic safety program, the bill establishes the presence of 0.10 percent blood alcohol concentration in a driver as a presumption of driving while intoxicated.

"Last year in Texas, abusive drinker-drivers contributed to the deaths of some 1,700 Texans on our highways. The cost to all Texans was an estimated \$348.5 million," Parker said.

"If this new law is uniformly, fairly, and firmly enforced throughout Texas it could bring into control our number one

highway safety menace and reduce the death toll by as much as 50 percent during the next two years," Parker commented.

"Such a reduction could easily save the citizens of this state \$340 million in the same period of time," the TSA president stated.

"But I must re-emphasize," Parker continued, "that we will not see a reduction in this abusive drinker-driver death toll unless there are strong efforts from the local law enforcement level and unless there is positive cooperation from the courts."

Parker said that the new drunk-driving law is evidence of growing concern by the people of Texas with this major highway safety problem.

The cotton industry and the U. S. Department of Agriculture have joined forces in a cooperative effort to attain maximum profitable yields of cotton in 1971.

The campaign was launched at the Secretary of Agriculture's press conference, recently.

Goal of the effort is to increase producer net income and profits through increased yields and obtain an adequate supply of cotton to meet needs at home and abroad.

Cong. Burleson Announces "Action Is Step In The Right Direction"

Congressman Omar Burleson announced that the Department of Transportation has indicated its intention to revise its commercial vehicle driver qualification regulations insofar as they apply to drivers of certain vehicles controlled and operated by farmers. This action followed consultations and study within the Department, with the

farm group representatives and other interested parties. Congressman Burleson stated that the Department's Federal Highway Administration found that the seasonal and intermittent nature of interstate farm operations; the general short range of the majority of farm trips; and the lower incidence of exposure of farm vehicles to highway collision risks support

revision of the regulations. "As one who has protested vehemently the restrictions on farm vehicles, and who has introduced legislation to correct this inequity," Burleson said, "this action is a step in the right direction."

He stated that the Department's revision will cover a proposed exemption from the new driver qualification rules for all drivers of farm vehicles under 10,000 pounds gross vehicle weight, a lowering of the minimum age to 18 for drivers of farmer-controlled and operated vehicles, and selected ex-

emptions from some other requirements. The agency also will consider a 150-mile radius exemption for single vehicles (nonarticulated) and limited exemptions for the larger and heavier multiple-unit (articulated) types of farm vehicles. There is also a general exemption proposed for drivers of vehicles used in custom combine harvesting operations.

"Frankly," Burleson said, "I do not think the Federal Government has any business regulating farm vehicles at all. State provisions should be sufficient and I continue to feel

there should be a complete exemption for farm vehicles."

The 32nd Fort Griffin Fandangle Celebration Is Slated In Albany

The 1971 32nd Fort Griffin Fandangle will be celebrated at the Prairie Theatre in Albany, Texas, on June 17, 18, 19 and 24, 25, 26. Barbecue, catered by the Texas Trails Chuck Wagon of Albany, will be served each evening of the Fandangle, beginning at 5:00 p. m. The price is \$2.00 per plate. A concert will be played on the steam calliope before the performances at the theatre.

The Fandangle parade will be held Thursday, June 24, at 6:00 p. m. Governor Preston Smith will lead the parade and a host of other Texas officials are expected to view the parade and attend the evening performance of the show. The Fandangle Parade, a show in itself, will have in their parade again this year the six white horses of Hardin-Simmons; the Fort Wolters marching band playing Fandangle music. Many new and original entries will be included in the 1971 Parade.

The ticket box office opened Tuesday June 1. Good seats are still available for the Fandangle performances. Tickets may be ordered from the Fandangle Ticket Office in Albany either by mail or by phone. The phone

Ticket prices are: Box seats, \$5.00; chair seats, center section and first rows of side sections, \$3.50; chair seats, side sections, \$2.00; bleacher seats, \$1.50. Special rates for tickets for Kissin' Kin night, June 17th, are as follows: Box seats \$4.00; center section and low side section chair seats, \$2.75; side section chair seats, \$1.50; bleacher seats, \$1.00.

The Fort Griffin Fandangle is a gentle satire of life at the famous western outpost of Fort Griffin, Texas, and the lively and lusty town of Griffin which sprang up in the shadow of the fort. The fort was situated on a hilltop for protection from bands of marauding Indians. The town nestled between the bottom of the hill and the Clear Fork of the Brazos River; during the 1870's and 80's, it was the scene of the wildest west. Doc Holliday lived in Griffin before he went to Tombstone. Big Nose Kate spent a night in jail at Griffin for trying to burn down a hotel. Lottie Deno, the gracious lady of the gambling tables saw her lover shot to death there. Wyatt Earp, who came to visit Doc Holliday, stayed only a few days, remarking that "Griffin is too wild for me."

The Fandangle portrays the facets of life in pioneer times—the soldiers; the saloon characters; the buffalo hunters who spent weeks hunting and skinning; the lonely cowboys who drove herds of longhorn cattle up the Western Trail to Abilene, Kansas; the mother who feared Indians, disease, loneliness; the children; the old folks, the Indians in their kingdom and in their realization that all was lost. The spectator is transported into yesteryear. He is there with history as it happened.

Since 1938 the Fort Griffin Fandangle has been recreating prairie history through pageantry and comedy and showing off Western style. During its six night summer run the Fandangle Prairie Theatre's 1600 seats are filled with people from all over the United States—people who find the show enchanting and return again to bring others with them.

School Children Must Be Vaccinated According to Law

Students Included
The immunization requirements are specified elsewhere in this policy statement and apply to all students attending public, private, or parochial schools, for example: kindergartens associated with elementary schools, elementary or secondary schools, academies, colleges, universities, and schools for the blind, deaf mentally ill and mentally retarded.

Exclusions From Compliance
Exclusions from compliance are allowable on an individualized basis for medical contraindications and religious conflicts. Students falling into these categories must submit signed affidavits as specified in the law.

Medical Contraindications
The student must present an affidavit signed by a physician, duly registered and licensed under the Medical Practice Act, in which it is stated that, in the physician's opinion, the immunization required would be injurious to the health and well-being of the applicant or any member of his family or household.

Religious Conflicts
The student must present "an affidavit signed by the applicant, or if a minor, by his parent or guardian stating that the immunization conflicts with the tenets and practice of a recognized church or religious denomination of which the applicant is an adherent or member; provided, however, that this exemption does not apply in times of emergency or epidemic declared by the Commissioner of Health."

JULY 1 WILL SEE MEDICARE PREMIUM INCREASE TO \$5.00

Because of increasing costs of medical services, Medicare's medical insurance premium will be increased from \$3.30 to \$5.00 per month effective July 1, 1971 according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene.

Those who are enrolled in the medical insurance program and who receive social security, railroad retirement, or a federal civil service pension will simply continue to have the premium deducted from their checks. People not receiving one of these payments must pay their premiums direct.

Tuley said, "Even with the impending premium increase, Medicare's medical insurance is still considered a good buy for those age 65 and over. The federal government pays one-half the cost of this insurance from general tax revenues. Those covered by medical insurance will be receiving \$11.20 worth of insurance for \$5.60.

Medical insurance helps pay for a variety of necessary medical services including doctors' bills, ambulance service, outpatient hospital treatment, and rental or purchase of durable medical equipment such as wheelchairs or hospital beds for use at home.

He stressed that the premium applies only to medical insurance. Hospital insurance, which pays for inpatient hospital service, is financed by social security payroll contributions.
