> weeds is during April and May. Higginbotham says that if the infestation is extremely high, small areas of the pond may be treated with an approved herbicide. However, the weeds will probably be burned back temporarily with the herbicide and will begin growth again next spring. If weeds are a problem this year, the specialist says they will also be a problem next year if untreated. The best solution is to make plans now and treat the aquatic weeds next April or May when the herbicides are most effective.


My friend and I have a difference of opinion. We made a bet and agreed to let your answer decide who pays. He is helping me restore an old wash stand. We took it apart, removed the paint, sanded it and are in the process of putting it back together. But, we're having a problem. The material is hardwood and we cannot seem to get wood screws firmly set without damaging the screw slot. We have been forced to take some screws out and start all over. I say they just don't make screws as good as they used to. He says I am using the wrong size screwdriver. Who is right and who is wrong?

We don't have a one word - or a one-name answer. We do know that you are definitely doing something wrong. To do it right, you need the proper type and size wood screw; a screwdriver of the proper tip size and blade length, and the proper preparations.

An experienced carpenter would have difficulty setting a screw in hard wood if he first did not start the hole. You can use an awl, a nail, a tool or a specially designed tool you will find at your local hardware store. Oldtimers sometimes start a screw with a few taps of a hammer, but this is not recommended as it may reduce the size of the screw slot. For very hard wood, it is wise to drill all or most of the hole. Special drill bits, matched to screw sizes are available for this purpose.

If the tip of the screwdriver is wider than the screw, you will damage the surrounding surface; if it is too narrow, poor leverage will result in damage to the screw



#### **FROZEN FOODS**

When buying frozen

foods, always choose packages that are very firm and clean, without any discoloration from the contents which indicates thawing and refreezing. Look for other signs of defrosting, such as ice-coated, sweating or limp packages. The contents may be safe to eat, but there will be a quality loss. Frozen fruits should be kept firmly frozen until ready to thaw and use. Fruits selected for freezing are picked at the peak of ripeness and nutrient content, then cleaned and processed quickly-before nutrient loss can occur. Since only the finest quality fruit is used for freezing, you never have to worry about buying fruit that is spoiled, bruised or otherwise unusable.

You can have the aroma of homemade bread, fresh from the oven, with little fuss these days. It used to take hours of measuring, mixing and waiting to prepare bread. Today, the consumer can purchase readyto-use dough - already mixed - in the frozen food section of the supermarket. With this convenience product, even a 9-to-5 working woman can find the time to make homemade bread. How much does this old-

fashioned treat cost? Surprisingly, frozen bread dough averages only about 35-44 cents a one-pound loaf - a very affordable "special touch." Compare that to an average of 89 cents a pound for packaged, store-bought whole wheat bread, or 94 cents a pound for packaged Italian bread.




