Talco-Bogata School Term To Start August 24

The Talco-Bogata Schools will hold the first day of classes for the 1981-82 school year on Monday, August 24. Breakfast and lunches will be served in the cafeterias. Buses will make their regular runs on Monday morning with students remaining in school the entire day. Students should be ready and waiting for the bus a little earlier than usual. It will probably take one or two days to establish regular times for each bus route. Should the bus fail to

pick up a student for any reason, please contact the appropriate building principal. All students entering Kindergarten must be five years of age on or before September 1st of the current year. Students entering the first grade must be six years of age on or before September 1st of the current year. Kindergarten students must furnish a birth certificate before being enrolled as well as first grade students who did not attend

Kindergarten the previous year or who are enrolling for the first time in the district. Parents are also reminded that all children entering Elementary Schools in Texas must have met the required State immunizations of diphtheria, tetanus, polio, measles, and rubella. All students in high school must have diphtheria, tetanus and polio immunizations up to date. Pre-Registration for new students moving into the Talco-Bogata School district

over the summer who will be attending Rivercrest High School for the 1981-82 school term should report to the Rivercrest High School office Thursday, August 13 or Friday, August 14 between 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Registration for K-8 in the Talco and Bogata School will be held on the first day of school August 24, 1981. 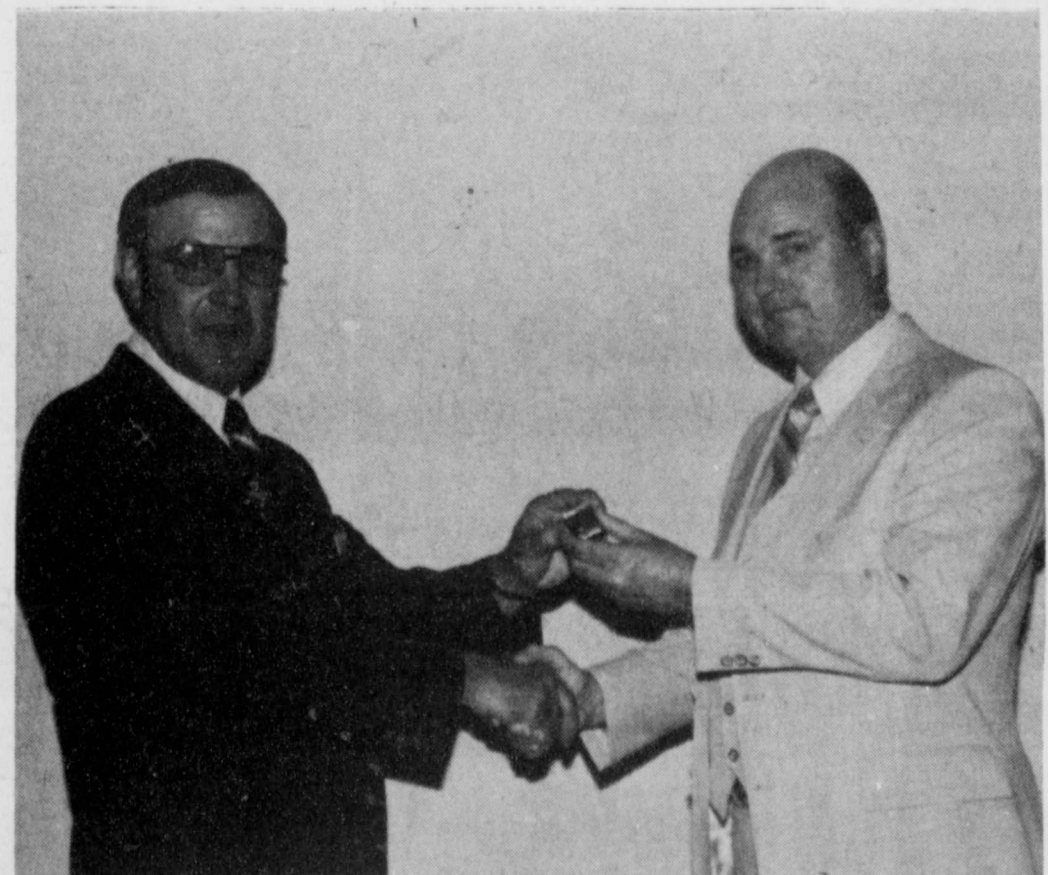
McDowra Reunion To Be Held

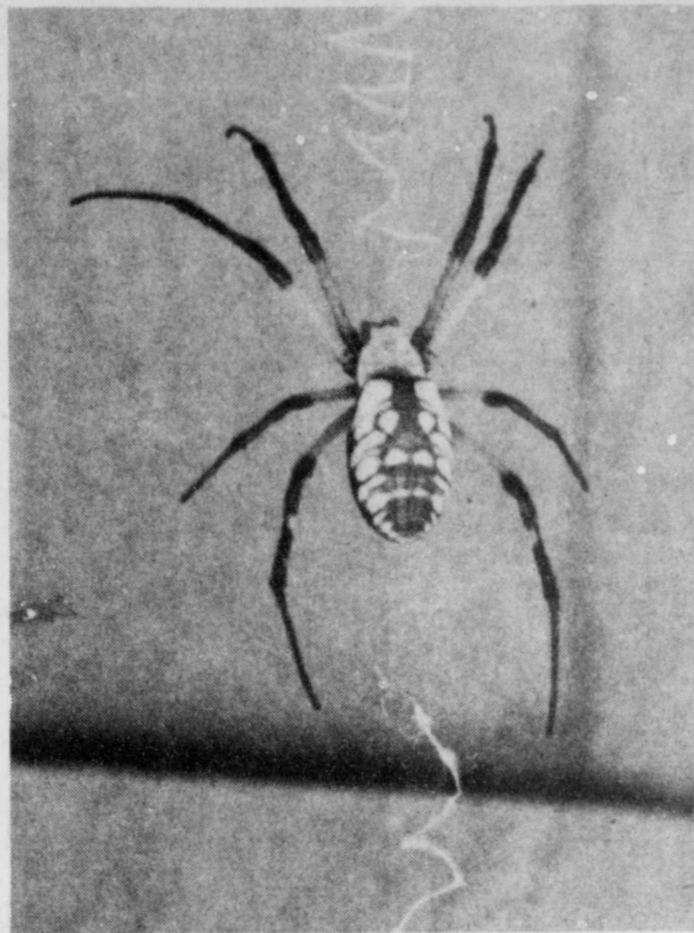

Graveside services were held Monday at the Post Oak Cemetery with the Rev. Glenn Renfro officiating. Grant Funeral Home had charge of arrangements.

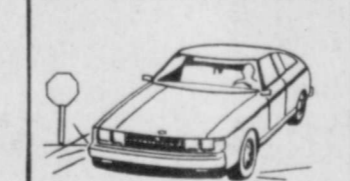
Miss Finch is survived by one brother, Roy Finch of Blossom and several nieces and nephews.
