## Smoking Of Sewer Systems To Begin

Hayter Engineering personnel will begin stage IV of the City of Bogata's Sewer System Evaluation Survey the week of August 10. This stage of the survey is what is referred to as "smoking" the sewer lines to locate defects in the lines where rainwater enters the sewers. A smoke bomb will be put

into manholes or cleanouts and the smoke forced through the sewer lines by a portable gasoline powered force fan. The length of lines to be tested at one time will be from 100 to 1,000 feet. Observers will be stationed along the line being tested to locate on-the-ground and on a map where smoke rises to

the atmosphere from unauthorized openings (defects in system). The smoke is white to gray in color. It is harmless, non-burning, non-staining and will not leave a residue. Under normal circumstances, the smoke will not enter your premises. The

smoke will pass through the building vent pipe to the outside of building, and this should cause no problem. If there is an untrapped sewer opening inside your building, smoke may enter the building. Should this happen, you are advised to open doors, windows or any other means of ventilation, and temporarily vacate the building. Immediately after vacating the building, you should report the occurrence to the men conducting the tests, or call 632-5315. Should you have special problems, such as ill persons confined to bed, or persons with respiratory problems,

please call Francis Summers, City Secretary, at City Hall, 632-5315. Upon receipt of this notice, Hayter Engineering will contact you to work out a solution. A notice will be inserted in doors of each residence or business prior to smoking of lines in each area to be smoked.

## Patterson Attempting To Stop Foreign Purchase

State Representative L.P. (Pete) Patterson has requested Attorney General Mark White to attempt through federal courts to stop action on the purchase of Texasgulf Inc. by Elf Aquitaine, a French government owned corporation.

Texasgulf Inc. is one of the major corporations in the U.S. that frash sulphur and manufacture materials used in fertilizers. Three of their sulphur trasching operations are located in the State of Texas. They are in Liberty, New Gulf and Fort Stockton.

Representative Patterson contends that there could be severe economic repercussions to our farmers and agricultural communities if this transaction is allowed. There presently exists a sulphur shortage around the world, and the country of France is in desperate need of sulphur and other products that Texasgulf Inc. manufactures.

Representative Patterson feels that our own natural resources will have the potential of leaving our country, and therefore being unavailable at any price for our own use.

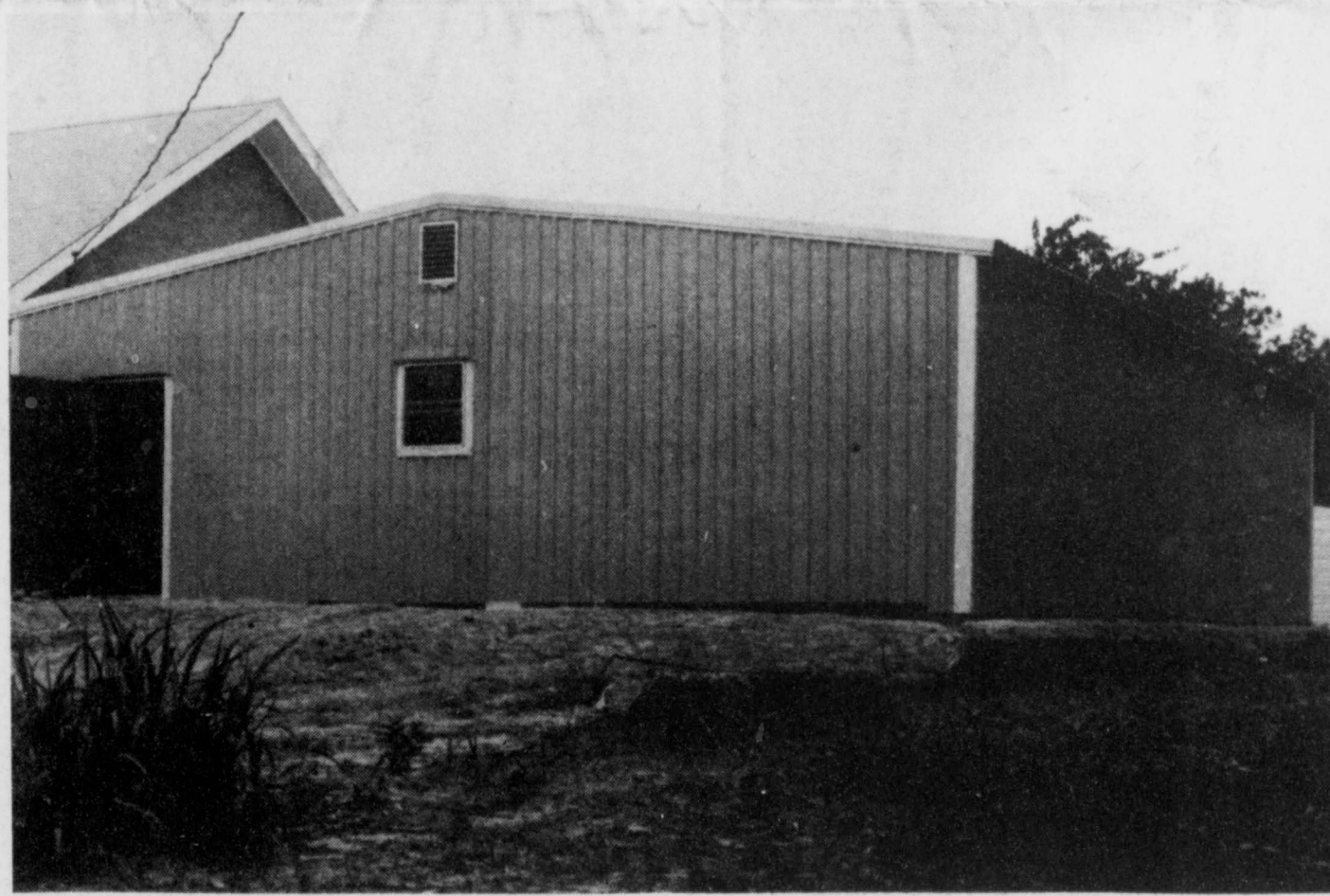

## No Repeat Of Drought This Year

Last year the first week of August was scorching, miserably hot, and incredibly dry. Multi-million dollar losses resulting from one of the worst droughts in a fourteen-state area were being reported.

This year farmers view the world from a more optimistic position, due to heavy May and June rainfall and intermittent showers during July.

In 1980 the temperature soared to 100 degrees at the middle of June and went to 100 or over every day for nearly three months. No rain of any significant amount fell. Each evening people could see the ominous bulge of the high pressure system causing the drought on their TV weather maps.

Farmers, already in trouble because of a serious drought in 1978, watched in horror as their crops shriveled and died in the fields.

The record amount of rain in the late spring has made a big difference in area crops

this year as compared to last year. Although grass on pastures and meadows was damaged by the shortage of moisture in 1980 most of the entire area is lush and green.

But the wet weather has brought some problems as well. Wheat sat in the fields for weeks after it should have been combined, because the fields were so muddy. The grain sprouted in the head, lowering prices to a poor level. The price of wheat, even the best grade, fell below the \$3 per hundred weight level, the worst price in years.

Diseases of cattle, which flourish in moist warm weather, have been prevalent. Red water disease, black leg, pink eye, summer pneumonia and fly fever have been a problem to area cattlemen.

A severe drop in the price of cattle has resulted in further problems for the cattlemen, but there are complaints. By the first of August last year

cattle were being sold because there was no grazing, or those who could were feeding hay. Only a mild winter prevented severe winter hay shortages.

Problems or not, conditions this year look good for the farmer. Milo, which is just now being harvested, received good rains during its formative stages, and yields are promisingly heavy. The price is currently at a fairly good ration also.

Cotton crops look good, as do the soy beans. most soy beans were planted behind wheat crops, and are young.

they will need more rains to produce.

Perhaps one of the major factors in this years agriculture season is the lack of extreme heat. Nothing, no matter how much moisture it may have, can resist 107 or 110 degrees of blistering sunshine day after day. The summer seems far from cool, but comparatively speaking, is quite mild.

The results of this years harvest is not in yet, won't be until November, but one thing is definitely apparent, there won't be a repeat of 1980.

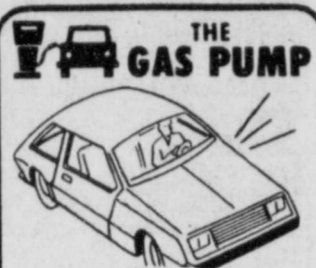

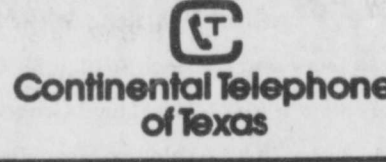
